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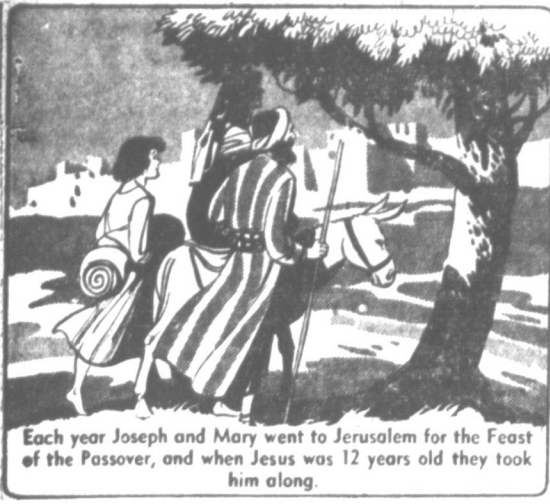
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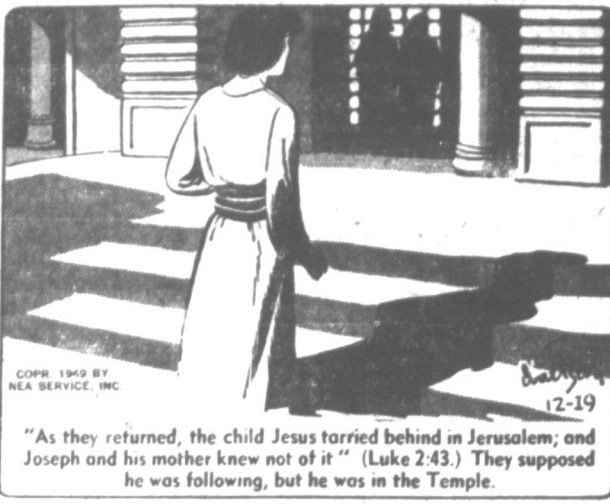

Three Giants of Labor and Industry Dug in for Battle at Orange Today

ORANGE — (AP) — Three giants of labor and industry are dug in here today for a battle over who, if anybody, will become the bargaining agent for employees of one of the nation's few big unorganized industrial plants.

A side issue in the struggle is the question of whether the CIO can gain a foothold in the only major industrial center in Texas where the AF of L still reigns completely supreme.

The shooting started this morning at a National Labor Relations Board hearing in the county Courthouse at Orange.

The NLRB hearing was called for the purpose of taking testi-

mony on the question of whether another bargaining election will be called at the E. I. Du Pont de Nemours Company's Sabine River works here.

Evidence will be presented by Du Pont, by four AF of L organizations and by one CIO affiliate. All of the testimony will be handled up and sent to Washington where the NLRB national headquarters will decide what to do about the matter.

Twice previously Du Pont employees at the big Orange plant have voted on the same question and each time they balloted in favor of "no union." The last election was in May of 1947. On that occasion 89 of the workers favored one of three labor unions

GOP to Drop 'Me-Tooism'

CHICAGO — (AP) — Republican Party strategy leaders were reported agreed today that the GOP must shed "me-tooism" and give the voters a "clear choice" on 1950 election issues.

Arthur E. Summerfield, Michigan national committeeman, voiced the view. He said the GOP National Strategy Committee which he heads is in agreement with him.

The strategy group took no formal stand on policy. That is eventually to be decided by the party's National Committee in January or February.

But the strategists feel that any plans they recommend for local party workers depend a great deal on "a clear-cut, positive" set of principles.

Summerfield's declaration suggested that GOP success next year hinges more on what the party offers — and how soon — than on how it goes about offering it.

School for Congressmen Proposed

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A school in which members of Congress could learn what government agencies do with tax dollars was proposed by Rep. Lyle (D-Texas).

"The government has gotten so big that few of us know the entire setup and operations of the various departments and independent agencies," he told a reporter.

"I have no doubt that we could save hundreds of millions of dollars annually if we knew where to trim the corners."

The Texas said he would submit his idea formally in a resolution as soon as Congress convenes. The measure would provide for the holding of "regular classes in a committee or caucus room."

"Attendance would be voluntary, with classes probably held early in the morning so as not to conflict with committee hearings or House sessions. The school would be a House affair, but any senators wishing to attend would be welcome."

