Carrington resigns as fleet heads to Falklands

LONDON (AP) - British Foreign Secretary Lord Carrington resigned today, taking responsibility for his diplomatic failure to prevent Argentina's seizure of the Falkland

Carrington quit only hours after the aircraft carrier Invincible, leading Britain's mightiest fleet since the 1956 Suez crisis, left the southern naval base at Portsmouth on an 8,000-mile, two-week voyage to recapture the Falklands which Argentina seized Friday

The resignation, accepted by Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, followed three days of mounting demands from newspapers and lawmakers, including members of the ruling Conservative party, for him and Defense Secretary John Nott to leave the government over what critics called the Falklands

"In my view much of the criticism is unfounded but I have been responsible for the conduct of the policy." Carrington said in his letter of resignation. "I think it right that I

Nott also tendered his resignation but Thatcher refused it, telling him in a letter she needed him to continue "as our forces prepare for the possibility of armed action. I have the fullest confidence in your ability to carry out the crucial tasks ahead.

Two of Carrington's aides, Deputy Foreign Secretary Humphrey Atkins and Richard Luce, Foreign Office minister of state for Latin America. also tendered resignations which were accepted

Carrington quit as the 19,500-ton Invincible stacked with Harrier vertical-takeoff jets and Sea King anti-submarine helicopters steamed out of Portsmouth on England's south coast to sea. A flotilla of destroyers and frigates prepared to follow it.

"God speed Invincible!" 30,000 Britons lining the harbor screamed. waving Union Jacks

Argentine President Leopoldo Galtieri said his nation would go to war with Britain to defend the islands 250 miles off the Argentine coast. His

forces seized the archipelago Friday after 149 years of British rule.

In the Falklands the invaders dug in, imposed a 24-hour curfew on the 1,800 staunchly pro-British islanders, threatened jail terms for resisters to Argentine rule and decreed Spanish the official language. Most islanders are sheepherders of English and Scottish

Argentina announced that its forces also occupied South Georgia, an island dependency of the Falklands 800 miles to the east. But the garrison of 22 British marines on the island was reported to have killed three of the invaders, raising Argentina's casualties to four dead and two wounded. No British casualties have been reported

British Defense Secretary John Nott claimed the marines destroyed one of the Argentines helicopters and damaged one of their ships before they were overwhelmed. Argentine naval sources denied this.

Meanwhile, the British governor of the Falklands, Rex Hunt, and the 82 marines captured with him on Friday were flown home. Argentina deported them to Uruguay.

Crews at the Portsmouth naval base worked feverishly through the night to ready the aircraft carriers Invincible and Hermes and their escort of destroyers and frigates for the expedition to the South Atlantic.

They were to rendezvous with another group of ships off Gibraltar to form a fleet of 40 warships, nearly two-thirds of Britain's naval strength.

The force includes 22-year-old Prince Andrew, second son of Queen Elizabeth II and one of the Invincible's 12 helicopter pilots. "If we have to fight, we will. And we

are not going to fight unless we win, said the defease secretary in a television interview "We are not making the largest task

force available outside the two superpowers without the intention, if we have to, of using it.

Members of Parliament were demanding that Nott and Foreign Secretary Lord Carrington resign

because of their failure to prevent the invasion. But press reports said although Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher rebuked them, no resignations were imminent.

In the Falklands, the new Argentine military administration ordered a round-the-clock curfew, with 15 days in jail for violators; driving on the right side of the road instead of the British left. Spanish as the official language

British press reports from the Falklands said six marines had escaped the invaders and were hiding in the hills behind Port Stanley, the

"There will be a bloodbath here if the navy task force tries to capture Stanley," Winchester said a carpenter, Jim Burgess, told him

Argentine Foreign Minister Nicanor Costa Mendez told the United Nations his government would comply with the Security Council resolution calling on it to cease hostilities and negotiate with Britain. But he ignored the resolution's demand that Argentine forces withdraw from the islands

New Zealand broke diplomatic relations with Argentina Sunday to protest the invasion, which Prime Minister Robert D. Muldoon called "naked aggression." Portugal, a close ally of Britain, said it might allow the British armada to refuel at the Portuguese base at Lajes, in the

Captor's death ends weekend of crime for Amarillo hostages

shot and killed himself near a state police roadblock was identified today as David Benns, 27, an escapee from a Colorado state mental hospital who was riding with four people described as "more or less hostages."

