U.S. Marines and 2nd division infantrymen pushed back remnants of four Red divisions across the Nakdong River west of Yongsan. Yongsan is 22 miles south of Taegu.

The fight there was grim and bloody. Hand to hand combat raged.

The Marines and doughboys charged with bayonets and swung their rifle butts as clubs. They captured dominating hills.

American officers estimated 7,300 Communists had been killed and wounded there in a week of fighting.

U.S. casualties have been heavy along the 35-mile front in the southwest and west.

Three Communist divisions are pounding toward Taegu from the east. Two more Red divisions have been identified in the drive down the Kumhwa highway toward Taegu.

The North Koreans were reported massing fresh strength opposite the gash they have cut in allied lines southwest of Pohang port, second most important on the Korean southeast coast.

A South Korean spokesman announced in Tokyo that South Korean navy units made a surprise landing Wednesday at the start of a "very important naval operation."

He said the landings were made on an island off Kusan and on another off Mokpo in the southwest.

The naval units were still fighting for the islands.

The spokesman said the operations are "preliminary to a really powerful naval action."

### War Material 'Siesta' Rapped By Senate Body

WASHINGTON — A subcommittee headed by Senator Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, said today a shakeup of the munitions board to eliminate "siesta psychology" in handling war material for Korean fighting.

The preparedness group reported yesterday that "more imaginative and far-sighted men" are needed to direct the stockpiling of critical defense items. It said proper handling of the nation's rubber resources by the board might head off a need for contracts like those invoked in World War II.

Johnson's group reported that the Defense Department lacks any "real central attack and policy" in handling the disposal of material once declared surplus but possibly useful now in light of the Korean war.

The senators said they found at least five defense plants have been sold or put on sale since the Korean crisis began.

# Time to Write Article About Alaska, Hawaii Rolls Around

 WASHINGTON — (AP) — Every two years, when there's a new Congress, I write a piece about Alaska and Hawaii.  
 There's never any attempt at prophecy in it. (There's none in this, either.)  
 Every two years the story says that Hawaii and Alaska, which have been trying to get statehood for themselves, are still trying.  
 And then the story explains that maybe this session of Congress will be the time when they get it—maybe.  
 Then they don't get it. Then when there's a new Congress, and there's talk about Hawaii and Alaska, I do another piece.  
 Last March I did such a piece

because the House had passed bills to let Hawaii and Alaska become states.  
 But I pointed out that this would mean nothing unless the Senate also approved. Somehow, the Senate never got around to it, as usual.  
 But since last March something has happened: our relations with Russia have gone even further down hill than they were then. Hawaii and Alaska look even larger as important parts of this country's outer defenses. Since they're so important, there's been renewed talk to let them come in as states.  
 And yesterday President Truman nudged the Senate to do something. Senator Lucas of Illinois, top man among the Senate Democrats, said maybe the Senate will act before going home this month.  
 So here once again is the story on Hawaii and Alaska, just in case the Senate lets them become the 49th and 50th states:  
 The U.S. bought Alaska from Russia in 1867 for \$7,200,000 but didn't allow it to become a territory until 1912.  
 The U.S. annexed Hawaii, then a republic, in 1898 and made it a territory in 1900.  
 Alaska is twice the size of Texas, which has 865,000 square miles. It has a population of 100,000 people, more than many of the present states had when they were admitted to the union. Hawaii has a population of 50,000. About 86 percent of those people are American citizens. Hawaii, made up of seven islands, has an area of 6,400 square miles.  
 Alaska's chief industries are fishing, fur, mining, lumber. Hawaii's are sugar, pineapples, cattle, dairy products, truck crops, fish and coffee.  
 In both territories the people have voted for statehood. Congressional committees have made trips to the territories and investigated the problem of giving them statehood.  
 A statehood for both was promised by the Democrats and Republicans.  
 First real action came in 1947 when the House voted to admit Hawaii. The Senate never has voted.  
 The House this year voted again for Hawaii and, for the first time, for Alaska, too. So far the Senate still hasn't acted.  
 Some of the congressmen opposed to statehood argue this way:  
 Alaska and Hawaii, if admitted, would have two senators each, since every state has two senators. And, because of its 540,000 population, Hawaii would be entitled to two representatives in the house. Alaska, because it has only 100,000 population, would have one representative in the house.  
 In their local elections about 100,000 of the 540,000 Hawaiians vote, and about 20,000 of Alaska's 100,000 population vote.  
 This would give Alaska two senators representing only 20,000 voters. Whereas states with millions of voters are allowed only two senators.  
 But the people in Alaska and

