Senate Can Work Like Fury When—and if—it Wants To

WASHINGTON — (AP)—When the Senate wants to, it can pass bills like fury. Of course, it doesn't often want to. Yesterday it wanted to. In four hours and a half the Senate whirled through 24 bills. In one inspired minute, between 2:11 and 2:12 p. m., it passed six bills. That's an average of one every 10 seconds. All these bills aren't of earth-shaking importance, naturally. But they may be important to the individual concerned. Take Lydon F. Hibberd of Route 4, Elizabethtown, Ky. He was driving happily along the road, doing 40 m. p. h., when he was stopped by a government truck on a business. He popped into Hibberd's car, damaging it to the tune of \$21.85. The Senate handed down the verdict: pay that man \$21.85. Hibberd still is quite a way from Uncle Sam's cash register. The House must pass the bill, and President Truman must sign it, before it's a law of the land. Or take the case of Dr. Ta Fu Wu. He's a Chungking, China, boy who is making good at St. Anne's Hospital in Fall River, Mass. The Senate decided he should be given special permission to stay in this country. Here again the House and Mr. Truman still must give their okay. On a day like yesterday—officially it's "legislation day"—the legislation supposedly is non-controversial. When a bill comes up, the title is read and senators are given a chance to object. One objection is enough to stop the bill. If no one says anything, the bill passes.

Search Underway For Naval Craft
NORFOLK, Va. — (AP)—A Navy Grumman torpedo bomber with a crew of three is down in the Atlantic about 70 miles east of Cape Henry and a massive aerial and surface search is under way.

The TBM was on anti-submarine training maneuvers with three other craft from the Norfolk Naval Air Station's composite Squadron 24. At 11:25 p. m. (CST) — the other planes radioed a submarine operating in the area that one had gone down. There was no fire. Six ships, including five submarines and a submarine rescue vessel and 75 planes are conducting the search.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Bridge Finesses Are Trees That Hide in the Forest

The trouble with some bridge players is that they can't see the forest for the trees. They see each suit as an individual problem, but they have no picture of the hand as a whole. This type of blindness is illustrated in today's hand. If West had been lucky enough to hit upon a heart opening, declarer's hash would have been settled immediately. He would have lost a trick in each suit. As it happened, West opened the eight of clubs. Dummy played low, East finessed the ten, and South won with the king of clubs. At this point, South saw that his best chance to make the maximum number of tricks in spades was to take a finesse. Likewise, his best chance to get the maximum number of tricks in hearts was to take a finesse in that suit. South did not stop to think about the hand as a whole. He proceeded to take a finesse in hearts with the intention of finessing the spades on the way back. The heart finesse lost to East's king. East returned a trump, and South finessed again, losing to West's queen. The defenders then had no trouble cashing their two aces. The contract was therefore defeated. If South had considered the hand as a whole, he would have realized that the correct line of play was to take no finesses at all. The contract would then be virtually assured. South should lay down the ace and king of spades at the second and third tricks. He then leads a diamond with the intention of continuing the suit until the ace is forced out. This plan sets up a diamond in dummy on which South can discard his losing heart. Declarer therefore loses only one diamond, one club and one trump.

Preucil, Josef Nestaval, Dr. Jiri Hejda and Antonie Kleinerova. The prosecution charged that Hejda, a former factory owner, had worked out the program to copy the communication of the nation. "This program," the prosecution said, "clearly showed that their aim was to restore capitalism, fascize public life and in the end marshallize the country and put an end to its independence. It was a criminal program which the whole underground organization wanted, to effect an imperial intervention by the imperialists."

The state said Preucil headed a spy ring that collected data about munition works and other state secrets. Nestaval was referred to as a "leading figure of the criminal underground organization."

Other sentences were listed as: Bedrich Hosticka, 28 years; Zdenek Peska, 28 years; Jiri Krizek, 22 years; Frantiska Zeminova, 20 years; and Vojtech Dundr, 20 years, all at hard labor.

Most of the defendants were members of the National Socialist Party which has been outlawed by the Communist-led state. It was the party of the late President Eduard Benes. All the defendants were sentenced to loss of property and their civil rights. A 500,000-crown (\$10,000) fine was imposed on Hejda. Krizek, a former legal adviser to the British Embassy, was fined 150,000 crowns.

