The list of witnesses called to secret sessions of the committee ranged from Chicago's mayor, a state's attorney elected as "the man gangsters fear," to remnants of the old "Scarface Al" Capone gang.

Prime meat for the committee's sessions in Chicago are the gang-style slaying of a former Chicago police lieutenant and a lawyer, both of whom were investigating crime. They were slain Sept. 25 in separate ambushes.

Most of gangland's big shots in the Chicago area have gone into hiding to evade committee subpoenas. At least three are known to have gone to Mexico to await the committee's departure from Chicago.

But the committee chairman, Senator Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), said that hiding would avail them nothing. He warned that they will face contempt charges "even if it takes 10 years to find them."

U.N. Forces Poised South Of Parallel

TOKYO, Friday, Oct. 6 —(AP)—Beating down the strongest resistance yet encountered in North Korea, the Korean republic's third division Thursday seized Changjon, 60 air miles north of the 38th parallel.

U.S. Eighth Army headquarters estimated that a Red infantry division and a company of Red marines made a stand three miles south of that east-coast town.

AP Correspondent William Jordan, with the fast-moving republican third division, said the town fell to the South Koreans after an all-day fight. His information evidently was several hours more recent than that at Eighth Army headquarters.

Thirty-five miles south of this deepest penetration of North Korea, the republican capital division engaged a bypassed force of about 1,200 Reds in the hills west of Hwangpo.

The first notable show of Red defense came at a United Nations army of up to 175,000 troops was massing to yank down the iron curtain all along Parallel 38 and wipe out Communist resistance in all of Korea.

LUCKNOW, India —(AP)— Man-eating wolves and hyenas have killed seven children in villages near here recently.

Latest victim was a 12-year-old boy of Paragon village, only five miles from Lucknow. His half-eaten body was found in the fields. In the Banthara area, 12 miles from here, half-a-dozen children have been killed within three months.

Special police guards have been posted in the affected areas and villagers have been issued spears and firearms.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Use Expert Bidding To Fool Opponents

Every once in a while the Cavendish Club in New York is the scene of a special invitation bridge game in which participation is limited to a small group of players, all of whom would appear in any one's ranking of the 20 best rubber bridge players in the world.

Strangely enough, while the play of the cards is exceptional, the players spend so much time fooling one another, that bidding mistakes are frequent. In today's hand, John Crawford of Philadelphia gave East and West the full treatment.

The bidding is worth study, though I don't recommend that anyone follow it. The opening bid of one spade is certainly normal. As for North's double, we refuse to comment. East's redouble is also correct, and there can be no objection to Mr. Crawford's bid of two diamonds. Since each side had a perfect score, he saw no point in hurrying.

West might have bid two



spades, but he chose to pass and await developments. He also saw no hurry. I don't quite understand North's bid of two spades.

passed since he knew that his partner would rescue himself.

Now West decided to save a little time and went directly to three spades. He wanted to show that he had a good five card trump suit and that he was not interested in doubling his opponents at a low level in the bidding.

North's four diamond bid was normal enough. Even North had to do something ordinary once, and East simply passed to wait further developments. Since he had redoubled one spade to start with, he knew that his partner would not pass four diamonds.

Mr. Crawford's bid of six diamonds was in the nature of a double cross. Of course he expected to make it and normally would have bid slowly in order to coax a double. In this case he decided the jump would produce the double anyway. As for his redouble, he knew that his opponents would have so many high cards that they would not become scared and run out.

There was nothing to the play of the hand. West opened his king of spades. Crawford trumped in dummy, drew trumps and led the king of hearts. East played the ace, and Crawford trumped it and claimed all the tricks.

Truman May Set Registration of Doctors October 16

ABOARD YACHT COMMANDER, Chesapeake Bay —(AP)— President Truman was reported about ready today to set a date for the registration of doctors and dentists under the new draft law. The date is expected to be Oct. 16.

The president made no direct announcement, but word of his plans came from a well-informed source to newsmen on his yacht trailing the chief executive on his vacation cruise.

His yacht, the Williamsburg, anchored off the Patuxent (Md.) Naval Base last night. It was to move south toward Yorktown, Va., today. Aides said the chief executive hoped to be able to watch the first World Series game on television today.