Hawaii argue this way:  
 They've already been kept too long in the status of territories. They're both mature in running their own affairs. But Congress, because they are only territories, really runs them and makes laws for them.  
 But, unlike the people in states, the people in Alaska and Hawaii have no voice in the laws made for them. And, although they have to pay federal taxes, they don't get the full benefit from federal laws that states get.  
 They can't vote in a national election. A territory can elect its own legislature but the president appoints the governor.  
 In addition to all this, the Hawaiians and Alaskans argue that statehood would strengthen this country's position in the Pacific.

NEW YORK — (AP) — Argentine Ambassador Jeronimo Remorino says his government has authorized aid to United Nations forces in Korea.  
 The ambassador, who arrived here by plane yesterday from Argentina, said he did not know what sort of aid was contemplated, but he would relay the offer to the L. N. unified command in Washington.  
 Remorino added that he expects agreement on a \$125,000,000 United States loan to Argentina in less than a month.

## Telephone Classes Provide American Dentists a Fill-in

 CHICAGO — A fresh idea in education — classes by telephone on a nationwide scale is gaining ground.  
 The University of Illinois College of Dentistry started a series of talks on advances in dentistry last October. Once a month for six months, the programs were carried over a 15,000 mile wire hookup. They were heard by 6,000 dentists in 163 cities.  
 A new series will begin this fall. The sponsors report they have worked out plans to pipe the lectures to 10,000 dentists in 250 cities in 45 states and Canada.  
 Dr. Isaac Schour, associate dean, and Dr. Saul Levy, director of the extension division of post-graduate studies of the dental school say:  
 "The future holds great op-

portunities for the expansion of this revolutionary new technique for postgraduate education."  
 The purpose is to keep dentists abreast of new developments in their field. They pay a \$10 fee. In return, they get the privilege of listening throughout the series and an illustrated manual that summarizes the views of the speakers.  
 There is a different topic for each session. Six men—teaching and practicing dentists, physicians and surgeons and other scientists—speak on each subject.  
 Classes start at 8:30 p.m. eastern standard time and run for two hours. Dentists gather in hospital amphitheaters, lodge halls and private homes. They used an American Legion ballroom in Canton, Ohio, and a radio station studio in Salt Lake City. It was dinner time on the Pacific Coast. So, the students ate while they listened in a Seattle hotel. The waitresses wore moccasins.  
 The project has a farred well financially. Fees collected for the 1949-50 series added up to \$66,574. Expenses, chiefly for wire rental and printing, came to \$66,490. The balance was \$84.

## Army Perfects New Head Gear With Drape, Metal Covering

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — The Army will soon field-test a new plastic helmet, stronger and lighter than the last war's iron pot, featuring a drape shape and an aluminum cover.

The aluminum adds somewhat to the helmet's strength, but its chief function will be to serve as a shaving mug, cooking pot, foot bath, or water can — just as the old iron cover did.

Its secondary value is strictly morale. The Army figures most soldiers like to have some metal covering on their heads, and if metal makes them happier, metal they'll get.

Actually, according to Army Quartermaster Corps Research and Development's Dr. Warren Stubblein, the plastic liner alone is just as strong as the old helmet, steel and plastic liner together.

The new helmet is cut low around the neck to provide better protection to the neck and base of the skull, sits a little higher on the forehead, and is cut wide over the ears to accommodate ear phones for tankers, and other radio men. Metal clips are provided for attachment of the headphones — which also are new and lighter and smaller than the old headsets.