MOSCOW — (AP)—Finland's prime minister, Urho Kekkonen, arrived in Moscow today to sign a new five-year Finnish-Soviet trade pact.

Four Linemen Die In Georgia Mishap

PEARSON, Ga. — (AP)—A high voltage power line snapped and fell to the rain-soaked ground yesterday, and electrocuted four linemen. Two other crewmen were outside the charged area and escaped injury. The six-man crew was relocating a Georgia Power and Light Company line along a newly constructed highway between Pearson and Cogdell. A pole they were erecting in a driving rain broke a 2,000-volt line. The electrical charge killed the four almost instantly. Those killed were O. A. Odum, 48, C. M. Brooker, J. L. Liles, Jr., 24, and C. E. Brown. The linemen who escaped unhurt are J. D. Williams and W. H. Bennett. All were residents of Waycross, Ga.

"What's more, she predicts the next trend in feminine fashions will be toward concealment. "Women have gone to extremes in nudity," said the former school marm from Denton, Texas. "They have lost the art of glamor, which is concealment, not revelation. "Most of the offenders are the TV gals who vie to see who



can wear the lowest gowns. That, coupled with the fad of French bathing suits, has worked to eliminate whatever mystery existed about the feminine form. "The glamor girls of video (notably Faye Emerson) have been feigning gowns cut to amazing new lows. But Miss Sheridan indicated this trend will be stopped. "A woman's eyes are her greatest attraction," she expounded. "She can create much more attention with her eyes than being half-dressed. "Women will have to learn to use their eyes and their voices again, because television must eventually be censored. "Actually it's personality that counts. 15-Year-Old Boy Wins Acquittal

CHARLESTON, W. Va. — (AP) — Fifteen-year-old Jimmy Basham, who was charged with the slaying of his father, was acquitted today by a jury in a court room here. Express Train Fire In Britain Is Fatal To Five Passengers

BEATOCK, Scotland — (AP) — Five passengers perished in flames that raced through three coaches of a speeding Birmingham-Glasgow express last night. Several other passengers were injured in the blaze.

When the flaming train — the Midland Scot — finally was flagged to a halt near this village, 87 miles southeast of Glasgow, the first three cars continued to burn down to the steel framework. Screaming passengers milled through the smoke-filled corridors and jumped to safety as the train slowed down.

The dead — a man, two women and two children were found in a compartment in the first coach behind the engine. Their bodies were so badly burned that immediate identification was impossible.

Witnesses said air currents sent the flames whipping through the corridors as the blazing train roared through the night — its engineer unaware of the disaster aboard. British railroad cars are divided into small compartments connected by a narrow, passage-way.

Adam Moffatt, a track worker, spotted the flaming coaches as the train sped towards Beatock and flagged it to a halt.

Screaming women passengers scrambled out. Moffatt dragged to safety one elderly woman passenger who had collapsed in a smoke-filled passage.

Police later searched the smoldering wreckage for jewelry valued at 10,000 pounds (\$28,000) reported lost in the blaze.

Convicted Attacker Dies In Chair at Texas Prison

HUNTSVILLE — (AP) — Claiming innocence to the last, William R. Ray was executed early today for rape of a nine-year-old girl in a Fort Worth park in 1948.

The execution took place despite a weird involved maneuvering in his trials and appeals, two reprieves and a last-minute, desperate attempt to get his sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

Officers said he admitted his guilt at one time, but he had pleaded innocent in court. His attorneys said the admission of guilt had been obtained by coercion.

Twice the 35-year-old ex-Air Force cook had narrowly escaped the death chamber — once through a court error and once through a plea by his victim's parents.

A long series of attempts were made — the latest a few hours before he was strapped in the chair — to get his sentence changed to life imprisonment.

"Well, I'm dying for something I don't know anything about," was his final statement. Ray entered the death chamber at 12:02 a.m. The current was applied at 12:05 and he was dead three minutes later.

Relatives, including his mother, Mrs. Edna Ray of Vernon, who had visited him a few hours before the execution kept a death watch on the sidewalk outside the prison.

His last visitor was Prison Chaplain B. C. Anderson who went to the death cell at 11:30 p.m. The chaplain read the 19th and 103rd Psalms and the 14th chapter of St. John — which says in part: "let not your heart be troubled."

