Since you are already in abad mood after the ordeal of April 15th, I'll just point out a few facts that will ruin your whole week. You know the saying "Have a bad day and pass it on?"- Well, here goes.
Forty five years ago govern ments-federal, state and localwere taking ten cents out of every dollar earned. In them days about three of that ten cents supported the federal establish ment. Now, 1978, forty four cents of every dollar you ear goes to federal, state and local governments. About twenty nin cents is processed out of the orty four and sent to Washing on. It takes a lot of twenty on. It takes a to $\$ 500$ nine cents-ez to make $\$ 50$ billion-(but the borrowing pro ess is another plece). Our tax obligation is growing faster than any other item in a family budget. Taxes are our biggest single cost item-that means we pay more on the average for taxes than for food, shelter and clothing-all lumped together. And yet taxes are not computed in the cost of living index. That's pretty sneaky Wehave to budset our taxes in order to stay out of trouble-yet that slice out of trouble-y that out he pie isn't reflected in statistics we are given which tell us how much we are shelling out Talk about truth in packaging. In those same forty five years, the efforts of our labor has doubled the amount of goods and services available. While in the same period, the tax bit has quadrupled and a little more. Since what we purchase hasn't increased as much as asn't increased as much as axes, the money supply has had be increased 23 times. And that, friends, is inflation; de-

dollar due to government spending which does not provide any goods or services in return.
And here is something else. There are 73 million people within private enterprise who work and earn to support themselves and dependents. But remember, forty four cents goes to governments-yep, we are supporting 81 million others who are completely dependent upon tax dollars for support. For sure, 15 million of those 81 work for some branch of government and pay taxes. But you see, they are returning 44 cents of every dollar that is paid to them-and that dollar was taken from the 73 million in the first place. Furthermore, that 15 million are not contributing to the gross national product.
Our tax burden supports bureaucratic system involving 81 million people. That is a clear million people. That is a clear majority-so it is no wonder bureaucracy has increased. It is called security in perpetuity. Selfish man will seldom vote himself out of a job or a dole In the 200 years that we have been piling up bureaucracies, only two government programs have been abolished. The government got out of the liquor and horse businesses. The feds no longer make rum or breed horses. Even socialistic England is more progressive than we. It took them only 142 years to abolish the position of Nap oleon watchers. From 1803 to 1945 it was required that a man stand on the cliffs of Dover, watch thru a spy glass and ring a bell should he see Napoleon approaching.
Now you know that I have been watching and ringing bells for years. Approaching social ish is what keeps me with class and bell prosed me wiass and bell prosed. But don't 15 million-I do it for fres