The helmet will weigh around three pounds, including its aluminum cover, which is more than a pound less than the old helmet.

The light weight is part of the overall Army policy, reflected by the mottoes hung in Research and Development offices: "Make it lighter, make it smaller, make it work!"

Dr. Stubblein said there were two reasons for this. First, the entire Army is being redesigned

to be strictly airborne. Next, if a soldier doesn't have so much weight to carry himself, he'll get less tired, and will be able to fight longer.

So far, 2500 helmets have been ordered for field testing. Defense Department spokesmen said there is "a very good chance it will be adopted," since by the time a product is OK'd for field-testing, any adjustments in it will be minor.

The design was the work of the Army Quartermaster Corps and Dr. Steven Grancey of New York's Museum of Art. Dr. Grancey is curator of arms, and is by profession an armorer. The new helmet's shape actually derives from old Roman helmets.

Helmet's aren't designed to stop bullets, as such as they are to protect the head from falling debris and shell fragments. Yet flat-surface sample of the material of which the new helmet is composed was fired on at point-blank range with .45 caliber bullets. They didn't penetrate. Striking a curved surface, they're even less likely to penetrate, Dr. Stubblein said.

There is still a bug in the design, which worries the medical

corps. The medical complaint there's no way to trace fragments of plastics in the body through X-rays. Research and Development is tinkering with ideas of combing chemicals in the plastic which can be traced.

Along with the new helmet, Dr. Stubblein's office is also

**France's Rebuilding Program Is Including Repair of Casino**

**LE TOUQUET, France** — (AP) — France is busy rebuilding, not only its bombed-out homes and factories, but the tennis courts and gambling casino of this channel coast resort where some of Europe's wealthiest playboys cavorted before World War II. Some Frenchmen don't care for spending \$1,400,000 of tax money to lift the face of a casino. But from the government's point of view it's a good investment — the tax collector gets 60 percent of the take.

Besides, like all property-owners in France, the hotel and club proprietors have a legal claim on the state for damages caused by the war. In Le Touquet they put the sum at about \$20,000,000 and point out that rival Deauville was hardly touched.

Le Touquet began life humbly as Paris-Plage — a private beach — probably because it is one of the closest seaside resorts to the capital. The 128 miles are an easy three hours by car, and only a little more by train.

Shortly after the turn of the 20th century, some wealthy British investors came in and the tonier-sounding name of a nearby cape was added. Now the official books call it Le Touquet-Paris-Plage. High up on the French coast between Boulogne and Dieppe, the beach somehow particularly

NEW YORK — I had my fortune told by a lady who reads feet.

Now, what's so funny about all that reading is just as legitimate as palm reading. True, it tickles more, but it involves the same life lines and heart lines and head lines and bumps used in reading character and the future from a hand.

