UN Allies Quit Retreat; Defense Line Is Established

Location Believed Near 38th Parallel

TOKYO (AP)—Allied Eighth Army forces halted their mass retreat south from Pyongyang today and dug in for a new western Korean stand against the onrushing armies of Red China. General MacArthur's headquarters kept secret the locations of the new line. The Americans, South Koreans, British and Turks of the Eighth Army with their better transport had outrun the Chinese and every hour was vital in bulwarking their new positions. A spokesman said only that the line ran from a point south of Pyongyang to positions south and east. There were indications the new line might be somewhere near Parallel 38, the old border between Red North and Republican South Korea. South Korean forces swept into hill country to clean out guerrillas near Sipyon, a hamlet 70 miles southeast of Pyongyang.



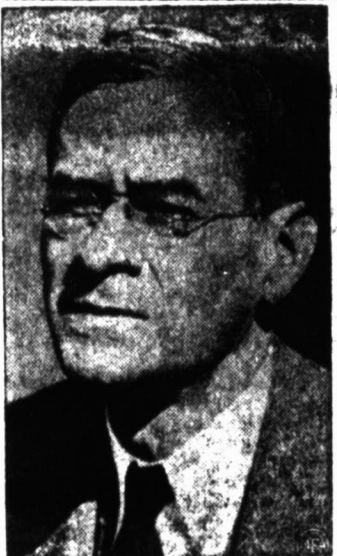

China Is Asked To Halt Army At Parallel 38

LAKE SUCCESS (AP)—Communist China is being asked directly by 13 Asian and Middle Eastern nations to halt its troops at the 38th Parallel in Korea for UN negotiations to avert a third world war. The appeal was forwarded last night as powerful new proposals for an arranged truce piled up in the United Nations. India, the Philippines and Pakistan sparked the move for the direct plea to Peiping, transmitted through Communist China's representative here, Wu Hsiuchuan. The 38th Parallel is the boundary between North and South Korea across which the North Koreans attacked last June 25. Declared aggressors by the UN, the North Koreans were pushed back by UN troops across the parallel and in some places to the Korea-China border before hundreds of thousands of Chinese Communists poured into the fight. They saved a general UN retreat southward. The move by the Asian-Middle East bloc all but overshadowed an emergency meeting of the general assembly (called for 9:45 a. m. CST). It was to debate sending to the assembly's plenary session a general UN retreat southward. (See CHINA ASKED, Page 3)

Compact Signed; Now Up to Senate

SANTA FE, N.M.—The tri-state water compact, governing use and distribution of the waters of the Canadian River was signed here at 1:10 p. m. today after a snag in wordage held up the 11 a. m. scheduled signing of the document. The agreement was reached late yesterday by the compact commissioners meeting in the Federal Building here. When the formal document was drawn last night and this morning, attorneys found objection to word employment of some of the stipulations. This caused a last-minute delay and some fear that an agreement may not be reached.

Rusty Ward, president of the Jaycees, announced that the blood bank, which the club put on a strong drive to obtain last summer, has been ordered and is expected to arrive in the next few days.

Conviction of Judith Coplon Is Reversed

NEW YORK (AP)—The conviction of Judith Coplon on charges of being a Russian spy has been reversed by a federal court of appeals. However, the court declared that her "guilt is plain" and refused to dismiss the indictment. It ordered a new trial. The Second Circuit Court of Appeals yesterday ordered the new trial for the comely 29-year-old Brooklyn resident on grounds that her arrest without a warrant was illegal. FBI wiretapping also was a factor in the reversal. Miss Coplon, former Department of Justice employee, and Valentin A. Gubichev, 33-year-old Russian engineer and suspended United Nations employe, were convicted last March. They were found guilty of conspiring to transmit secret defense information. Each was sentenced to 15 years in prison. Because of the tense international situation, Gubichev was allowed to return to his native Russia—"never to return"—instead of serving his term. He relinquished the right of appeal. His brunette and attractive co-defendant—married to one of her lawyers after her conviction—has been free in \$20,000 bail pending appeal. She also is appealing a sentence of 40 months to ten years imposed previously on a Washington, D.C., conviction of stealing government secrets. Yesterday's reversal here does not affect the Washington conviction.

