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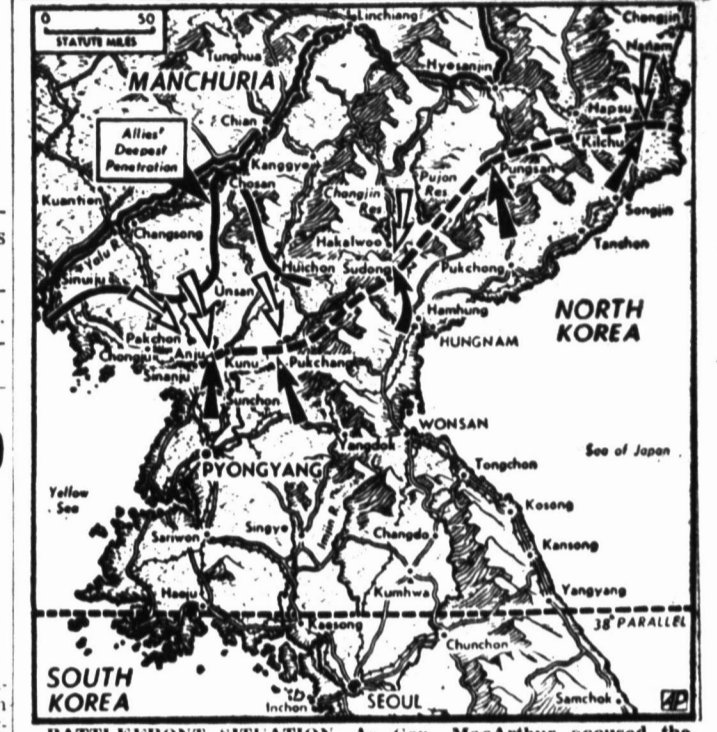

Philip T. Pegues To Head 4-County Boy Scout District

Philip T. Pegues, now field executive for the Boy Scouts in Fort Worth, will assume a similar post here about Jan. 1. He will head the Santa Fe District of Gray, Roberts, Hemphill and Carson Counties.

Pegues has had three years' experience as a field executive in the Fort Worth Council. As a scout, Pegues received the rank of Eagle Scout with three points. He attended Texas Wesleyan College of Fort Worth and North Texas State College in Denton and is a veteran of World War II, having served in the European Theater. He is married and a member of the Methodist Church.

The addition of this new field executive is a part of the recently adopted expansion program of the Adobe Walls Council, according to Paul Beisenberg, scout executive. The expansion program calls for a membership of 5,000 in 1952. Present membership is 3,600.

In the past, the Santa Fe District has been served by the scout executive of the council, who is also responsible for all scouting services over the 15 counties of the Adobe Walls Council. The new field executive will devote his entire time to assisting adult leaders in their work.

According to Beisenberg, it is anticipated that with this additional leadership, more camps will be organized throughout the district.

from FCC any day. The company has long been using teletype for inter-airport communications.

The grant announced by CAA late Monday afternoon, plus the local money if okayed by the voters, would bring the total funds available, according to an Associated Press dispatch, to \$140,000. This money would be used, the AP said, \$60,000 for land; \$24,000 for buildings; and \$56,000 for preparing site, paving, lighting and miscellaneous.

The money is part of an overall appropriation of \$2,200,057 in federal funds to improve eight airports in Texas. The other fields coming under this are Dallas Love Field, Eagle Pass, Greater Fort Worth International, Harlingen All Valley, Houston Municipal, Midland-Odessa, and San Antonio Municipal. Over the nation \$51,023,618 in federal funds will be granted to improve or construct local airports.

A social hour will be held in the cafeteria after the program.