The body was taken to the Huntsville Funeral Home. Early today no arrangements had been made for burial.

Roy Starnes of Corsicans, a Church of Christ evangelist, visited Ray about 9 p.m. "My heart is with God and I am ready," he quoted Ray as saying. "My sentence may be commuted but I could die in three months, so I think it is better this way."

While Ray spent his last day talking and praying in the death cell, his attorneys fought for a last minute reprieve.

Doyle Pevehouse of Corsicans went to Galveston yesterday and presented Federal Judge T. M. Kennerly with two writs designed to win another stay. Kennerly refused to take any action.

Then Pevehouse left Galveston with the reported intention of finding some other federal judge who might help Ray. Pevehouse contacted Federal Judge Allan Hannay but was advised that Kennerly handled such matters.

On April 8, 1948, Ray raped the little girl in a secluded Fort Worth park. He was convicted nearly two years ago.

He missed the electric chair the first time when an omission was discovered in the trial court records, after the Court of Criminal Appeals had affirmed the death verdict.

Ray was saved the second time last May 19, seven hours before he was to die, when the parents of his victim asked that the sentence be commuted to life imprisonment. The pardon board granted a 20-day reprieve. Later the parents withdrew their plea. Since then the pardon board has been silent on the case.

Cards Stacked Against Him

BLATIMORE — (AP) — The story of a gamblers' gun duel — in which the cards were stacked for death — was recounted in police court last night.

James Singletary, 26, was given a preliminary hearing on a charge of shooting and killing Ben Jones, 29.

Before Singletary was held without bail for grand jury action, Patrolman Harry Bannon testified witnesses gave this account of the shooting:

The two men got into a quarrel while gambling in a card game. They agreed to go home, get pistols, and decide the issue. They met on a South Baltimore street. Both drew their weapons.

Video Called Boost To Soft Drink Sales

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — People are buying their soft drinks by the case and drinking them at home these days, says Alfred N. Steele.

Steele, president of Pepsi-Cola Co., says television is responsible. People like to sit around their TV sets sipping a soft drink, he claims.

"You can't sit around all evening before a TV set with a glass of whisky in your hand," he reasons. "You'd fall out of your chair."

2-5 Years Given Youth in Slaying Of Father, 63 PITTSBURGH — (AP) — Twenty-two-year-old Vincent Kos must serve from two to five years in prison for killing his father because "he was raising hell all the time."

Kos, who pleaded guilty to a general charge of murder in the shooting last February 20 of his 43-year-old father, Matthew, at nearby Cuddy, was adjudged guilty of involuntary manslaughter.

Under Pennsylvania law, a guilty plea to a murder charge calls for the presiding judge to hear testimony, adjudge degree of guilt and fix sentence.

Young Kos — one of 13 children — told Judge John P. Egan that on the day of the shooting he heard repeated bickering between his father and other members of the family.

"That night, Kos said, he got a revolver and went to his father's room, adding: "Something snapped in me right then. Something drove me to kill him. I walked into his room and told him, 'I am going to kill you.' He said, 'What? Then I shot him.'"

Cornerstone Rites Lack Just One Thing SEWANEE, Tenn. — (AP) — One of the biggest questions making the rounds here is: "who has the cornerstone?"

Dr. Boylston Green, vice-chancellor of the University of the South, said last night the 200-pound piece of polished marble had vanished.

It was to be dedicated in formal ceremonies Sunday commemorating the erection of the \$300,000 Gallor Memorial Dining Hall.

Green said the stone was placed near the building Wednesday afternoon but was reported missing Thursday morning.

"If students took it, I think it is a clever prank and someone will bring it back," the chancellor said.

He did not say if Sunday's schedule will be interrupted if the stone is not found.

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U.S. Reds Learning Danger Of Lying, Refusing to Talk

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Communists are learning that it's sometimes more dangerous to tell lies or to refuse to talk than it is to try to overthrow the government. Very few Communists have ever been convicted under statutes designed to curb subversive activities. A great many have been convicted of perjury, making false written statements or contempt of Congress.