The doctor draft registration was provided in a law passed by Congress early last month. It is designed to permit the calling up of those physicians and dentists who were trained at government expense during the war and saw little or no active duty.

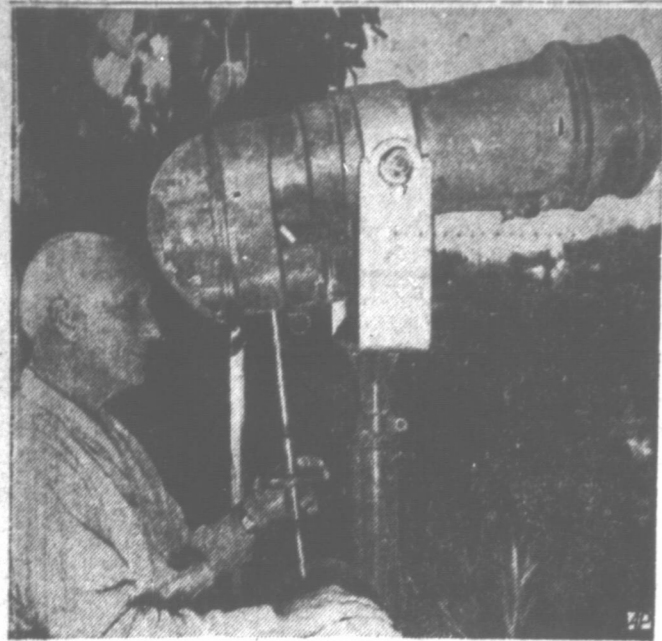

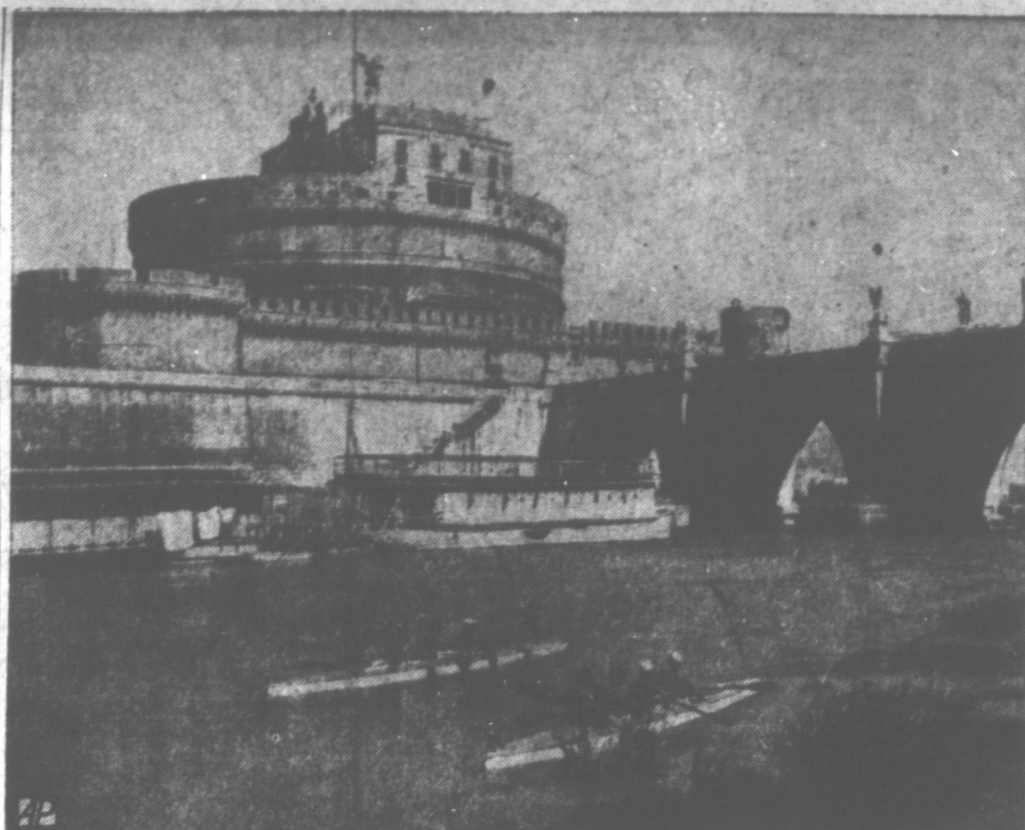
Wholesale Index Takes Sharp Drop

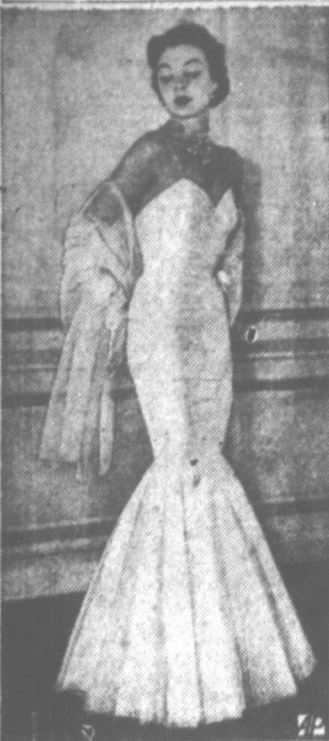

 The United Nations at Lake Success Wednesday night directed MacArthur, in effect, to use any means at his command to unify Korea.
 Parallel 38 was drawn originally to designate American and Russian zones for acceptance of the Japanese surrender after World War II.
 The allied political aim is a unified, independent Korea. Indocinated and armed by Russia, the North Koreans plunged across the parallel June 25. The historic initial U.N. armed peace-enforcement action crushed the Red invaders in three months.
 To mop up the remnants, the U.N. forces waited only for completion of the buildup eastward from the Seoul-Inchon west coast area and for final decisions on strategy. There was no indication of where the main allied blows would fall or whether they might be amphibious or overland.
 The Red regime continued to ignore surrender ultimatums first aired by MacArthur last Sunday and repeated since.
 American Marines punched northward from rubble Uijongbu, 20 miles south of 38 and about 11 miles northeast of Seoul. Resistance was scattered.

Texan Pilots Huge Airplane To Korea

SEOUL—(P)—The first of the gigantic new C-119 flying boxcars to settle down on Kimpo Airfield was piloted by Capt. Maurice Johnson of McKinney, Texas, authorities reported here today.
 They reported that the C-119, known also as the Fairchild Packet, is being used for the first time in a major airlift.
 In the 14 days since the C-119s have been in operation, they have flown 815 trips and carried 4,442 tons and 3,728 passengers from Tokyo to Kimpo field.

Homemade Toys Please Children

