WASHINGTON—(AP)—A presidential board today recommended a 40-hour week and an 18-cent hourly wage increase for about 75,000 railroad yard service employees. It recommended denial of wage boosts for about 125,000 trainmen and conductors.

The State Supreme Court granted McDonald permission to file a mandamus suit against the State Democratic Executive Committee, which barred his name on charges of party disloyalty here Monday.

Daredevil Drivers To Present Show Here June 24-25

Capt. Jack O' Diamonds and his famed daredevil auto-crashing troupe will visit Pampa June 24-25 under the sponsorship of the local post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. This is the final appearance in the state by the troupe.

On Saturday, June 24, a free safety show will be conducted, with the drivers showing how long it takes a car to stop at speeds up to sixty miles per hour, proper and improper use of hand signals, what to do in case of a blowout, how to avert roll-overs, slides and other accidents.

On Sunday, June 25, the two-hour car-crashing performance will be conducted at the Top of Texas rodeo grounds. There will be twelve automobile and motorcycle acts, including clown shows. Included in Diamonds' troupe are Al Krueger, the youngest performer in a daredevil show gang, Lucky Starr, a clown, Lewis Grimes, crash driver, Speedy Adams, who specializes on roll-overs and head-on collisions, and Miss Audrey Laster, the world champion lady boardcrasher.

The proceeds of the show will be used by the VFW to aid the rehabilitation of veterans in the area. Diamonds, a veteran of 12 years in the Marines and Navy, has offered his troupe to aid the VFW.

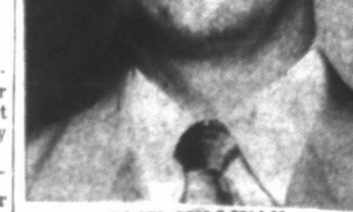
While the two argued, Rep. Lyle (D-Texas) tried unsuccessfully to get the issue brought to a vote.

At Least 40 Persons Dead In Peru Revolt

LIMA, Peru—(AP)—At least 40 persons were believed today to have been killed in a two-day revolt during which rebels captured most of the city of Arequipa. The government announced loyal troops, moving into the city, had put down the revolt.

The government blamed Communists for the uprising. Arequipa, with a population of 93,000, is Peru's second largest city. The rebels at one time held the city hall, military headquarters, the airport, a radio station and other buildings.

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Billion-Dollar Cut Claimed After Session

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Democratic tax law drafters were reported today, after a surprise secret huddle, to be in virtual agreement on a billion-dollar-plus excise tax cutting bill that could avoid a presidential veto.

The huddle, understood to have been attended by House Ways and Means Democrats and Speaker Rayburn, changed the whole outlook for tax legislation—which had been dark for this session.

They made no announcement, but there were indications their minds were about made up to:

- 1. Ram through a bill slashing excise taxes by \$1,100,000,000 on jewelry, furs, luggage and toilet preparations, movie tickets, travel tickets, baby bottle warmers and scores of other items.
2. Put into the bill a hike in the income tax rate for large corporations, perhaps from the present 38 percent to 41 percent—to collect about \$800,000,000 additional from these corporations annually.
3. Meet a July 1 deadline for House passage of the measure, so that the Senate will have time to act before the present Congress adjourns.