This new wrinkle in the attack on American Reds recalls the similarly oblique approach which the government found effective in fighting the racketeers of the 1930s: The government knew pretty much about the crimes of the racketeers — murder, extortion, blackmail, etc.; yet it seldom had enough evidence to convict them.

But when the Treasury Department went after them for income tax evasion, Al Capone and some of his peers were lodged behind bars for long terms. It curbed their criminal activities at least for the time they were in jail, and it inspired great respect for the income tax laws. Government agents have found that big-time bookmakers and gamblers today pay their income taxes with punitical correctness.

The Federal government has about 28 statutes intended in one way or another to make subversive activities illegal — from the Smith Act, which forbids conspiracies to overthrow the government by force, to the law which forbids mailing indecent literature. (Subversive literature is defined as indecent.)

The Communists are careful not to get caught violating these statutes. He only persons who have ever been convicted for Communist activities, as such, were the 11 Red leaders who were convicted recently in New York un-

der the Smith Act. Some notable characters, how-

have recently been convicted citizenship papers in 1950. Alger Hiss's conviction was for perjury (lying orally while under oath) or of making false written affidavits. Harry Bridges, president of the CIO Longshoremen's Union, was convicted in April in a West Coast federal court and sentenced to five years. He was charged with lying when he swore he never had been a Communist when he applied for natural-

ization papers in 1948. Large could be pressed because the legal three-year limit for prosecution had passed. Persons convicted of lying under oath regarding Communist activity include Harold R. Christoffel, a former president of a labor union at the Allis-Chalmers plant in Milwaukee; and Carl Aldo Marzani, a former State Depart-

ment employee. Dozens of witnesses before Congressional committees who refused to say whether they were Communists have been convicted in the past few years. Since 1948 there have been 34 such convictions in Washington alone. The act making contempt of Congress a crime was passed in 1857. There have been more convictions under that act in the past two years than all its previous history. "What effect are these convictions having on Communists?" this reporter asked George Morris Fay, U. S. attorney for the District of Columbia. "These particular defendants will have a greater respect for congressional committees," Fay replied. "And these convictions should deter others from committing perjury or exhibiting disrespect for authority."

The SARAZEN SWING

Right Hand Too Far Over Shaft Spells Slice, Too Far Under Hook

By GENE SARAZEN
Winner of Them All

Mistakes made with the right hand result from placing it too far over or under the shaft. The one causes a slice, the other a hook.

A simple check to make sure your right hand is in the correct position is to see that the V formed by the thumb and index finger points directly toward the right shoulder.

In 1930 I discovered a major fault in the grip of my right hand. Studying slow-motion movies, I detected that at the top of the backswing I was allowing the club to slide from its original position in my fingers.

No wonder I was developing blisters along the palm and above the thumb. The club was slipping in my hand.

It was only through months of swinging the heavy practice club that I was able to strengthen my grip with my right hand so that my thumb and index and middle fingers — the key fingers — were welded to the club throughout the swing.

A description of the roles played by the hands doesn't mean that you should consciously think of them as the guide and powerhouse when you are playing. Understanding their functions, however, you will be able to detect the cause of your errors and correct them on the practice fairway.

During the course of a round, a player should check his grip and stance before each stroke, but his concentration should be completely on the shot.

NEXT: One basic stance on all long shots.

Coal Official Ponders Job Of Dickering With John L.

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — Would you take on the ticklish job of handling John L. Lewis at coal contract time for from \$50,000 to \$65,000 a year?

That's the question a Pittsburgh industrialist is debating these days.

He is Henry M. Moses, picked by fellow coal operators to head a new permanent association of coal mine owners. They want a central figure to take over the task of negotiating with Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers.

Moses, boss of most of the United States Steel Corporation's coal mining operations, hasn't said yes or no. But his friends and associates in the coal industry predict he'll take the job.

Moses is president of the H. C. Frick Coke Company, a "Big Steel" subsidiary. If he quits to run the newly organized Bitum-

inous (soft coal) Operators Association, one of his main jobs will be dealing with Lewis.

Operator associations in Central and Western Pennsylvania, Northern West Virginia and Ohio set up the new agency. They hope other operator groups will come into the fold. Illinois and Indiana men still are pondering an invitation. So are captive mine owners. They are steel companies whose coal is kept off the commercial market.