Truman Press Aide Is Dead

WASHINGTON (AP)—Charles Ross, President Truman's official voice in day-to-day contacts with newsmen, is dead. The President's press secretary succumbed at 5:50 p. m. yesterday of a heart attack. He was 65. A kind, gentle, sentimental newspaperman, Charles G. Ross was catapulted into national prominence when his boyhood friend, Harry S. Truman, became President of the United States.

Army Drive Is Short of Goal

The Salvation Army fund campaign which was scheduled to end yesterday is \$1,300 short of the \$7,000 goal set. Therefore the drive will be continued until the established goal has been reached. That was the word this morning of Lt. Fred McClure, commander of the local organization. Many of the workers have been unable to make their contacts which is one reason that the drive has not been completed. McClure added that they would like very much to get the drive out of the way as any further delay is sure to interfere with the Salvation Army's Christmas charity activity.

French Blast Commie Force

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—A French ground and air operation lashed out today at rebel Vietminh forces around the town of Seven Pagodas, key section in Red River delta defenses guarding eastern approaches to the north Indochina capital of Hanoi. A French army spokesman said two to four battalions, covered by bombers and fighters, drove out to clear the area of the Communist-led guerrillas who are threatening to cut the road and rail lifeline between Hanoi and the northern seaport of Haiphong. The critical delta area where the new operations are taking place is just south of the main mountain stronghold of Ho Chi-minh's rebel forces. The Vietminh had streamed into the area through a 50-mile gap in the French northern defense line near the Chinese border between Luocnam and Dinh Lap. Auto Price Line Increases Today

DETROIT (AP)—The price line in the automobile industry was raised today in two major points. Ford had followed General Motors with a boost in car prices. The two increases approximated five percent or more. Higher costs and materials shortages figured in both actions. Only Chrysler of the industry's "big three" had yet to announce its price intentions. Chrysler's 1951 model cars come out in January. Thus the auto industry, a vital part of America's economic pattern, had all but given up in the attempt to "hold the line." Previously, several smaller independent auto makers had boosted prices. Solon Pushing Road South

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Kem (R-Mo) said today that in considering further funds for the inter-American highway project, he is also considering a social value rather than as a defense undertaking. Kem recently inspected the highway, which would run from the United States border south through the Panama Canal, as a member of a Senate Public Works subcommittee. Since construction of the road began in 1942 the U. S. has spent \$22,000,000 on it, with the view its completion would aid in defense of the Panama Canal. But, Kem told a reporter, "today our defense strategy there is in the air and on the sea." Gaps exist in the highway for some 250 miles in Guatemala, Costa Rica and Panama. A subcommittee is now considering a request that \$8,000,000 be voted for further construction. "It is a question of how high a priority this road should be given in view of present conditions," he said. "I don't see how we can afford to spend money down there under conditions now existing in the world." But, he added, the gaps in the highway must be completed before economic and social benefits can be obtained. Kem also said people of Central America resent the fact that they are not sharing in Marshall plan funds. "I also detected a widespread feeling that the friends of the Rio Grande were being played for suckers," he said.

Sooner reservists down the Canadian catch up.  
The term "acre feet" means one acre of land covered by water one foot deep; this amounts to 325,800 gallons of water per acre at a one foot depth.  
Another clause, favoring Texas, stipulates that the state shall have full use of all North Canadian waters for domestic, municipal, and stockwater consumption. The North Canadian dips into Dallas and Sherman Counties before flowing on into Oklahoma.  
However, release of the surplus waters of the dam would be impractical, geological engineers said, because too much would be lost in transit between the dam and Oklahoma. But the engineers made the recommendations just the same to the Compact Commission.

the north, was a fight down 80 miles of a river gorge road. Chinese Reds held hills flanking the road for much of the way.  
Elements of the Fifth and Seventh Marine regiments and the 31st and 32nd Regiments of the U. S. Army's Seventh Division were cut off in the frigid wasteland. They were being supplied by air. Planes were removing wounded who had survived five-day fighting retreat down both sides of Changjin Reservoir.  
While ground forces saw little action, allied planes rocketed and bombed the enemy all the way from the fronts to the Yalu River boundary of Manchuria.  
The Fifth Air Force said its airmen had killed or wounded 1,800 Reds up to 1 p. m. Wednesday (10 p. m. CST, Tuesday). These included 150 killed, Pyongyang, the Red Korean capital abandoned Tuesday by allied troops, and another 420 near the city.  
The planes in 250 sorties struck 15 enemy towns and destroyed 33 vehicles, 16 boxcars, several tanks, 44 cars, five supply dumps and other installations.  
They roared down on bridges, railroads and airports. F-51 Mustangs knocked out at least four of 20 Russian Yak-type aircraft on the field at Sinuju in extreme northwest Korea. Then they bombed the field. A later flight of F-80 jets found the field abandoned.  
Marine Corsairs sprayed proximity fuse bombs for the first time in the Korean war on the northeast Korean coast. The bombs detonated before they hit the ground, spraying metal effectively against enemy troops particularly in foxholes.  
Three marine Corsairs took time out to guide jeep rescue parties to wounded and frostbitten American infantrymen stumbling across the windswept ice of Changjin Reservoir.