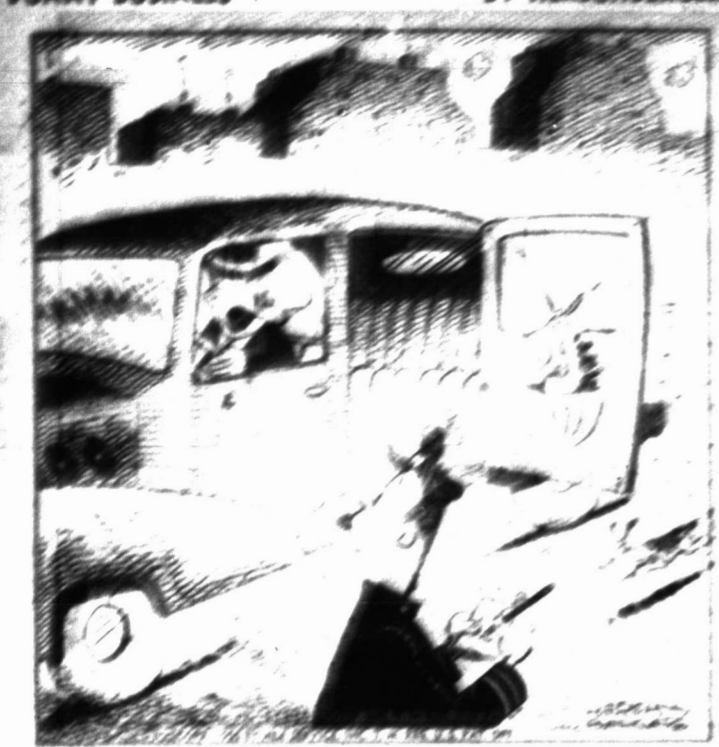

Polio's Incidence Hits Record High

AUSTIN — (AP) — Polio's incidence jumped to a new high for 1950 this past week with 81 new cases reported.

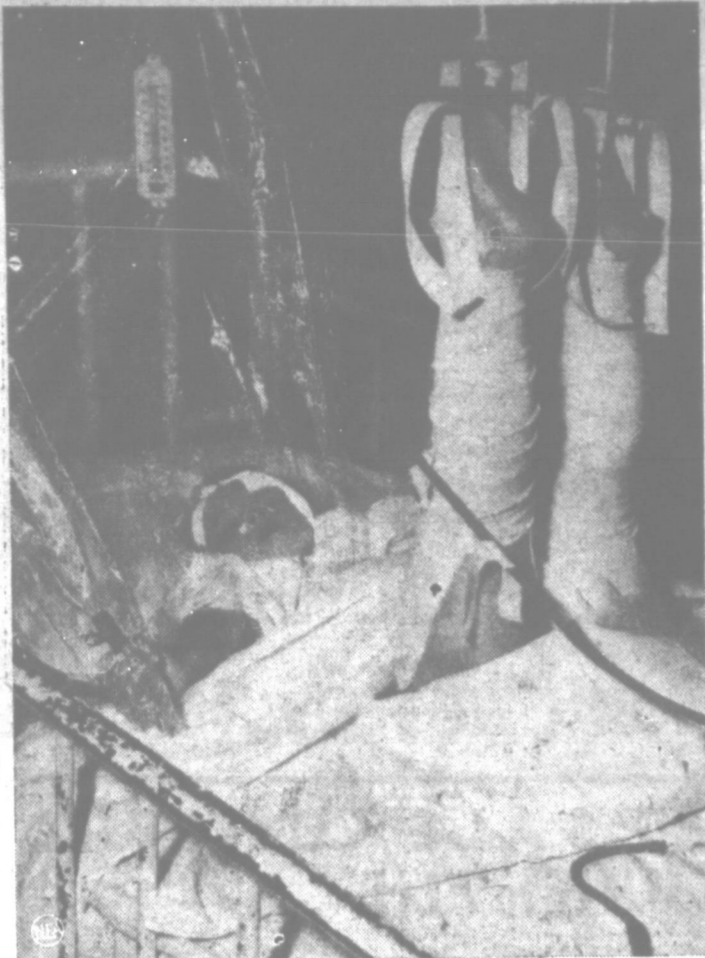
This was six more cases than in the previous week, which had been the record week of the year. State Health Officer Dr. George W. Cox reported the year's total reached 821 in 95 counties compared with 343 in 60 counties for the same period a year ago. Four counties had their initial incidence of polio last week. They were Kendall, Lubbock,

Wheeler and Wise. Cases in other counties: Bexar (San Antonio) and Tarrant (Fort Worth), nine each; Hidalgo, six; Dallas and Galveston, five each; Smith, four; Harris, three; El Paso, Jones and McLennan, two each; and Brazos, Fort Bend, Hardeman, Haskell, Howard, Jefferson, Kleberg, Runnels, Val-

Some High Flying Materials Slip but Index Still Rising

NEW YORK — (AP) — A few of the high fliers in the current upward price spiral are being taken down a peg.

Rubber and steel scrap, which climbed sensationally in recent months to new all-time highs, have been falling this week. They stand out against the long list of other commodities which are still climbing or holding their high points.

A handful of other commodities have been coming down, too, and today makers of some of finished products, whose raw material costs have been rising, assure us they plan to hold the price line for the consumer. Others, however, see little chance as yet of staying out of the inflation parade.

Trade sources say that rubber and steel scrap prices went higher than was justified by any but special and temporary conditions—and measures were taken to end these conditions.

For example, natural rubber prices dropped six cents a pound at Singapore in the first two days of this week. Trade sources think it's because Chinese speculators have changed their minds. They had been holding rubber to force the price up.