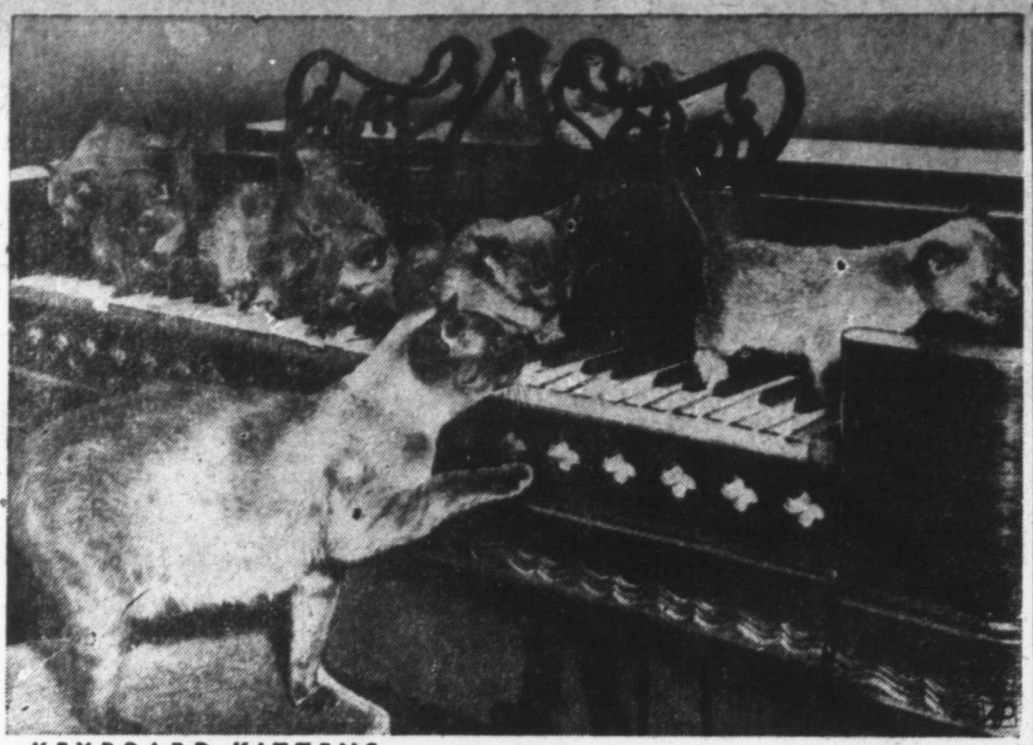

### Mighty Alaskan Volcano Scheduled to Erupt, Predicted to Make A-Bomb Appear Smaller

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — (AP) — The greatest explosion in modern history is shaping up in the rugged mountains of the Alaskan Peninsula. Scientists who make the prediction feel that 1950 will be the year of the big blast—a tremendous eruption that will make the A-Bomb seem like a popcorn.

Increased activity has been observed during the past month throughout the length of the 600-mile long peninsula. Beneath the smoking peaks and steaming fumaroles experts say gases are building up tremendous pressures, swirling in pools of molten lava and seeking a vent. Gauged by past performances that vent is in the Alaskan Peninsula.

The men who study nature's giant fireworks displays—volcanologists—don't agree on the exact time and place of the big blow, but they agree that the volcanoes have been quiet for too long.

Field crews recently had living examples to prove their contention. On the tip of the peninsula 8,900-foot Mount Pavlov is belching smoke 20,000 feet into the air. Fine ash covered an area of 30 miles and visibility was impaired.

First reports of the eruption, classified as a minor one by the experts, came from pilots on July 31. They spotted flames and lava pouring from a crater on the northeast slope. One witnessed chunks of pumice thrown hundreds of feet into the air and another described alternate coughing of steam and smoke punctuated by spurts of fiery lava.

Since July 2 the men who study the birth of mountains have also had their instruments trained in the direction of Knife Mountain, another volcano situated in the heart of the Alaskan Peninsula. On that day fishermen flying to a remote lake spotted a black crater on the slope of the peak. Flying closer, they observed spouting smoke and smelled the acrid sulphurous fumes that accompany an eruption.

National Park Service regional director George L. Collins conducted a survey of the peninsula and this week reported a new volcanic ash on the white slopes at many points. He said gas pressures beneath the earth's crust are probably pressing toward activity on a tremendous scale.

Several months ago Father Bernard Hubbard, geology head of the University of Santa Clara, predicted a big eruption. Hubbard, famed for his exploration of Alaska's active volcanoes, said he believes volcanoes operate in cycles.

"Mount Katmai erupted in 1912," he said then. "Aniakchak blew its top about 20 years later in 1931. Over 18 years have passed since then, and I believe another big eruption is due before long."

Under the auspices of the government, teams of experts have been sent into the area to observe the smoking peaks this year. Equipped with seismographs to detect the initial rumblings deep in the earth, gravity meters, and other sensitive ma-

chines, they will attempt to predict the next big eruption.

One group with the Geological Survey visits various remote volcanic islands by boat from Dutch Harbor. Two of the world's foremost volcanologists, Dr. Thomas A. Jagger and Dr. Howell Williams, have concerned themselves with the Alaskan volcanoes. They believe the cones in the north seldom erupt without warning. Usually the explosive upheaval is preceded by smoking and rumbling deep within the mountain.