By DAVID TAYLOR MARKE

Junior learns more through his play than through any other single activity. Time for play should be provided for him each day. Play space, toys and materials for play are as necessary to his all-around development as are food and sleep. If his playthings are of a good assortment, his play is of many kinds; he uses his body vigorously with certain equipment; he creates other materials to meet his needs; he thinks clearly and well as he works at his play problems. Junior imitates and "tries on" the life that goes on about him. He is happily engaged in situations of his own planning, and sings and chuckles over his efforts, or plays quietly, absorbed in his undertakings. If his materials are of wide variety, they may be shared with companions.

These toys need not be "store-bought." Rather, many of them can be made at home. Mrs. Marie Belle Fowler in a pamphlet first issued in 1936 but recently reissued by the New York State College of Home Economics at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. It is called "Homemade Playthings."

Not only are homemade toys less expensive, she says, but they offer opportunities for Dad and other members of the family to share in the play life of the young child through the manufacture of his toys. They become interested in Junior's play and may be ingenious in meeting his needs by converting waste materials, such as boxes and baskets, into attractive toys. It also gives Junior a chance to see something made from start to finish.

The pamphlet emphasizes that such toys should be durable and sturdy to stand hard wear; hygienic so that they can be washed or cleaned; simple enough so that Junior can manipulate the boxes, blocks, nested cans, push-along-the-floor trains, floor boats, stick horses, and sand. It also gives directions for making many and varied uses. The use of poor paints and materials that are fragile or have rough surfaces or sharp corners should be avoided. The pamphlet gives directions

