Chinese Hordes Entering Fire Ravaged Pyongyang

Invaders Battered By Allied Aircraft

TOKYO -(AP)- The big Red Chinese army was reported entering abandoned Pyongyang tonight on a momentous face-saving mission for Soviet-sponsored communism in the Orient.

United Nations forces representing 53 non-Communist countries had driven the broken and fleeing Red Korean army from their Pyongyang capital Oct. 20.

Tuesday, before overwhelming pressure from vanguards of the 1,000,000-man Chinese Communist army assembled

WASHINGTON - (A) - The possibility that United Nations forces may suffer total military defeat in Korea, necessitating a Dunkerque-like withdrawal by sea and air, was said today to be figuring in crisis conference s here.

Although hope has not been abandoned that the oprushing Chinese Communist hordes can be stopped, it was reported that Gen, Omar Bradley told President Truman and Prime Minister Attlee of Britain yesterday that evacuation plans are ready if they have to be used.

Politicians fell for 'Keynes' fallacy long before 1950 and today the world's treasuries are in a financial jam.