Steel scrap prices went to a record high of \$46 a ton at Pittsburgh. But this week \$3 was shaved off the price. Trade sources give several reasons. The high price attracted more scrap into the market. Mills refused to buy at the record price. Some announced plans to import scrap from Europe. And the price of scrap came down.

A few other commodities have suffered price drops recently, and some that tried for higher prices failed to make it stick. Sugar refiners in the East announced they were hiking the price of refined sugar, but large consumers stayed out of the market and the announced price increases were withdrawn before their effective date.

Dispatches from Maine say that a good run of fish there has brought the price of sardines down slightly.

The makers of men's hose, plagued by the rise in the cost of cotton yarn, assure us today that they hope to hold stock prices where they are. They say most producers already have ordered enough yarn for the present anyway.

But these little gleams of price relief flicker against generally rising prices. The Bureau of La-

bor Statistics, which bases its general index of basic commodities on the August, 1939, level, says today that the index advanced during last week from 266.9 to 269.

Mechanical Brain For Translation Is Developing

PASADENA, Calif. — (AP) — A variation of the electronic brain which solves complex mathematical problems in a twinkling may be translating languages by next fall.

Dr. H. D. Huskey, of the National Bureau of Standards, yesterday told of a new calculator at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Instead of numerals, he said in a speech at the convention of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, foreign words would be imprinted in the machine's memory—a magnetized drum.

A Russian scientific treatise, for example, would be typed out and fed in. The machine would match the words with their English equivalents, also stored in its memory, which would emerge on printed tape.





This is their way of saying the girls act phoney instead of acting themselves.
"They have stylized walks and stylized hair-dos that make them all look alike," said Tony, a former radio writer who flew an artillery cub scouting plane in Europe during the war.
"If Groucho Marx is making money, every comedian wants to grow a moustache. It's that way in this business. The girls work too hard trying to look the way they think a professional model ought to."
The result? They become stiff caricatures. They gain a fake poise — and lose their own real poise.
"The photographers are inundated with pretty girls of this type," Tony continued. "When they see a girl with real individuality and charm, they pounce on her. It's her naturalness that pays off."
There's an old wisecrack that you can tell a man who's out of work because he dresses so neatly. It's that way in modeling.
"One of the top girl models — she makes up to \$500 a week — comes to work wearing glasses and with her hair in curlers," said Tony.

Department Store Optimism High, Retailer Reports

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Department stores have reversed the declining profit trend of 1949 and most stores now view coming months with "considerable optimism," a Harvard retailing expert reported yesterday. Malcolm P. McNair said the 30th annual survey of the Harvard University Bureau of Business Research showed that department stores "bore the brunt" of last year's business recession. Profits dipped 27 percent to a figure of about 3 cents for each dollar of sales, after taxes. This was the lowest level since 1938. Total dollar sales dropped for the first time in 11 years, McNair said.

He gave the report to the compartment congress, financial unit of the National Retail Dry Goods Association, at its midyear meeting here. Even today sales have not met expectations, McNair said, largely because of lags in apparel and general merchandise. He added: "Nevertheless department store gross margins seem to have improved measurably because of lower markdowns, and expenses in many stores have now been brought under better control. As a result the declining profit trend apparently is not being carried over into 1950, and department store managements in a majority of instances seem now to be viewing the months ahead with considerable optimism."

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Abide by Double if Pointwise It's the Best

"Our bridge club is in a dither about this hand," writes a Kansas City correspondent. "It was played in a match-point tournament. The question is how the hand should be bid. 'Some of us think that North was right to rebid his spades rather than allow the double of two diamonds to stand. The others think that North should have passed the double of two diamonds, hoping to win more points in penalties. 'What would the best tournament players do in a situation like this?' Most of the best tournament players would let the double stand. Naturally, North would prefer to hold more than one diamond. He would also prefer to hold greater strength outside of his long spade suit. However, North cannot pick and choose. He must decide on the basis of the hand that he actually holds. In match-point play, North

diamonds two tricks; and that if it is not good enough to produce a game, it will still be good enough to set two diamonds one trick. When the hand was actually played, South made eleven tricks at notrump by leading towards his king of clubs. At two diamonds doubled, South would open the king of spades and would discard a club when East ruffed the third spade. East would lead a trump, and South would take it and lead a heart. North would return a club. At this point, East could hold the loss to 500 points only by putting up the ace of clubs — but even 500 points could be too big a price to pay.

