

President Truman Carries Fight for European Recovery Aid to the People

'Slash Would Be a Gain for Commies'

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. —P— President Truman carried to the people his fight to keep Congress from slashing European aid funds, declaring such action "would be a great gain for communism."

"If we were to falter now and cut down our aid," he said in a nationally-broadcast address, "the momentum of recovery would be destroyed. The people of these countries would be thrown into confusion and their advance toward economic self-reliance would be blocked."

"A slash in the funds available for European recovery at this time would be the worst kind of false economy. It would cancel the hopes and the plans of the Western European nations. It would be a great gain for communism."

Speaking at dedication ceremonies for the world war memorial park, the President sharply challenged economy advocates "who try to convince us that we cannot afford to pay the price of peace."

"These," he said, "are the same voices that misled us in the 1920's."

Demands for a cut in ECA funds have come from members of both parties in the Senate, where the Appropriations Committee is now considering a bill to finance European relief during the coming months.

"I am confident we shall not make this mistake," Mr. Truman declared.

The President's speech sounded the theme that this country still has a long way to go "before we can make the free world secure against the social and political evils on which communism thrives."

"The cause of peace and freedom is still threatened," he said. "Predicting that the North Atlantic Pact will soon be passed by an overwhelming majority in the Senate," Mr. Truman declared it is "vital" to follow this up with a program of military aid to increase the effective strength of the free nations against aggression.

Mrs. Cooper's time was 26.3 seconds. She was closely followed by Texie Harlan of Kellerville, who rode the barrels in 26.7 seconds.

Betty Rae Bullock of Samnorwood and Ora Waldrop of Amarillo are tied for third place in the rodeo's first go-round with identical times of 28 seconds.

In the calf scramble, held this year for the first time, Carl Daner caught and tied his calf quicker than any of the other youngsters in the arena and won a white face Hereford calf for his own.

In Friday night's kid pony show, the first feature of this year's rodeo, Lee Cockrell of Pampa placed first in three events. Jimmie Bateman and Carol Carnes followed him closely by taking two firsts apiece.

In Group 1, for youngsters 7 to 7, Bobby Andis and Lou Ann Taylor, both of Pampa, took first and second, and Bob Frost of Endrie, N.M., took third place.

Jimmie Bateman of Knox City, Jimmie Hopkins of Hopkins, and Stan Organ of Pampa took the first three places in Group 2, for the 8-to-10-year-old section.

Damage suit over broiler plant settled out of court.

The petit jury summoned to appear at 10 a. m. tomorrow in 31st District Court was ordered by Judge Lewis M. Goodrich when the only case slated to go to trial was settled out of court.

The settled case was the damage suit brought by Alvin D. Henry against W. T. Hamm seeking \$2,750 damages. The plaintiff claimed damages caused by the gases and odors given off by the Top of Texas Broiler Co. owned by Hamm.

In a written agreement, signed by all parties, Hamm will continue to operate his chicken broiler plant until July 24 when he will shut down and move to other quarters. This will permit Hamm to work out all chickens he now has in stock. In drawing up the agreement, Henry waived all claims to any damages. The agreement was approved by Judge Goodrich who last week granted a temporary injunction but stayed the writ until June 13. This move by the court forced the defense into either settlement or going to trial Monday and prevented any delaying action. Judge Goodrich, in signing the injunction, said that if the trial was delayed for any reason he would issue the writ, temporarily halting the broiler plant from operating.

The plant will now operate for six weeks at its present location, then close down and move elsewhere.

Late Friday afternoon an agreed settlement was approved by the court granting a \$675 damage award to E. B. Daley against Harriett and H. C. Nash. The award was for damages caused to Daley's car on Dec. 20, 1948, when Nash's car, operated by his daughter, Harriett, crashed into the rear end of it on Highway 70 six miles north of Pampa.

