

# Communists Seize Church Offices, Arrest Priests

## Catholics Make Fraud Accusations

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia — (AP) — Roman Catholic sources charged today Communists have seized virtually all church administrative offices in Czechoslovakia and arrested priests who resisted.

The informants said reports from various parts of the country showed repressive measures against the church are increasing. Some priests reported police charged them with "inciting unrest" after they had read from the pulpit yesterday the Catholic hierarchy's accusations of deceit, fraud, kidnapping and robbery against the Communist government.

The denunciation, in the form of a pastoral letter, was a virtual white book catalogue of alleged anti-church actions by the government, which it accused of aiming at the "extermination of the church of Christ." The letter told Catholic communists their "hour of trial" may be at hand.

Prague priests said they believed the pastoral letter, signed by Archbishop Josef Beran of Prague, Archbishop Josef Matocha of Olomouc and the country's other Catholic bishops, had received wide circulation despite police attempts to prevent the letter from being read in pulpits. Priests have reported they were warned in night police visits against reading pastoral letters, the only means for the hierarchy to tell its side of the church-state fight since the Catholic press was shut down by the government.

Churchmen said the government took over nearly all administrative offices in the archdiocese and the diocese of the country and installed, instead, officials of the Communist-sponsored Catholic Action, an organization which the archbishop has denounced as a tool of the state. Those who joined willingly have been excommunicated.

The few administrative offices still remaining in church hands also will be taken over when "old church affairs" are cleared up there, the informants said.

The informants said some priests who objected to giving up the offices were arrested. From the occupied offices, the Communist-supported groups are said to be issuing their own orders and attacks on the hierarchy.

The separatist group also was said to have accused the hierarchy of backing a church-state agreement. The pastoral letter said that under present circumstances, no church-state agreement is possible.

"We desire an agreement, not a dictate," said the letter, read by priests in churches throughout the country. (See COMMUNISTS, Page 5)

## Mrs. Alfred Reynolds Dies; Treatment Sought for Child

Mrs. Alfred Reynolds, 712 E. Locust, died at the John Sealy Hospital in Galveston at 7:30 a. m. yesterday. The News was notified this morning.

Mrs. Reynolds, whose disease was diagnosed as a very rare type of anemia in which the body was unable to piece white blood corpuscles and the substance that causes the blood to clot, was flown to the Galveston hospital June 11 by Roy Webb, Jr.

Her physician and the local Red Cross chapter made arrangements for her admittance to the state hospital where greater facilities exist for treating such rare diseases than can be found locally.

While at the hospital, Mrs. Reynolds was given blood from the Red Cross blood bank in Galveston. Her daily transfusions soon exhausted the supply of such rare blood, and repeated appeals were published Thursday for donors to replenish the bank's supply.

More than the needed supply was soon obtained, but her condition turned critical over the weekend.

A Duenkel-Carmichael ambulance that left yesterday morning for Galveston is expected to bring Mrs. Reynolds's body back this evening. Her husband will also return with the ambulance.

Funeral arrangements, to be conducted by the Duenkel-Carmichael Funeral Home, are pending his arrival.

Application was made this morning to the Shrine hospital for crippled children in Dallas to admit the Reynolds' three-year-old daughter, Sandra Louise, for treatment.

If the child can be admitted, it may mark an end to the series of tragedies that have struck the Reynolds family over the past few years.

The child fell against a gas heater in December 1947, when she was only a year old, and severely burned her hand. Now she is in need of an operation to keep the hand from becoming deformed.

Reynolds was preparing to have the hand operated. (See REYNOLDS, Page 5)

### HOUSE FACES TEST VOTING ON HOUSING

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House approached its first test voting today on a multi-billion dollar administration program up for decision after a week of hot debate. Confident House leaders predicted the Senate-passed housing bill would go to the White House by Friday as a major victory for President Truman's "fair deal" program.

But the opposition, including many Republicans and some Southern Democrats, refused to give up.

