

BHS Sweeps U.I.L. Meet

Seventeen students from Borden High School qualified for Regional competition last week at the University Interscholastic League Contest. The District competition was

Drawing the lucky name from a hopper bulging with









Each couple were presented with plaques appropriately hand painted by Doris Rudd.






Since you are already in a bad mood after the ordeal of April 15th, I'll just point out a few facts that will ruin your whole week. You know the saying "Have a bad day and pass it on?"—Well, here goes.

Forty five years ago governments-federal, state and localwere taking ten cents out of every dollar earned. In them days about three of that ten cents supported the federal establishment. Now, 1978, forty four cents of every dollar you earn goes to federal, state and local governments. About twenty nine cents is processed out of the forty four and sent to Washington. It takes a lot of twenty nine cents-ez to make \$500 billion-(but the borrowing process is another piece). Our tax obligation is growing faster than any other item in a family budget. Taxes are our biggest single cost item-that means we pay more on the average for taxes than for food, shelter and clothing-all lumped together. And yet taxes are not computed in the cost of living index. That's pretty sneaky. We have to budget our taxes in order to stay out of trouble-yet that slice out of the pie isn't reflected in statistics we are given which tell us how much we are shelling out. Talk about truth in packaging.
In those same forty five years,

the efforts of our labor has doubled the amount of goods and services available. While in the same period, the tax bit has quadrupled and a little more. Since what we purchase hasn't increased as much as taxes, the money supply has had to be increased 23 times. And that, friends, is inflation; depreciation of the value of the

dollar due to government spending which does not provide any goods or services in return.

And here is something else. There are 73 million people within private enterprise who work and earn to support themselves and dependents. But remember, forty four cents goes to governments-yep, we are supporting 81 million others who are completely dependent upon tax dollars for support. For sure, 15 million of those 81 work for some branch of government and pay taxes. But you see, they are returning 44 cents of every dollar that is paid to them-and that dollar was taken from the 73 million in the first place. Furthermore, that 15 million are not contributing to the gross national product.

Our tax burden supports a bureaucratic system involving 81 million people. That is a clear majority-so it is no wonder bureaucracy has increased. It is called security in perpetuity. Selfish man will seldom vote himself out of a job or a dole.

In the 200 years that we have been piling up bureaucracies, only two government programs have been abolished. The government got out of the liquor and horse businesses. The feds no longer make rum or breed horses. Even socialistic England is more progressive than we. It took them only 142 years to abolish the position of Napoleon watchers. From 1803 to 1945 it was required that a man stand on the cliffs of Dover, watch thru a spy glass and ring a bell should he see Napoleon approaching.

Now you know that I have been watching and ringing bells for years. Approaching socialish is what keeps me with glass and bell prosed. But don't worry-I'm not counted in the 15 million-I do it for free.



At their regular meeting held April 17, the Borden County School Board welcomed visitors and officers of the High School Student Council.

Prior to hearing the visitors, temporary Chairman T. L. Griffin called for a canvas of the Trustee election. This done, Mr. Griffin asked for the reorganization of the Board.

Ralph Miller, nominated by Martin Parks and seconded by Brent Murphy was elected President of the Board by acclamation. Other officers elected were Kenneth Williams as V. Pres. and Doyle Newton

as Secretary.
Continuing with the agenda, Pres. Miller asked for statements from the visitors.

Patrick Toombs, as president of the Student Council, read a prepared paper to the board stating the students stand on the action taken by the Board in their meeting of March 13. Patrick also gave each trustee a copy of the statement. The statement reads as follows:

Board Members Borden County Schools, I'm Patrick Toombs, President of the Student Council, which represents the Student body of Borden Co.

We as students have heard many reasons given but we felt we should address ourselves to the source whereby we could put all such untruths or half-truths to rest once and for all.

We feel that there is only one source of credible information to end these rumors and that is why we are here

If the board could in its

best judgment disclose the reasons for the non-renewal of the coaches contracts it is in my estimation that the morale of the students would improve.

Many of us feel that when policy is reviewed by the board that consideration should be given to requesting parents, board members etc.., be barred from workouts, and practice sessions unless the coaches want spectators. We don't see this kind of interference in our classrooms so why should the coaches classrooms which are the gym, tennis court, track field, or football field, be any different.

I would like to thank you for your time and consideration and allowing us as students to meet with the board. Thank you!

Lisa Barnes as Vice Pres. of the Student Council, presented the Board with a petition signed by more than 75% of the student body. The petition, she explained, was not started by the Student Council, but by one member of the student body, namely Martha Anderson.
President Miller very grac-

iously thanked the students for their interest. He commended them highly for the manner in which they presented their concern. Miller went on to say that the Board felt that any explanation at this time would be unfair in absence of the faculty involved.

Of the 12 visitors present, 6 presented the Board with testimony in defense of the persons in question. The consensus was l. An explanation was in order. 2. A re-evaluation should be considered and 3. the asset of the families involved to the community.

James Telchik, voicing the opinion of all present, stated that it would be in the best interest of the community and school to have an explanation forthcoming with the least delay possible.

Again Pres. Miller thanked the visitors for their interest. He assured those present that the demonstration of the community interest in the school was always appreciated by the board. Once again he stated that an explanation would be unfair. He assured the visitors that at such time that a hearing was requested, the student Council as well as the public would be notified. Stuerintendent McLeroy said in clarification that a hearing had been requested at one time but had since been recalled.


The group was invited to stay for the rest of the general meeting, but all declined.