A motion on plea of privilege by attorneys for Walter A. Teague, defendant in a child-custody case, was granted by the court. The suit was styled "Metcalf vs. Teague, Walter A. Teague vs. Metcalf." (See PLEA, Page 5)

Public Hearings to Continue in Probe

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Senator McMahon (D-Conn.) said yesterday the public airing of "incredible mismanagement" charges against the Atomic Energy Commission will go forward Monday despite the secrecy bars raised on some phases of the investigation.

He said he hopes that Senator Hickenlooper (R-Iowa), author of the charges, will be ready then to proceed with his case. But McMahon added that if the Iowa in not ready, "then I have some

matters I want to present in open session."

McMahon is chairman and Hickenlooper the former chairman of the joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee which is looking into the charges.

Hickenlooper made no immediate announcement of his intentions. He had commented earlier, however, that the committee's action in voting 9 to 8 for closed-door hearings on cases involving the loyalty of AEC employees had left him undecided as to his next move.

McMahon told a news conference:

1. He will again bring up the matter of shipping radioactive isotopes (atomic bomb material) to foreign nations if Hickenlooper is not ready Monday.

2. The committee is turning to Attorney General Tom Clark and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover for advice on how to proceed with the loyalty issues raised by Hickenlooper.

3. No decision has been reached whether to hold hearings, either public or private, on "Case A." That is the designation of an Atomic Energy Commission employee who, according to Hickenlooper, wrote "one of the hottest atomic documents ever as a member" after he had been suspended following an FBI loyalty check and then reinstated.

"Case A" has asked the committee for a hearing and AEC Chairman David E. Lilienthal in a letter to McMahon said he would be glad to have a hearing on this one of the major problems which the subcommittee will lay before Clark and Hoover.

The commission's radioactive isotope export program came under Congressional fire last week when it was learned that non-isotopes had been sent to the Norwegian military establishment.

Radioactive isotopes are atomic particles useful as "tracers" in many fields of research, both military and non-military. The question of whether an iron isotope, such as sent to Norway, can help in the development of heat

Agreement Ends Berlin Rail Strike

BERLIN —(AP)— American-Russian agreement last night signalled the end of the Berlin rail strike. Prompt union acceptance predicted by strike leaders, promised to break open the floodgates for 150,000 tons of supplies tied up in what amounted to a "little blockade."

Leaders of the anti-Communist rail union, the UGO, said the 14,000 strikers would formally accept tomorrow a set of peace terms backed up by a solid Western guarantee and that traffic would move as soon as snarls accumulated in three weeks of chaos are cleared up.

Brig. Gen. L. Howley, the U.S. commandant, negotiated the railway agreement. He announced the terms and told strikers "it is the conviction of the Western Allied commandants that this is a fair offer and I have been assured that it will be carried out exactly."

The Soviet-controlled reichsbahn (railway) promised Howley it would pay at least 60 percent of the workers' wages in west marks. The West Berlin city government will authorize payment for the next three months of up to 15 percent additional to the workers in the same currency.

The workers had demanded all their pay in west marks, worth four times as much as the Soviet-sponsored east marks. They also had demanded recognition by the Russians of their union and assurance of no reprisals.

The union failed to win recognition, but said the fight for it would go on. The issue was sidestepped in Howley's negotiations. UGO leaders said, however, (See AGREEMENT, Page 5)

HST SEEKS VOTES WITH FARM PLAN

WASHINGTON —(AP)— President Truman's top political lieutenants are headed for the corn belt with the administration's big farm program as a vote-getting argument for 1950.

They will open a two-day political conference in Des Moines, Iowa, this afternoon, aiming to lay the groundwork for next year's congressional campaigns and to hold Democratic farm gains of last fall.

From the Capital are coming such Democratic leaders as Vice President Barkley, Secretary of Labor Tobin, Attorney General Clark, Senator J. Howard McGrath of Rhode Island, the Democratic national chairman, and Senator Elmer Thomas of Oklahoma, chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee.

