U. N. Given Military Power Plan

NEW YORK (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson today submitted to the United Nations general assembly a four-point plan to give that body military power to combat aggression anywhere in the world.

Truman Backs Slap at Taft

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman said today he subscribes to what W. Averell Harriman said about Senator Taft (R-Ohio) — that Taft's actions have furthered the designs of the Kremlin.

Replying to a news conference question, Mr. Truman said that yes, he does, subscribe to Harriman's attack on the Ohio senator, made in a speech to the American Federation of Labor convention at Houston on Tuesday.

Steel Union Chiefs Open Wage Talks In Secret Meeting

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Top policy makers of the powerful CIO United Steel workers union huddled behind closed doors today in a session which President Philip Murray said will "undoubtedly discuss wage demands."

The union's executive board also completed its preparations for a campaign to win union shops throughout the steel industry.

A union shop is one in which membership in the union is a condition of continued employment.

Vishinsky Warned By Traffic Cop

GLEN COVE, N. Y. (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky has been warned by a traffic cop that the next time he speeds through Glen Cove he'll get a ticket.

Red Ryder Comic Is Back, After Unavoidable Delay

Red Ryder is back in the News today. Due to circumstances beyond our control, the popular comic strip was not received in time for publication Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Acheson's Republican adviser, John Foster Dulles, described it as "the most important proposal for international peace and security put forth" since the end of World War Two.

The fight over the proposal is expected to start today when the assembly's 14-nation steering committee meets to decide the order in which the assembly will take up the almost four-score items on its agenda and which of the six main committees will handle each one.

Russia's Andrei Y. Vishinsky is almost certain to demand priority for a three-point Soviet declaration which he read to the assembly yesterday.

The United States plan is an expansion and formalization of ideas set forth by Acheson in a speech to the assembly in the velvet-draped hall at Flushing Meadow Park yesterday.

John D. Hickerson, assistant secretary of state, told newsmen that it is a result of the experience gained from the war in Korea and envisions a genuine system of international security.

It would: 1. Enable the veto-free general assembly to meet on 24 hours notice in case of a breach of the peace whenever the Security Council, which bears "the primary responsibility for the maintenance of peace and security," is hamstrung by a big-power veto.

2. Set up a roving U.N. commission to observe developments in areas of international tension and report authoritatively to the assembly on events there.

3. Ask member governments to set up, within their national armed services, units which would respond to the call of the Security Council or assembly to punish violations of the peace.

Hickerson later described the Soviet proposals as completely bankrupt of statesmanship or new ideas and said they were a compilation of previous Soviet moves whose futility had been demonstrated in other years.

Village Aroused by Phantom Whistler

PARADIS, La. (AP)—This little bayou community bustled with excitement today watching for a phantom whistler whose weird serenades have terrorized a 15-year-old bride-to-be.

Nearly all of the village's 200 population peered out of windows last night while a cordon of sheriff's deputies guarded the home of Jacquelyn Cadow.

For the past few days the townspeople have talked of little except the intruder who threatened the girl's life and vowed to prevent her marriage to a young state trooper.

His whistle is a shrill interpretation of a funeral dirge. State police, who were drawn into the investigation by State Trooper Herbert Belsom of New Orleans, Jacquelyn's husband-to-be, said they were stepping out of the case.

"We are convinced it is the work of a prankster," Trooper Vincent B. Eberer said. State Police Sgt. N. J. Khoury said the Cadow home yesterday took on the appearance of a media. Hundreds of curiosity seekers in automobiles paused for a look at the scene of the whistler's visits—a cottage surrounded by moss-draped oaks.

A doctor attended the young bride-to-be who collapsed Tuesday night after she and her mother, her mother's sister and a New Orleans States reporter all said they twice heard the intruder's funeral whistle.

Marines Hit Stiff Defense In Seoul Entry

TOKYO (AP)—American Marines battled for ancient Seoul today while a Red mystery column was reported rolling down on the Korean capital from Soviet-dominated Manchuria.

The nationality of manpower in the heavily-armed Communist column was not known to U.S. intelligence officers.

The Marines' entry into Northwest Seoul's narrow streets was met by stiffening resistance.

Field dispatches reported the tanked leathernecks entered the city at 6 p.m. Wednesday (3 a.m. CST) from their Han River crossing eight miles downstream.

The swift 10th corps advance from the original second front landing beaches at Inchon, 22 miles away, appeared to have reached the slower house-to-house fighting phase.

The Marines made it from the riverside into Seoul in 12 hours.

