can be achieved, but they are actually convinced that America will prove more vulnerable to propaganda and other forms of political attack than did the disintegrating Third Republic of France and they reason that if the "Strategy of Terror" worked well in France, it will work even better in the United States. Further, they believe that sensational results can be achieved soon, before our rapidly mounting war-production can turn the tide of battle in Europe and in the Pacific—in other words, before the end of 1942.

Maybe the Axis political experts are wrong about America as they were wrong about England and about Russia, but their plan is not a fantastic or irrational one—granted the means of action they possess in this country and the reasonable hope they have of continuing military reverses for the United Nations in the weeks to come. On the contrary, it is something which should be taken seriously by the American people and government—in fact it is only if the Axis plan is taken very seriously that it is likely to fail.

In addition to averting a possibly deadly menace to America as a free nation, the smashing of the Axis political warfare plan against us would be a positive contribution to victory. It would deprive the Axis leaders of their last hope of winning the war and thereby shatter their morale to pieces, for they know that they cannot possibly win if America fights the war wholeheartedly and would not have attacked us unless they felt reasonably confident we could be prevented by some kind of trickery from doing so.

It looks, therefore, as if the really decisive battle of this war were going to be fought not in the islands of the Pacific nor on the plains of Russia, but in the cities, towns and villages of the United States with every American citizen in the front lines. Consequently every citizen should understand just what kind of an attack he is going to face.

unpleasant surprises the Axis may have in store for us in the way of sabotage, espionage, armed attacks by fifth-column bands, etc.

The underlying propaganda strategy of the enemy is crystal-clear, however, and if his propaganda attack fails so will all his other attacks.

In the first place he is going to try to repeat the strategy which worked so well in the first phase of the war—to split up the united front against him and get us quarreling with our allies, as he succeeded in doing with the French and British. He will try to whip up feeling in this country against England and Russia and then in his propaganda to Britain and Russia quote these anti-British or anti-Russian outbursts from America to sow suspicion and resentment of America there.

IDEALISTS BECOME PAWNS OF AXIS AGENTS  
This may sound somewhat complicated and implausible but the mechanism is really very simple. The enemy short-wave radio gives agents in this country their cue by devoting most of its programs to attacks on England and at the same time feeds them with anti-British arguments and "facts" which can serve as the basis for whispering campaigns.

The enemy agents—there are tens of thousands of them still at large—then go around to their American contacts—bitter-end isolationists and Roosevelt-haters—and "needle" them. The contacts do not always realize they are being needed and do not identify the needlers as enemy agents—or at least do not realize what they are really up to—but they are always ready to believe anything unfavorable to the British, Russians or the Administration. They needle very easily and when properly needed open their mouths in Congress, in the newspapers and among their friends.

BRITISH SUSPICION  
The result is a great wave of criticism or pessimism about our allies—helped along by insidious articles or statements by enemy agents disguised as patriots and interventionists—which is strongly reflected in the American press.

AGENTS HERE OR IN LATIN AMERICA cable the hottest extracts from our papers to Berlin and Tokyo and within a few hours they are being

quoted in the Axis radio programs to England and the Empire, where they serve to substantiate the Axis line to England which is—believe it or not—that America is planning to fight this war to the last Englishman and will make peace with Hitler

as soon as we have occupied all the British colonies we want.

This type of anti-British propaganda from seemingly respectable American sources is particularly dangerous when it includes—as it has included recently—strong American criticisms of British policy in

India and in Palestine. When the "Col. Blimps" in England hear that Americans are summoning England to hand India back to the Indians or to make concessions to the Jews of Palestine at the expense of the Arabs they begin to think that may-

be there is something to the Nazi charges about American designs on the empire and would probably be saying so in print—if the British censorship did not prevent them.

SPONTANEOUS CRITICISM IS ENEMY DYNAMITE  
Thanks partly to the censorship but chiefly to British familiarity—gained in many wars—with the etiquette of alliances, the British press seldom hits back at America, thus leaving a gap in the vicious circle which Nazi propaganda tries to create, but occasionally some wrathful Briton will evade or defy the conventions, as former Premier Hepburn of Canada did recently with his attack on the American navy—which was appreciated by Americans about as much as American criticisms of British bungling in Malaya were appreciated by the British.

Other allies are inspired by enemy propaganda. Most of them in fact are spontaneous.  
That is one reason why the Axis feels so confident of being able to destroy us by political warfare, for it is obvious that if we can be isolated from our strongest allies we will be well launched on the road to destruction.

**Price Boost In Gasoline Asked In East**

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—Sinkings and war diversion of tankers brought proposals today for higher gasoline, kerosene and fuel oil prices in the East and for night and Sunday closing of filling stations throughout the country.

The petroleum industry war council, an advisory group of oil company executives, requested the price boost, understood to be eight-tenths of a cent per gallon for gasoline, as an offset to higher transportation costs resulting from large

emergency movement of petroleum by rail tank cars.