Rep. Cole (R-Kans) said he would offer an amendment that would postpone the launching of a public housing program for as long as the federal treasury operates in the red.

This would be in line with the sharp, double-edged attack already launched against the bill as: (1) a threat to the financial stability of the government, and (2) a long step in federal control that would take America down the road toward socialism.

Administration Democrats and some Republicans have argued.

Three days later a Navy veteran was flogged, a woman and two men were beaten at Dora, Ala., and then a coal miner was dragged from his home at Coaltown and whipped.

An aroused American Legion in Birmingham formed a committee of 500 to help officers bring the masked raiders to justice.

## Wichita Is In Cleanup

WICHITA FALLS — (AP) — Another phase in Wichita Falls' cleanup campaign to fight polio starts today.

Yesterday two B-26 bombers swooped low over the city to lay a cloud of DDT against flies and mosquitoes. Today, a fogging machine and hand-sprayers will be used in alleys.

Tomorrow, the city gets another aerial DDT spraying and also holds a big cleanup drive. From Sixth to 11th Streets and from Labor Street to the Railway Station, the city will get a scrubbing. About 1,200 persons have enlisted in scrubbing.

The polio figure for the year in Wichita Falls is 23. There has been one death. Fourteen cases have come from within the city.

The B-26 planes were from the Texas Air National Guard. All stores will close tomorrow morning until a fire siren gives a signal the town is cleaned up.

## Shadow of Lash and Burning Cross Hanging Over Dixie

ATLANTA — (AP) — The shadow of the lash and burning cross today hangs heavy over Dixie. Out of three states since February — Alabama, Tennessee and Georgia — have come 51 grim stories of a lynching, floggings, cross-burnings, bombings and intimidations.

Though men and women have been beaten, their homes invaded by masked men and their lives threatened, the law has yet to record a single conviction.

This latest pattern of violence began developing around Chattanooga, Tenn. There in three months 21 men were beaten by hooded gangs.

In each of these cases the victims said they were whipped for reasons of race, religion or morals, drinking mostly.

The head of the KKK in Alabama ordered Klansmen to discard their masks in public. His act has prompted some Klansmen to threaten revolt.

Since the expensive and attractive metal markers have been put up, at least four have been destroyed by automobiles ramming and twisting the poles out of shape to the extent where they had to be taken down and replaced.

"It seems funny," one city official said this morning, "that they can miss all of the trees, but hit the street signs."

Smaller boys have used the signs to chin themselves causing some to hang at dizzy angles and others to break off altogether.

All in all, about 14 markers have been damaged or ruined since the street marking was completed three weeks ago. Some of the damage was done during the month the injured showed none spent putting them into place.

City Manager Dick Pepin said this morning that the job was considered completed three weeks ago, but that a few still remain to be placed.

Instead of a reduction for the 100 and 200 blocks of N. Cuyler and the first 50 feet in the 100 block of S. Cuyler, the board raised land valuations there 12.5 percent. The remainder of the 100 block of S. Cuyler will remain the same as last year.

Speaking for the board, J. Wade Duncan told newsmen the board made the change because the land value of those three blocks was considered too cheap in comparison with property in the remainder of the city.

The action does not affect buildings erected on the lots. They will be taxed on the same scale as last year.

Taxable school lands outside the city will remain the same as last year.

In the meantime two types of valuation notices to property owners will be sent out.

The first type—a courtesy notice—will be sent to property owners who have built houses, or remodeled houses, on their lots in the past 12 months because those improvements were not on the tax rolls previously.

## Six Guns Stolen From Texas Ranger

DALLAS — (AP) — This Texas Ranger lost his six guns. Visiting Capt. Bob Crowder of the Rangers' Lubbock department reported to Dallas police that six shotguns had been stolen from him.

Two men, whose pictures are on file in the Dallas Police Identification Department, are suspected of stealing the guns.

## Two Die as Bus Rakes Bridge Side

GARLAND — (AP) — A 12-year-old boy and an East Texas State College co-ed were killed when a Continental Southern Trailways bus raked the side of a 109-foot creek bridge near here. Four others were seriously injured.