State police officer Dave Bryant said the man's identity was confirmed by the state police crime laboratory in Santa Fe, which matched his prints against those sent by the Colorado State Hospital in Pueblo.

Bryant said the man died instantly Sunday from a single gunshot fired from a 45-caliber pistol as the car in which he was riding approached the

Bryant said three women and a man in the car with Benns were not injured in the incident.

The four told police they had left Amarillo with Benns last Wednesday after he hired them to accompany him to Casper, Wyo., to drive back vehicles from a car auction, Bryant said.

When the group arrived in the Buena Vista, Colo., area, Benns told them he had lied about the car-buying venture "and from that point on they were more or less hostages, more or less in fear of him," Bryant said.

He said no charges would be filed against the four, all residents of Amarillo, Texas.

'We can see no reason to file charges." Bryant said.

He said anything they may have been involved in while with Benns "they did while they were being threatened. He unload them before he got them.

Bryant identified the four as Kevin Lemley, 18; Leslie Annette Haag, 24; Teresa Brown, 18, and Deborah D.

Futch, 20. Benns walked away from the Colorado State Hospital March 4. He allegedly held a 19-year-old Pueblo woman hostage for five days before releasing her and was tracked by authorities to the Trinidad railroad

yard before they lost his trail. Officials believe Benns hopped a freight train eving the area

Benns and the four Texas residents left Colorado during the weekend, headed for New Mexico in a vehicle stolen from Buena Vista.

The vehicle broke down in northern New Mexico near the town of Tres Piedras, Bryant said. The officer said three youths who stopped to offer help early Sunday were abducted and later left tied up at a ranch house east of Springer in eastern New Mexico

The three youths were found unharmed Sunday by a state policeman.

State police began looking for the vehicle belonging to the missing youths after relatives reported they did not return home Saturday night.

Bryant and another state policeman, Finis Roberts, spotted the car headed north on Interstate 25. Bryant followed the vehicle until it reached the roadblock seven miles south of Raton shortly after noon Sunday

"The initial report we had was that all of the occupants were armed and that they had high-powered rifles with them," said Bryant.

Bryant said three handguns were found in the vehicle by officers.

Snow, winds, forest fires, tornadoes kill 49

Associated Press Writer A wild spring weekend of snow, high

winds, forest fires and tornadoes bore down on the nation, forcing 200 people to flee Sierra Nevada avalanches. engulfing Virginia homes in flames and killing 49 people in a swath of swirling destruction from Texas to Indiana.

"I bet it didn't take five minutes for that house to burn down," said Ernest Brookins, a resident of Suffolk, Va., where 17 homes were destroyed Sunday by forest fires fanned by 50 mph winds.

Snow piled 21 feet deep at Norden in northern California, threatening new avalanches today while rescue workers attempted to determine how to search for two more victims at the Alpine Meadows ski resort. An avalanche there Wednesday killed six.

Winds gusted to 81 mph Sunday in Johnstown, Pa., as the storm moved east after spawning weekend tornadoes

that killed 28 Residents of Paris, Texas, were to

agencies sought to help the 200 injured and the thousands left homeless Friday by two tornadoes. City Manager Bob Sokoll said 480 homes were destroyed and 397 sustained major damage, making them unfit for habitation.

In Arkansas, where 13 died in twisters, Gov. Frank White pulled a family Bible out of the debris in Conway as workers loaded the remaining possessions of Ruby Stubits, 73, onto a pickup truck.

The remnants of the storm pushed eastward Sunday, leaving 9 inches of snow in some areas of Michigan. About 500 motorists stranded in Grand Rapids on Saturday were able to return to the roads on Sunday. Several thousand customers were without power around

Federal panel to consider reinstating lines

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A Dallas-area congressional redistricting plan rejected by the Supreme Court is scheduled to be reconsidered today by a three-judge federal panel.

The high court ordered the judges to decide whether to keep the disputed lines in place for upcoming elections on an interim basis. Parties in the case

have been instructed to appear at 1:30 p.m., said a spokesman for Texas Attorney General Mark White.