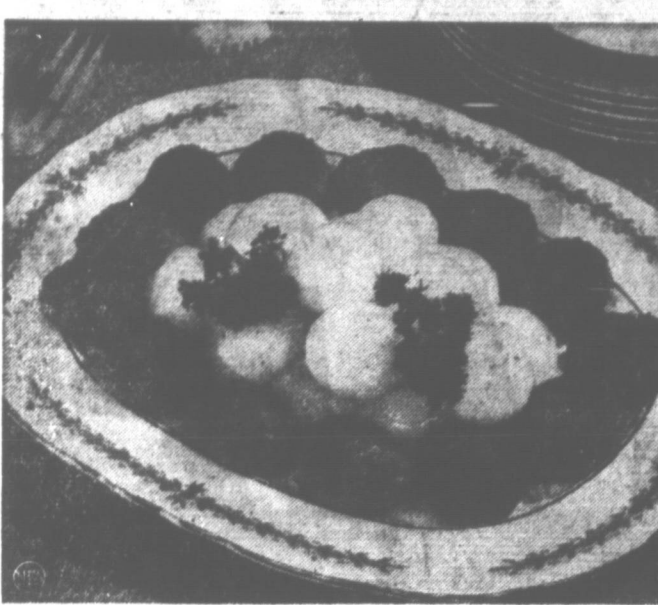

For dinner prepare Frikadellar, a Danish version of meatballs. It uses pork shoulder, a budget meat item.

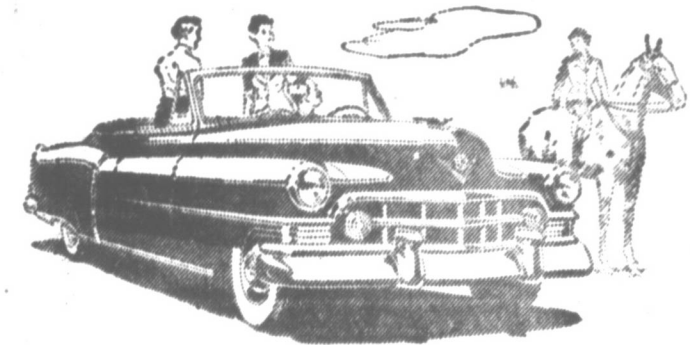

NORTH KOREA — (AP) — Here is what it is like above the 38th parallel in North Korea.
An exhausted South Korean soldier sleeps in a muddy ditch, his unheeding head pillowed in the yellow dust of the roadway.
Two lines of bone-weary South Korean doughboys limp past over the stones and ruts of the road they have trudged along for more than a fortnight from deep in South Korea.
But they manage a sweat-stained grin as they pass. A battered truck wheezes by — so decrepit it could be held together only by the morale of the men in it. It looks like a sardine can on wheels. But troops jammed in it are singing, shouting and waving small black, red and white flags of the Korean republic.
The marching troops look at the riders enviously, then turn and break into the shuffling trot typical of their infantry.
Marching with them and shouldering part of their equipment are 20 or more boys under 10 years old. They are camp followers attracted by the joy of going with the winning army — and getting a bowl of free rice. A soldier pointed to a smiling eight-year-old carrying a load of mortar shells and said: "He's my house boy."
Behind the column slowly stumbles a line of civilian laborers. Each is burdened with a wooden pack to which is tied a fresh cut log almost as wide as the road and more than six inches thick. The logs are used to bridge streams.
And behind them for hours come soldier stragglers — men too worn out to keep the killing pace, middle-aged men limping painfully, young wounded men with blood-stained bandages on cheeks, arms and legs.
But they want to catch up with the column, for there are no kitchen trucks in this army to wheel back the rice ration.
On the map the 38th parallel is a special neat straight black line.
But as the Rok doughboy plods on north beyond the frontier he sees no painted demarcation or chalkmark across the winding road.
The hills are scarred by army-dug ditches and pockmarked with