The dead were Billy Mack Ham, 12, of Cooper, Tex., and a woman identified as Miss Norma Charlene Floyd, 20, an East Texas State College student from Corsicana, Tex.

Concrete pillars of the bridge ripped great holes in the steel side of the bus as it struck yesterday. The boy was cut in half and the Floyd girl's feet were severed.

Thirty-seven passengers were on the bus, headed for Hot Springs, Ark., via Greenville and Texarkana. Almost all were bruised to some extent.

The bus left Dallas at 2:45 p. m. The accident happened about 3 p. m., approximately three miles northeast of Garland.

Part of the Ham boy's body was found on the bridge and part inside the bus.

The woman's body was found some hours after the accident after the waters of Rowlett Creek had been ordered dragged by Dallas County Sheriff Bill Decker.

A pair of feet were first found on the bridge. A check of the seriously injured showed none had suffered immediate amputations. Decker then ordered the creek waters dragged.

## Lerroux of Spain Dies

MADRID, Spain — (AP) — Alejandro Lerroux, 85, five times premier of republican Spain, died early this morning.

The family announced that Lerroux, who had proclaimed his agnosticism throughout his life, returned to the Catholic Church and received the sacrament on his deathbed.

Lerroux was reported in Lisbon, Portugal, in 1945. He had been in exile there since the civil war. In 1947 Generalissimo Franco gave him permission to return to Spain.

A life-long Republican, he had been exiled several times by King Alfonso XIII. Each time he returned, his power as chief of the radical Republican Party grew greater.

Five times, however, he was named premier to try to run Spain on a middle-of-the-road basis.

## Man Injured In Car Wreck

A car-truck crash near White Deer early this morning sent Jim Powers, White Deer, to the hospital with serious, but not fully determined injuries.

According to physicians at Worley Hospital, the injured man suffered no fractures, but has a "definite concussion." He was placed under observation to determine whether he had received internal injuries.

Details of the crash were meager at noon today, but reports stated Powers was injured when his car and a wheat truck collided on a road one mile west and one mile north of White Deer shortly after 9 a. m.

State Highway Patrolmen investigated the accident, but were not available for a detailed report by press time today.

## COURT ORDER NEEDED TO CHECK ELECTION

Pampa News Staff Editor's Note: This is the second and final installment explaining how the new "secret ballot" law operates, showing what happens to ballots and stubs after an election.

When the election is over, the stub box is delivered to the district clerk and the ballot box to the county clerk. The district clerk retains the sealed stub box for 60 days and then destroys the stubs by fire in the presence of the county judge.

The sealed box may be opened only on order of the district judge who has authority to punish anyone for contempt of court who opens the box without his order.

But, it's possible to tell when it is possible to tell who voted for who although it would be learned only in the event of a contested election.

In that event the stub box would be opened, on order of the Court, and the numbers and stubs checked against the numbers on the ballots in the corresponding voting precinct box. With the voter's signature on the reverse side of the numbered stub his ballot can easily be found and how he voted would no longer be a secret.

To balance this is the fact that the ballot box and the stub box are in the hands of two different officials after an election. This would make it necessary for the county clerk to conspire with the district clerk should either want to tamper with the votes. Also, in the event of a contest, stuffing could be detected if the ballot box had more ballots than the stub box. Counting out could be detected if the stub box had more stubs than the ballot box had ballots.

Stub boxes could also be checked against stub boxes of other voting precincts to learn if anyone had voted twice in the same election.

All in all the new law does make the ballot secret during polling and counting hours, and after the 60-day waiting period. If no contest arises, the ballot is 100 percent secret. If a contest arises, checks against the numbers on the ballot are brought out into the open and who voted for whom will show up.

## Talks Will Be Resumed

BERLIN — (AP) — The Allies announced today four-power talks on Germany will be revived tomorrow afternoon. The five-week-long rail strike which has imposed a virtual blockade on Berlin is scheduled to end in the morning.