This is the first time such pronounced activity has been noted since July 23, 1945, when Mount Tullik, Alaska's largest active volcano, threw the Uminak Island Army Base into an uproar. Although the base was 60 miles from the crater. Detailed evacuation plans were made when the volcano peak disintegrated with a roar.

Planes flying the Aleutian route were unable to approach the menace of Mount Tullik. Lumps of volcanic ash heated to 1,000 degrees centigrade were shot 1,000 feet into the air above the eight mile wide crater. Ships in nearby Chernofski Bay prepared to put out to sea.

Fortunately the Army base was not harmed by the waves of lava that boiled down from the cone. While it was still active a crew headed by Lt. Ray E. Wilcox, former geology professor of the University of Wisconsin, conducted a close up study and advised that the lava flow presented no immediate danger. Today the cone still smokes, serving as a landmark for aircraft.

Other landmarks which may yet become portals to the molten core of the earth include stately Mount Shishaldin, 9,387 feet above the shores of Unimak Island, rising in a perfect cone and still active.

The heart of the system apparently lies in the 3,000,000-acre Katmai National Monument. Today it is studded with active volcanoes such as Knife Mountain, Mount Mageik, Novarupta Volcano and Martin Volcano. But its namesake, Mount Katmai, seems forever stilled. In its vast crater is a green lake eight miles in diameter. Yet it was the scene of the world's greatest eruption.

When Katmai erupted in 1912 the lives of the village of Savonoski, forewarned by rumblings in the earth, fled to Naknek. Today their cabins are buried in pumice and ash, only the roofs are visible from a plane. The eruption had clouded the entire peninsula, depositing foot-deep layers of ash on ships at sea, smothering birds and wildlife and creating the famous Valley of Ten Thousand Smokes. Recent trips to the valley found fumaroles no longer steaming and branches in the surrounding cones are now dormant. But other peaks in the area are acting up once again.

Although they believe the eruptions of Alaska's volcano pressure belt looms in the near future, the experts see no cause for alarm.

Following his survey, Collins said, "The Katmai area is the finest single place in the world for academic research. There is a tremendous variety of activity. But there is no special danger in allowing the public to see a volcano at work. In fact this year the monument area has been opened to the public for the first time."

Attention is now focused on Pavlov. Twice before it has signaled eruptions. Villagers at Unga, over 60 miles away, were startled in 1922 when the night sky was split by flames shooting from Pavlov's cone. In 1947 again, it blew ash into the Aleutian winds. Since then like many dozens of peaks in the belt, it has been quiescent. Occasional rings of smoke and steam rise over the snowy slopes.

But this month experts are watching the mysterious peaks with renewed interest—wondering which will break from its muzzling crater with a new eruption. Instead of rushing away as in Hawaii and more populous places adjacent to large volcanoes, the field crews in Alaska hope they can rush toward the eruption in time to record its activity. Although Katmai was the world's greatest blast, they recall not a single person witnessed the eruption.

### Secret of World's Climate Is Sought in the Glaciers

NEW YORK — (AP) — To wrest from a glacier some of the climatic secrets of a thousand years, William O. Field, Jr., of the American Geographical Society has returned once more to Alaska.

Field, head of the AGS department of exploration and field research, will visit the 15-man team operating from the glaciological laboratories set up June 22 near the center of a 700-square mile expanse of snow and ice near Juneau in South-eastern Alaska.

The project is sponsored by federal agencies, including the U.S. Forest Service and U.S. Geological Survey, and its findings will be made available to the government. Representatives of several U.S. agencies are visiting the project this summer.

Now in its second year, the project seeks also new information on the physical properties of ice and the climate controls affecting glacier expansion and recession.

The party is measuring the snowfall which forms the glacier in its upper levels, the flow of ice to lower levels, and its final disappearance by melting. It drills several hundred feet to study the crystal structure of the ice deep in the glacier. Surveyors are mapping the whole region, and other scientists are studying vegetation near the ice to determine past variations of glaciers.

One specific glacier (the Taku) is advancing several hundred feet a year and toppling trees 150 years old in its path.