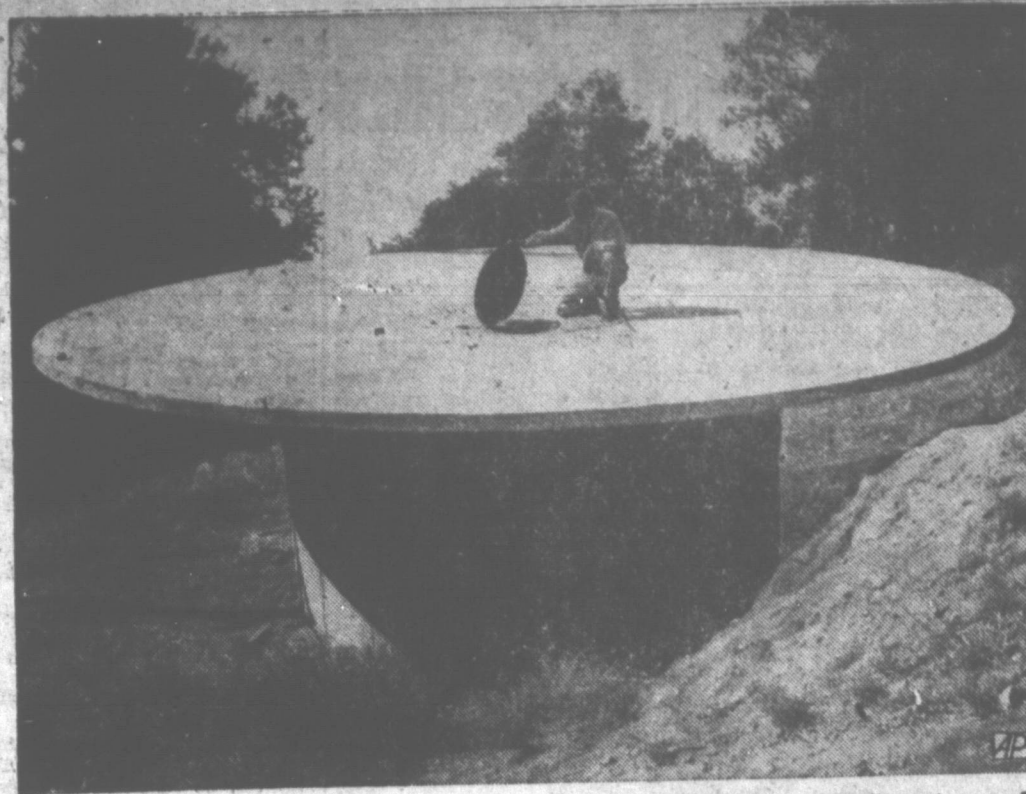

France Seeks Oil in Mexico

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — The newspaper El Nacional reported yesterday the "French Petroleum Co." is negotiating with the Mexican government on a contract to drill for oil on a contingent basis.

Oil sources said France has been seeking to buy Mexican oil for more than a year. Similar negotiations a year ago collapsed, but the "Petrofina Company" bought an interest in a former Fauley company for contingent drilling. Edwin C. Fauley, U.S. oil operator, contracted with Mexico to drill in areas selected by the government. He later sold an interest in this operation to Petrofina.

The contract, loss of several made with U.S. companies, provides that if the drillers strike oil, they will get half the production until their costs are paid and then about 15 percent for 25 years. If the well is dry, they get nothing and are out the cost of drilling. Fauley's company found oil, but the two wells are not yet major producers.