A committee of the council, appealing last night to Leon Henderson, the price administrator, told him the use of rail cars in the eastward haul, replacing the lost and diverted tankers, would add about \$115,000,000 this year to the transportation costs.

The industry executives broadened a previous proposal for the gasoline station curfew and Sunday closing in the East, suggesting that such a program be instituted throughout the country. One spokesman said this would reduce industry operation expenses and help meet the higher transportation costs.

The increase in the prices of gasoline and other petroleum products, if granted, would be effective in the 17 Eastern states and the District of Columbia, the same area covered by the gasoline curtailment program last summer.

The sinkings and war diversion of tankers caused Petroleum Coordinator Ickes yesterday to call for a reduction of 204,100 barrels daily in crude petroleum production in the great Southwestern and Southeastern fields, including Texas, to bring production into line with reduced

transportation facilities and prevent a storage glut in the producing areas.

Ralph K. Davies, deputy petroleum coordinator, who attended the industry council meeting, declined to discuss the proposals for price increases in the East, as a means of meeting added costs but did tell reporters that the coordination office "will not take the price or tax route to control or curtail gasoline consumption." The treasury had proposed that the tax on gasoline be raised from 1.5 to 3 cents, as a revenue measure.

**Pampa Boy Qualifies For Scholarship Test**

A Pampa boy, Hubert Ayers, Jr., son of H. R. Ayers, gasoline engine operator, is one of the 20 boys who has qualified for the scholastic aptitude test of the college entrance examination board for a Phillips Petroleum company scholarship.

The tests will be given on April 11.

Out of the group of 10 girls and 20 boys who have qualified for the test, six boys and three girls will receive a four-year scholarship for the college of the student's choice from the Frank Phillips Founda-

tion, Inc., which has set aside \$66,000 for this purpose.

This fund was set up in 1939 on the occasion of Mr. Phillips 66th birthday celebration and scholarships have already been awarded 12 boys and six girls.

Those eligible to compete for the scholarships are children of Phillips employees.

## Today's War Analysis

The news from the Orient today is bad and, barring the smatching of a rabbit from the hat, there is little to encourage hope of salvaging the key island of Java from the wreckage which the Japanese are making of Allied holdings in the southwest Pacific.

However, this trend has been fully expected and should cause no despair. Our turn will come as soon as we get our war-machine running in top.

The Japs have landed more troops to increase their superiority over the Allied forces, which include Americans. Fighting is raging throughout the island with the result, it seems to me, that the defense must be encountering grave difficulty in conducting military operations because of the density of the population, which is one of the most closely packed in the world.

The long, slim island of Java, with an area about that of Alabama, has within its narrow confines 45,000,000 people, or about a third the population of the whole United States. You won't have forgotten the tragedy of Belgium during Hitler's bloody blitzkrieg of 1940, when civilians in frenzied flight so jammed the highways that the military were rendered helpless in the face of the enemy.

If this last remaining barrier to the Indian ocean succumbs, where will the Japs strike next? For one thing they may be expected to pursue vigorously their effort to conquer Burma, where they continue to forge ahead. This is a strategic territory which at once controls the gateway to China's serpentine Burma road and affords a base for an attack on India.

Should Burma fall, it's likely that the Japanese will try to take over the vast Indian empire which they have coveted so long. Much must depend, of course, on how quickly the United States and the other Allies can muster sufficient strength for an offensive in the western Pacific. An early attack on the Japs might deter them from an attempt on Hindustan.

With the collapse of Java, the Allies would fall back on Australia as a base—and one which must be held at all cost. There lies great future danger for the Mikado's ambitions, and for that reason it's quite in the cards that the Japanese will try to seize at least the naval and air base of Darwin which lies near Indonesia on the north coast of Australia.

Possession of rich Indonesia would give Japan a large measure of the self-sufficiency which she so eagerly seeks—provided she could hold this treasure and at the same time protect her attenuated sea-route to home ports. Here are the oil and other essentials, for many of which

she has been dependent on the United States and without which she couldn't wage war.

The fly in the ointment for Japan is that her new lands of milk and honey won't be very useful to her unless she can (1) defend the some 3,300 miles of sea-lane to the mother country, and (2) provide ships to transport the supplies. Moreover, it will be months before she can repair the damage done by the ruthless scorched-earth policy of the Dutch.

The Japs are running hog-wild now, but the gravest possible danger lurks along that extended sea-route to their homeland. That will be the hunting ground of the United States navy and air force when we have prepared ourselves for the work.

Already the Japanese shipping losses have been terribly heavy—so much so that Washington experts tell us Nippon couldn't stand a year of such drain. Her new-found self-sufficiency will go to the bottom of the ocean with her cargo boats—and after that her downfall.