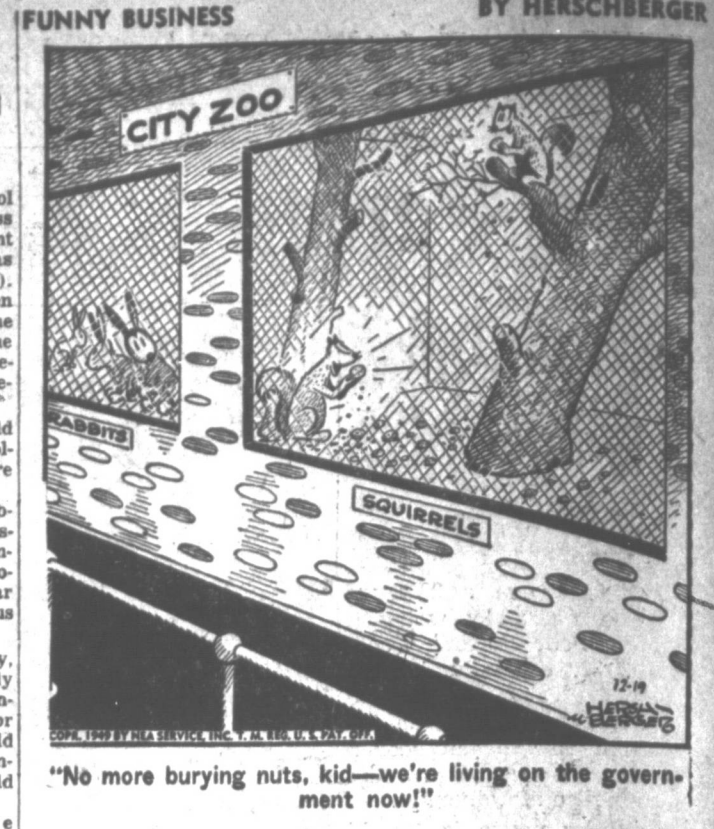
"The key personnel in the various agencies and bureaus would be requested to act as lecturers," Lyle said.

"We have access now to these charts and diagrams showing the government's structure, but there is a lot more to it than appears on the surface."

"Under the present practice, we vote hundreds of millions of dollars appropriations yearly for hidden items."

"The only congressmen who know anything about them are the members of the particular appropriations subcommittee which handled the measure containing them."

"The rest of us find ourselves in the position of blindly accepting the recommendation of these subcommittees, or voting against the bill."

New gift-companions which perfume guests along this Christmas are bring powder puffs and individual supplies of face powder in a variety of shades. Centering these guest-room accessories in a handsome gift box are four flacons of a famed-name perfume.

Cologne and toilet water boast as fancy trappings as perfume. One pair of cologne bottles, masquerading as Christmas candles, puts that idea across with stoppers that look like golden flames. Another pair of cologne bottles provides the sturdy legs on which a picturesque Santa stands. When the cologne bottles go to work, Santa starts his career as a piggy bank.

A gift make-up set of face powder, rouge and lipstick is all color-keyed to match a girl's hair. It comes in a modern designed polystyrene case that's meant to double as a cigarette or candy container once cosmetics are emptied.

Not omitted from Santa's pack are compacts, which are more like collectors' items this year than ever. Special mention goes to one which clasp a lipstick to its case, is black enameled and has an embossed border of gold metal.