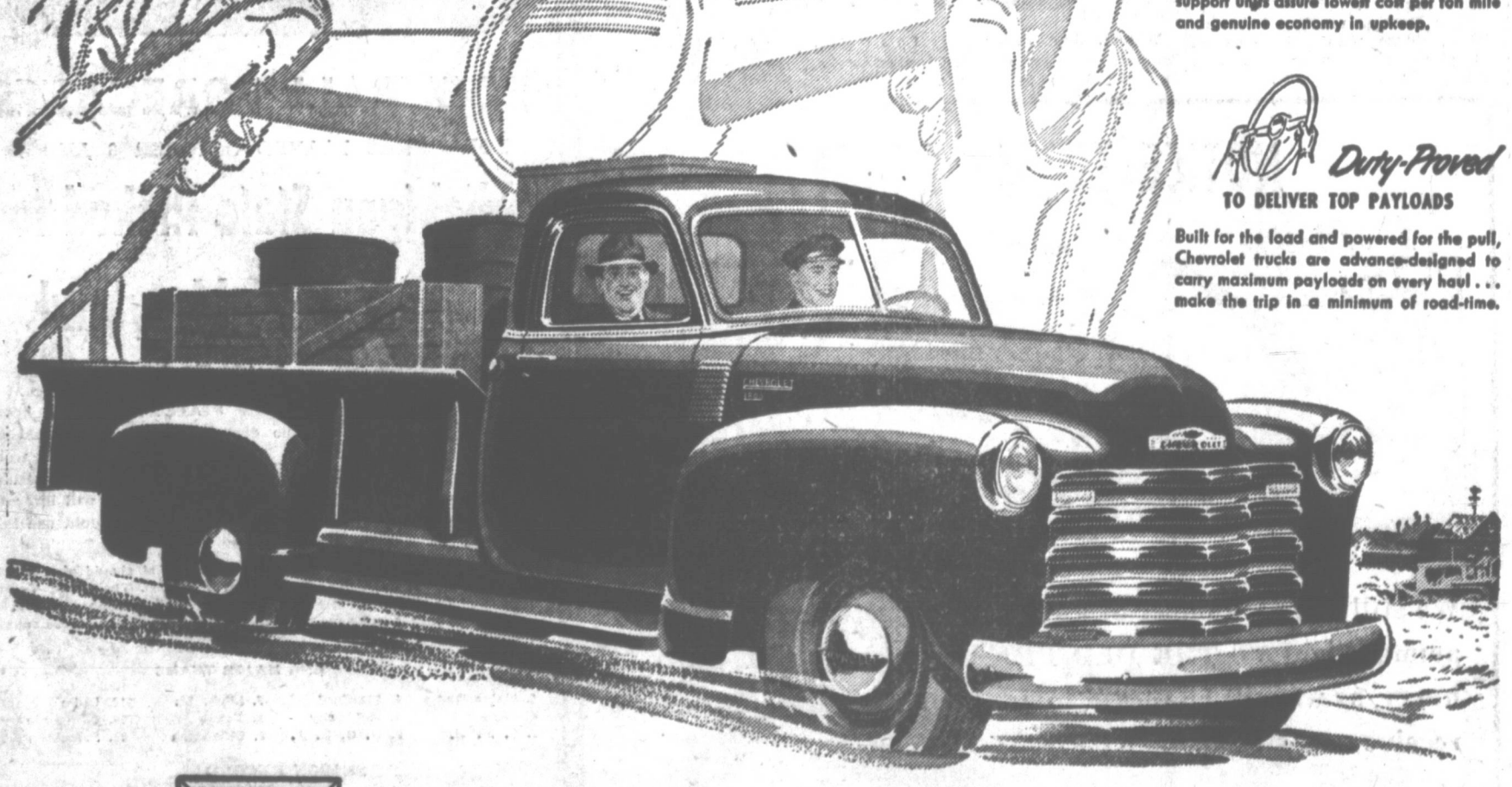

Merchant Ship Is Postwar's First

NEW YORK — (AP) — America's new post-war freighter, scheduled to be launched late this fall, may be the forerunner of a long line of similar ships. The S. O. Island, named in honor of the late Virginia congressman who is regarded as the father of the Merchant Marine Act of 1936, is a prototype that would serve as a model in the event there is another mass production ship construction program to replace the slower Liberty ships of World War II fame.

Not since 1947 has there been a dry cargo vessel turned out by U.S. shipbuilders for American flag operation, according to the American Merchant Marine Institute. While the top speed of the prototype is a secret, its design calls for 20 knots or nearly double that of the Liberty ship and well above the Victory and C-types. It will cost \$5,000,000 and at 10,500 deadweight tons will have the same capacity as a Liberty ship.

appropriate blank spaces to support the required information on their finances and membership. For any organization that chooses to register, that will be all for the present. Except that any member not reported must register himself.

There is another deadline provided in the bill which will provide a further showdown. This is the requirement that Feb. 1 of every year after registration, each organization must report anew its membership and finances.

This may start a new daily chain of litigation. Assuming that the courts do uphold the Subversive Activities Control Board in requiring registration of an organization, the Department of Justice must then start criminal proceedings. For every violation, fines of \$2000 to \$5000 are assessable as well as imprisonment of from two to five years. Long court cases and appeals are sure to follow.

WASHINGTON — Partial reason for President Truman's delay in applying the price-wage and material controls which Congress gave him is his failure so far to persuade anybody to accept this unpopular task. He has offered the post to three men, but they have turned it down with a polite but firm "No, thank you."

The fact is that the President is having difficulty in talking the big men of business and industry into accepting top war jobs. He does not seem to possess the salesmanship of Franklin D. Roosevelt, who, despite his campaign attacks on "economic royalists," was unusually lucky or fortunate in drafting them for the World War II emergency.

