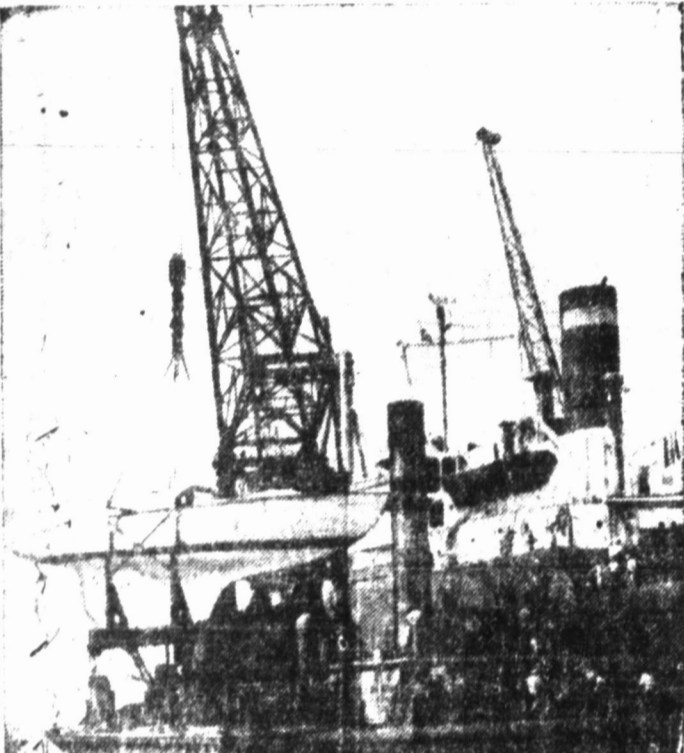




Scientist Will Try To See the Light, Fire-Fly's, That Is

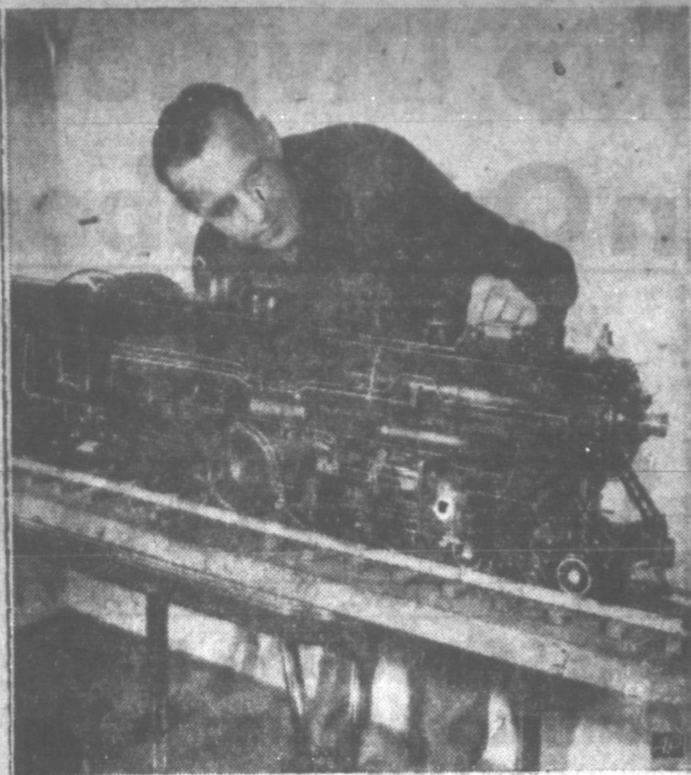

"She was my first girl friend," sighed Donald Bookwalter, 23, at his arraignment yesterday. It was "to prove my love" for attractive, brunette Margaret Sweet, 20, that the former department store messenger from Sacramento, Calif., robbed a branch of the Bank of America of \$1,600 Monday, he testified. Bookwalter said he met Miss Sweet, a taxi dancer, at a ballroom 10 days ago. He spent \$50 to \$70 a night, dancing only with her until his funds ran low. When he bought her a horse, saddle and riding habit after the holdup, she became suspicious. A newspaper description of the robber seemed to fit him, she said, and she asked him to drive her to the police station. She came out with officers, who made the arrest.

French Bill to Ban Coca Cola Defeated

PARIS — (AP) — Parliament's upper house last night defeated legislation aimed at banning Coca Cola, criticized by conservative wine growers and anti-American Communists as a threat to French drinking habits. The bill was approved by the National Assembly, the lower house, last February. The assembly could enact the cola ban over the opposition of the Council of the Republic but parliamentary observers agreed the action last night virtually killed the bill.