A big battle seemed in prospect. Besides the threat of the unidentified column of 40 tanks and 200 other vehicles approaching Seoul from the north, Korean Reds rushed into the city from several other directions.

General Douglas MacArthur appeared confident. After a visit to a Marine sector west of Seoul, directly across the Han from the capital, the United Nations commander went aboard the Battleship Missouri off Inchon and then flew back to Tokyo.

AP Correspondent Russell Brines reported the Marines' entry into Seoul's northwest outskirts. Brines said another Marine armored column swept over Seoul's nearest satellite airfield toward three partly wrecked bridges across the Han.

Tax Deduction Rise In 10 Days Looms

Chavez Blocks Canadian Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate action at this time on a bill to authorize an \$85,000,000 project to provide a dozen West Texas cities with water from the Canadian River has been blocked by Senator Chavez (D-NM).

Senator Johnson (D-Tex.) told a reporter today he will seek to have the bill—which already has passed the House—acted upon by the Senate soon after Congress comes back in November.

Possibility that the measure will be considered later this year also has been held out by Majority Leader Lucas (D-Ill.). He told the Senate yesterday he believes the bill could be taken up if the Senate returns after Thanksgiving Day and the November elections—as its leaders have agreed upon.

Chavez has indicated he will oppose the bill until a compact for division of Canadian River water has been agreed upon by New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma.

Johnson asked Lucas at yesterday's Senate session if he thought there was any possibility of the bill being taken up at this time.

Lucas replied that if there were to be any long speeches against it he felt it could go over for later action.

He said he understood Chavez is "very much interested in opposition to the bill."

At this point Chavez said: "I want to let the senator from Illinois know that if he (See CHAVEZ, Page 2)

Gen. Marshall Takes Oath as Defense Boss

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall was sworn in as secretary of defense today at a ceremony attended by only two other persons.

The general was given the oath of office by Felix Larkin, general counsel of the Defense Department. Stephen Early, outgoing deputy secretary, was the only witness.

An announcement of the ceremony, which was held at 7:45 a.m. CST, said that this private swearing-in was "in accordance with the wishes" of Marshall.

The new secretary immediately called a conference with the joint chiefs of staff.

The swearing-in ceremony was held in the office of the secretary of defense.

The way was cleared late yesterday for Marshall to succeed Louis Johnson, who left office quietly on Tuesday in obedience to President Truman's wishes.

Marshall took his second oath as a cabinet member in front of the desk used by General John J. Pershing who Pershing was Army chief of staff.

General Marshall faces immediate problems in reconstituting his defense family at home and in broadening and bolstering anti-Communist defenses abroad.

United Nations forces in Korea have eased the immediate pressure there by the offensive now under way. And the administration and Congress have provided the money and paved the way for U. S. military expansion under a global basis to support the policy of meeting aggression with force.

Stop Signs Placed At Two Locations On Duncan Street

By 4 p.m. the job was completed when the last drop of yellow paint was applied and the last metal sign securely anchored at the Duncan and Harve intersection.

Shaw Undergoes Second Operation

LUTON, England (AP)—Playwright George Bernard Shaw today underwent a second major operation at the hospital where he has been recovering from a broken thigh, the British Press Association reported.

The agency said the new surgery was designed to relieve a bladder and kidney condition which began to trouble the 94-year-old Irish-born dramatist after he was first operated on for a fractured thigh.

Shaw broke his thigh in a fall in his garden.

Johnson Outlines Watchdog Group's Alaska Trip Duties

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas wants his "watchdog" committee on defense to concentrate on housing, radar defenses and communications when three members of the committee go to Alaska next month.

He discussed the trip in a letter made public today to Senator Morse (R-Ore.), one of the three committee members named to make the Alaskan investigation.

The other two are Senators Hunt (D-Wyo.) and Saffron (D-Miss.). Johnson, chairman of the special armed services subcommittee, set up to watch the whole defense program, also asked the task force to investigate the condition of roads in the territory of the Alaska railroad and of ports and air fields. He wants their adequacy to be determined from the standpoint of total mobilization.

Naval Post Offer Denied by Stassen

NEW YORK (AP)—Harold E. Stassen denied last night a newspaper report that he would replace Francis Matthews as secretary of the Navy.

The Spokane, Wash., Spokesman-Review said the Navy secretary job had been offered Stassen by President Truman.

More Postal Cuts Predicted by Solon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Humphrey (D-Minn.) said today that instead of restoring delays, cutbacks made last spring by the Post Office Department, have to curtail services even further.

He told a reporter the Post Office Department will certainly have to absorb a portion of the \$500,000,000 cut in services as pending ordered by Congress.