THANKLESS — Working for the government, and especially in the field of head-but-but controls, in the opinion of the industrialists Mr. Truman has approached with requests and offers, is a thankless job.

It gets them in the bad graces of their associates, who do not like Mr. Truman's "fair deal." They note that not a man who served at Washington during the last war emerged with an enhanced reputation.

Thus, with a few exceptions such as Messers Harrison and Cliford, Mr. Truman will be forced to rely on incumbent members of his official family — Secretaries Snyder, Chapman, Sawyer and Brannan — or on "political reliables," who will serve out of loyalty to the head of the party.

"Big men" just will not work for the government even in this time of crisis. In fact, Mr. Truman has told friends, only semi-humorously, that the draft act may have to be extended to include corporate executives.

"CONTAMINATED" — Senator Styles Bridges' recent charge that the Farmers' Union had both a Communist birth and background did not receive the attention it deserves. In view of subsequent political repercussions.

The New Hampshire legislator says that no speech in his Senate career provoked so much editorial comment in agricultural areas or so much mail from farmers. 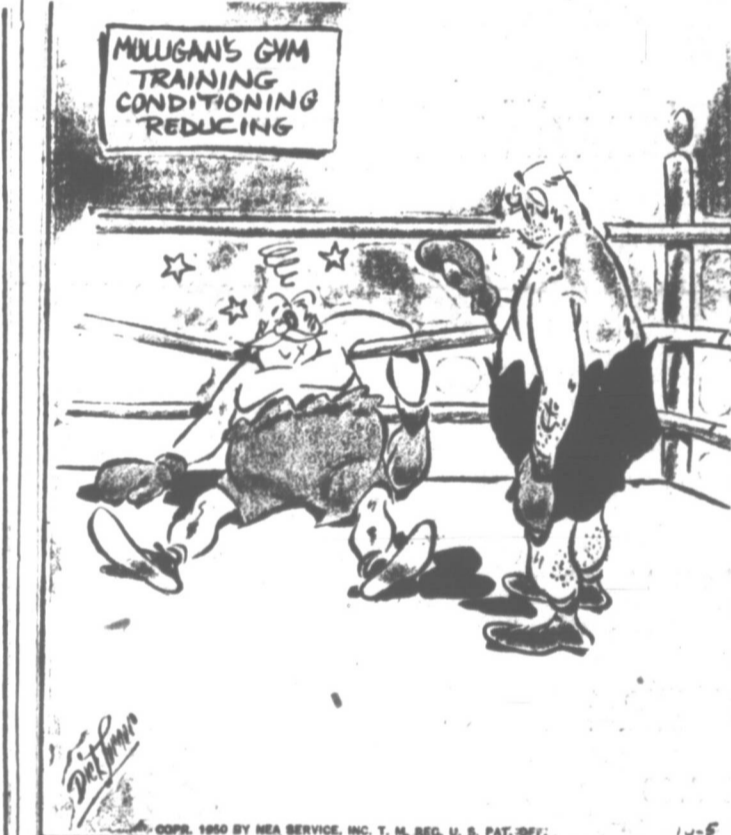

Texans May Swap Citrus for Pre-Cut Swedish Dwellings

MARLINGEN — (AP) — Fruit growers in South Texas may swap citrus for Swedish dwellings. Citrus growers in the lush and crowded Lower Rio Grande Valley need the houses. Sweden would like to have the citrus especially without paying scarce U. S. dollars. Larry Lightner, Harlingen importer, has been dicker for four years with two young Stockholm men, Lennart Bruce, 31, and Sten Dahlstrom, 34. They represent the John Bruce Company of Stockholm. This week the three brought their proposition before the powerful Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers Association. Austin Anson, executive manager of the association, said today the deal looks "very promising." The Swedish houses are not ordinary houses. In precise, almost British English, Bruce says they are "pre-cut and not pre-fabricated." Individual pieces have built-in interlocking hooks that are tightened by a patented device in which only one tool — a crank-like wrench — is needed. They range from three-room cottages to 2-bedroom houses with about 800 square feet of space. Bruce said he was trying "to sell the U. S. something it needed, without ECA red tape and burdening the nation's taxpayers unnecessarily." He and Lightner agreed the houses are worth about \$2,500 each — roughly 1,999 boxes of fruit. Fruit also may be swapped for tomato and fruit boxes made in Sweden. "We are not in the housing or box business," said Anson, "but merely are acting as referees in a deal whereby Sweden would find a market for their houses, and we would find another market for our citrus."