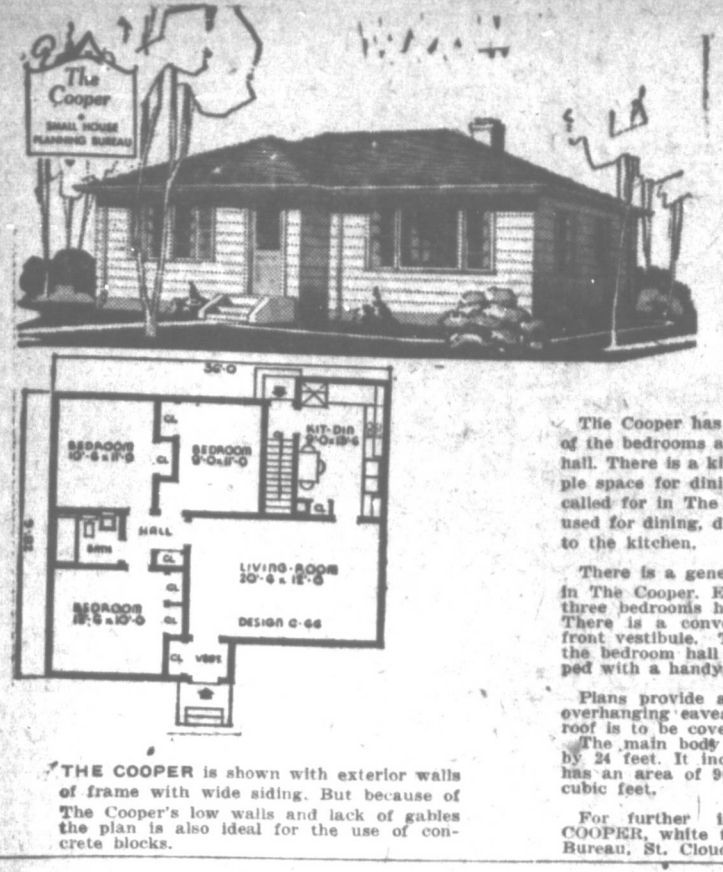

Dust, Dirt, Grease and Grime Are Real Pests at Holiday Time

NEW YORK — Dirt, dust, grease and grime are among the most troublesome pests with which an American housewife has to contend. They come out of nowhere into — well, into and onto practically everything.

Their "dirty work" has been responsible for the development of two large and highly efficient national industries: the manufacture of vacuum cleaners, with ingenious capacity for reaching into every nook and cranny, and the production of an increasing number of effective soapless cleaners and synthetic detergents for washing all types of walls, ceilings and woodwork.

There are two factors in the growing use of these wall-washing materials. First, the marked improvement in the washability of modern-day paints, varnishes and enamels. And, second, the simplicity of operation. The cleaning materials are easy to apply. Their wetting and penetrating properties are re-rackable. Furthermore, they are speedily rinsed — and some do not even require rinsing. In addition, they are free of ingredients harmful to the surface or to human hands. This was when the old soap, hot water and elbow grease method was a chore undertaken only at spring cleaning time when days were devoted to it. Now, washing painted walls and woodwork is a simple matter of a few hours. This is of special interest at holiday time, when adult and teen-ager parties call for cleanliness and brightness in entry halls, living rooms, dining rooms — and kitchens. Don't forget the kitchen. Everybody crowds into that spot at holiday party time!

There are several dozen paint washing materials on the market. Some are based on the old standby, trisodium phosphate and some are complicated chemical

Paint Convector Give Color Accent To Household

For a fresh, new decorative treatment for rooms in homes with convector heating, try painting the convector radiators in a contrasting color to the color of the adjacent walls. The effect is unique and pleasing and adds a distinctive decorative note which is easy and inexpensive to achieve.

If it is not desirable to paint the entire convector a contrasting shade, a color accent can be added to the room by painting only the outlet grille of the unit. In such cases, the convector is painted to match the color of the walls and the grille is painted a lighter shade. This treatment is effective, decorators say, either with modern or traditional rooms. Any good grade of paint can be used with complete satisfaction.

In painting a convector radiator, it is best to remove the front panel before painting so that a paint bond is not established between the front and the ends of the convector.

In rooms where plain colored walls of a dark shade are used, it is often effective to paint the convectors in a lighter, contrasting shade for color accent. Or, in rooms where it is desired to combine the comfort of this modern heating with the charm of early American furnishings, the convector can be painted to simulate the knotty pine trim of woodwork or furnishings.

Convectors are delivered for installation in a neutral shade which permits the greatest latitude in decorating. In today's homes, the most popular type of installation is the recessed convector which may be set into the wall, usually beneath the window area. It helps retain the clean, flowing lines of modern interiors. Free-standing models also are popular and have the advantage of demanding much less floor space than old-style radiators.

Oak Flooring, Noted for Beauty, Is Available in Variety of Styles

Builders point out that since the flooring is a permanent structural part of a house and plays a leading role in its interior appearance, persons planning to build would be well advised to familiarize themselves with the leading types available before making their selections.

Information can be obtained from builders, lumber dealers, individual manufacturers of flooring and trade associations composed of flooring makers. A recently published booklet on oak floors, for example, describes the various styles of oak flooring and presents many other flooring facts of interest to prospective home owners.

Oak is the most extensively used of all residential flooring materials, the booklet explains. The wood is noted for its beauty, durability, ease of upkeep and its capacity for being restored to its original condition after years of wear.

There is a choice of three general types or styles of oak flooring — strip, plank and parquet. Unit block flooring, a relatively new development, is sometimes classified as a fourth type. Actually it is in form of parquet. The booklet points out that the various types are available in a wide price range, depending upon such factors as the grade of wood, whether it is plain-sawn or quarter-sawn and whether it is unfinished or prefinished.