Prospective Voter Should Use Caution

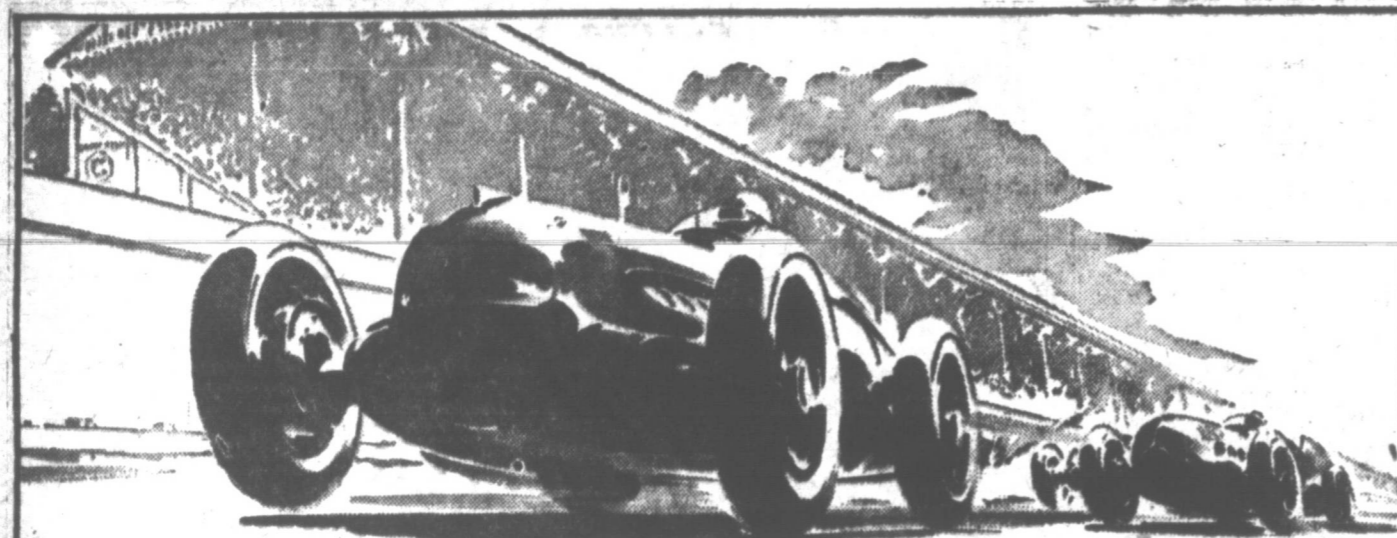

Bond Issues Set Record in State

AUSTIN — (AP) — A record amount of bonds has been issued by political agencies of the state in the first nine months of the fiscal year, Attorney General Price Daniel reported. A total of \$216,465,546 worth of negotiable bonds has been examined and approved by the attorney general's office, which must approve legality of such bonds. The state, counties, school districts and cities have issued the bonds for public purposes. A record total of \$11,675,092 in bonds was approved during April. Assistant Attorney General George W. Sparks, head of the bond division, reported. School districts usually account for the bulk of bond issues but counties set the pace in April as Harris County released three issues amounting to \$13,500,000 at one time. Issuance of \$10,000,000 in veterans' land bonds by the state also contributed to the April record. Bond issues by political divisions, for April: counties, \$14,913,992; State of Texas veterans' land bonds, \$10,000,000; school districts, \$8,218,400; cities and towns, \$8,127,500; state colleges, \$350,000; junior-college districts, \$70,200.