The compact not completely perfect," Col. E. V. Spence, Texas member of the commission, said he considered it a good trade with Oklahoma and New Mexico. He added, "It will permit us to build a firm project on the Canadian without hurting New Mexico to the west or Oklahoma to the east."  
Before the compact can be officially termed a tri-state agreement it must win approval by the legislatures of the three states.  
With the official signing of the document this morning by the commissioners, the objection of Sen. Dennis Chavez, N. M., to the bill being placed on the Senate's calendar for consideration because a water compact protecting New Mexico's rights, had not been drawn.  
Unofficial reports coming from Santa Fe declared the bill would be on the Senate's calendar by Saturday, the document being signed and rushed to Washington with the utmost speed.  
The first day's session was held up by engineers working behind closed doors on stipulations and recommendations for the compact formula. The commissioners, however, met for two hours before adjourning to allow engineers to complete their work.  
Each of the commissioners was armed with consulting engineers and an attorney.  
Shortly before Chairman Berkeley Johnson called for a noon recess, a rough outline of the compact formula was read to the party by Raymond A. Hill, consulting engineer to Johnson. During the recess Col. Spence went into conference with his staff and members of the Canadian River Waters Users Assn. The caucus ended with the Texas group signifying their approval of Hill's rough-draft formula. During the afternoon session Col. Spence moved the formula he adopted; he was seconded by John Bliss, commissioner from New Mexico; the vote of Clarence Burch, Oklahoma commissioner, made the motion unanimous.  
On the Texas advisory delegation to the meeting are E. O. Wedgeworth, Chamber of Commerce manager and Mayor C. A. Huff.

### YOU AND THE SERVICE

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — I should become a conscientious objector, would I be retained in my present position?

A. The way Selective Service looks at it there isn't such a thing as becoming a conscientious objector overnight. When you filled out your questionnaire the first time you should have set forth the religious background which qualifies you to the rights extended conscientious objectors at that time. It's highly doubtful whether a draft board could be convinced of a sudden change in this basic attitude. However, if you are successful in getting the draft status of a conscientious objector there is no reason why you couldn't hang on to your present job.

Q. Next October when I will be 19 I plan to enter a vocational school for radio announcers and broadcast engineers. I am a member of the naval reserve. What will be my draft status then? Will I be able to get a deferment?

A. It's possible that you could get a deferment from the draft as a naval reservist. It would be up to your draft board to decide whether or not the vocational school you enter meets the definition of education institution for a deferment.

Q. Does the Army take a person who walks in his sleep?

A. It works this way. The Army takes sleep walkers if they meet all the other requirements. Then if they continue to walk in their sleep after induction the Army tries to correct it. There is no record of a man being discharged just for sleep walking.

Q. My son got married after Korea started. Does that keep him out of the service?

A. This is strictly up to the

### JACOBY ON CANASTA

#### Take Pointers on Melding

By OSWALD JACOBY

Written for NEA Service In my last article I discussed the first play with a hand that included a joker, a deuce, a pair of kings and three sevens when both sides needed fifty.

The normal correct play with this hand is to meld the joker with the sevens right away. In the article, I mentioned that I would make this play most of the time but would not do so automatically. On occasion I might meld the joker with the kings or might not meld at all on my first turn.

In my book "Oswald Jacoby's Complete Canasta" I list the four advantages in making the initial meld. They are:

1. Your partner is relieved of the burden of trying for the required count.
2. Either you or your partner can thereafter take the discard pile with one wild card and merely one card of the same rank as the last discard.
3. If an opponent discards a card that can be added to one of your melds, you may take the discard pile.
4. You have a start toward a canasta.