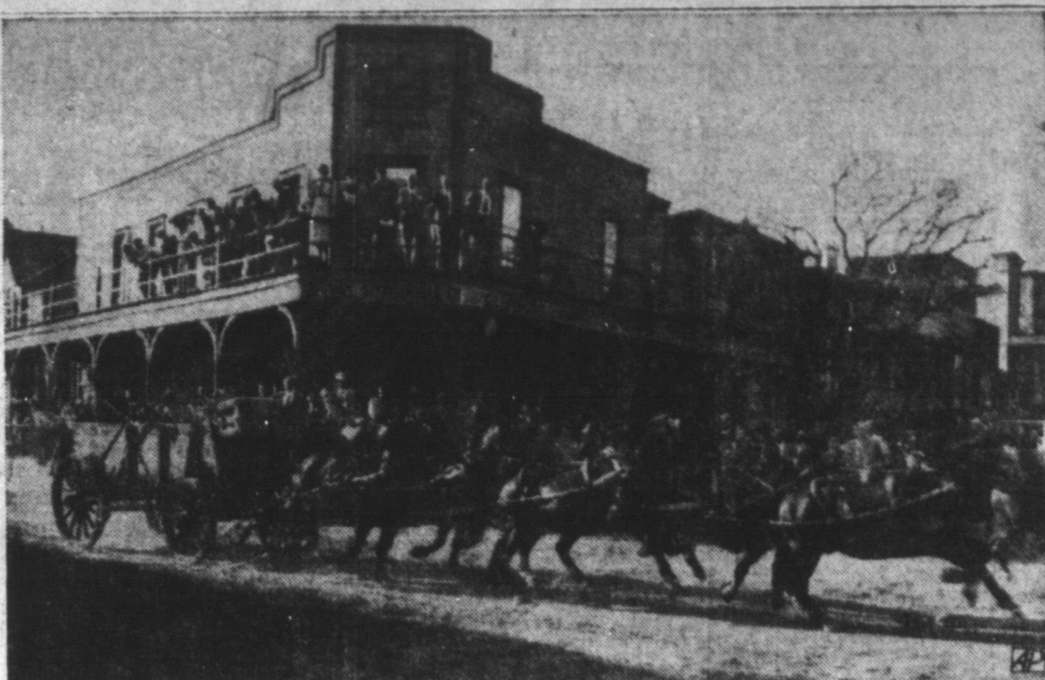

Q. and A.

You and the Service

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Q. When will dependents be allowed to go to Japan? And is the Army paying for medical care for dependents?

A. The Army has made no plans yet for allowing dependents to go to Japan. When the Army's medical services are available for dependents they are provided. The Army is not paying for medical care under any other circumstances.

Q. You wrote in a recent column that high school boys in the National Guard would be left in school if their units were called to active duty. My son was in high school and got in the Guard without his parents' consent. And when the order came for his group to go on active duty they took him. We live in Tennessee and I wrote to the State Adjutant General asking him to not take our son. He said there was nothing he could do about it. Is there?

A. It is obvious that the Tennessee Adjutant General, like those in other states, has chosen to ignore the general policy laid down by the Pentagon on this matter. And unfortunately there isn't much to be done about it. Your son is now in the U. S. Army and is subject to all of its regulations. The most you can do is write your son's commanding officer, stating your reasons for wanting him to be let out of service.

Q. How does a person go about changing his draft board status to that of conscientious objector?

A. You'll have to get religion in an awful hurry and convince the draft board of your sincerity. If you didn't explain your conscientious objections to serving your country in the first questionnaire it's likely that your board will be pretty dubious about your change. But don't let

First Step on Armory Taken

Capt. William J. Ragsdale, commander of Battery A, 474th Field Artillery Bn., announced Monday the State National Guard Armory Board has accepted a deed to 10 acres of land and a title guaranty policy covering the value of the land, on which an armory is scheduled to be constructed in the near future.