The farm conference is the first major field move of the Democrats in their battle with the Republicans for the farm vote.

Midwestern farm states have been credited with playing a major part in Mr. Truman's 1948 presidential victory.

Party leaders said several thousand Midwest Democratic chainmen as well as representatives of farm, labor and consumer groups are expected to take part.

The immediate goal of the meeting will be to sell the idea Democrats can and will do more than Republicans to solve postwar problems of agriculture.

The sales talk will center largely on a new farm plan advanced by Secretary Brannan. The plan is set out in a report (See HST SEEKS, Page 5)

U. S.-Soviet Ministers In Session

PARIS —(AP)— Russian and American foreign ministers unexpectedly arranged a dinner date Saturday after Andrei Vishinsky spent several hours in contact with Moscow over the big four German deadlock.

Secretary of State Dean Acheson decided to take along his top advisers on Germany — just in case the Russian had some new ideas to put forward which could break the logjam.

At Vishinsky's request, the Foreign Ministers Council was taking a day's recess until today. Most Western officials believed the Soviet diplomat was awaiting fresh instructions from the Kremlin.

Acheson and his advisers — Dr. Philip C. Jessup, Robert Murphy and Charles E. Bohlen — were to be Vishinsky's guests at dinner Saturday night in the Russian embassy. A week ago Vishinsky was Acheson's guest at a small dinner party.

Acheson, French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin conferred yesterday afternoon to map strategy for today's session.

With the conference still in deadlock, there was a growing belief by many of the Western power delegates that Germany can be settled only by the Germans themselves.

In the final session of the now three-week old conference, Vishinsky dusted off his old proposal that the powers get busy on a German treaty and pull their troops out of Germany within a year after it was signed. The Western powers said talk of treaty at this time was futile in view of their inability to agree either on unification of Germany or of Berlin.

Secretary of State Dean Acheson proposed instead that they get on with discussion of the Austrian treaty and some provisional arrangements for Germany. During the coming three days, he said it would be possible for deputies to examine whether any hope of agreement on a German treaty remained. He bluntly stated he was not willing to remain beyond the end of the week.

It seemed to put a seal on the prospect of any real East-West agreement.

**Arguments for Both Sides Offered
On Question of Communist Teachers**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — There's been a running argument for months over this question: Should a Communist Party member be allowed to teach in American schools?

Those on the "yes side," putting their emphasis on the importance of academic freedom, argue this way:
A teacher should not be interfered with unless he's caught trying to twist his teaching to fit the party line.
To do that, they say, would require spying and once spying started in a school the faculty would be paralyzed or ruined.
They argue that once a man is a Communist Party member he is no longer free to teach what he may truly think because:
He is a disciplined party member and must follow the party line, no matter how it shifts or changes.

Arthur M. Schlesinger, Jr., author of the "Age of Jackson," reached an astonishing conclusion on May 14 in the Saturday Review of Literature when he said:
No university in its "senses" would knowingly hire a Communist, but once such a man was hired he shouldn't be fired for his beliefs alone unless having him around was a real danger.
Those who say a Communist should not be hired to teach received their strongest support this week from 20 educators, including General Eisenhower, president of B. Conant, president of Harvard.

In a 64-page booklet they said: "Members of the Communist Party of the United States should not be employed as teachers." They said party members are not "free to think for themselves," "It is because members of the party are required to surrender this right, as a consequence becoming part of a movement characterized by conspiracy and calculated deceit, that they should be excluded from employment as teachers."

SOUTHERN EDUCATORS PLAN NEW PROGRAM

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — (AP) — A South reached down yesterday yanked at its own bootstraps to pull away from some of its educational difficulties.

It was E-Day—education day—for a nucleus of 14 colleges and universities in 13 states. Educators and statemen sat down to form the board of control for Southern regional education, a reciprocal plan unique in American history.

Already contracts have been signed with six institutions for medical, dental and veterinary training. The others are expected to begin participation shortly.