Mexico Will Stage Long Bicycle Race

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — Bicycle clubs of all Latin-American countries and the United States, Canada, France, Italy and Spain have been invited to enter Mexico's third annual bicycle race. The 1,160-mile race through Central Mexico will be held Nov. 25 to Dec. 10.

1,059 Russian-Made Tanks Hit by Allied Air-Power

TOKYO — (AP) — Allied land-based planes destroyed or damaged 1,059 Russian-made tanks during the war in South Korea, the American Air Force chief in the Far East announced. Lt. Gen. George E. Stratemeyer summarized the destruction wrought from the air on the Reds up until Sunday. Then he added: "The war would have been vastly different if we had been up against a major air power." At no time did the U.N. forces consider using the atom bomb, Stratemeyer told a news conference. He said that in 96 days allied fighters and bombers destroyed or damaged: 1,059 tanks, 5,223 trucks, 350 locomotives, 874 railroad cars, 376 bridges, 182 aircraft, 43 warehouses, 22 oil storage tanks, and 33 marshalling yards; they silenced 689 field guns, attacked 11,000 troops and sealed 33 tunnels. Eighteen major strategic Red targets — such as industrial centers — were reported neutralized. These mostly were the objects of strategic raids by far-ranging B-29s. The Far East Air Force (FEAF) commander listed allied aerial losses as 139 aircraft and 175 casualties. Of the casualties, 52 airmen were killed, 56 wounded, 65 missing and two were known to be prisoners of war. With North Korean Red targets virtually erased, allied planes are continuing attacks aimed at cutting off communications behind the retreating Communists. A bomb-line stretches explosives across the peninsula — north of the 38th parallel. "We're going to keep the bomb-line ahead of our troops," Stratemeyer said when asked to comment on South Korean forces surging across the Red border. "Most of the 40,456 sorties flown during the first 96 days up to Sunday were in close support of ground forces. Of the total, 3,159 were B-29 strikes against strategic targets." Stratemeyer said the strategic phase ended quickly because "it is common knowledge that the enemy's principal sources of materials were off limits." He did not mention Russia, but said "the sources of supply didn't see fit to provide" a larger air force for the North Korean invaders. The enemy planes destroyed were mostly Russian-made Yak fighters. Intelligence reports indicated the Reds have only seven planes remaining, including three twin-engine bombers, and about 90 tanks which might include some damaged and later repaired. Stratemeyer said FEAF's total of Red tanks destroyed might include duplications, but explained that pilots' reports had been reduced by a third to equalize that factor. Regarding Chinese Communist charges of air attacks on Manchurian villages, north of Korea, Stratemeyer commented: "This has been accidental."

YOU and the SERVICE

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Q. What's the minimum hitch can serve in the Marine Corps if I enlist? A. Three years. Q. What's the rule about doctors who volunteer for service who aren't reserve officers? Do they get more money? What rank do they get? A. The present law provides that physicians and dentists who volunteer for service will receive an extra \$100 a month in addition to regular pay and allowances. They will be commissioned as first lieutenants unless their professional qualifications entitle them to a higher rank. Q. I have applied for Aviation Cadet training but in the meantime expect a draft call. What's my status? A. You will be deferred for four months. Q. What's the new regulation about enlisting straight into the Marine reserves without becoming a regular? A. The period of enlistment is indefinite. Men with no prior military service, between the ages of 18 and 32, may sign up at any Marine Corps recruiting station if they meet requirements. They will be enlisted in the volunteer reserve, placed on extended active duty "in excess of 30 days" and sent immediately to "boot" camp for training. Q. What should a reserve officer in the Air Force do if he gets his call to active duty but thinks he deserves a deferment? A. Send your request for deferment to the headquarters of the numbered Air Force issuing the recall order, asking for a delay in compliance with your orders. A minimum notification period of 10 days plus travel time is provided in all recall orders, but upon personal request this period may be extended to a maximum of 30 days in justifiable cases. Q. Do Divinity students have to register for the draft? A. They have to register but they will be deferred.