The meeting of the four deputy military governors will be held in the Allied Control Authority Building, virtually deserted for a year.

They met last on March 17, 1948. Their new conference was called to carry out the will of the Big Four foreign ministers, who decided at Paris a week ago today that four-power talks should be begun to forge at least a way of life for Germany and Berlin even though major disagreements on policy in the divided city and nation still exist.

Informed sources said tomorrow's agenda probably would include the trade situation and transport conditions.

Soviet-occupied Eastern Germany is sagging. In Western occupied zones, it is booming.

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## Care and Feeding of Screens

By ROBERT SCHARF

Nothing can detract from the looks of your home more than shabby screens. But screen maintenance is something most homeowners can do in their spare time, with few tools. Good care will also lengthen the life of screens.

Before screens are hung, they should be washed thoroughly and the condition of the frame checked. If the joints are weak or broken, they can be strengthened by screwing metal braces to the frame corners.

If the screening is rusted or corroded, scrub it clean with hot water and soap. Then brush on turpentine to loosen and remove most of the rust and corrosion. Finally, paint both sides of the screen with a coat of screen enamel or spar varnish thinned with turpentine. Paint the frame, also, to help prevent deterioration.

## You Can Beat Heat 20 Ways

1. Close windows and doors during mid-day.
2. Draw shades on "sunny side."
3. Replace heavy wool rugs with fibre or cotton rugs; or use no rugs at all.
4. Store heavy draperies; replace with light open-mesh material, or use no curtains at all.
5. Put light-colored washable slipcovers on upholstered furniture.
6. Cool off the house exterior by hosing it down in late afternoon; also wet down driveways and walks.
7. Place electric fan near window, so that it blows across a bowl of ice.
8. Hang sheets dampened in cold water in doorways with an electric fan circulating air across them.
9. Make the house as much as 15 degrees cooler with 4" of mineral wool insulation between roof and living quarters.
10. Do a minimum of top-of-stove cooking; use the insulated oven instead; plan light, simple meals.
11. Close kitchen from other rooms while cooking.
12. Open kitchen windows while cooking; expel superheated air with ventilating fan or electric fan blowing outward in an open window.
13. Cross-ventilate the attic 24 hours a day, or use a ventilating fan during afternoon and evening.
14. Open all doors and windows in the evening and place two of three electric fans in windows in different rooms to blow inward and draw cool air quickly into the house.
15. Use electric lights sparingly; replace high wattage bulbs with lamps of less intensity.
16. Do the ironing in the cool morning hours.
17. Wear loose, lightweight clothing.
18. Don't over-work, over-play or over-eat.
19. Don't watch the thermometer!
20. Keep cool-tempered; don't fly off the handle!




inches apart. Alternate the angle of slope from nail to nail. Space the nails three inches apart at the edges and 3-8-inch away from the edge. Leave a space of about 1-8-inch between boards.

Where the nails are to be concealed under moldings, large headed nails may be used.

The proper methods of applying insulating board in the plank and tile shapes vary with the products. Some manufacturers have developed clip systems and interlocking joints which eliminate exposed nailing. Full directions for application can be obtained from the dealer who supplies the material.

In putting up tileboard units it is especially important that the framing or nailing strips conform with the size of the units used. For 12- or 24-inch tileboards, the nailing strips should be on 12-inch centers. A choice of 8-inch or 16-inch centers is allowed for units 16-inch or 32-inch wide, but striping 8 inches on centers provides for additional: 1 nailing and a better job.

CAN USE ADHESIVES

Unless otherwise specified in the manufacturer's instructions, 1-1/4-inch finishing nails or brads or cadmium plated diamond point nails should be used for half-inch planks and tileboards. They should be driven at an angle and set below the surface.

Nailing strips for planks should be placed at right angles to the plank on 9-inch centers up to a height of five feet. Above five feet the strips may be 12 or 16 inches apart.