Already, 464 students—232 of them Negroes—have been allotted the 14 institutions for the above types of training. For this the several states will pay to the institutions concerned a total of \$1,630,000 for 1949-51.

Yesterday was the day set for perfecting the organization begun last year, and to consider suggestions made by some 40 university officials, including six Negroes, who sat down to discuss such problems as:

Methods of securing more effective financial assistance and support of institutional research; ways of meeting needs for improvement of facilities; methods of intra-state planning among public and private institutions; and ways in which each institution can keep informed about educational programs underway in the region.

Former Florida Governor Millard F. Caldwell, president of the council, said: "One thing I want to nail down now—this is a plan of education for all the people of the South regardless of color or religion."

And Dr. John E. Ivey, Jr., of Atlanta, director of the council, said: "The admittance policies of institution control the segregation question."

Caldwell said, "the real purpose of our meeting is to set up means to supply a superior type of education for the South because we are not satisfied with the overall type being provided now."

"The plan is to lick the financial difficulties of Southern education."

Woodruff Gets 2-Year Term

EDINBURG — (AP) — Delbert G. Woodruff gave up his effort to clear himself of a murder charge Friday and drew a two-year prison sentence.

He changed his plea to guilty of murder without malice just as Judge Bryce Ferguson was preparing his charge to the jury. Thursday Woodruff had testified in his defense.

The judge sentenced Woodruff for the fatal shooting of Frank Evins in an Edinburg hotel room on June 21, 1947.

Woodruff still is charged with the fatal shooting of Evins' brother, Jesse, at the same time. District Attorney Jack Ross said that charge will stay on the docket.

Woodruff was indicted for both murder with malice and murder without malice in the deaths. He was the last witness, testifying that he fatally wounded both brothers with one desperate shot as they held him down after attacking him.

Woodruff said the brothers "jumped" him in his room after he talked with Jesse Evins' wife, now Mrs. Evelyn Goldsmith, in the hotel lobby.

Ross asked Woodruff: "Were you and Evelyn just good friends?"

"I was in love with Evelyn," Woodruff answered.

Earlier, Mrs. Goldsmith was a defense witness. When Ross asked if she and Woodruff had had an affair, she replied they had not been intimate.

She was suing Evins for a divorce at the time of the shooting.

Senator McMahon (D-Conn.),

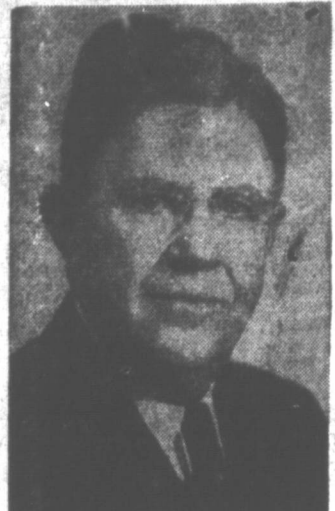

She was arrested by the FBI shortly after her husband, America's longtime No. 1 Communist, jumped bail and stowed away on a Polish liner. She will be detained at Ellis Island until case is reviewed in Washington.

The administration labor bill before the Senate would repeal the present law and replace it with the old Wagner Act plus a few amendments. The administration measure has no injunction provision. It calls for only a 30-day cooling-off period in critical disputes.

A week ago a group of Democratic and Republican senators got together and decided that the administration bill needs sharper "teeth" for dealing with such disputes—but something short of the T.H. Law's court order section.

Members of the bipartisan group said then they had agreed on a plan for giving the President authority to seize struck plants in national emergency cases.

The group named Morse to introduce the amendment. Morse said the proposal did not satisfy him and he refused to go along. Meanwhile, Ives offered an amendment which would require Congress to deal separately with each national emergency labor dispute. The President could recommend seizure, but that plan would be out the window if both branches of Congress vetoed the idea.