Rick Gray. White's executive assistant, said the Supreme Court did not prevent the judges from retaining their plan until this fall's congressional elections.

The Supreme Court had agreed with Texas Republicans that the federal court improperly substituted its own plan for four Dallas-area districts for those drawn up by the state legislature.

The districts include those of incumbent U.S. Reps. Jim Mattox and Martin Frost, both Democrats, and Republican Rep. Jim Collins.

The panel also designed its own plan for a new "mid-cities" congressional district between Dallas and Fort Worth.

Mount St. Helens erupts again

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) - Mount St. Helens awoke unexpectedly from a fortnight's slumber with two mild eruptions, the latter coming in two brief 'pulses" early today, shooting a plume of steam and ash nearly four miles

Five funerals were scheduled at various locations. The services include those of two elderly sisters who were residents of one nursing home. who died while trying to seek shelter in a church

Well, if government is an

organization that has nothing of its own, just what kind of an organization is it? Government is a group of people who persuade the rest of us that government can provide protection, justice and just about anything and everything else that

the mind of man can think up. There is nothing mystical or divine about government. It is a man - made organizatin put together under the Constitution wherein those who drafted the instrument arrogated to themselves an enormous number of powers above and beyond everyone else in the land.

The most fantastic propaganda efforts have taken place since 1789. The bulk of the people of the United States have come to believe that the government is the repository of all wisdom; the safe deposit box of the nation's wealth; the arbiter of all allocations of jobs and favors; and the be - all and end - all of civilization.

If it were possible for men to make an organization which could, in fact, be all - wise, control all wealth, allocate all resources, human and otherwise, and remain the ultimate point of judicial decision - making, then men would have made a God.

If we look at this organization called government real closely, we will see that all it is is a group of people. Government isn't the real problem. It is belief in the superpowers of government that is.

When one attempts to cope with human beliefs, one is in deep water instantly. The deepest and most profound beliefs any people have are

usually refered to as religious. That is what we are actually facing.

In this country now, all the mystical and cultural religious heritage to the contrary notwithstanding the great faith - the over - arching national belief — is a kind of religious devotion to the state. Thus, what we are confronting, whether we choose to look at it this way or not, is a great pagan cult. Belief in the great powers of government may well be the last of the great pagan religions.

With the enormous growth of secularism in the United States, it is fair to say that a great many people today shun the traditional religious faiths. It is also true that there are millions who continue to support the "old time" practices. Droves of persons now have a dual religious faith: They may stil give lip service and tithing

along traditional lines. But when they really want to get something done, they go to the picket line. The pagan belief in the powers of the state is a most pragmatic, practical faith.

Prayer meetings continue, but they are buttressed by mass demonstration. Government is a visible god, with troops and guns. That is what people really believe in today. "Trust in the Lord" may be a pious phrase; but just in case, it would be important to have a few politicains in one's camp.

Faith in government has turned the

world into an armed camp.

Unhapppily, White House support for less government, balanced budgets. fewer taxes and private enterprise has a hallow ring. Out of the mouth of the guru come assurances of peace; but out of the Oval Office come decrees for more arms, guns and power. So, taxes are cut but spending increases. Hypocrisy is everywhere.

The pagan faith in government is the kind of faith that brought great Rome to its knees. The belief that force is the ultimate answer to every contention, combined with plenty of money with which to solve all problems, sets the stage for a great disillusionment.

American belief is in secular paganism. We have a theocracy, in which a failure to participate is viewed as both illegal and to a degree a kind of blasphemy. When the vision of personal indepenence and the willingness to solve one's own problems is replaced by lines of worshipers offering love and allegiance to Molloch, the nation is in



Nation now has a 76-day hedge against shutoff of oil by OPEC

WASHINGTON (AP) - Uncle Sam is one-third of the way through paying off his oil insurance policy

Officials were gathering on the banks of the Mississippi River this afternoon to switch on the pumps that will send the 250-millionith-barrel of oil into the Stragetic Petroleum Reserve. The ceremony marks six long, often frustrating years for the government's biggest energy program. Before it is all over in 1990, it is

expected the program will spend more than \$30 billion to stash away 750 million barrels of oil as insurance against another foreign oil embargo. That's a far cry from the \$6 billion to

\$7 billion the program was originally estimated to cost for a smaller, 500-million-barrel reserve. Huge cost overruns have been only

one of the problems. Construction delays and world oil shortages have thrown the government far behind its original timetable. And last week a House subcommittee heard allegations that oil switching and other fraud may have cost the government millions of dollars.