"The Juneau ice field is one of the most accessible extensive glacier systems in the world," Field commented.

### Learn to Sabotage Plants, Manufacturers Are Urged

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Learn best ways to sabotage your own plant. Then you'll know where to block any sneak punch foreign agents might throw. That, in effect, was a suggestion made to industry today by the Defense Department. It was included in a booklet issued by the department's munitions board to spell out means of protecting war plants against internal sabotage and outside atomic attacks. The booklet, "Principles of Plant Protection," charged management with the primary responsibility for defeating any enemy attempts to cripple production and "destroy our ability and will to fight." It suggested that the best way for management to undertake its security job is to set an official "with a lively imagination" to figuring out the best means of sabotaging his plant to slow down or halt production. Espionage agents may be expected to use "great ingenuity" in obtaining information and carrying out sabotage, the munitions board stated, adding: "It would be realistic to assume that efforts are being made at present to collect all available information on our industrial plants vital to war." The board suggested that the most likely forms of sabotage will be the damaging of build-

### Tourists Urged to Watch For Scalpers in New Mexico

By ROBERT A. BARNES AP Newsfeatures ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. — Want to see a bear? A coyote? A mystery animal? An Indian bracelet? Then New Mexico's the place. Just drive through and read the signs. Summer tourists are here in hordes, and it's questionable who gives whom a rougher time — the tourists who make a trader unroll two dozen or so Navajo rugs and then drive off with nary a nice-knowin'-ya, bub; or the busy promoters who spot cross-country thoughtares in the Southwest loaded, not for bar, but for vacationers. Like all vacation havens New Mexico has all kinds of folks trying to put together a dollar here and there. The less scrupulous — the fakes — are the bans of every decent, self-respecting businessman who has to compete with them. "Free water!" the signs scream. "Last chance!" What all too many easterners don't know is that there are virtually no legitimate spots in the state which charge for water. Unless you want to fill a tank-truck. "See the zoo! See the wild animals!" For mile after mile after mile you see them — the signs in giant orange and yellow letters. "Four miles! Two miles! 300 yards! Right here, right here!" they scream. "Stop! You just PASSED it!" The tourists stop. Lots of them. Folks who live around here don't pay too much attention. A cobra's a cobra, they figure. So's a laughing hyena. Legitimate Indian traders chop at their bits over the counterfeiters. One of the best-known — Dean Kirk — has his answer printed for all to see near his trading post west of Gallup. "One mile to Dean Kirk trading post. Genuine handmade Indian goods. No wild animals, no cheap gas, no beer, no snakes, no junk curios, no fake exhibits." Some trading posts aren't really trading posts, established for the primary purpose of dealing with Indians. Naturally the ones in more isolated locations make their living by trading, not selling to tourists. Vacationers pay thousands of dollars annually for Indian merchandise without knowing whether it is what it purports to be. The United Indian Traders association, which includes some 300 traders on the Navajo, Hopi, Zuni and other Indian reservations in New Mexico and adjoining states, has taken steps to aid the unwary tourist. All genuine handmade Indian jewelry coming from members of the UITA bears a stamp identifying it. Jewelry which is not stamped may or may not be handmade. Great quantities of silverware are sold as "handmade" articles. This often means they were turned out in an assembly line process by Indian silversmiths working in one of the big jewelry factories.

### Defiance of Court By Georgia Demos Assailed by Judge

COLUMBUS, Ga. — (AP) — The Democratic party in Georgia defied the law when it challenged Supreme Court rulings on racial segregation, a federal judge declared here. A resolution adopted by the state Democratic convention, which said in effect that Georgia would never allow mixing of races regardless of decisions by the Supreme Court, was sharply criticized yesterday by U. S. District Judge A. B. Conger. It was "the spitting of a negligible, vicious, vociferous, selfish few," Judge Conger said in a prepared charge to a federal grand jury. The convention, which met last month, renominated Gov. Herman Talmadge, long an advocate of white supremacy. "The resolution not only committed those participating but invoked the aid of all state and local peace officers to defy the Supreme Court decision. . .," Conger added. When the convention took action on the resolution, party leaders said they were willing to go to jail to uphold their principles.