The babies were delivered in a 25 minute period by Dr. Harry M. Krasney. He said both mother and babies were doing fine. Each child weighed a few ounces over five pounds. They have not been named. After the delivery, Dr. Krasney asked Mrs. Dundon, "Well, what do you want?" "I'd like to have a little girl," she replied. "You have one," Dr. Krasney said. "What else would you like to have?" Mrs. Dundon anxiously asked, "do you mean I have another baby?" "Yes, you have another one," the doctor said. "I'd like to have a boy," she said.

Monterrey Still Trails Rival City

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — Guadalajara is still ahead of Monterrey in Mexico's population race. This year's census figures give Guadalajara 354,246 inhabitants and Monterrey 339,634. Guadalajara has always been Mexico's second biggest city, but the Monterrey industries have caused an increase of 46 percent in Monterrey's population in the last 50 years. The population of the cotton center of Torreon was reported as 137,228.

HOLLYWOOD.—If Spike Jones is right, the average American wants to see the first fiddler fall into the bass drum. And the harpist popped with a bat during her most serious moment. And the tenor the victim of a belch.

The sum of \$25,000 a week, most weeks, is what Spike Jones of the musical nonsense circuit is paid for entertaining Americans, so he probably is right.

The basis of the comedy in his Musical Depreciation Reviews is, he says, "what you would like to see happen." The state of American humor then is that the top and the belch are the keystones of laughter. Why try to be subtle when being otherwise pays so handsomely?

A very funny or, at any rate, most laughable to those attending the Home Show here now—sequence in the Jones show is when a supposed Queen for a Day contestant comes to the microphone. Her nervousness causes her to laugh so hard that she giggles. Are the folks in the audience amused because her nervousness might be their nervousness? Or are they laughing because she obviously didn't know she was to sing?

I don't know the answer. I'm just amazed that this could be funny.

Spike, who has made the washboard, the cowbell and the revolver instruments in his band, spends a great deal of his time wondering what will make people laugh. He wondered for weeks about the nervous con-

stant, having it in mind as a build-up for a musical number. When the gal sails into "Glow Worm" the stage and almost all the people on it fall a part. "Everytime you hear 'Glow Worm,'" says Spike, "you want something—anything—to happen."

OAKLAND, Md. — (P) — There was cheer a plenty in the little mountain cabin of Homer Ash. The waiting was just about over. Mrs. Ash was ready to go to the hospital to have her sixth child.

There was the usual joking and speculation as to whether it would be a boy or a girl among the Ash family and Ash's sister Mrs. Emerson Knox, and her 12-year-old daughter Wanda Lee, who had come over to help with the wash.

Then —

As Mrs. Knox prepared to start

the gas-ne-powered washing machine, a terrific explosion enveloped the group.

The children screamed, choked with pain and fright. Ash, knocked to the floor by the blast, saw gas-ine-fed flames spreading over the floor and up the walls.

Though badly burned, he managed to half-drag, half-carry his wife, his sister and the children from the blazing room.

Five-year-old Tommy was dead. So was two-year-old Peggy. And Wanda Lee.

His wife, ready for childbirth, was severely burned. His sister moaned in her scorched clothing. Somehow, he got out the car and headed them for the hospital as the flames consumed the house.

His child arrived a few minutes after they checked in. It was dead.

Last night, after long, agonizing hours, Mrs. Ash died.

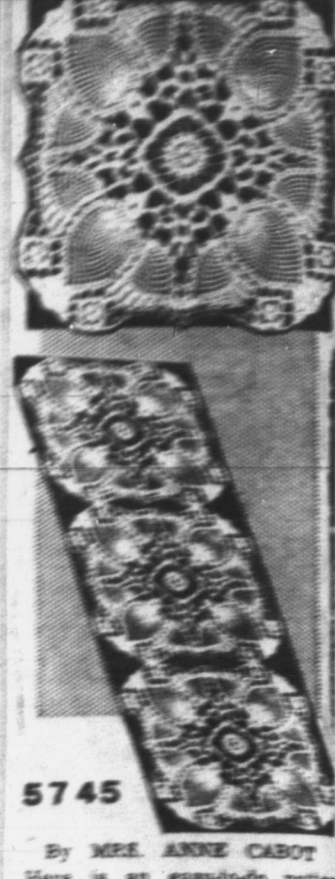

Peace Through Power Policy Is Urged by Air Secretary

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Secretary of the Air Force Thomas K. Finletter told a graduating class yesterday it can hope for a world without war only if America pursues a policy of peace through power.