But even with the problems, Energy Department officials say the program's accomplishments have been remarkable given the staggering size of the undertaking.

Thousands are evacuated after 3rd eruption PICHUCALCO, Mexico (AP) -About 10,000 refugees arrived Sunday

Weary, hungry villagers crowded into shelters here in southeast Mexico as the government evacuated thousands of peasants from around the erupting volcano El Chichonal. The 4,340-foot volcano erupted

Saturday night for the third time in six days, raising the toll to at least 21 dead and at least 500 injured and pouring more tons of ashes on villages and towns for miles around. Villagers who returned to their homes last Friday fled

Defense Minister Felix Galvan Lopez said the fate of 5,000 people in isolated settlements on the slopes of the volcano still was not known. Dr. Rigoberto Garcia, chief of medical services for Chiapas state, said paratroopers would attempt to jump into the villages with food today if the clouds of smoke and ashes belching from the peak in the Sierra Madre did not turn them back.

in Pichucalco, 22 miles from the volcano. Many were women and children whose homes collapsed under the weight of the volcanic debris. Some were in a state of panic. Children cried as they waited for buses or trucks to take them to shelters.

DEAR MAMA: Please don't wait until Billy kills somebody before you have him psychiatrically examined. His violent behavior could be a symptom of a mental disorder. Your son should not be allowed to have a knife in his possession, and if you know-ingly permit it, you must share the responsibility for whatever occurs as a result of it. Please act at once. Ask your family physician to guide you, or call your local mental health clinic. Billy clearly needs evaluation and therapy.

DEAR ABBY: "Too Tired for Love" complains because her husband works the night shift and she works days. 'When he comes home at 2 a.m. he's wide-awake and ready for romance, but I am already three hours into a deep sleep by then," says she,

DEAR DR. LAMB - My son's wife has herpes in her vagina. My son says he doesn't have it now but thought once he might have it in his mouth. He had blisters develop in his

I would like to know how safe my family is when they come to my home. I have all but asked my son not to come. I have a 16-year-old daughter. I couldn't bear to think of her getting the

DEAR READER - Both herpes simplex type 1 (mouth) and type 2 (genital) are spread by physical con-tact with virus-containing secretions and cells shed by the infected person. That does NOT mean sexual contact in all cases.

A person can spread herpes from the mouth to the genital area and vice

versa by his own hand. Kissing is a common way to spread herpes simplex type

From 30 to 90 percent of teen-agers already have antibodies that show they have been infected by type 1 in childhood, not by sex but by kissing and simple physical contact.

With today's sexual freedom, and because of selfhand, you can find both type 1 and type 2 in both the genital and oral areas. At present the best we can advise to avoid spread is to avoid close physical contact such as kissing and touching.

When a problem question by someone with whom you are having trouble, the answer will probably be you need counseling." Maybe you are asking a professional, mental health worker, psychiatrist, or psychologist, psychotherapist or psychoanalyst. He or she might answer, "Everyone could benefit from counseling

She would, then, proceed with a psychological recipe for an instant cure for whatever problem one might disclose. Charlie Coyote in the comic series the Roadrunner probably feels the need for counseling as a result of near misses, backfires and aggravated frustrations. He never wins. Counseling may not help Charlie Coyote learn to catch the Roadrunner, but it could help him direct his attention toward more fulfilling accomplishable goals

If you are brave enough to ask me this question, of course, the answer is "you might need counseling, but not me." Few individuals admit their need for counseling. It just doesn't sound right. Counseling suggests weakness. something an individual is unable to attain on his own. One might be embarrassed or ashamed to admit that he cannot handle an emotional problem. 


Once a person can admit a need for counseling, the first step toward good mental health had been taken.







HOUSTON (AP) - Former Dallas Cowboy Buddy Dial says a pass thrown 23 years ago figured heavily in his recovery from drug addiction.