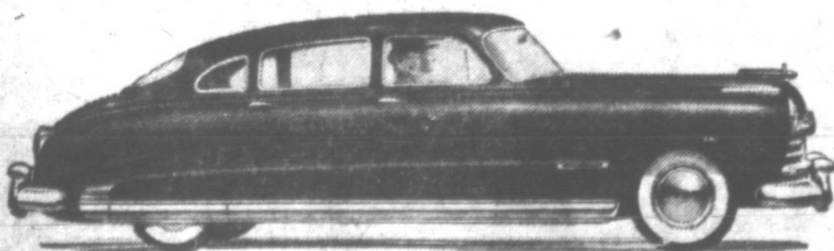

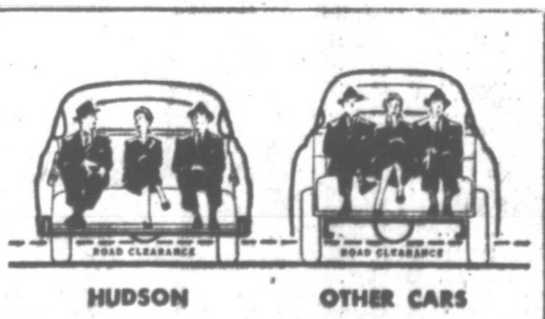

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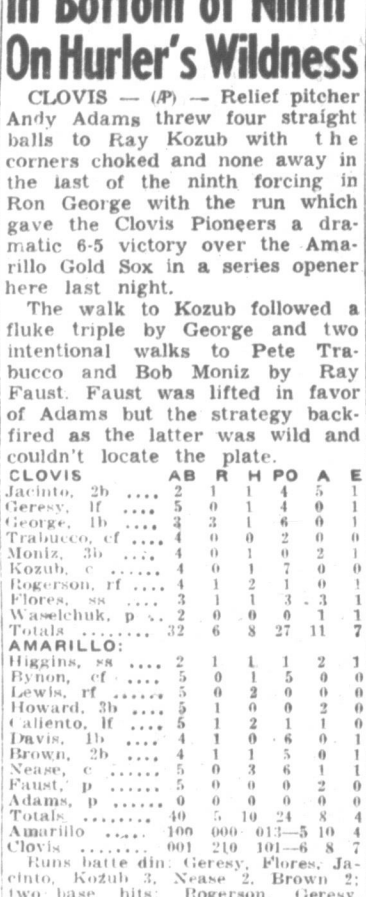
Little League Will Send Players Back To School on Time

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. (NEA) — The world championships of Little League baseball will be held at Williamsport, Pa., Aug. 23 to 26, permitting all boys to be home in time for the opening of school.

More than 2000 teams representing 37 states will go into action in late April to determine regional championships throughout the summer. Overlapping Grip Should Be Used By Players With Good-Sized Hands



HONEST HANDS—With the club in the left hand, thumb on the shaft, place the little finger of the right over the left, in the depression between the index and middle finger for the overlapping grip.

Until the advent of Harry Vardon, the grip used in golf was the St. Andrews.

More or less a baseball grip in which both hands were placed on the shaft with no interrelationship, the St. Andrews grip pushed a player into an open stance.

The two made for inconsistency unless a gofer was able to practice or play at least three times a week.

Vardon believed in honest hands — that the left should know what the right was doing. He believed that they should work together as a unit.

Vardon's hands were abnormally large, his little finger larger than the average person's middle finger.

The British master developed the grip which we call the overlapping, or Vardon, in which the hands are joined by placing the little finger of the right over the left, in the depression between the index and middle finger. The left thumb is on the shaft.

This grip was popularized by Vardon's exploits, used by almost all the champions of the subsequent eras — Hagen, Jones, Armstrong, Joyce, Withered, Nelson, Hogan and Snead.

Word has reached us of several ex-West Texas New Mexico League players and their recent accomplishments. First, an ex-Oiler whom local fans have been watching in his climb for the top - Warren Hacker - has compiled a record of four wins and only one loss for Springfield, of the Class AAA International League. Warren Oiler stood out in 1946, tossed in a doubleheader Sunday, May 28, and went all the way, tossing a three hit shutout to beat Syracuse, 10-0. In the seven inning tilt, Hacker did not walk a man and fanned six. He also contributed one single in four trips.

Last year, Hacker won 5 and lost 3 for the Chicago Cubs, after getting a late start. He was expected to be a mainstay this year, but was farmed to the rugged International League for experience.

Also in 1946, Wild Bill Evans, speedy fastballer, was starring for the Amarillo Gold Sox. Evans, it appears, isn't doing so good for Sacramento in the Pacific Coast circuit. Wild Bill has eight losses charged against him, and only four wins. In his last start, on May 26, he lost to Oakland in 13 innings, 2 to 1. In his last five games, Evans has allowed only six runs, but has lost four out of the five. That's pretty tough luck, but the Sacramento managerial staff seems to recognize the facts, and appears to still have quite an interest in the ex-Amarillo.

NM League standouts also produced two stellar first basemen who have attempted a climb to the top. Danny Ozark, former Cleveland Blue Sox infielder, has been seeing very little action for St. Paul of the International League, and last week was optioned to Elmira of the Class A Eastern League. The other first baseman, Gordon Goldberry, who is considerably younger than Ozark, has apparently been doing all right for himself. He is currently hitting at a .267 clip for the Chicago White Sox in the American League. This, incidentally is seven percentage points higher than Cleveland manager Lou Boudreau, and also outshines averages sported by the highly publicized Luke Easter also of the Indians (.230), Luke Appling of Chicago (.230), and Joe Gordon another Cleveland Tribe member who is clipping at a .229 pace.

