SEOUL, Korea -(AP)- American troops in northwest Korea this afternoon recovered a half-mile of ground lost to a morning Communist attack and fought bitterly for no gain in the northeast against an enemy newly identified by General MacArthur as Chinese Reds.

Elements of two U.S. divisions holding the bridgehead area north of the Chongchon River near Korea's west coast recovered the territory lost to the Reds six miles north of Aniu.



That the people of the United States have recently been very optimistic is evidenced by the fact that, during the last twelve months, the volume of consumer credit, advanced for purposes other than housing, has increased more than \$4.5 billions. Moreover, in July and August, 1950, the spirit of optimism was reinforced by fear of restrictions on borrow-She ing and of price controls leading to shortages of durable consumer goods. The result was that, in this two-month period, consumer credit volume jumped nearly \$1.3 billions, and rose to a total of almost \$21 billions. And this is in addition to the \$40 billions of outstanding debt represented by mortgages on homes.

As long as boom conditions per sist, and almost everyone who wishes to work has a job, most of the people who have promised to pay their parts of this 61-billion dollar total, will probably have little occasion for worry, but if and when the boom breaks (as all previous booms have done) and spread, many of those who have so other election prediction for pubfreely promised to pay are likely to find themselves in sad straits. 