Ives told a reporter they might turn up with several amendments to either the administration bill or to a substitute measure sponsored by Republican Senators Taft (Ohio), Donnell (Mo) and Smith (N.J.). The substitute bill would make 28 changes in the Taft-Hartley Law, but retain its basic provisions—including the emergency injunction.

Senators trying to get rid of the injunction feel that their chances already have been dealt a blow by John L. Lewis' action in ordering a week's shutdown of the coal mines, starting Monday. They believe that Lewis strengthened the hand of those who favor the injunction.

(Continued From Page 1) features high-level returns to farmers and cheap food for consumers when there are surpluses. The gap between high returns to producers and low prices for consumers would be bridged by government payments to farmers.

Senators Kenneth S. Wherry, of Nebraska, Republican Senate floor leader, sought to take the edge off the Democratic sales campaign in a nationally broadcast speech from Alliance, Neb., Friday night, charging the Brannan plan would "socialize" agriculture.

He said its cost would be prohibitive and that its operation would put farmers under direct control of thousands of government agents.

States to be represented at the Democratic conference include Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Wyoming, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio.

The Democrats are trying to break a string of off-year election losses in the farm belt. Since 1932, Democrats have won every presidential election, but received setbacks in off-year congressional contests.

At stake in the 16-state area will be 11 Senate seats and 146 House seats. Nine of the Senate seats and 79 House seats are held by Republicans.

The meeting will be held in the home state of perhaps the sharpest critic of the administration's farm proposal—President Allan B. Kline of the American Farm Bureau Federation. Kline contends the Brannan program would subject farmers to "complete governmental regimentation." Democrats deny this.

Howley was asked if some elements might try to reject the offer today. He replied: "that would be a terrible thing."

From Good Fairway Lie Use Sand Iron in Preference to 8 or 9 on Approach Shots

Twelfth of a series written for NEA Service

By GENE SARAZEN Winner of Them All

Golf strokes are saved and scoring is made easier by good approach shots.

The best of golfers will be confronted many a time with a situation that requires a short pitch to the green.

Usually this is because the intended shot to the green went astray, or was hit from too great a distance to reach the putting surface.

From good lies on the fairway, use a sand iron in preference to a No. 8 or No. 9 iron.

The deep pitch of a sand iron permits the ball to be stopped quicker, and gives you a more even flight.

The hands are forward in addressing the ball.

Play this shot back off the right heel.

A full swing is not required, so body action is at a minimum. I use but little action in the ankles and knees, but still use a free turn of the body from the hips up.

The left foot is scarcely turned at all, but the shoulders are turned so they are facing the line of play at the top of the backswing.

Only by practice can you get the feel of these shots.

Experience will tell you how hard to hit the ball.

The backswing is always short. Use the No. 9 iron from difficult lies. The narrower flange will permit the clubhead to dig into the turf, which may be necessary to hit the ball squarely.

A common fault is the tendency to stop after hitting the ball.

Carry your swing through, bringing the hands straight out on a line with the direction of flight. Use but little action in the ankles and knees with a free turn of the body from the hips up. Play the shot off the right heel, hands forward in addressing the ball.