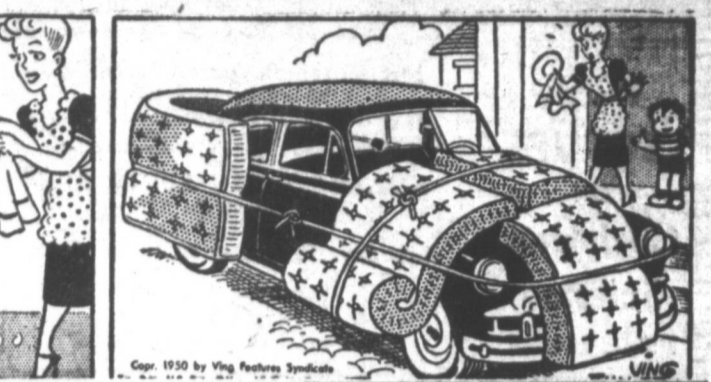

Business Wheels Out Guns Against Excess Profits Tax

By SAM DAWSON
NEW YORK (AP)—Businessmen are wheeling up their big guns for a last ditch stand in the next two or three weeks against the excess profits tax.

Opponents of the tax fall in two categories: those who think taxing profits is the wrong way to finance rearmament; and those who say their own industries will be unfairly penalized by such a tax.

A week after election the House Ways and Means Committee meets to hear Secretary Snyder outline his ideas of how big the tax should be applied against various industries. Then the committee will hear business protests, and take up drafting of the tax, as ordered in the bill passed before Congress recessed.

Popularly, the excess profits tax is supposed to take all or most of the profit out of rearming the nation.

Businessmen, however, question whether it does. And they bring various charges against it: that it discourages enterprise at the very time the nation needs increased production; that it encourages corporate waste and extravagance; that its administration is a headache, because of its complicated relief clauses for companies unfairly over-taxed.


They question whether it halts inflation—many charge it actually increases inflation, because it discourages efficiency of production and thus boosts costs and prices.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Convention-Maker Shows His Stuff

Samuel Stayman, of New York, is one of the members of the American team that is representing this country against England and the rest of Europe in an international bridge match at Bermuda. Stayman is probably best known for the bidding convention that bears his name, described last week in this column. He can also play the cards magnificently, as this has been shown in this summer's national championships, clearly shows.

North knew he was taking a big risk when he raised to three no-trump. However, the hand took place towards the end of a team match, and North knew that the other team (which was a couple of thousand points behind) would be stretching all possible game hands in the effort to catch up. If the game could be made, North wanted his partner to be in it; if it couldn't be made, North knew that both teams would lose the same amount.

On the first trick, East put up the queen of clubs, and Stayman won in his own hand with the king. He returned the king of diamonds, and West played low. The fall of the eight of diamonds from the East hand encouraged Stayman to lead the queen of diamonds, in the expectation that East would have to drop the nine or jack.

This time West took his ace of diamonds. For lack of a better return (clubs) to lead dangerous since South might have the seven for all West knew. West led back his last diamond to East's jack. East then led his remaining club, and declarer won with the ace.

Business was picking up, since Stayman could now count on five tricks in the minor suits. But how to extract four more tricks from spades and hearts?

He cashed the last diamond, hoping that a clue would be forthcoming—and was rewarded when East signaled with the eight of hearts. Stayman reasoned that East would have thrown the nine rather than the eight if he could have done so; which meant that West held the nine of hearts. Also that East probably started with at least four and possibly five hearts headed by the king.

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queen. A lot of information to extract from a single eight-spade—but all of it was logical!

He therefore led the ten of hearts from his hand, letting it ride to East's queen. East knew it would do him no good to return a heart up to dummy's ace-jack, so he led a low spade. Declarer played low, allowing dummy to win with the nine.

Stayman was now sure of two spades and one heart, but still needed another trick in the major suits. He led a low spade to his ace, cashed the jack of clubs, and threw East in the lead with another spade. East had to return a heart up to dummy's ace-jack, thus giving Stayman his game contract.


Shamrock Host to Fall Meeting of American Legion