In the other major league circuit, the National League, Bill Serena seems to have earned himself the regular third baseman's job with the Chicago Cubs. Serena led the WT-NM League in home runs in 1947 while playing with the Lubbock Lubbers. He is, at the present, hitting .222, and has blasted only one four bagger. He has seven runs batted in to his credit.

Pennsylvania Area Launches Campaign for Very Survival

SCRANTON, Pa. — (AP) — Civic leaders called on the 300,000 residents of the Lackawanna Valley today for "total mobilization" to keep this once wealthy region from economic collapse.

Population has been declining as the anthracite coal industry lost ground to competing fuels. Preliminary figures from the 1950 census show a total of 125,080 residents, down 11 percent from 1940. Will cost Scranton its place as Pennsylvania's third city.

Miners lost their jobs and, unable to find new ones, moved away with their families.

A city-wide drive begun about six years ago brought many new industries but not enough to keep pace.

As a symbol of the optimism of the leaders in the mobilization drive, the new campaign itself is known as "LIFE." The letters stand for Lackawanna Industrial Fund Enterprise.

Co-chairmen of the LIFE campaign are Frank C. Walker, former postmaster general, and Ralph H. Weeks, former president of the International Correspondence Schools. They are leading a drive to raise \$2,000,000.

The money is to be used to lure new industries into Scranton. And with the new industries, Weeks and Walker hope, will come more jobs and more residents.

Lackawanna County is on the threshold of a new era," Weeks said.

But, he warned: "If we do not reach our goal, we can expect to face a very unpleasant task in the form of mounting unemployment rolls and diminishing business activity."

A community challenge confronts each one of us. Our answer, the answer of labor, the industrialists, the professions, the businessmen and every person in the county with earned income, is total mobilization in support of the LIFE campaign.

A huge rally at the Masonic Temple Wednesday night will serve as the kickoff for the LIFE campaign. Weeks said the drive won't end until the \$2,000,000 is raised.

One Killed, Three Wounded In Gotham Holdup Attempt

NEW YORK — (AP) — A running gun battle between police and holdup men in the Greenwich Village night club belt early yesterday left one bandit dead and two bandits and a bystander wounded.

Two patrons were slugged on the head with gun butts when they resisted three holdup men who invaded the Little Casino Cafe and fled without loot.

Dozens of persons in the crowded neighborhood ducked into doorways as a score of shots were exchanged.

Twenty-five patrons of the cafe, who witnessed the frustrated holdup, poured out into the street in fighting mood.

Two of the bandits were wounded and captured after their

getaway car, crashed in a construction derrick near Washington Square.

The third fugitive ran into a death trap when he sought refuge in the kitchen of an almost empty cafe nearby, the fashionable Salle Des Champagnes. He was shot to death there when he was trapped by two policemen and came out shooting.

A patrolman, hearing the robbers shooting in the Little Casino, engaged them in battle as they fled in their car. He wounded two of them. Two other policemen then joined the chase.

The dead man was identified by police as Harold A. Sellers, 20, of Brooklyn.

The wounded were identified as: Ralph Chirlies, 19, of Brooklyn, one of the alleged robbers, wounded in the right arm.

John Penna, 25, of Queens, another alleged robber, in serious condition from wounds in the back and right arm.

Louis La Presto, 43, of Manhattan, the bystander, was in serious condition with a bullet wound in the head. Police said he was shot by one of the gunmen to cover their escape from the Casino.

The holdup was thwarted when the bandits pulled guns and ordered the manager and patrons to line up about 12:30 a. m. (EST). Confusion broke out, and one of the robbers fired shots into the ceiling and slugged the two patrons. The robbers, apparently fearing capture, gave up their attempt to obtain money, and made a desperate attempt to escape.

11 Solons Urge Peace Action

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Seven senators and four representatives proposed yesterday that the United Nations call an immediate disarmament conference.

The 11 lawmakers offered a resolution which would pledge the United States to turn over to the U. N. for peace development the funds that would be saved in the next five years by any workable disarmament agreement.

Signers were Senators McMahon (D-Conn.), Magnuson (D-Wash.), Fulbright (D-Ark), Morse (R-Ore), Sparkman (D-Ala), Gillette (D-Iowa), and Henderickson (R-NJ), and Reps. Price (D-Ill.), Henry Jackson (D-Wash), Eaton (R-NJ) and Cole (R-Ny).