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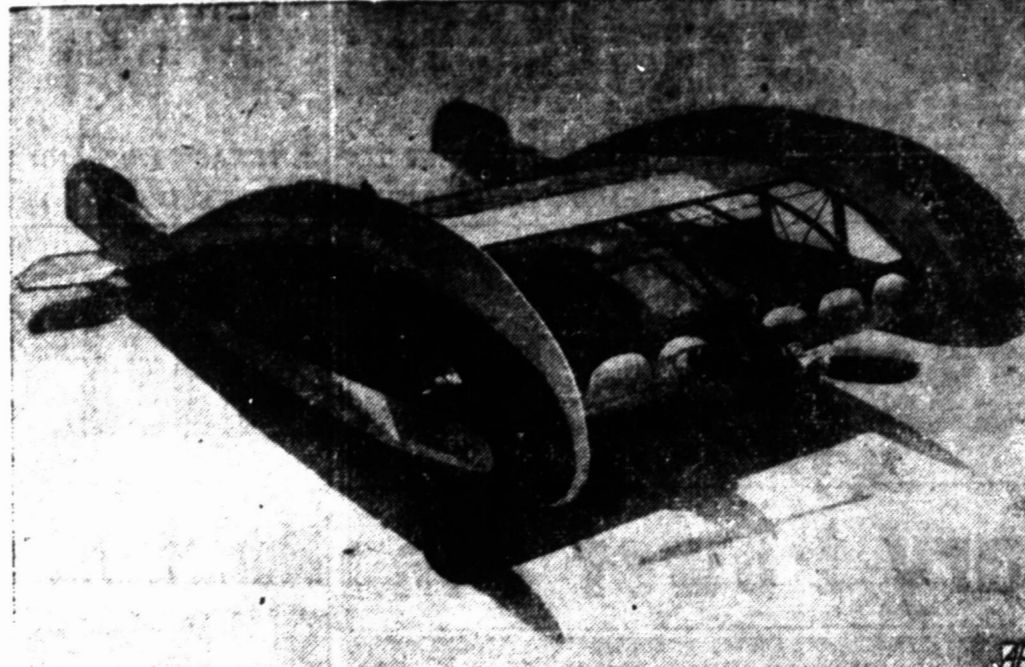


# Dana Andrews Asks Where Filmland's New Stars Are

 man said the general was not called back by any emergency.  
 Pilots spotted the Red column 20 miles south of the Yalu River, Korean boundary 210 miles north of Seoul. It was reported Thursday morning to be possibly below the 38th parallel dividing North and South Korea. This would put the column less than 30 air miles from Seoul.  
 Elite divisions of North Koreans which invaded South Korea June 25 were seasoned in Communist China's Manchurian armies. They fought with Russian-made tanks and other arms. But with the allied offensive in the south picking up steam, the Reds appear unable to muster much organized strength from that direction.  
 The column from the north—if it reaches Seoul intact—would pose the freshest threat.  
 Reds in the south were reported withdrawing, changing into civilian clothes and deserting or surrendering.  
 A major battle for Seoul's duty and narrow streets might destroy a large part of the 500-year-old capital. The city of 1,000,000 is a mass of closely packed one- and two-story mud-covered wooden structures.  
 To cut off effective reinforcements for the city from the

 south, the U.S. seventh division overtook the highway from Seoul to Suwon.  
 The seventh division's vehicles moved on dust-choked roads from the Inchon beachhead to points 10 miles southwest of the city alongside rice paddies where peasants placidly gathered in the harvest.  
 The harvest of Korea's staple food was one factor in the timing of the allies' all-out effort to crush the Reds.  
 AP Correspondent Reiman Morin reported that the Marines who rammed across the Han eight miles northwest of Seoul found the narrow roads too slow for their tanks. They rumbled farther east to the railroad tracks leading into the city and then swung southward.  
 Morin, veteran reporter of European, African and Asian campaigns, said the drive on the capital from the northwest was a big push "like the big ones near the end of the last war."  
 Reds captured on the Han's north bank, Morin added, reported they had been pressed into battle only five days previously. This was shortly after the United Nations started landing a 40,000-man liberation force at Inchon last Friday.  
 Allied bombers and fighters kept an umbrella over the Marines and infantrymen on the Seoul front.

### Steel Workers To Talk Raise

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — The policy making body of the CIO-United Steel Workers Union—its executive board—meets tomorrow and Friday to decide whether to demand a wage boost for 1,000,000 members.

The board members were called by President Philip Murray, head of both the steelworkers union and the CIO, at a time when rank and file USW members were pressing for fatter pay envelopes to meet a rising cost of living.