Soft coal operators now in the association account for about 150,000,000 tons of annual production. That compares with the nation's total output last year of around 430,000,000 tons.

If Illinois and Indiana operators sign up, the association will represent about half the nation's coal mining capacity.

Lewis, once charged that Moses was preventing a contract settlement by wielding the power of U. S. Steel, returned Moses.

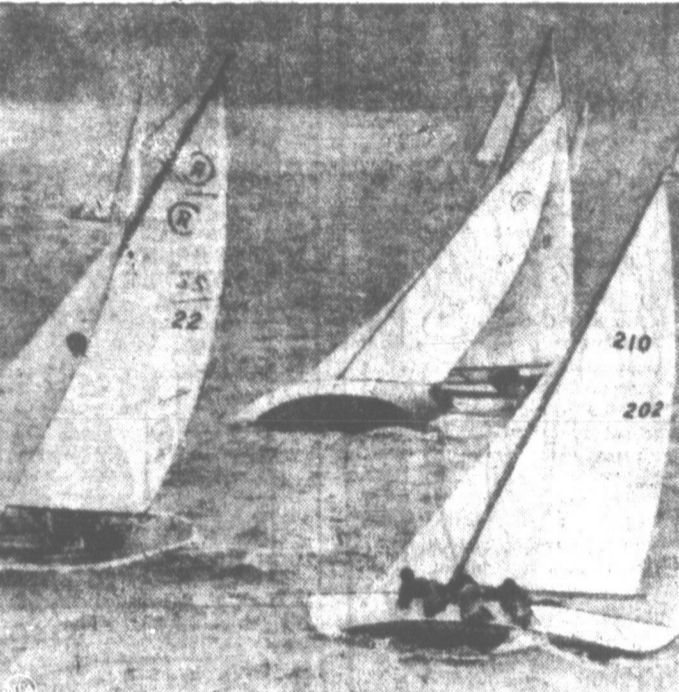

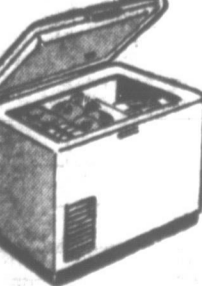

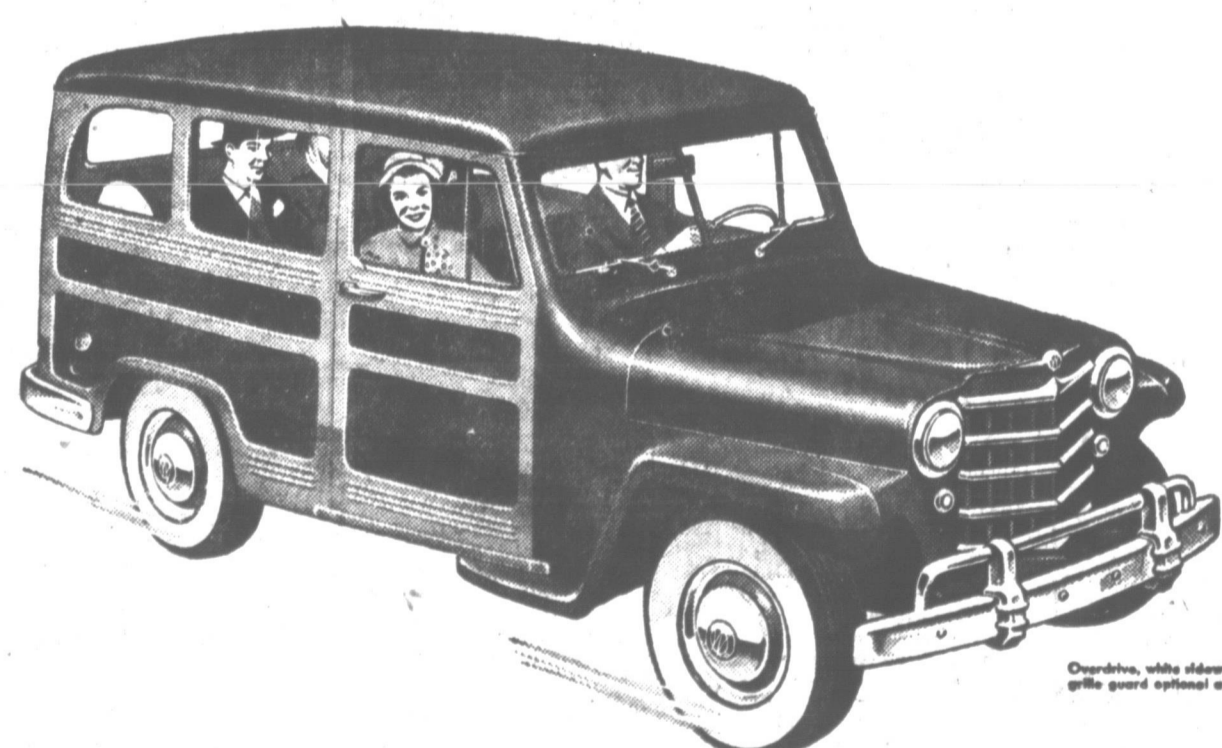
Border patrolmen in South Texas arrested 19,362 aliens during May, he said, exceeding the total for April by 200 arrests.