The first advantage is not too important at fifty, although I

have seen plenty of hands that did not hold a fifty count. However, there is another point in that connection. Some players are just scared to death until they get a meld down on the table.

If any partner is of that class I will surely meld immediately for fear that if I don't he will make some absurd initial meld. After all, I can make my meld conveniently and still retain a wild card in my hand.

The second and third advantages are very important. Take my hand as an example. If I don't meld, I can take the discard pile only if a king or seven is discarded to me. If I do meld, I will be able to make it if a king

or seven or a matcher for one of my four odd cards is thrown. Your opponents have a very good defense against these two advantages. They can freeze the pack against you. This makes them use one of their wild cards but if they get the discard pile they get their own wild card back. If you get the discard pile, they lose their wild card.

However, if they do freeze the pack against you the odds favor their getting it. You will be playing with seven or eight cards only depending on which meld you choose. Each of them will have his whole hand.

This particular type freeze is likely to prove very effective if you don't know how to play against it. Even if you do know how to play against it, it is usually a very good play against a side that melds too quickly. It will be discussed further in the next article.

# AP Selects Two-Platoon All-America 1950 Grid Team

## Reynolds, Heinrich, Grandelius, Kazmaier Named Offensive Backs

NEW YORK (AP)—The Associated Press All-America football team for 1950, for the first time, is divided into offensive and defensive squads in key with the modern style of play. Oklahoma, Army and Texas each placed two men on the first teams.

Probably as a direct result of the spread of the two-platoon system, football offense reached a new peak in 1950. A survey of the teams in The AP's top ten ranking showed that 15 years ago the nation's leaders averaged 17 points per game. This year, with a baffling variety of plays assailed by fresh waves of players, the average exceeds 30. A new high mark in offensive fury in a game between major schools was reached when Ohio State beat Iowa 83-21.

The offensive backs who stood out in this orgy of ground gain were Don Heinrich, Washington's tricky passer and field general; Bobby Reynolds, sensational Nebraska sophomore who led the nation's top schools in scoring with 157 points; Everett Grandelius, big Michigan State back who gained 1,023 yards against tough opposition; and Dick Kazmaier, mayspring of Princeton's undefeated team.

They had only the slightest margin, however, over the second team offensive backfield of Babe Parilli of Kentucky; Eddie Tolboom of Wyoming; John Westherral of Oklahoma; and Kyle Rote of Southern Methodist.

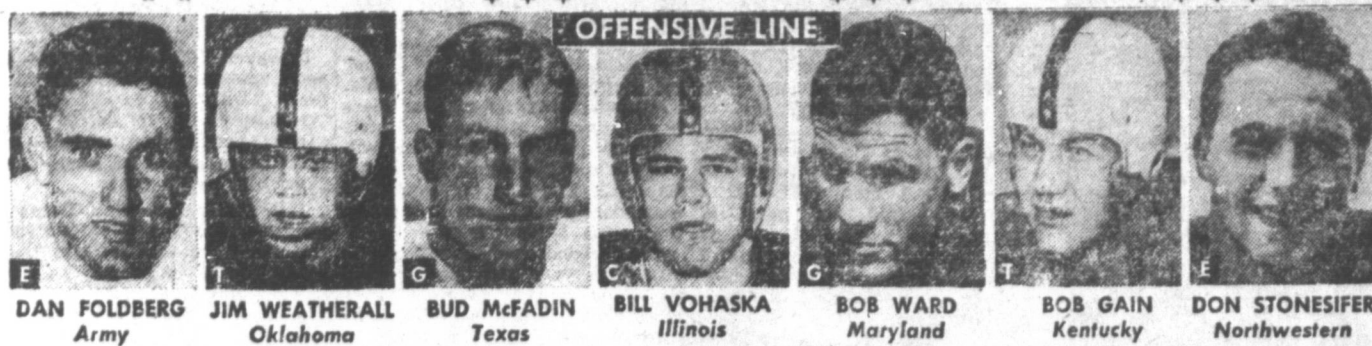
Rounding out the first offensive team were Dan Foldsberg of Army and Don Stonesifer of Northwestern at ends; Jim Weatherall of Oklahoma; and Bob Gain of Kentucky at tackles; Bud McFadin of Texas and Bob Ward of Maryland at guards; and Bill Vohaska of Illinois at center.