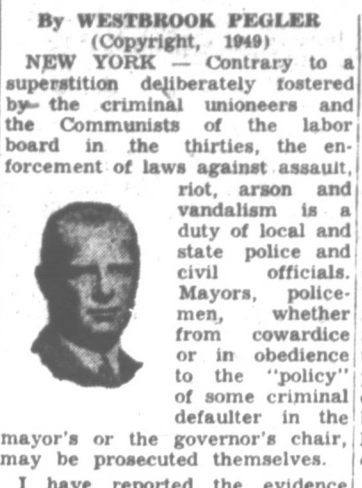

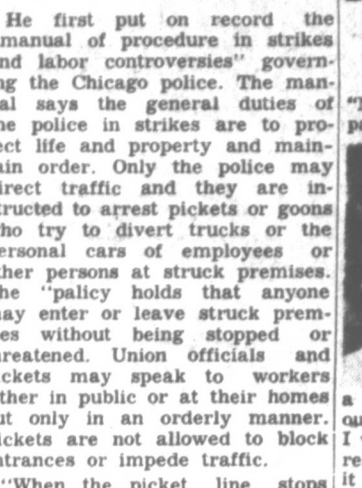

Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Note Book

 HAMM, Luxembourg — (AP) — There is a grave here big enough for a man, but too small to hold a legend.
 In the grave lies Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., and it holds him securely. But his legend reaches across the miles and years to all those who aspire to what he

lived by and that was leadership. They didn't bury "George" here, they just put him underground. But nobody shoveled earth on what he stood for nor can anyone as long as men put their faith in valor.

Perhaps the word is glory. George used that word often. He liked the sound of it and he believed in it. He didn't fight the system under which mankind has dwelled in worry and wonder since Cain killed Abel.

He took it as it has been. He said it would probably continue and he believed and lived and died in that belief — that man is born to warfare and that since his heritage is struggle, those who struggle with the firmest courage are the people who face life in the finest way.

There is probably a wisdom above war called peace — the world's unknown adventure. Whether peace is good or bad for the human race has never been fully determined because always since the Garden of Eden this race, facing life with more vanity than the insects but with four fewer legs, has expressed its frustrations in a sterile pattern of weary violence.

In individual cases these outbreaks are classified as homicide, a kind of crime. In the cases of nation against nation there is the softer word, war, a kind of polite and collective murder. Under this surprising moral order you can be hanged for killing a man you have a personal grievance against or can be rewarded with a medal for killing 25 strangers you don't know.

George Patton took mankind as it is and as it always has been. His real monument was a ruthless, personal honesty. He believed that people, being what they are, facing life with more vanity than the insects but with four fewer legs, has expressed its frustrations in a sterile pattern of weary violence.

Because his courage came out of his mouth as well as his heart, because he spoke as bravely and straightly as he acted, he was sometimes in hot water with the American people. He was a more honest warrior than they were with him. They compromised and quibbled. He acted. He did what they wanted done.

They wanted victory and he gave it to them. There are diplomats in military as well as civilian life. Diplomats want success without the attrition and risk of gambling.

George was smart enough to know that a bold general spends men's lives to save other men's lives. He hated foxholes because he really believed that digging in was wasted energy, that in attacking again and again lay success and few losses.

And when the Army needed a tough man to do a tough job, there was George, tough enough to order one man to his death to keep two other men alive. And that was the courage he had — a courage above military politics.

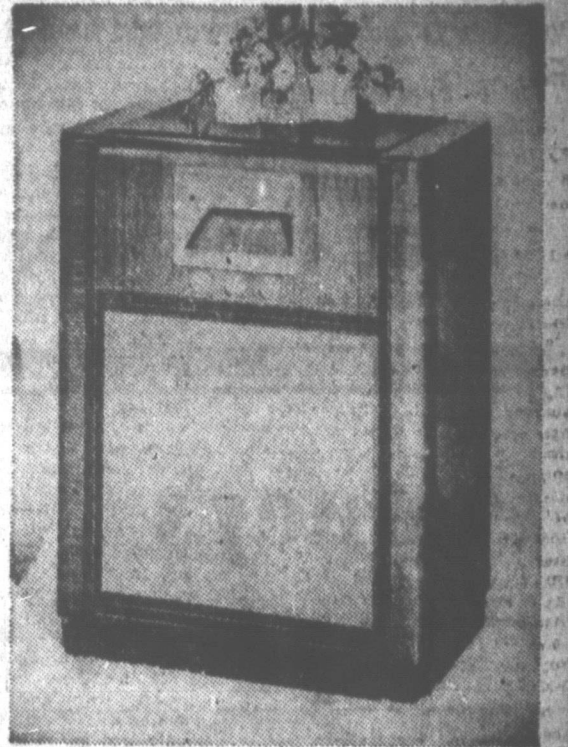

Monument Sales Practice Hit

DALLAS (AP)—The president of a monument builders group says some cemetery owners are selling women monuments they can't afford.