Dial, whose doctor gave him three months to live in 1981 says he is using hypnosis to overcome the agony he tried for years to kill with pills.

"I haven't felt this well, really, since '67, when I woke up from my first back surgery and knew I would never play

football again," he said. Dial says he owes his life to former Cowboys who collected money for him to go to Dr. David Axelrad's new pain clinic in Sacramento, Calif. And he also thanks All-Pro quarterback

Bobby Layne His own doctor predicted Dial had three months to live, but recommended the clinic. Dial was reluctant.

"There wasn't any way anybody was going to hypnotize this country boy." Dial said. "That was just for crazy people. Axelrad changed Dial's mind after the former Rice

All-America's description of the first pass Lavne threw to him. The doctor said the concentration Dial used in the catch resembled a hypnotic trance. Dial began fighting pain from football injuries in the

mid-60s. He suffered a leg injury, broken ribs and back problems that required three operations during his career. The prescription pills to which he became addicted cost

him his Dallas home, his businesses and his cars. Then one night in 1976, shortly after his wife divorced him, Dial woke up suffering a new kind of agony

"Son, I'm dying," he said, staggering into his boy Kevin's bedroom. Kevin, then 13. managed to get him to a hospital. Doctors said Dial's kidney was in severe trauma brought on by the Darvon, Demerol and Percodan he took daily.

1982 baseball season opens today

AP Sports Writer The 1982 baseball season is underway, with games scheduled in Baltimore and Cincinnati, and for a number of veterans, it marks the resumption of the chase toward impressive career goals.

Before the last out is recorded sometime in October, Pete Rose, Gaylord Perry, Nolan Ryan, Carl Yastrzemski and a host of others could attain significant lifetime achievements

Philadelphia's Rose, who will celebrate his 41st birthday on April 14. goes into the season with 3,697 career hits. He is 74 away from Hank Aaron's total of 3,771, second on the all-time list behind the legendary Ty Cobb. A year ago. Rose opened the season 74 hits short of Stan Musial's National League record, a mark he tied in June and burst past in August. He is now 495 hit's away from Cobb's career total of 4,191 and is determined to reach that mark before he leaves baseball.

Rose can make progress in three other categories as well. With 11,910 at bats, he needs 454 to tie Aaron's all-time record of 12,364. He has averaged 640 at bats a year throughout his career, so the mark seems entirely within reach. He also needs 55 games to tie Willie Mays for fifth place on the all-time games played list at 2,992, and 34 runs scored to tie Musial's fifth-place total of

Perry, who's 43 now, signed a

free-agent contract with the Seattle Mariners and gets a chance to reach the 300-victory plateau, a milestone last

accomplished in 1963 by Hall of Famer Early Wynn.

The veteran right-hander, who could be called the ancient Mariner, needs three victories for 300 and can also move closer to Walter Johnson's all-time strikeout record of 3,508. Perry goes into 1982 with 3,336 strikeouts, second on the all-time list and 172 short of Johnson's record. But other pitchers could get there first.

The main threat would seem to be Ryan, who needs 259 strikeouts to reach Johnson. That is a total the flame-throwing Houston pitcher has surpassed in six different seasons in his brilliant career

Ferguson Jenkins, signed to a free agent contract by the Chicago Cubs. needs just 38 strikeouts to become the seventh pitcher in history to reach 3,000 for his career. Two of those who got there before him. Steve Carlton of Philadelphia and Cincinnati's Tom Seaver, will seek to add to their totals as they continue their own pursuit of Johnson's record. Carlton enters the season with 3,148 strikeouts and Seaver

Jenkins (264), Carlton (262), Seaver (259) and Baltimore's Jim Palmer (248) are bunched in career wins, and all could make inroads on the journey to 300. Perry is almost certain to get there

When St. Louis opens its season Tuesday night in Houston, it will mark the 24th opening day for Cardinal pitcher Jim Kaat. No other hurler has lasted that long in the majors. Kaat, who's also 43, has 278 victories, second most for any active pitcher.