Much of the pressure for a steelworkers wage rise has followed new gains made by the CIO-auto workers union. Steelworkers now average \$1.70 an hour compared with the auto workers \$1.75, including a recent 10-cent boost.

The steelworkers last year ended a 42-day strike by accepting a pension and insurance program in lieu of a pay increase.

To be considered by the board will be a resolution from 28,000 steelworkers in the Pittsburgh area, asking that a wage hike be sought. The resolution cites "the tremendous increase in the cost of living" and the "huge profits of the steel industry."

Murray himself has described the industry's profits as "fabulous."

Under the contract which ended last year's walkout, the steelworkers union may re-open wage discussions Nov. 1. If no agreement is reached by Dec. 31, the union is free to strike Jan. 1, 1951.

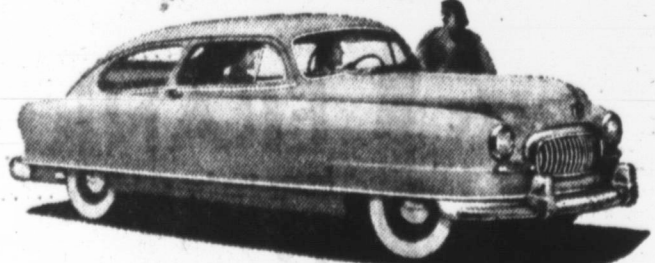

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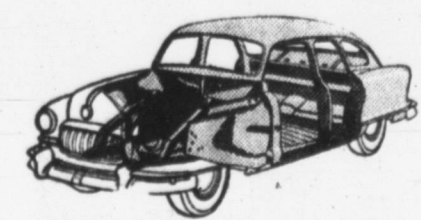

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# Decision to End War With West Germany Is Strategic

The decision of the big three powers — Britain, France and America — to end the protracted state of war with Western Germany is a strategic move calculated to maintain peace and to

strengthen the defenses of Western Europe.

Its terms constitute warning to Russia not to interfere with Western Germany. Indeed, the big three say bluntly that any attack on Berlin or Western Germany will be regarded as an attack on them as occupying powers.

This means, so far as present indications go, that the old reich will remain divided under its present lines indefinitely.

Russia's eastern zone of 46,000 square miles, with its population of 17,300,000, will continue as a communized satellite of Moscow. The western zone—96,000 square miles, with a population of 49,700,000 — will function separately under its Bonn government, with the big three continuing occupation.

Will Germany remain divided permanently? I don't believe so. The Germans are a clanish folk and it's in the book that sometime in the distant future these two portions of the fatherland will coalesce, by force or otherwise.

The big three decision not to end military occupation of the country serves a double purpose: It is a safeguard against Germany building up a war potential which would permit of further aggression. It is a protection for the unarmed and at present defenseless country.

As would be expected, the big three agreed that the recreation of a German army would be against the best interests of Europe and of Germany herself. Throughout a long discussion of this problem, France remained firm in a refusal to agree to such rearmament of a Germany which three times within 100 years had attacked her.

However, Germany isn't to be left militarily impotent for defense purposes. She is to be allowed to create mobile police formations, and such forces can be very effective.

This would seem to be a shrewd move on the part of the big three. It not only strengthens the general defenses of western Europe, but it may be expected to give a fillip to the morale of the Germans. They are a proud folk who would resent bitterly being utterly dependent on their conquerors for protection.

This same point about morale also applies to the allied decision that Western Germany shall be allowed to handle her own foreign relations, which thus far have been dealt with by the occupying powers.

One of the most important allied decisions is to foster the rebuilding of the German economy and integrate it with that of Western Europe. This means, among other things, that production in the great Ruhr steel center will be speeded up to bolster western military defenses.

The agreement with Germany takes the place of the peace treaty which should, and could, have been signed long ago if the western powers and Russia could have come to terms. Even now the big three foreign ministers have little hope of an early agreement with Moscow on a treaty.

## Oil Allowable Cut by 125,162

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas' peak oil allowable will take a 125,162-barrel daily tumble next month.

The railroad commission ordered the slash yesterday, trimming October permissive flow to 2,761,296 barrels a day.