**Author Still Satisfied With Bohemian Life With Fame**

CHICAGO — (AP) — Author Nelson Algren lives in a "ten-dollar-a-month flat in a Chicago factory district."  
He doesn't have to. His latest book, "The Man With the Golden Arm," brought him enough fame and fortune to warrant a move to the other side of the tracks.  
The book won an American industry award for distinguished work. A selection of a book club, it also is being made into a movie and Algren is writing the dialogue for the shooting script.  
Algren's small second floor flat is in the back part of a two-house lot northwest of the loop. It vibrates in rhythm with the rumble of passing freight trains. Sented amid stacks of books and surrounded by the paraphernalia

of writing, Algren says he has no intention of deserting the slum for a penthouse.  
He expressed the fear that moving to a swank spot on the near north side might be too distracting.  
"There are too many phonies living what they think is a very Bohemian life," he says. "For someone who wants to do serious work that sort of thing only encroaches on his time."  
Time apparently is of great importance to the 41 year old novelist. He has an unlisted telephone number known only to a small group of friends. And the neighborhood where he lives, with its broken sidewalks and general shabbiness, is unimpressive. It is in this neighborhood that he says "I have my roots." At least it puts him within easy reach of the people he writes about.  
His books chronicle the lives of dope addicts, prostitutes, burglars, hard-as-nails cops and cops looking for a pay-off. "Golden Arm" has as its protagonist a card dealer who becomes addicted to dope. "Never Come Morning" dealt with a prostitute. His other works, "Neon Wilderness," a collection of short stories, and "Somebody In Boots," his first novel written in 1935, were focused on life along Chicago's Division street, Madison street and South State street.  
Life there, Algren says, is subcommunity.  
"There's no room for these people," he says. "They live on the edge of life with the prospect that it will end now — not today or tomorrow, but now. And on top of them, keeping them down, sits a great heavy middle class society."  
His books, he said in an interview, are written with the motive of "bruising the complacency of squares, the smug, whitecollared, righteous, church-going citizens. I want the middle class to be conscious of the world underneath."

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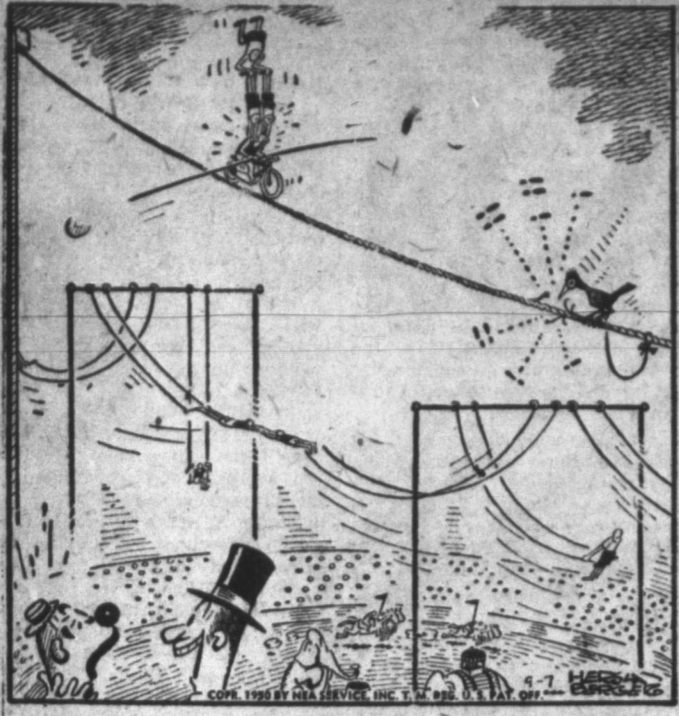