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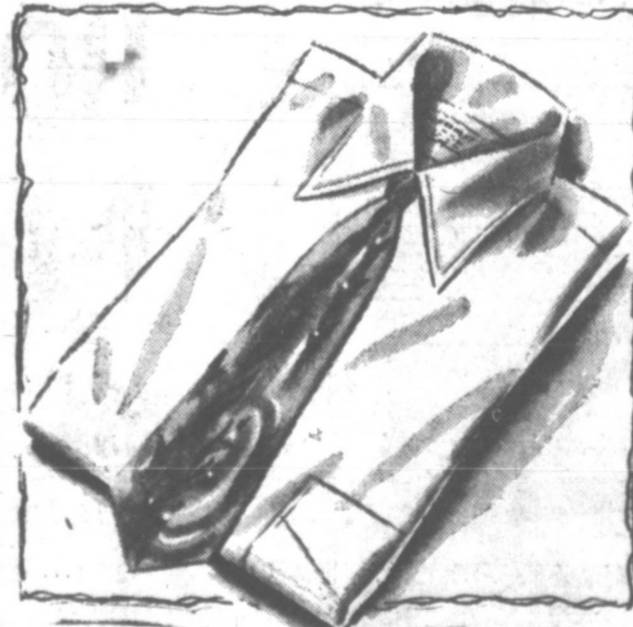
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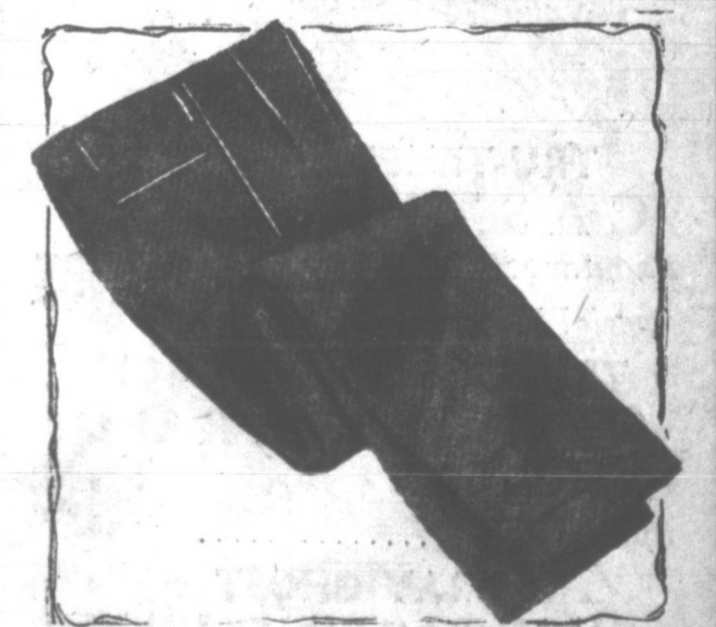
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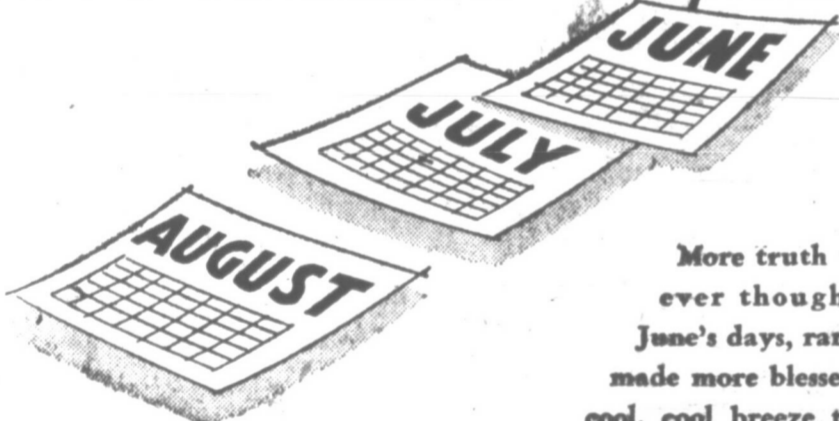
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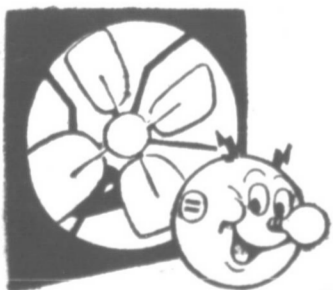

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Scientific Ground Warfare Termed Great Allied Need

WEST POINT — (AP) — Secretary of the Army Frank Pace, Jr. told the 571 graduates of the U.S. Military Academy yesterday that the western allies must depend on "highly scientific ground troops" to meet the numerical superiority of potential enemies.