Perry and Kaat share the senior citizen role with Boston's Carl Yastrzemski, who's also 43. Yaz is starting his 22nd season with the Red Sox, one short of Brooks Robinson's record for years spent with one club. His next home run will be the 427th of his career, breaking a 16th-place tie with Billy Williams. With 600 doubles, he is three away from Paul Waner's ninth-place total of 603 and 24 short of Aaron's eighth-place total of 624.

Yaz needs 15 runs scored to match Honus Wagner's 15th-place total of 1,740 and 16 runs batted in to reach Wagner's 12th-place total of 1,732. With 3,192 hits. Yastrzemski is 59 away from Nap Lajoie's ninth-place total of 3,251 and 91 short of Mays' eighth-place total of 3.283. He needs 63 singles to tie Frankie Frisch for 15th place on that list with 2.171 and 280 at-bats to reach Cobb's third-place total of 11,429

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World War II project involved bomber bats

HONDO, Texas (AP) - World War II incendiary-bomb bats - intended to be unleashed over Tokyo and other key Japanese cities to roost in the eaves of buildings until their tiny time bombs went off - were "recruited" and trained for combat in Texas Hill

Country caves just west of San Antonio. Four caves along the Balcones Fault contributed their share of bats to the top-secret Navy operation called Project X-Ray.

Heavily armed Marines detailed from Corpus Christi cordoned off Devil's Sinkhole near Rocksprings. Bracken Cave near present-day Natural Bridge Caverns. Frio Cave in Uvalde County and Ney Cave in northern Medina County during 1943 and 1944.

Those four caves were chosen because together they house the largest known concentrations of bats in the world, said an account of Project X-Ray in a 1948 publication of the National Speliological Society.

The largest colony of all is in Ney

Cave, in remote and rugged ranch

country - home of an estimated 10 million to 70 million Mexican freetail bats. It houses many more bats than the legendary Carlsbad Caverns in New "Everybody's heard of Carlsbad Caverns," said Hunter Schuehle, whose family owns Ney Cave. "But I bet

there's not a hundred who have heard of The cave's anonymity hides a fascinating history.

military camp around the cave's yawning entrance. halfway up a

limestone mountain. At the height of the bat-catching phase of the operation, giant screens prefabricated at Hondo Army Airfield were trucked to the cave and spread in front of its 30-foot gaping mouth. Closed, they could capture a million

bats in a single night Bats caught at the four Texas caves for the project were transported to a remote California site to be fitted with tiny delayed-fuse incidiary devices. There, they accidentally fulfilled their suicide mission by burning, among other things, an airplane hangar and a colonel's automobile.

The \$2 million project was canceled

abruptly in October 1944 before any bats could be loosed over Japan.

Though certainly the most bizarre, bat-bombs were not the only offbeat contributions to warfare from Ney

Schuehle pointed out some pyramid-shaped concrete structures in the bed of Verde Creek, about a mile

from the cave. Those are not from World War II, he

said, but from a war a century older. "Those are vats where the Confederates cleaned guano (bat manure) they mined for gunpowder in the Civil War." Schuehle said. Hard-pressed Confederate engineers had to turn to local sources for ammunition production, and some of them turned to Ney Cave.

In the cave mouth, a rickety wooden framework remains from an old pulley-and-bucket mining system that recalls a third war effort - this one during World War I.

The National Speliological Society bulletin recounts a wartime fertilizer drive that saw Ney Cave and others in Texas contribute up to 65 boxcar-loads of nitrogen-rich guano a day to patriotic

The cave's relative inaccessibility, closely guarded by the owners of the surrounding ranchland and far from any main roads, has kept it unchanged from its appearance in the 1940s - or the 1860s for that matter.

Inside the cave. Schuehle played a flashlight beam around the honey-combed limestone ceilings to reveal a scattering of furry bodies clinging in repose.

In the late afternoon warmth, a number of bats were beginning to swirl in circular patterns high in the house-size anteroom of the cave, preparing for their daily dusk-to-dawn

The bulk of the bat colony has not returned from its winter migration to

South America, Schuehle said. When the bats are here in full strength they stream out of the 20-foot

wide cave mouth in a black torrent, wingtip-to-wingtip, for more than 15 minutes to forage for insects as far as the Gulf Coast before returning to roost. Schuehle said.