The cut came after an earlier order directed a September allowable rollback of 61,860 barrels daily through cuts in six west Texas reef lime fields. 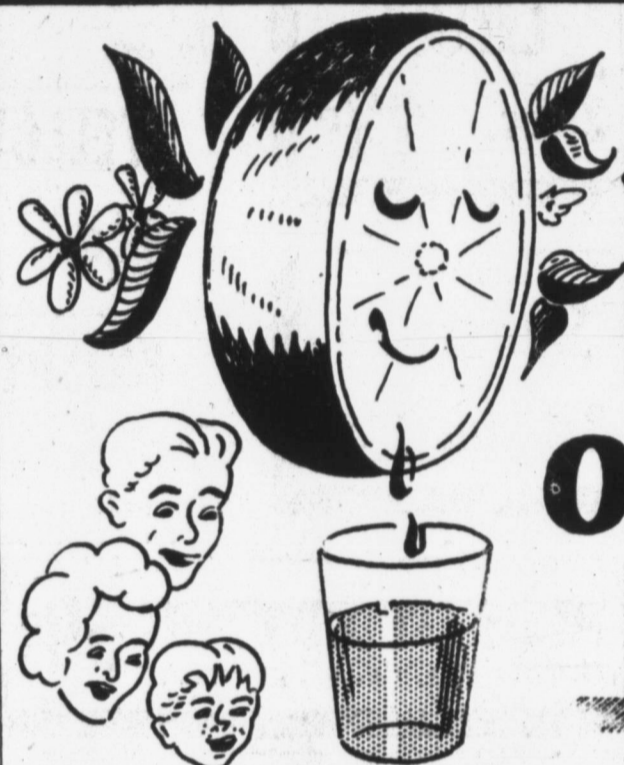

CHICAGO — (AP) — The president-treasurer of an independent teamsters local suffered a hip bruise last night as gunmen failed in an attempt to slay him. Police said the gunmen, hiding in a parked car, blasted four shots at the union official, Steve Slahor, 49, after he parked his automobile in a North Side street. Police Capt. Joseph Goldberg says Slahor related he ducked under the car's dashboard when he saw a pistol muzzle pointing at him from a dark sedan parked across the street. One bullet struck Slahor's keys in his trouser pocket and the slug was deflected. Officials at Illinois Masonic Hospital said Slahor suffered a left hip bruise by the slug that hit his keys.

### International Harvester's Operations Still Indefinite

CHICAGO — (AP) — Resumption of operations at 10 International Harvester Company plants appeared uncertain today despite a new wage agreement and the union ordering 27,000 strikers back to work. The company and the Farm Equipment Workers settled their wage dispute last night, three weeks after the strike was called. There appeared a difference of opinion between company and union spokesmen on features of the agreement. But still on strike at nine other Harvester plants are some 23,000 members of a second union, the CIO United Auto Workers, which has rejected the company's wage offer. This situation, company spokesmen said, makes resumption of production uncertain, even in plants where FE workers predominate. Some FE plants are dependent for parts and material on plants where the UAW is in control. The FE union, a division of the United Electrical Workers (Ind.), had ordered its 27,000 members back to work yesterday. Gerald Fiedle, head of the FE's Harvester council, said the new wage agreement will give FE employees a wage package higher than any yet signed in a major industry in the country. But a company spokesman said union officials accepted the 10 cents hourly general wage raise first offered by Harvester Sept. 12. It also includes an arrangement to gear workers' pay to the cost of living. The FE, as well as the CIO-UAW, originally had

LONDON, England — I wish my name were Stokes, Lippmann, Childs, Lindley or Krock, and I was recognized as a fellow who knew politics and whose opinion of things in Washington carried weight.

Then I could speak of Senator Robert Taft with authority. What I thought about him would be read and considered by men and women who think there is something more important than, say, Joe's chances against Ezzard, Judy Garland records, and the current popularity of boxer dogs.

Senator Taft came to my mind about an hour ago when, reading the Daily Express for a tip on something good in the fourth at Goodwood, I noticed a story under a Washington dateline that informed me that Senator Taft was against President Truman's appointment of General George Marshall as secretary of defense.

My first reaction to the story was that Senator Taft finally had reached rock bottom. My

second, third, and fourth reactions were the same.

I am, sure that one can't call a senator a jerk and still maintain dignity, so I am going to waive dignity and call Mr. Taft a jerk. Not a bench-sitting jerk. Not a utility jerk. Not a jerk who has run in to kick a field goal. No, I am going to call him — from thousands of waves away — a starting, first string, varsity jerk.

Give him Ruth's old number, Gehrig's old number, and Grange's old number. Place him on a pedestal as the one man who, without having to go to the trouble of thinking, hits the wrong thing on the head every time.

Senator Taft objects to Marshall. Just think about that. The man from Ohio carries enough nonsense in his head to attack a man who, in the pages of history yet to be written, will emerge as one of the great Americans of all time.