Tileboard and plank also can be put on with special adhesives over sound plaster, smooth wood, plaster board or other continuous surface. Many manufacturers provide or recommend an adhesive for the purpose. Some supplementary nailing usually is advisable when an

## Here's Tip On Inside Finishing

Building interior walls and ceilings with insulating board products can be handled successfully by the average home handy man, if he will take the time to follow a few simple instructions. Here are some of the points to keep in mind for a clean-cut, long-lasting job:

Insulating board in the large sheets generally is applied by nailing to the framing members. The upright members should be installed not more than 16 inches apart, center to center. The boards preferably should be long enough to span between sills and plates. If vertical joints should occur, headers are needed behind them for a nailing base. Headers also are advisable back of chair rails and all other heavy moldings.

To permit the boards to become adjusted to atmospheric conditions, place them singly around the room at least 24 hours prior to nailing them in place.

If the nailing is to be exposed, or covered with paints or stains, the insulating board should be attached by means of finishing nails or brads, driven at an angle and set. Nails 1 1/4 inches long are recommended for half-inch board. The insulating board should be nailed first to the intermediate framing members and then along the edges. On the intermediate members, space the nails six

## Oldtimers Give Views on Changing Texas Weather

(Written for the AP)  
DALLAS, Tex. —(AP)— People are looking at the skies these days for something more than signs of rain, hail or dust storms.

They are looking for tornadoes.

The old boys with legs bowed from years of wrapping 'em around a cow pony will push their Stetsons back on snow-capped heads and tell you they don't like this new twist to the weather. They'd prefer it like in the old days when winds and liquor were both hard and straight.

"They all pretty much feel like 'Uncle Bill' McIntosh who used to punch cattle on the Texas High Plains fifty years ago and is still in the cattle business in Dalhart. 'Up here in the peak of Texas,' he said, 'we used to give out with a belly laugh when someone asked if we were afraid of tornadoes. We'd snort derisively that we'd never had one — our straight winds blew 'em plumb to perdition."

But those days are gone forever. Twice this spring a tornado has struck near Dalhart, one with five miles, the other within four. Other twisters have hit the Panhandle this spring. The worst was a death-dealing tornado that lashed Amarillo in May.

The favorite spawning ground of tornadoes, so far as the Dalhart country is concerned, is along Rita Blanca Canyon about 12 miles south of Dalhart. The first tornado the oldtimers can remember formed in that sector in 1921. It dissipated near Dalhart and killed no one.

The second tornado to spawn along the Rita Blanca drew 12 miles south of Dalhart was two years ago. It dipped to earth almost immediately, rattled and damaged buildings and the residence of Everett McIntyre, but did not injure him or his wife.

The third tornado was born in that area in April this year, again struck the McIntyre farm, did more damage than his predecessor, then hopped and skipped northeastward nearly 30 miles before it broke up. It damaged buildings on a half dozen farms and ranches.

The second one followed by about a month, striking in mid-May. It formed near Nara Visa, N. M., 45 miles southwest of Dalhart on the Rock Island Railroad and U. S. Highway 84. The funnel form passed over Nara Visa about noon on Monday, May 16, and smacked its leisurely and very damaging way northeastward until after midnight it dissipated near Guymon, Okla. It killed a man in Oklahoma.

Cow country calculating about the reasons for this spring's tornadoes, by far the worst since the second one struck May 16.

W. W. (Chunky) Bowling, a retired cattleman who moved to Dalhart 49 years ago, is positive the Dalhart cow country weather has changed. "Uncle Bill" McIntosh agrees. Most of the change has come since the Dust Bowl days that spanned the mid-1930s.

Bowling pointed out that there are less winter blizzards now than 20 years ago. Incidentally, blizzards have claimed many more

lives in this Panhandle country than tornadoes.

June temperatures in the Dalhart country always used to read 104, with a record top of 106. Now temperatures are lower — one summer the top was 93 — but the air is more humid. "We've had eight good crops in succession," Bowling said. "That never happened before."

Flossie Rhodes, who grew up in this country, says her nephew contends that the mounting weight of the polar ice cap has caused the earth to tilt more on its axis, changing the climate in certain areas.