Apprehensions during the first eleven months of the 1949-50 year have already exceeded the previous high figure of 168,381 arrests made during the entire 1948-49 period.

The Rio Grande Valley was the scene of a large share of alien arrests. He said 15,754 aliens were taken in Cameron, Hidalgo, Willacy, Starr, Brooks and Kleberg counties. It was reported the Del Rio sector of the San Antonio district accounted for 1774 and 824 were detained in the Laredo area.

U.S. Is Sending Anti-Tank Weapons to Western Europe

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States reportedly is shipping some of its best anti-tank weapons to those European allies which might be in the path of massive Soviet armored forces in a future war.

Defense officials said the weapons — bound mostly for France under the arms aid program — include bazookas, rocket launchers, and powerful recoilless rifles which are still in the secret stage.

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At the same time, the U.S. Army is pressing a long-range program aimed at countering the threat of Russia's potent armored forces by the "development and limited production of a family of tanks superior to those of any possible future enemy."

Officials told a reporter that U.S. medium tanks — including some modernized World War II types — are among the weapons being sent to Europe under the arms program.

The Senate Armed Forces and Foreign Relations Committees are holding joint hearings on the administration's request for \$1,222,500,000 for a second year of that program to rearm this country's friends abroad.

Senator Lodge (R-Mass.), a foreign relations member, told reporters that this program "is

the most practical step toward world peace we can take at present."

Lodge, an Army officer in World War II, said that under the arms program "within three or four years Western Europe can be made an unattractive target for Russian aggression — and without bankrupting the United States." He added:

"If we do nothing we run a very real risk of World War III."

Gen. George C. Marshall, wartime Army chief of staff and former secretary of state, said much the same thing in testimony before the House Foreign Affairs Committee, which also is considering the second-year arms aid bill.

Marshall acknowledged that there is some danger Russia will strike before Western Europe reaches peak military strength. "But," he said, "I am convinced that to sit impotent is the most dangerous thing we can do."

Marshall also met behind closed doors with the two Senate committees. One senator afterwards quoted the general as saying there is a second danger in the arms program: that this country may rearm some nation which ultimately will elect a Communist government.

The senator, who asked not to be quoted by name, said:

"Marshall said that was a calculated risk that must be taken — but that the risk was worth the gamble."

On the question of armored strength, military officials estimate that Russia and its satellites have more than 40,000 medium and heavy tanks of all types — compared with about 6,000 combat-worthy U.S. medium and light tanks.

While the Army has ordered production of what it considers the best light tank in the world, it says it will be years before enough of these are delivered to equip all units which will use them.

PASADENA, Calif. — (AP) — Some months ago, the Sunny Slope Water Co. erected a 70-foot water tower in an exclusive residential area and painted it yellow.

A howl arose that eventually led to official action. The regional planning commission ordered the construction permit revoked. Finally, yesterday, the board of supervisors ordered the water tower torn down.

Some people just don't like yellow.

This tank will carry a weapon able to knock out any known tractor vehicle.

It is known that the new recoilless rifle — light enough to be carried by two men and reportedly powerful enough to knock out a tank — comes in 57 and 75 millimeter sizes.

The 57 millimeter rifle, it has been disclosed officially, has a range of more than two miles. The 75 can fire about four miles.