It is like a Piper Cub attacking a B-29. It is the mouse snapping and the lamb attacking the lion.

The senator says his reason for trying to block Marshall's appointment is that the appointment would strengthen Secretary of State Acheson's hand. In other words, the senator's dislike for Acheson is stronger than his like for his country. I don't think Br'er Taft would go so far as to say that Marshall as defense secretary would be a liability to his country.

There could be no better choice for the job than Marshall. He stands alone, and one of the great things President Truman ever did was to label him publicly as the finest American.

Who did more than anyone else to make this country victorious in World War II? Marshall.

Who saw the needs and fought with hack politicians to get them? Marshall.

My consolation here in London is the knowledge that my countrymen will ignore the senator from Ohio and go ahead and put the best man in the job.

One of these days — it may not come until a Russian throws a hand grenade through his living room window — Senator Taft is going to realize that the U.S. is now fighting for survival, not Ohio votes.

## Heavy India Rains Cause Evacuation

NEW DELHI, India — (AP) — Unusually heavy rains and gales in East Punjab, on India's north-west border, have caused 70 deaths and the collapse of 25,000 homes.

Officials estimate 200,000 persons are homeless and damage to food crops exceeds \$50,000,000. Railways were derailed at several points.

Most of the houses destroyed belonged to Moslems who had been evacuated to Pakistan and were occupied by Hindu refugees from the neighboring Moslem nation.

## Production Hours, Wages Set Records

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The demands of the Korean fighting and world rearmament have pushed factory working hours to World War II levels, a average weekly earnings to an all-time record.

The bureau of labor statistics reported an average work week of 41.2 hours in mid-August for the 12,700,000 production workers in the nation's factories.

This equalled figures for wartime 1944 and was a jump of

more than two full hours since August 1949. Average weekly pay in manufacturing industries went up \$1 within a year to an all-time record of \$80.28 in mid-August.

## 'Prayer Day' Set in Texas

AUSTIN — (AP) — Gov. Allan Shivers yesterday designated Sunday, Sept. 24, as a day of prayer in Texas.

He urged all Texans "each in his own way" to ask for divine guidance for the nation's leaders and men at home and abroad, in peace and at war.

The governor said many letters have come to his office asking for designation of a special day of prayer. He quoted from one letter of a mother of four soldier sons: ". . . it seems high time someone started a movement to call our nation to a day or a week of prayer, in thanksgiving to God for His guidance so far and in supplication for His guidance and blessings upon our United Nations. Too much is said about armament, men and material, and not enough about God's help."

HOUSTON — (AP) — The will of Harry C. Hansen, Houston oilman, left one third of his estate, estimated at several million dollars, to Rice Institute. He died two weeks ago in a Kerrville, Texas, hospital.

## Three Flying Boats Purchased by Mexico

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — The Mexican navy has bought three new flying boats for coastal patrol. Newspapers reported they would be used to look for boats operating illegally in Mexican waters.

The navy department said it was only waiting for Washington to issue export permits before its crews go to the U. S. for the new planes. The announcement did not say where they were bought or give details of their type.

## Indian Fighter Is Due Army Pension

SAN PEDRO, Calif. — (AP) — Sixty-two years ago Edwin M. Wells was fighting Indians with the U. S. cavalry. Now he's 81 years of age and he finally got around to asking for a soldier's pension.

T. E. McDermott, head of the San Pedro Veterans Center, says yellowing records of the frontier days prove that Wells is entitled to a pension.

Wells made his pension request yesterday. He related that he ran away from home at the age of 18 to become a cow puncher and joined the cavalry at the age of 19 to campaign against the Cheyenne Indians.

He and his wife, Katharine, have been married for 33 years. Gasoline weighs approximately six pounds to a gallon.

**Game-Fish Group Will Meet Friday**

AUSTIN — (AP) — The state game, fish and oyster commission will hold its next regular meeting in Mineral Wells Friday and conduct a marine seminar at Rockport Oct. 27-29.

The Mineral Wells meeting is in keeping with a commission policy of holding six regional meetings a year in different sections of the state to acquaint commissioners better with sectional wildlife problems.

A special invitation has been sent the board of directors of the Brazos River Reclamation and Conservation District to attend. The meeting is open to the public.

Commission Executive Secretary Howard Dodgen said the Mineral Wells meeting would permit commissioners to inspect the new state fish hatchery in Palo Pinto County. Brief dedication ceremonies will be held Friday afternoon.

**Texas Firms With Slot Machines Lead Entire U.S.**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Texas far exceeded any other state in the number of establishments paying federal taxes last year to operate slot machines.