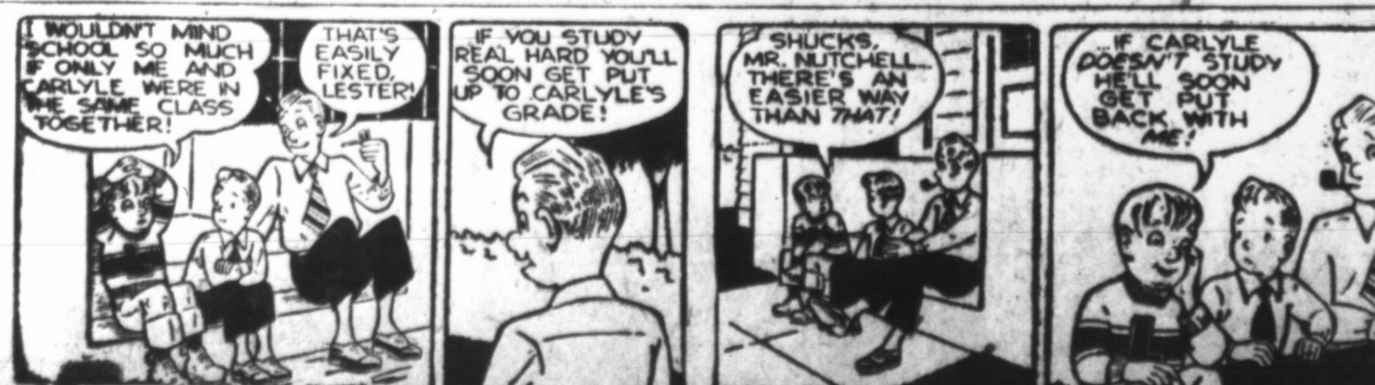

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## Disney's No Different; He Has Trouble With Stars, Too

**HOLLYWOOD** — (P) — Alfred Hitchcock, the director who has called actors anything from children to cattle, once remarked that Walt Disney has the ideal relationship with his stars: he can erase them if they get out of line.

When I told Disney this, he replied: "We have trouble with our actors, too."

For instance, there is Mickey Mouse. The famed rodent has been brought back more times than Sarah Bernhardt. Several times Mickey has faded and his sentimental creator has revived him in a new vehicle.

"The trouble is," Disney explained, "that Mickey isn't funny himself. He has to be surrounded with comic situations. That takes a lot of trouble."

Minnie Mouse has suffered an eclipse for the same reason. "There's no action connected with Minnie," the cartoon man said, "and we have given up the subtle stuff."

"The duck (Donald) and the dog (Pluto) are funnier characters in themselves, but even they can get out of line. We get so busy with what we're doing that we lose perspective. We have to stop and see what is happening to the characters."

Disney has taken on a new set of actors who are even more unmanageable than his film veterans. He has started a series which he calls "true-life adventures," starting the wild life of North America.

The first of the series was called "Seal Island" and it chronicled the life of seals on an Aleutian island. It won an Academy Award. The second is "Beaver Valley," which is currently winning much praise throughout the country. Among the fan letters Disney has received is one from a justice of the U. S. Supreme Court.

"Beaver Valley," as you might suspect, stars the beaver. He is a fantastic animal," Walt said. "All he does is eat, sleep and work. He never seems to play at all. The work he does is of utmost importance in conserving the land in the western United States. The government even transports beavers into areas that need conservation."

Supporting the dam-builders are a lively bunch of others, who believe in all play and no work. They are as funny a set of comedians as Disney has ever offered. The rest of the cast includes the villain — a coyote, plus various moose, crickets, frogs, salmon, ducks, bears, etc.

The films run a half-hour and are Disney's answer to the double-feature. He feels audiences will get more enjoyment out of watching nature's actors than in sitting through a B picture that accompanies the major film.

"These pictures aren't cheap to make," he told me. "They cost at least \$100,000. I have to send a cameraman into the wilds for about nine months in order to get what we're after. I now have a man on the Olympic peninsula in Washington filming the elk. Coming up is what I call 'Nature's Half-Acre.' A study of every living thing on and under an average half-acre of land."

He is also contemplating a starring vehicle for the others. I highly recommend it. They're as funny as Donald Duck.
