**Express Train Fire** In Britain Is Fatal **To Five Passengers** 

BEATTOCK, Scotland Five passengers perished in ilames that raced through three coaches of a speeding Birming-ham-Glasgow express last night. Several other passengers were in-jured in the blaze.

When the flaming train — the Midland Scot — finally was flag-ged to a halt near this village, 60 miles southeast of Glasgow, the first three cars continued to burn down to the steel framework: Screaming passengers mill-ed through the smoke-filled corridors and jumped to safety as the train slowed down.



**U.S. Reds Learning Danger Of Lying, Refusing to Talk**

WASHINGTON - (P) - Communists are learning that it's ometimes more cangerous to tell lies or to refuse to talk than it to overthrow the govis to try ennment. Very few Communists have ever been convicted under statutes designed to curb subversive activities. A great many have been convicted of perjury, making false written statements or contempt of Congress.

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This new wrinkle in the atteck on American Reds recalls the similarly oblique approach which government zound effective in fighting the rackeeters of the 1930s? The government knew etty much about the crimes of the racketeers - murder, extor-tion, blackmail, etc.; yet it seldom had enough evidence to convict them.

But when the Treasury Department went after them for income tax evasion. Al Capone and some of his peers were lodged bars for long terms. It curbed their criminal activities at least for the time they were in jail, and it inspired great respect for the income tax laws. Govern-ment agents have found that bigtime bookmakers and gamblers today pay their income taxes with puritanical correctness.

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



"The Disastrous Middle Of the Road Policy"

Here is a continuation of Ludwig yon Mises' article under the heading "The Disastrous Middle

"Interventionism is not a golden mean between capitrlism and socialism. It is the design of a third system of society's economic organization and must be appreciated as such.

> "It is not the task of this discussion to raise any questions about the merits either of capitalism or of socialism. I am dealing today with interventionism alone And I do not intend to enter into an arbitrary evaluation of interventionism from any preconceived point of view. My only concern is to show how interventionism

works and whether or not it can

be considered as a pattern of a "The interventionists emphasize that they plan to retain private ownership of the means of production, entrepreneurship and market exchange. But, they go on to say, it is preemptory to prevent these capitalist institutions from spreading havoc and unfairly exploiting the majority of people. It is the duty of government to restrain by orders and prohibition, the greed of the propertied classes lest their acquisitiveness harm the poorer classes. Unhampered or laissez-faire capitalism is an evil. But in order to eliminate its evils. there is no need to abolish capitalism entirely. It is possible to improve the capitalist system by government interference with the actions of the capitalists and dentrepreneurs. Such government regulation and regimentation of business is the only method to keep off totalitarian socialism and to salvage those features of capitalism which are worth preserv-

ing. "On the ground of this philosophy, the interventionists advocate a galaxy of various measures. Let us pick out one of them, the very popular scheme of price control

"The government believes that the price of a definite commodity, e.g., milk, is too high. It wants to make it possible for the poor to give their children more milk. Thus it resorts to a price ceiling and fixes the price of milk at a lower rate than that prevailing on the free market. The result is that the marginal producers of

milk, those producing at the highest cost, now incur losses. As no individual farmer or businessman can go on producing at a loss, these marginal producers stop producing and selling milk on the market. They will use their cows and their skill for other more profitable purposes. They will, for example, produce butter, cheese or meat. There will be less milk available for the consumers, not more. This, of course is contrary to the intentions of the govern-



WRITTEN FOR NEA The season for hay fever is about to begin. Some unfortunate

people start with their sneezing and running noses in the early spring and keep it up almost continuously until late fall. This deplorable situation is usually the result of being sensitive

to a great deal many different pollens from growing things. In many areas trees are the first of the pollens likely to cause trouble. These are followed by the grasses-and occasionally other plants pollinating at the same season-and ending up with the ragweeds which are the worst of

The tree pollens are not as common sources of difficulty as either the grasses or the ragweeds. Although the pines and their relatives are great pollen producers they do not usually cause allergic symptons. Most of the hay fever caused by tree pollens can be traced to the hardwood trees and to some of the