Out of 66,278 such establishments in the United States and its territories, 8,134 were in Texas, it was disclosed by a report of the Internal Revenue Bureau for the year which ended June 30.

In second place was the state of Washington with 6,479, followed by California, with 5,760. The federal tax on "coin-operated gaming devices" is \$100 per device.

The report lists only the number of taxpayers, not the number of devices in operation. It

does not include the number of establishments paying a separate tax of \$10 per device to operate "coin-operated amusement devices."

In the gaming device category, the number of taxpayers in Texas exceeded the combined total of the states of Maine, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Vermont, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Pennsylvania and Maryland.

**Commodity Markets Hit by Peace Scare; Prices Tumble**

By SAM DAWSON

NEW YORK — (AP) — Hopes for an early ending of the Korean war have sent a peace scare through the commodity markets. The prices of some war-inflated commodities have tumbled. And this has set many businessmen wondering what would happen to the war boom if —

1. Fighting ends in Korea by the end of the year.

2. Russia doesn't start something somewhere else.

Those are "ifs" which no one can answer, only guess about. But if an uneasy peace settles down on the world again, the effect on American consumer psychology, production goals, and commodity prices might change the business picture decidedly, some observers argue.

Others think the force of the inflationary move is too strong to be more than slowed down a bit. They point to the present determination to go on spending heavily for rearmament beyond any need a war confined to Korea would indicate. This, they argue, will keep production high, everybody at work, personal income swollen, and many consumer goods in tight supply.

To prove this they point to a long list of price increases this week and predictions of price hikes on the day.

A new world record high price for secured wool is reported from Australia.

Higher prices of steel are predicted by Iron Age, a trade weekly. Rising tanker rates lead some

in the oil business to predict higher prices.

But against this list of coming price hikes on finished goods, based on rising costs of raw materials and of labor already on the books, there is the marked uneasiness in the commodity futures markets, braced to the peace scare.

Those who see a chance of deflation around the corner argue:

1. A sudden end of the Korean war would lead at once to a slump in civilian buying. Many consumers and manufacturers, too, would live for a while on the goods and raw materials they bought this summer.

2. With the pressure to buy dropping, world commodity markets would get back to sanity.

3. Another thing that might

cut consumer buying: higher taxes might take a bigger slice of the pay check, and another considerable part of the income will be going for payment on the gadgets bought on time.

4. At the same time, the nation's productive capacity is high and rising.

Seedless white grapefruit and seedless pink grapefruit were unchanged at \$4.50 and \$6 respectively, as volume continued light.

### Matamoros Port Asked by Farmers

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — A group of Matamoros farmers visited government offices yesterday to ask that port installations be built at Matamoros, across the Rio Grande from Brownsville, Texas.

Augusto Rodriguez, spokesman for the group, said all the port facilities at the point on the river are on the Brownsville side. Cotton from the Matamoros area must cross the river to be loaded from Brownsville wharves, and gasoline shipped from Tampico for the area is unloaded

and stored on the U.S. side. Rodriguez group saw the finance ministry to ask for the port equipment. He said a recent brief embargo on the export of Mexican cotton stored in Brownsville showed the need for Mexico to have its own port. The U.S. put the export of U.S. cotton under a licensing system to make sure it does not go to unfriendly countries, but quickly accepted Mexican-owned cotton stored along the border.

## Franks Used in Budget Meal

The trick of planning budget meals today lies largely in giving the family appetizing and nourishing fare and at the same time using the less expensive meats and extending them with non-meat proteins.

Try this novel budget combination. I think everyone will enjoy it.

EGGS IN MUSTARD SAUCE

One and one-third cups bouillon, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-4 teaspoon salt, dash of pepper, 2 to 3 teaspoons dry mustard (according to taste), 1 tablespoon dried parsley flakes, 1/2 cup grated American cheese, 1-2 cup canned or fresh mushroom slices, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon chopped chives (if desired), 6 hard-cooked eggs — halved, paprika, 4 slices thin toast.

Melt butter in saucepan. Remove from heat and add flour, stirring until blended. Gradually add bouillon, stirring constantly. Return to heat and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add salt, pepper, mustard, parsley and cheese, stir until cheese is melted. Saute mushrooms in butter five minutes. Add to sauce along with chives. Fold in eggs and stir gently just to mix eggs and sauce. Make a nest in center of plates, of four toast wedges for each plate (cut toast diagonally from corner to corner) and place mixture in center. Garnish with paprika.

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Foam rubber, which can now be bought by the yard like dress goods, is proving a boon to women whose decorative instincts in the past have been smothered for lack of know-how.