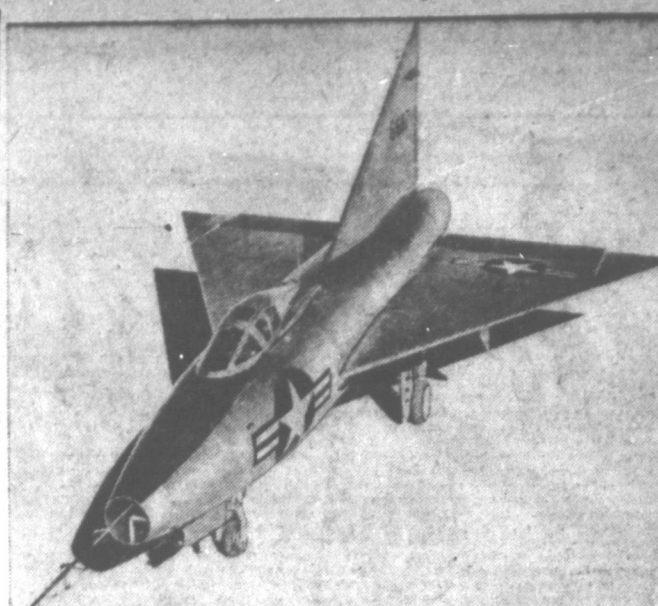
He is George L. Laing, head of the monument builders in Kansas and Oklahoma. He spoke Friday at a convention of the Southwest Monument Builders Association.

The meeting ended yesterday. "Women are in no mental state to select a grave marker at the time of a death in the family," Laing said. "They are so grief-stricken they will sign without reading the contract."

John W. Robinson of San Angelo, president of the Southwest Monument Builders, outlined a bill scheduled to come up in the Texas Legislature this week. It will change regulations governing laying of foundations for monuments.

The present law gives cemetery owners the right to determine who will install the foundation. The new bill gives the monument owner the right to decide who will install it.

(Continued From Page 1) defined in detail the ties which he said exist between the domestic prosperity of the United States and its foreign policy.

"We know that if we are to build a lasting peace in the world," he said, "we must achieve three essential conditions."

"First, this nation must be strong and prosperous."

"Second, other nations devoted to the cause of peace and freedom must also be strong and prosperous."

"Third, there must be an international structure capable of adjusting international differences and maintaining peace."

President Truman's assertion that rearming Europe is of "vital importance" in keeping peace drew the retort from Senator Taft (R-Ohio) yesterday that such action may have "the opposite effect."

The President said "it is of vital importance that the Atlantic Pact be followed by a policy of military aid to increase the effective strength of the free nations against aggression."

Taft, who heads the GOP Policy Committee, told a reporter he expects to vote for the North Atlantic Security Treaty when it comes before the Senate soon "because in my opinion it is bound to deter Russia from starting a war."

"On the other hand," he said, "I am inclined to think the arming of Western Europe would have the opposite effect."

Taft's disagreement with the President also extended to Truman's assertion that "A slash in funds available for European recovery at this time would be the worst kind of false economy."

"I have always felt that the ECA has been doing valuable work, but I don't think a 10 percent cut in its funds would eliminate any essential benefits," the Ohioan said.

General Congressional reaction

was mixed to several suggestions the President made, including his notice that he soon will send to Congress a proposal to give economic help to backward areas of the world.

Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said it is his understanding that only a small appropriation would be necessary to start what Mr. Truman called his inaugural message a "bold, new plan" for world economic expansion.

The most that may be asked at first, he said, would be technical assistance to help bring undeveloped areas into production.

Connally said he goes along with the President's plan for action in this session of Congress on the proposal to help rearm Western Europe.