After the presentation of diplomas at the traditional ceremony in the academy field house, the graduates hurled their caps in the air.

The crowd of 10,000 cheered the number one graduate, William B. De Graf, 24, of San Francisco. De Graf, World War II holder of the Bronze Star and Purple Heart, served as a first lieutenant in the 36th Division in the China-Burma-India theater.

Manager Appointed For Dallas Hospital

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Dr. Frederic R. Eastland, 48, is the new manager of the Veterans Administration hospital at Dallas.

The VA announced yesterday that the former chief of professional services at the VA hospital, Lake City, Fla., would take the place of J. Ralston Wells. Wells has been made manager of the new VA hospital under construction at Grand Island, Neb.

Texan's Miniature Railroad Gives Way to Age of Flying

A fast-look around the state: For 12 years a miniature railroad carried passengers around the 18-acre estate of Dr. E. O. Rushing at Dallas. It had two miles of track. A kerosene-burning locomotive named "Armo" pulled nine cars with a total capacity of 16 passengers. A block signal system operated blinkers at six road crossings. Also there were two steel trestles across a creek. But the other day, Dr. Rushing sold the whole railroad, which had been his pride. The reason: the doc has become interested in flying.

A tire blew out 180 miles from the finish line when he was less than three minutes behind the leader. The car shuddered, rumbled off the road, and came to a stop on the slanting brink of a 2,000-foot precipice. Johnson said he could have pushed the car with one hand and sent it rolling down the cliff.

State Seeking Office Space

AUSTIN — (AP) — Need for state-owned office space will be studied by the staff of the newly-created Legislative Budget Board.

McGee offered a tentative plan which would utilize money now being paid out in rent by state agencies, to finance a bond issue.

McGee reported that the state pays out \$230,000 a year in rent for office space.

The board also took these actions: Authorized transfer of unspent funds at the State Training School for Negro Girls at Brady at the end of the fiscal year, Aug. 31, to be used in construction of a new school for the same purpose. The school is scheduled to be transferred from Brady to Crockett.