Now, armed with a little more than shears, a homemaker can vanquish her upholstery and cushioning problems with ease, regardless of her inexperience.

To translate into action your yen to "do something" about a weary-looking chair, first of all remove its upholstery and old cushioning.

Make a paper pattern by outlining the shapes of the seat and back, cutting around arms and vertical supports.

Next, trace the pattern upon a length of latex foam, using a soft lead pencil. Allow an extra quarter inch on all sides of the back pad, and an additional half inch all around the seat cushion.

Cut out both cushions with heavy wet scissors, then bevel the edge of the back pad by cutting in toward the underside at a 40-degree angle. Leave the sides of the seat cushion straight.

The cushion is secured to the chair with six-inch tacking tape. This is pressed onto a thin coating of cementing compound which has previously been applied to the upper edge of the cushion.

Achieve a professional look by tucking the foam under from its lower edge, drawing the tape down tautly to hold it in place. The bottom of the tape is then tacked to the chair. The back pad

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ing it with rubber cement. Use the cement sparingly, spreading it with an old ruler or wooden spoon. Attach one end of the tape first; hold the other end taut and smooth into place. If any cement remains exposed, dust it with soapstone.

As a final step, make a cover to fit the cushion. It's a good idea to finish one end with snaps or zippers for easy removal.

If you'd like to add a luxurious touch to your home, try dressing up your bedroom with an upholstered headboard to match the draperies.

Use either the existing headboard or a plywood one, sawed by the man of the house into the shape and size you prefer.

The next step is to mark the pattern on the foam, working either from the headboard itself or from a paper pattern. When cutting the latex, add an extra half inch all around.

Tacking tape and rubber cement are used for this job, too. When applying the tape, hammer in a few tacks to hold the foam in place, then stand the headboard up and begin the permanent tacking along the top edge. Do the bottom next and then the sides, keeping the tension always the same in order to get a uniform effect.

Next cut the rubber with large scissors which have been dipped in water. Since it is several inches thick, care must be taken to hold the shears straight. This will prevent slanted sides.

## Taxpayers to Pay Higher Levy in Last Quarter Only

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Here are a few highlights about the new income tax increase. It ranges from 20 1-2 percent on people in the lowest income brackets to 11 1-2 percent on those in the highest.

But — this increase won't hit you all at once. The full increase will be applied only to your 1951 income, not your income this year.

On your 1950 income only one-quarter of the increase is applied.

For example: say you're in the lowest bracket now and the increase on you will be 20 1-2 percent.

When it comes time to settle up in full on your 1950 income tax, you'll find that the increase

is only one-quarter of 20 1-2 percent. But in 1952, when you settle up on 1951 income, you'll find your tax has been raised 20 1-2 percent on your whole 1951 income.

This sounds complicated and a reader's first impression is probably something like this: "What a headache I'm going to have when I make my tax return on my 1950 income."

Not so. Most people will do as they've been doing for years: They'll get a receipt from their boss on the tax withheld from them during the year. Then, without any signing of their own, they'll turn it into the tax collector, together with a simple form that they must fill out.

He'll check it over to see that it's right. If they've been over-taxed, he'll give them a refund. If they still owe some tax, he'll notify them.

Then there are those who use the so-called 1040-short form. Although they don't figure out their tax, they find it in the table on the back.

They'll do the same when — before midnight, March 15, 1951 — they file their tax return on 1950 income. They'll do nothing differently but — the figures in those tables, because of the tax increase, will be a little higher.

And then there's the third group, as in the past, the people who must figure their own tax. They'll do exactly as in the past. The only difference will be in the percentages.

This will give an example of how the tax will be increased on 1950 income only one quarter of what it will be on 1951 income.

Jones, a single man, has a net income after deductions of \$3,000. That has been his salary for several years and will be for some time.

In 1950 — when he made his return on 1949 income — his tax was \$409.

In 1951 — when he makes his return on 1950 income — his tax will be \$428.

But in 1952 — when he makes his return on 1951 income — his tax will be \$458.

### Bus Driver Last for First Aid Course

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. — (AP) — A rural school bus driver walked into the Champaign County Red Cross office just before the 1950 fall classes began. He said he had found a reminder to visit the office on his desk but could not remember why. Manager Walt Dinges dug into the files and said:

"You were to come here to take a first aid course, but the course isn't being offered this year. The notice was sent to you for the course we had in 1949."

Meanwhile, starting Oct. 1, your boss will hold a little higher tax out of your pay. This is to keep you as much as possible on the pay-as-you-go basis.