Strip flooring, the booklet says, is the type most widely employed for homes. For a dwelling in any price range it is always in good taste. Besides being the most economical from the standpoint of initial cost, it is adaptable to practically any architectural style and any decorative plan. It is produced in several thicknesses and widths. Most strip floors are composed of pieces of uniform width, but interesting effects also can be achieved by using random widths, according to the booklet.

Window Heat Losses Can Be Avoided

In the current trend toward larger window areas in modern homes, it is important that window caulkings be perfect wintertime double is to be assured.

Double and triple glazing is now produced as a single pane for permanent installation in window sash and will aid substantially in reducing heat loss. Windows and doors also can be caulked to cut down the infiltration of cold air. Dust and dirt are kept out of the house at the same time and this contributes to a cleaner home.

Inside the house, however, beneath-window installation of heating units is the best safeguard against costly heat loss. Modern convector-radiators are made in a variety of shapes and sizes and may be easily installed beneath most window areas regardless of the design of the windows. Convectors heat from the windows and provide a barrier against outside cold.

Record Price Paid for Bull

SULPHUR, Okla. — (AP) — J. P. McNatt of Greenville, Texas, paid \$10,300 for a seven-month-old bull calf at the 11th annual Hereford Heaven Ranch auction of Oklahoma Gov. Roy J. Turner.

It was the highest price paid for 48 animals in the auction Thursday. The calf represents the best of new crossed bloodlines at the Turner ranch.

Turner is to keep the young bull until after the 1950 show season and then deliver it as a proven breeding sire.

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — All his life he's been doing catty things. So you really can't blame Pinky for thinking he's a cat — but he doesn't seem to know it. He grew up with Geraldine, an Angora cat which is obviously Pinky's idol. They are the pets of Kathy and Ann Shelton.

When Geraldine licks her fur cat fashion, Pinky takes a bath too. Geraldine laps milk from a saucer. Pinky slurps from another.

Hot Water Supply Is Important

For maximum economy in the new home, the problem of an adequate and dependable supply of domestic hot water should be considered carefully at the time the heating system is selected. Instant hot water is more important than ever before as a result of the increasing use of electric dishwashers, automatic washing machines, built-in showers and other aids to comfortable living.

With steam and hot water heating systems, the problem is simplified because the same boiler which supplies heat for the home also heats the water for domestic purposes. With other systems, a separate water heater usually is required and this extra item of expense and maintenance must be considered in weighing the costs of the heating system from which selection is to be made.

Water heaters for use with steam or hot water systems are either of the storage type or tankless type. In the storage type, hot water is stored in a tank for use as needed during the day or night. Copper coils are connected or built into the heating boiler and immersed in the hot boiler water. The water circulates between the heater and storage tank as it is heated. Tankless type heaters are similar, with the exception that they use a greater expanse of copper coils. This permits the water to be heated almost instantaneously as it is used for domestic needs. The domestic hot water and boiler water are in separate circuits and do not mix.

In summer, when home heating is not required, the hot water supply is maintained by automatically controlling the boiler water at temperatures sufficient only to heat the water. This has the added advantage of helping keep the basement dry. The boiler water does not rise to the convector-radiators or other room units of the home heating system.

Overheating Brings Recurrent Colds and Bills

Overheating the home in winter-time is one of the chief causes of excessive fuel bills. Recurrent colds which sometimes lead to serious illness many times can be traced to too much heat within the home, rather than too little.

Usually the cause for overheating can be found in the heat outlets of the heat distribution system, especially if the heating units are old. Modern automatic controls regulate the heat delivery of the furnace or boiler and contribute to economy, but unless the heating units themselves are responsive to control heat is wasted and discomfort results.

Cast iron radiators are one of the chief offenders, heating engineers say, because they are slow to lose their heat after room temperatures are built up to the comfort level. As a result, temperatures continue to rise even after the central source of heat has been shut off.

Newer units use a heating element of copper or aluminum to solve this problem and provide more economical and efficient heating performance. The quick responsiveness of the new convector radiators, for example, is largely due to this advancement.

Reds Expected To Take Formosa

NEW YORK — The chances are that Formosa will wind up in Communist hands—either within or without, says Business Week in its forthcoming issue.

"There's no way for the U. S. to stop this by trying to hand Formosa back to Japan," says the magazine. "In theory, that might be done via the Japanese peace treaty. But other members of the Far Eastern Commission would have to agree. And there's no possibility of that."