Finletter spoke at commencement exercises of the University of Pennsylvania.

For prevention of war, he said in his prepared speech, we need a force so strong, so capable of violent counter attack, as to deter any nation bent on breaking peace.

And for the immediate future, he sees a need for continuing to

increase the fighting strength of the United States and her allies, because "the curve of military power is rising everywhere."

The air secretary didn't point to any new turns ahead in the road of foreign and military policy. Mainly, he tried to give young people just getting out of college an understanding of why we are arming when we want peace.

He said:

"Already this conflict of ideas — the need to prepare for war when in fact we want peace — is confusing some of our citizens. The power of a modern military establishment is appalling; and to give us further pause, the role of defense now consists in major part of counter attack."

Finletter didn't speak of definite numbers of guns and planes and A-bombs. He didn't speak of Russia by name. But he talked of "our enemies" as straight out enemies, not probably or possible ones.

Yet he said he has faith for the future, because there is "one great thing on our side — the wish of the ordinary man everywhere for peace."

"No government, however dictatorial its rule," he said, "can forever block the will of the people in their urge to stop the evil of war. The goal is there before us. It is a goal that can be reached."

But for the time being, Finletter said, these three principles

Orange County And Area Shows Tripled Increase

Couple Facing Long Sentence For Neglect

NEW YORK — (AP) — Guy and Mary Scielzo, a young Manhattan couple, face the prospect of up to 20 years in prison for starving to death their three-year-old son, Guy, Jr.

The 30-year-old father was convicted of first degree manslaughter by a jury that deliberated 90 minutes.

His wife, also 30, earlier had pleaded guilty to the same charge.

Little Guy, who weighed only

14 pounds — 21 pounds underweight — died at a hospital last November after he was found in a dark, lice-infested back room by authorities.

His sister, Vincenza, 4, was also starved, but recovered.

Scielzo drew another conviction with a possible three-year sentence for her neglect.

The couple had two other children, plump and happy. No full explanation ever was made why the children were treated so differently.

Mrs. Scielzo said only that Guy "wouldn't eat." Her husband said he was busy earning a living and assumed she was looking after the children. Sentencing was set for July 12.

What ever happened to fireman Joe Page of 1949 — the greatest relief pitcher ever?

Recent work of the New York Yankees bullpen artist reminds fans of the Page of 1949 — an in-and-outer who flopped after a glorious pennant year in 1947.

Highest priced of all Yankee pitchers with a \$30,000-plus wage, Page failed the World Champs yesterday for the second day in a row. Now they've lost the first two of their road trips.

Bothered by a sinus infection during the long home stand, Page saw little action. He had a week's rest before Stengel tied him in Chicago Tuesday night. Joe didn't have it.

Allie Reynolds was one out away from victory yesterday when the White Sox caught up with him. With two gone in the ninth and New York leading, 2-1, a single and walk by pinch hitters Floyd Baker and Luke Appling and a single by Chico Carrasquel tied the score.

Stengel took the ball from Allie and waved in Page, Joe's third pitch to Dave Philley sailed into the lower left field seats for a three-run homer and the ball game, 5-2.

Last season Page strode from the bullpen 80 times. The Yankees won 42 lost 17 and tied one of those games. So far in 19 appearances by Page, New York has won 11 and lost eight.

Especially alarming to Stengel was Page's new habit of throwing the home run ball. Five batters hit homers off him so far. Only seven did the trick all last season.

Page's failure cost the Yankees a chance to gain on Detroit. Instead the Tigers clung to their half game lead despite an 8-2 defeat by Philadelphia.

Five homers featured the night game between Cleveland and Boston, won by the Indians, 7-3. Larry Doby, Al Rosen and Lou Bourdeau were the long distance clouters for Cleveland, Vern Stephens and Ted Williams for the Red Sox. Williams collected 19 off Mike Garcia in the third with one on.

Ellis Kinder continued to throw that gopher ball up to the plate, yielding all three Cleveland homers. Bourdeau's was his first of the season.

Conrad Marrero held St. Louis to four hits as Washington thrust the Browns into the cellar with a 4-1 victory. The Senators had lost seven straight to St. Louis.

National League activity consisted of one night game. Reds wasted out the rest of the schedule.