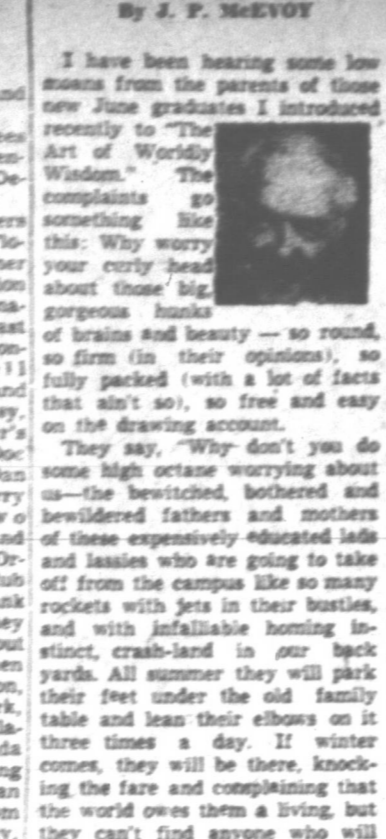

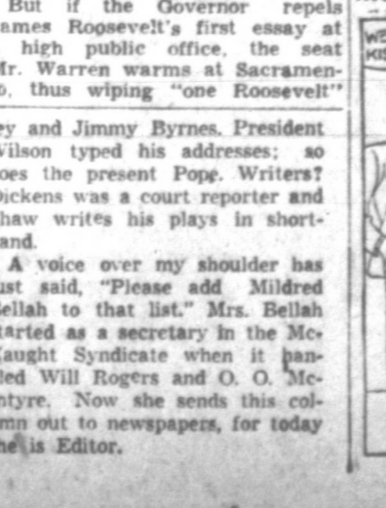

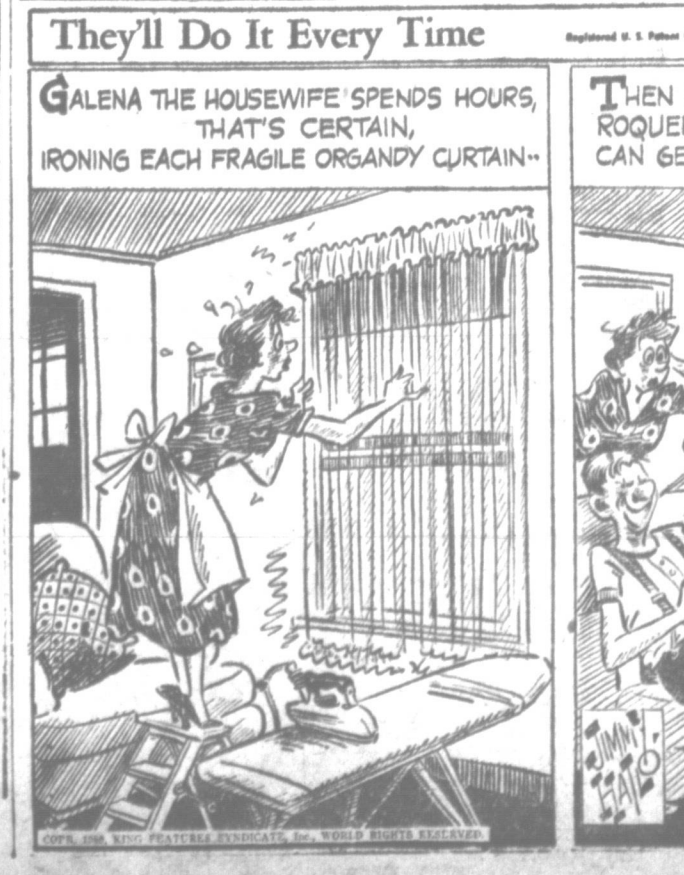

Metal Prices on March Again As Economists Urge Caution

 NEW YORK — (AP) — Metal prices on the march again tie in today with rising employment, soaring installment buying, record output in a few lines, lagging sales in others — and a nervous stock market.

Taken together they appear to back up the contention of those who think the long-range business prospect is evenly divided right now between inflation and deflation, with caution still the best policy.

Together they also show why opinion is divided as to whether the traditional summer slump will be as deep this year as usual. Auto and steel men say "no"; many others say "yes".

Metals are the prize exhibit for those who contend that inflation is making a comeback. Here is what has happened recently:

Steel scrap hit a record high in Pittsburgh, selling at 46 a ton, more than double the price just a year ago. Steel men have been shoveling record amounts of scrap into their furnaces to turn out the greatest tonnage of steel in history. Scrap dealers have advanced their prices \$15 a ton in three months. Basic steel prices have not advanced since December, but premium prices are paid for many finished steel products.

Copper scrap has been hard to find lately, too. A leading custom smelter, which buys this scrap to make refined copper, is offering a cent and a half more a pound for it — and charging two cents a pound more for the resulting refined copper.

That puts this custom, or secondary, copper at 22 1/2 cents a pound, within one cent of the postwar high, and six and a half cents above the postwar low, just a year ago. Most producers of primary copper, fresh from the cre, are waiting to see what to do about another price hike. Their order books are filling right now, anyway.

Zinc prices have jumped 10 times since the middle of March, a total increase of four and a half cents. It now costs 14 1/2

cents. And zinc concentrates have advanced \$7.50 a ton to \$91. Nickel went up eight cents a pound last week. Aluminum went up a half cent a pound last month. Magnesium advanced one cent a pound yesterday to 21 1/2. It was its first price change since 1943.

What has sent all these metals climbing back up the price ladder? Principally all the new cars and all the new homes. Metals are used in construction, and more metal goes into all the gadgets that furnish the new homes. The auto industry, one of the biggest buyers of metal, is running at record high speed. These three industries — construction, autos and appliances — keep the steel mills and the copper smelters busy.