The All-America defensive squad that could contain the foe and pave the way for this formidable offensive array is composed of Frank Anderson of Oklahoma and Don Menasco of Texas at ends; Al Carapella of Miami and Les Richter of California at tackles; Leo Heath of Ohio State and Vic Janowicz of Ohio State at guards; and Bill McColl of Stanford at center.

For the three defensive backfield positions on the first team, men were selected best known for offensive prowess but who nevertheless were pillars of strength on defense: Vic Janowicz of Ohio State, a 60-minute player around whom his team's defense was built; Eddie Salem of Alabama, as skilled at stopping an opponent as in directing his team's attack; and Bob Williams of Notre Dame a master quarterback always capable of taking the field to stem an attack.

The same situation prevails for the defensive backs of the second team—Wilfred (Whizzer) White of Arizona State College, Leon Heath of Oklahoma and John Dettley of Mississippi.

But no possible re-arrangement of All-America backfields can provide room for the host of brilliant ball carriers who starred in high scoring games. Chief among these are Parilli and

an allotment of less than one acre. Consequently, thousands of East Texas farmers have had to go to the cities and look for work. The 1950 census figures bear out that statement.

Beckworth recently received a letter from the Agriculture commissioner of South Carolina saying that the same situation prevailed there.

"The Texas congressman says he'll keep dwelling on the subject in the hopes that a majority of his colleagues someday will agree with his views.

"They can argue all they want to, that the law provides a minimum five-acre allotment," he continues, "but there are loopholes. In reality doesn't work out that way for countless thousands of small farmers over the country."

Explaining that a farmer who may have planted cotton for 40 years but would get no quota if he had switched to some other crop during the allotment base years, Beckworth says:

"The base follows the land rather than the farmer. Human rights are secondary to land rights."

He then called attention to the fact that plantings of cotton in 1951, when controls will be lifted and a farmer can plant all he wants, will not be figured into the historical base of a farm. Whenever production controls are reimposed, the acreage allotment will go back to the same base as fixed originally for the 1950 crop, he said.

 I can't understand this at all. Cooking isn't new to me. I took domestic science training in high school, and well do I remember the day when I was honored by having one of my pies given to the track team to replace a lost discus.  
 There are no end of cook books around the house, ranging from one on casserole cooking for humperjacks to one on what to do with leftovers. And I follow their directions as relentlessly as ever did a bloodhound follow a loose jailbird.  
 The more I think about it, the more I believe I have an answer to the awful food I have dished out in the past 48 hours.

The fault is with my kitchen, not me.  
 It's too confounded modern. It is too kitchens what a supersonic jet is to planes. The fingerprints of the designers are still on most of the stuff. I wouldn't be surprised if my kitchen didn't need a few more hours in the air, so to speak, to work the bugs out. Take the range, and you're welcome to it. I learned my cooking first on a cast iron monster that had to be fed chunks of stove-wood, and whose lids burned like the eyes of the devil himself, and then on a gas model that had to be lighted with kitchen matches. When I light an oven I am used to getting on my hands and knees, holding my breath while I poke a match through a hole, and then jumping back when I hear a "boom!" that denotes she is cooking with gas.  
 The range I have now has a built in TV, FM and record changer, and a radar for detecting the first signs of a falling soufflé or a burnt crust. Half the professors at M. I. T. couldn't

explain it, much less cook on and in it.  
 There's an automatic dishwasher, too, and I find it so fascinating that I have spent more time fiddling with it than I have trying to master the stove. Where I come from in Georgia half the fun in living was raising your own little automatic dish washers and dryers right under your own roof.  
 There are so many gadgets a man doesn't have time to pay attention to his cooking. There's a Goldberghish ice crushing machine which does away with wrapping a chunk of ice in a dish towel and whamming it on the floor or beating it with a rolling pin. Right by that is a perfectly beautiful can opener which does everything but give you a trim and a slug while it's slicing off the top of a can of tomatoes. No adventure in opening a can any more. No risk of losing half a finger lip trying to pry it open when the old fashioned cutter refused to go but half way round. The kitchen is too pretty for my taste. All pale yellow and

white, even to the dish rags—pardon, dish cloths—and the prize-winning combination stool and ladder.  
 I'm so afraid of breaking some of the high-powered equipment or scratching what must be the Ming porcelain on the sink, that I can't get down to serious cooking.