The onrushing St. Louis Cardinals racked up their seventh straight win behind Max Lanier. The chunky southpaw let down the Phillies with six hits, 4-2, as St. Louis stretched its lead to 3½ games over idle Brooklyn.

Two runs in the eighth broke a 2-2 tie, handing Ken Heintzelman his fifth loss. Enos Slaughter singled but was forced at second. Marty Marion tripled to break the tie and Del Rice drove him home as Lanier, unbeaten since May 17, won his fourth straight.

SPORTS ROUND-UP

NEW YORK — (P) — Writing about Ben Hogan — the same time, remaining on good terms with the wonderful little golfer has, all of a sudden, become something of a problem.

The man who made the greatest comeback in sports history by winning the Open championship in a play-off at Merion last Sunday does not wish his old friends of the press to mention his legs — the legs which were crushed and torn in an auto-bus crash in Texas some 17 months ago.

After he had tied for the title on Saturday night, he suggested rather mildly that sufficient had been written about his injuries and that the reading public might have had its fill.

When he won it on Sunday night he was much more phlegmatic not to say sulphuric in his demand that the assembled members of the press "lay off" his legs. There was no possible doubt that he meant every word he said.

But it was, of course, too tall an order. Great as was their admiration for the slight Texan, both for the magnificent golf he had just played and for the courage he had exhibited, the reporters knew there was no possible way of capturing the magnitude of Hogan's feat without telling of the dreadful hurts he had overcome.

So they wrote it, and Ben's angry each paper he picked up. Why he feels so strongly about the matter is not clear, for there never was a suggestion that he wished or would accept sympathy, nor that he would cup an alibi in the event of defeat.

Long experience with athletes of every strain does not recall a case parallel. To be sure, there have been those sweaty heroes who smiled through their pain and said, "it doesn't amount to nothing," or even remained stoically silent when they were prodded about their afflictions. But never one before this who became downright red-necked at it and paid off.

The suggestion he wasn't in prime physical condition.

Outside this strange fixation, which is enough to get him tossed out of the AIU (Athletes' International Union), the bantam who came back from the shadows of a merely engaging personality than he was before the accident. He smiles more readily, exhibits a new found sense of humor and generally acts like a man who is happy to be alive — as indeed, he probably is. He sits still for expansive interviews and signs autographs with relish. He has the gallery behind him as he never had before, and he should become increasingly popular with each tournament he plays.

He might even be a greater golfer than he was before he was injured. His stroking could not have improved, but during those months in an El Paso hospital he might have thought up some refinements in golfing strategy.

In many ways the way he went about beating Lloyd Mangrum and George Fazio in their play-off. Nowadays the touring men pros almost invariably "go for the flag" on every approach shot.

Through experience on the cash-and-carry circuit they know that pars are not good enough — that it takes birdies in large numbers to win nowadays.

But Ben, in the play-off, deliberately went back to the old formula — made famous by Bobby Jones — of merely shooting for the green and making certain he hit it. He knew Merion was dangerous; that a player could drop two or even three strokes by trying to cut a corner. So he shot for his pars and got 15 of them. How two birdies were that much graver. It was brainy golf and it paid off.

With the major league season more than one-fifth gone, many eyes have turned toward individuals and clubs that have come through with numerous surprises. The experts are now beginning to scratch their heads in wonderment, and several writers are worriedly thinking of their reputations and vowing not to be so hasty in the future years. This has perhaps been one of the most surprising years in major league history, although there is plenty of time for the representatives to do an "about face" and go the way that the scribes predicted. Some are sticking to their guns and claiming that "it'll happen yet," while others are feeling embarrassed and changing their minds. I, for one, am glad I was not around at the time the predictions were made, and thus did not place my head on the chopping block. My crystal gazing never was too hot, and I can readily see how the topsy-turvy pennant races would make any scribe want to leave home and take up any other occupation just to be clear of such unpredictable occurrences.

In the most recent "Sporting News," several fine articles appear that further substantiate the belief that this year's flag classes are the most backward in recent annals, and perhaps, any in history.

The Philadelphia Phillies, who have surprised the rest of the boys by coming up with a host of "bonus babies" that are really paying off, and the Chicago Cubs, are by far the two most surprising clubs in the National League.