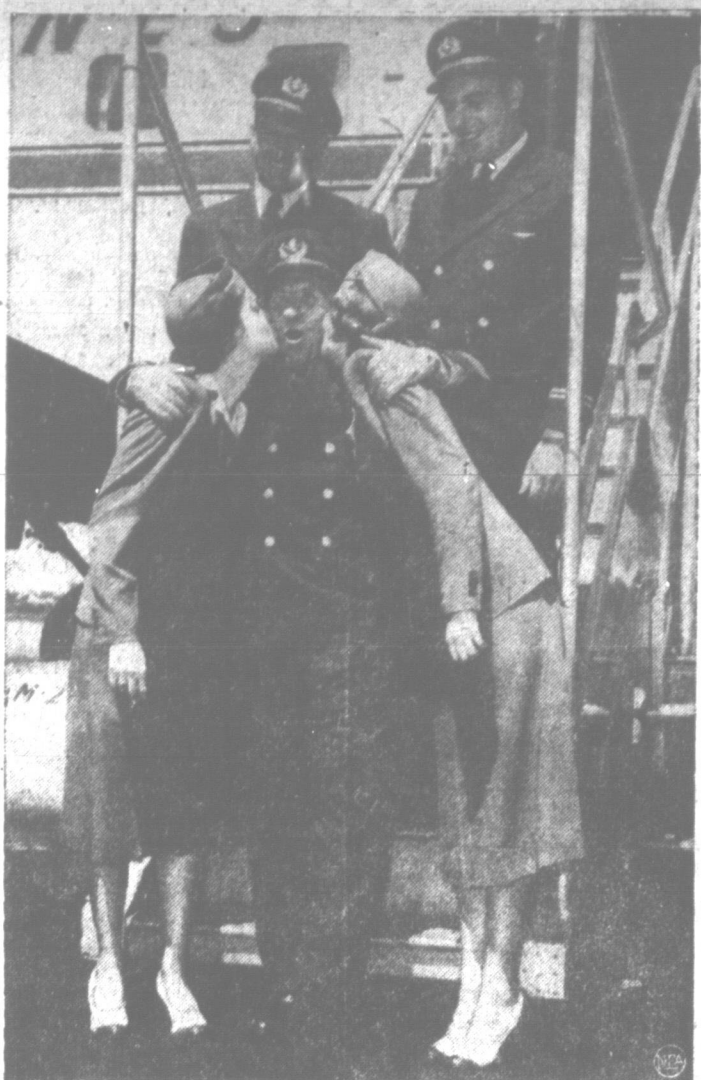
They also help to brighten the employment picture. Looking backward as government statisticians always do, the Census Bureau reports that last month the jobless totalled 3,016,000. This was 273,000 fewer out of work than in May of last year.

At the same time, a growing labor force and a booming durable goods market combined to send the total of the employed to 59,731,000, or 1,037,000 more than were working in May, 1949. As farm jobs open up this summer, the total of employment is expected to equal the record set in 1948.

Against this background of rising prices and rising employment, three things are noteworthy: the contrary opinion of some stock traders; the warning of some business leaders that the boom isn't firmly based; and an all-time high in buying on the cut.

Freeze's Advantage Relative

We have already noted that when the pack is frozen in the early stages of a hand it is advantageous to hold many cards and disadvantageous to hold only a few cards. However, there are degrees of advantage, and we must sometimes be considered carefully.

For example, suppose you hold 11 cards while an opponent holds only eight cards. You have an advantage, but it is not a big one. A player with eight cards can hold as many as four pairs and therefore has a fair chance to get the pack. He also has a reasonably good chance to pick a safe discard and isn't much worse off in this respect than the player with 11 cards.

Now suppose that your partner holds only three cards. His disadvantage is a very great one. Your advantage, of 11 cards to eight over one opponent isn't as great as his disadvantage of three cards to eight or three cards to 11 compared to his two opponents.

The question of position may also be important. For example, suppose you have your full hand of 11 cards and that one opponent likewise has 11 cards. Your partner has only five cards, and one opponent likewise has only five cards. Who has the advantage, particularly when the pack is frozen?

You have the advantage if your partner is discarding to the other short hand. The opponents have the advantage if you are discarding to the short opponent.

Suppose your partner is discarding to the opponent with five cards. He is not likely to give the pack away. The short opponent can hold two pairs and one pair. Even though your partner will have his troubles with only five cards in his own hand, he has a very good chance to stay out of real danger.

Meanwhile, the opponent with only five cards is discarding to your 11-card hand. He will have his troubles, just like your partner, but he is not as likely to land on his feet. You may have four or five pairs behind him, and when he makes a risky discard you will probably be able to snap it up.

The situation is reversed, of course, if you are discarding to the hand with five cards. You will have no trouble playing safe, of course, but your partner will probably give the pack away before long.

Q — The turn-up card is a queen. I must make the first play, and there is a red three in my hand. I need only 50 points for the first meld, and I have four queens in my hand. What is the correct procedure, assuming that I want to replace my red three and meld the five queens?

A — First put down your red three. Next draw a card from the stock to replace the red three. (If the replacement is a red three draw again. But be sure to have only 11 cards in your hand when you have finished replacing your red three.) Then put down your four queens on the table and add the turn-up queen to them. Finally, discard any of the remaining seven cards

in your hand. You are left with six cards, and it is then up to the next player to make his play.

Q — South deals. Does West have the right to put the first turn-up card in his hand? For example, suppose the first card turned up is a queen. West has only one queen in his hand and cannot meld. Can he pick up that queen anyway?

A — No; he cannot pick it up. Whenever you pick up a discard (the original turn-up card is considered a discard), you must meld it then and there. If you can't meld it, you can't pick it up.
