Christianity Versus Paganism

By WILLIAM E. GILROY, D.D. The contrast between the little group of Christians and the pagan world with which they were surrounded as the church took its roots and beginnings in the now famous cities could hardly have been greater.

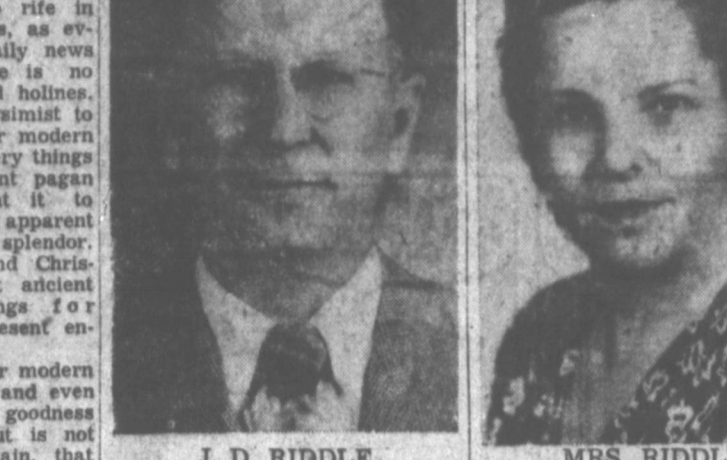
We have read of the outward splendor of Antioch, where the disciples were first called Christians; of its great double-columned street reaching for five miles; of its great pagan temples; its works of art, brought from all parts of that ancient world; the luxury and prosperity of its half a million inhabitants, in a flourishing city on the great lines of trade between east and west. But beneath it all there was the immensity of evil, the foulness and licentiousness that marked it as the most morally degraded of cities that almost vied with one another in immorality. The very religion of that pagan world was believed with licentious practices, Corinth, where Paul spent a considerable time on his missionary journeys, and to which city he addressed the longest and most revealing of his Epistles, was called the eye of Greece. To live as they do at Corinth," became a byword for luxurious and cultured living. But here, too, as one can plainly see from I and II Corinthians, the church had to make its way against an immorality by which some of the professing Christians themselves were corrupted.

It was not amazing that probably well-intentioned, but undisciplined, souls should imagine that they could continue in the Christian community practices of their former pagan life, but one can see how uncompromising Paul rebuked them, and asserted the necessary moral integrity of Christian living, in personal life, in home and family relationships, and in all the situations of daily life.

One might dwell upon that contrast and conflict in the ancient world, but it is more fitting to realize how that contrast and struggle led to today. Modern paganism is mostly irreligious. It does not build temples, or erect

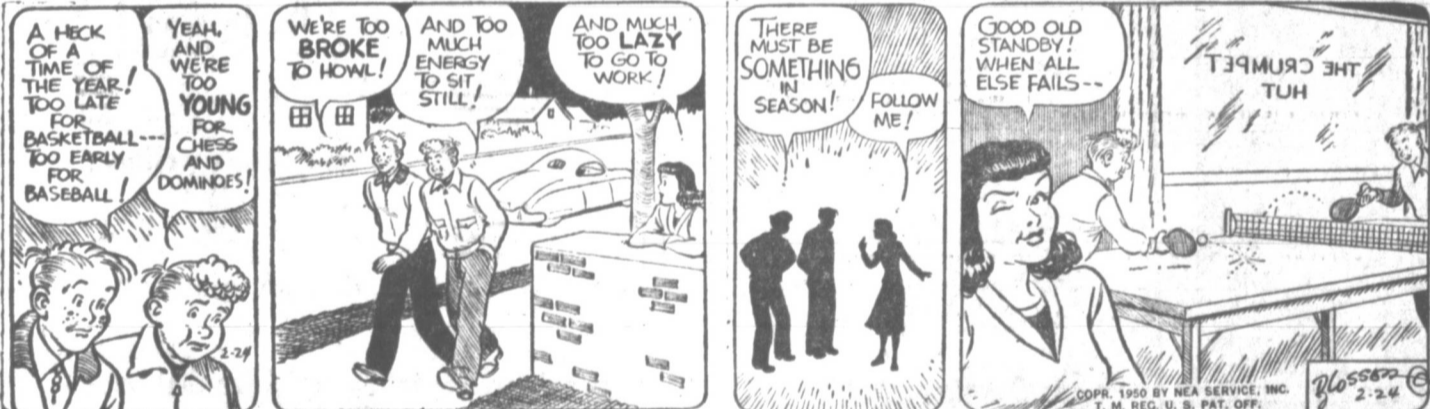

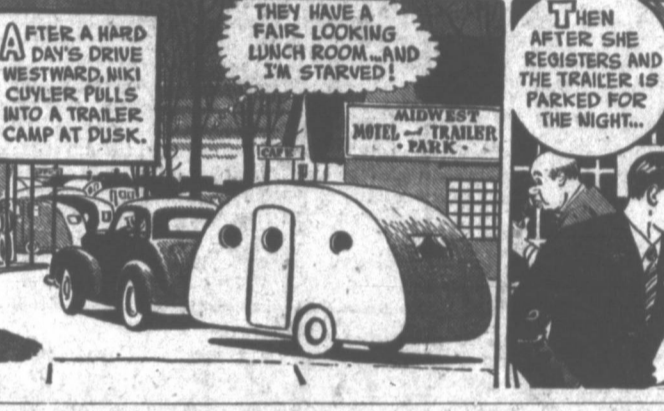

### Miami Baptist Pastor, Wife To Be Israel Missionaries

MIAMI — (Special) — The Rev. Dwight L. Baker, who for the past year has been pastor of the First Baptist Church, has resigned his pastorate, effective March 5. He and Mrs. Baker have been appointed by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board to serve as missionaries in Nazareth, Israel. They expect to sail for their new field between the first and tenth of April.

Rev. Baker, who served as chaplain with the Paratroopers in Germany, has planned since returning from the Army in 1946, to some day return to foreign soil as a missionary.

Both the Bakers have had special training which fits them for their new field of work. Mrs. Baker is a graduate of the Baptist Seminary, New Orleans, La., and Rev. Baker is a graduate of Baylor University, and has his Master's degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth.

The Baptist Mission in Nazareth operates a church, a primary school and the George W. Truitt Orphanage. There are now three women missionaries teaching in the school and operating the orphanage. Rev. Baker will be headmaster of the school and pastor of the church, which has been without a pastor for the past ten years.

The Bakers' work will be primarily among the Arabs. Since the country is bi-lingual, their first year's work on the field will largely be spent in studying the Arabic and Hebrew languages.

They will serve for five years before their first furlough allows them to return to the States for one year. Each subsequent term of service will be for seven years.