With most outfits begrudgingly mumbling under their breath at the failure of their bonus players, the Philadelphia management has produced one of the steady organizations in the circuit—built mostly around rookies, either fresh from college or making their first stab at the majors. It just so happens that Manager Eddie Sawyer has gotten a bunch of young fellows together that have the "stuff," and want to stay on top. They realize that the only way to do so is to make the Phillies a real title contender, and that's exactly what they've done. People are already beginning to discuss that sophomore "fix" and wondering how many promising rookies of this year will be forced to drop out next campaign.

Going back to the "Sporting News," a story headlined, "Cubs Unpredictable—But Doin' Okay" credits much of the unprecedented success of Frankie Frisch's Chicagoans to the improvement of Bill Serena, ex-WT-NM league

home run leader while playing with the Lubbock Hubbers in 1946. After using Serena, Ransom Jackson and Bob Ramazzotti for varying periods, Frisch has now optioned Jackson to a lower classification and permanently turned the job over to Serena. And it seems to have had its salutary effect. His hitting has picked up perceptibly and he has been far steadier afield. On June 6, Serena proved his worth by slapping out two home runs and a single, and drawing two walks for a perfect day against the Brooklyn Dodgers. His circuits drove in four runs and gave his Cubs a 7-4 triumph in ten innings. Frisch, in speaking of Serena, said: "Our biggest problem with Serena has been to get him to play farther away from the line. He goes better to his right, and yet we have had trouble to move him over. Balls went through to his left in the earlier weeks that he should have had. But he's spearing them now, and that will make our infield so much tighter. . . . Un-expected success like that of Serena is what's keeping the Phillies and the Cubs in the race."

Then in the American League, the Detroit Tigers have been the biggest surprise to most writers and fans. But not long after the season started, most reporters saw something that stumped them as the Tigers came up with plate power plus, and most scribes rapidly changed their tunes. The chief asset of the Tigers has been their ability to win on the road, and the mound success of Art Houtteman, Hal Newhouser and Virgil Trucks. It seems as if those Bengals are up to stay this year.

The patched up Yankees have been challenged for their arnica leadership by the stumbling Boston Red Sox. The Red Sox, still failing to live up to pre-season expectations, have been plagued by a horde of injuries and are now holding a dismal third place in the tight AL league can't actually be described as "dismal," in most instances, but for the power laden Boston, it is a very disappointing position. The Yanks continue to amaze everybody by stringing along, still held together by patches and tape, and remain as still the "World Champions," and probably the team to beat when the chips are down. All this boils down to the fact that this "anatomic" baseball year is as unpredictable as the Panhandle weather. And anybody knows what that means. Best we all sit back and watch while the upside-down scramble continues.

The SARAZEN SWING

Use Only One Stance on Long Shots; It's Second in Importance to Grip

By GENE SARAZEN Winner of Them All

On and around the greens there are bound to be personal variations on copy-book form, but a golfer should use one and only one basic stance on all long shots.

The stance is second in importance only to the grip. The most common fault springs from the weird misconception that because a player has 14 clubs, he must play them with as many swings from 14 stances.

The basic stance is regulated by the length of the club. My driver, for example, is 42 1/2 inches long. The natural, the comfortable position for me on my drive is to line the ball up opposite my left heel.

As the length of my clubs grows shorter, and the arc of my swing becomes progressively more upright, I stand a little closer to the ball, and play it progressively farther to the right. I line up my five iron, for instance, from the very center of my stance.

On my nine iron, the shortest fairway club, the position of the ball is moved back to a point almost in line with my right heel. When I want to accentuate my right instep,

tee and fairway shots should be played from the square stance in which both feet are placed at right angles to the projected direction of the shots. With the feet set in this position, the hips and shoulders are also squared to the line of flight. The square stance is the golf stance.

The open and closed stances are merely variations. They should be used with great discretion, if at all.

Harvard-Educated Pigeons Put Some People to Shame

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — (AP) — Without nets — is played on a two-foot square table.

One pigeon, using his beak, tries to bat the ball past his opponent. Rallies sometimes run to three or four shots — though most are "aces." Each successful shot brings a reward of food.

In another experiment, the birds are placed on either side of a glass partition. A panel has three buttons on either side of the glass.

To receive food, both pigeons must strike simultaneously certain matching buttons in the separated cages. When they turn the trick, food pops out.

Other birds have learned to peck signs labeled "yellow," "green," "blue," and "red." — always picking the proper sign when a light of the same color is flashed on. That also brings a reward of grain.

The time tells us it is this way. If an apparatus customarily pays off 10 seconds after the signal, they learn to kill that time by doing something else.