Morris' body was found, a bullet wound in the head and gun in hand. Nearby was a note addressed to his wife, Margaret. Chief Hershey said it cited financial difficulties and added: "I didn't have the nerve to take you with me."

Harvest Hands Crowd Into Perryton

PERRYTON —(Special)— An office of the Texas Employment Commission, headed by Charles Warner of Borger, has been set up west of town to care for wheat harvest needs in Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties in Texas, and Beaver and Texas counties, Oklahoma.

The Ochiltree County Commissioners Court has provided water, lights, showers, and ample parking space on the rodeo grounds outside of town where all harvest equipment will be assembled. The Chamber of Commerce has also provided a public address system over which all announcements and calls for laborers and machines will be made.

At the present time, there are about 80 combines, possibly a hundred trucks and more than 200 single laborers waiting in Perryton for the harvest to open.

Men and machines have been pouring into Perryton for the past week until now there is an acute shortage of room accommodations in town.

The harvest headquarters out of town was set up to help accommodate the transient workers with water, bathing, and toilet facilities, but many of them are nearly destitute, and are seeking any type of job to make their meals until they can begin cutting wheat.

Due to recent heavy rains, the harvest in Ochiltree County cannot open before tomorrow and the heavy part of the harvest will not open before the end of the week—provided no more rain falls. But with 350,000 acres to be harvested in Ochiltree County, 122,000 in Lipscomb, and numerous acres in the two Oklahoma counties, it is believed that all machines, trucks, and laborers will be utilized as soon as the weather will permit.

Elevators in the Perryton area have moved most of their government-stored wheat; however, when the harvest gets in full swing, they will be filled in four or five days, grain men said.

It was estimated that local elevators will be able to handle around 3,000,000 bushels in this county. Another 3,000,000 bushels can be stored in quonset-type storage bays on individual farms; but the remainder will have to be stacked on the ground until more space becomes available.

One striking feature of the huge harvest army in town is the way the transient workers cooperate with one another to pass along the information about where trucks and combines are needed, where jobs can be had, and urgent messages from home. Practically every state in the Union is represented in the Perryton area, and many of the workers are college students working to grub stake themselves through school next fall.

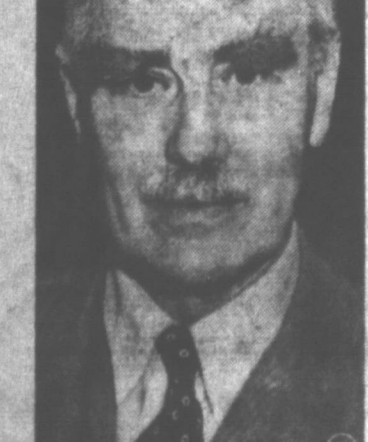

Senator Johnson told a reporter he plans to talk with Senator Connally before making a recommendation.

An aid to Connally said the senior Texas senator has been too busy to make a recommendation.

Anyway, he said, a temporary appointee has been named and there is no need for a presidential appointment immediately.

Those whose names have been submitted to the senators as applicants for the job include Sheriff T. W. (Buckshot) Lane of Wharton County; Robert H. Poole, McAllen; Otto Reichert, San Benito; J. D. Oakes, La Porte and Roy E. Floyd, Sam W. Rogers, Angus Morrison, Neal Folk, O. E. Dubois, Neal Arnold, W. F. Haley, Frank Paul, W. L. Fuller and W. S. Ashford, all of Houston.

The fact that a man's name does not appear on this list does not preclude the possibility of his appointment, aides of both senators said.

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas is headed for what may be the "worst financial disaster in her history," Speaker of the House Durwood Manford said Saturday.

In a letter addressed to members of the House of Representatives, Manford said revenues for the next two years will be 38 million dollars less than previously estimated.

Manford wrote the letter as the Legislature finished its twenty-second week with the tough finance-spending problem still unsolved.