But on the dot they're back at the feed box.

Her attorney, Ralph Morgall, in announcing her withdrawal, said the "heavy mental strain" dictated it. Nevada Republican leaders said nothing. They had shown no enthusiasm.

Everyone Wants To Be an Author

A waiter was fired from a New York restaurant. His boss—when the waiter appealed—said the fellow spent more time eyeing customers coldly and making notes than he did slinging escargots a la bourgogne (it was a very nice restaurant). Seems the man was gathering material for a book.

Twice in two days, lately, I've been a passenger in taxis when the cabbies, without urging, confided to me that they had both written books of their experiences driving around the city. One fellow wondered if it wasn't a certain publisher had accepted his manuscript when it hadn't been returned within two weeks. The other wanted to know if I knew the name of a good publisher, because HIS manuscript had just come back with a rejection slip.

I know a hairdresser who rushes home after putting the last pin curl in place and notes down all the gossip and big names he's heard all day. He's getting ready to do a memoir. Ball players, tennis players, theatrical people, impoverished nobility, ladies who have married famous men, men who have married famous ladies, stevedores, hotel keepers, jailbirds, all the politicians and the Roosevelt's apparently are bending over steeply hot typewriters, pouring out their souls.

It seems years since I've met anyone who didn't have a book in the process of creation. Fortunately, we've seen the end of the cycle of war correspondents' books. The ex-war correspondents seem to be the ones who now take a quick 10-day look-around in the scenes of past glory and return to write a definitive expose of conditions.

There are fiction and article writers, hitherto happily churning out their specialized opera, who have discovered a lazy man's method of becoming book authors. They just read over their old pieces, and paste a selection of them together with explanatory introductions on how come they wrote them. Lo, they have books under their belts.

Indisputably it's smart to be the author of a book today. But things also are coming to the point where book-writing primarily is an occupation of non-writers.

The business of putting thoughts on paper seems to be one of a very few occupations which requires little or no prior preparation. If you're an anthropologist who's discovered a new recipe for shrinking heads, or a celebrity-hunter with a memory for anecdote, all you have to do is rent a portable and start sorting out adjectives. That makes you an author.

Of course, fiction remains a field open to professional writers alone. It's a rare autobiographer who ventures into the plot-and-climax area where one is judged by one's handwork alone. An exception is a woman who wrote her memoirs, and then had to turn all the "I said" places into "Jane said," and swing a lot of real names into made-up ones. The reason was that her publishers were afraid of libel suits. But the book hasn't gone so well. Somebody said that every living soul has at least one book in him. It seems to me that before more than a couple of years are past, there will be very few people left with said stories simmering and seething in their minds. Publishers will run out of rejection slips, and the public will be surfeit of personal story, personal opinion and interpretation.

Then will come the day when we'll return to professionals of the pen and pencil, whose whole training is to turn out an impersonal, entertaining story.

Meanwhile, the presently embarrassing for anyone who has any connection with the writing business to admit one never has managed to whip out at least 60,000 words around a single subject. Thank goodness, the newspaper business remains full of dreamy souls who always are going to write a book—tomorrow.

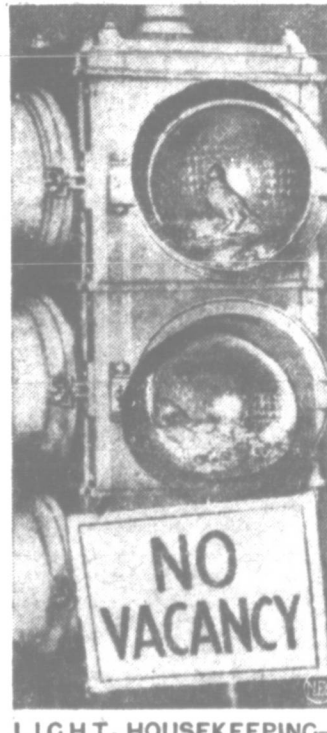

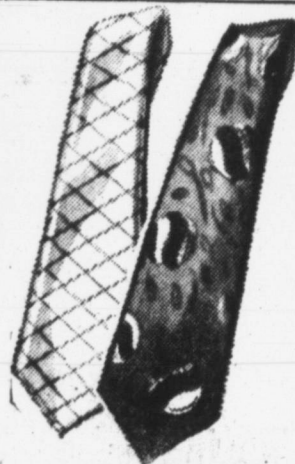