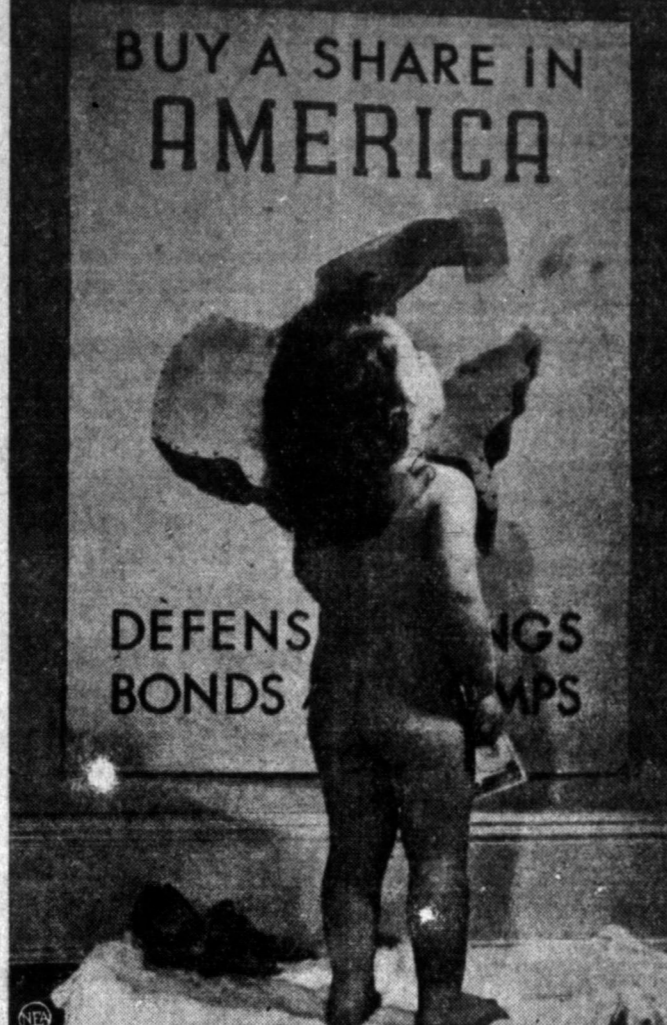

## Taft Objects To Corporation Tax

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—Chairman George (D-Cal.) called the Senate Finance committee together today for informal discussion of the new tax program as evidence appeared of senatorial dissatisfaction with the treasury's recommendations for unprecedented increases in individual and corporate income levies.

The treasury program received a generally favorable reception from members of the House Ways and Means committee when it was outlined Tuesday, but apparently the reaction would be less cordial in the other wing of the capitol.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio), a finance committee member, brought the cloak room criticism into the open with an assertion that the treasury was following an "unwise policy" in proposing surtax increases which would drain off 55 per cent of the earnings of corporations with more than \$25,000 net income annually.

Moreover, Taft told reporters he doubted that individual taxpayers could assume the staggering burden of \$3,200,000,000 in new levies which the treasury called for from this source. It was likely, he added, that congress would have to soften these increases and turn to new forms, such as a sales tax, in order to produce the needed revenue.

The Ohio senator said it was his opinion that if the \$3,000,000,000 additional corporation taxes proposed by the treasury were imposed, there might be a consequent stifling of business progress that would be reflected not only in the manufacture of essential civilian goods but in war production as well.

The treasury suggested an increase from the present 7 per cent to 31 per cent in surtaxes on the earnings of the larger companies. This would be in addition to the normal 24 per cent tax, which would not be increased.

## Movable Wealth Shifted By Dutch To West Indies

LONDON, March 5 (AP)—The ominous situation on embattled Java was reflected today by Dutch steps to strip the island of such movable wealth as commercial offices and foreign assets which might fall to the invading Japanese.

In a variation of the "scorched earth" to which the Dutch willingly have put Java and the other East Indies islands as they came exposed to the enemy, the Netherlands government-in-exile here has approved a mass transfer of such possessions to the greater security of the Dutch West Indies.

There they will be under the wing of the United States' defenses of the Caribbean, in a region which Axis submarines already have visited in raids but which is relatively unassailable for invasion.

The decision was announced last night after the dark news from Java that the enemy had deepened his inroads on the last stronghold of the eastern archipelago under the weight of numerically stronger land, sea, and air forces.

Dutch circles emphasized, however, that the measures were dictated by the desire to sweep the island bare of anything which might benefit the Japanese and that they indicated no urgent emergency.

Among the great enterprises whose main offices in the East Indies will be shifted to the West Indies are shipping companies operating in the Pacific.

Also involved are foreign assets held by the Dutch East Indies and commercial undertakings in the islands.

## Verdict Awaited In Juanita Barr Trial

DALLAS, March 5 (AP)—A court trying Mrs. Juanita Barr, charged with the fatal shooting of Mrs. Blanche Woodall, reconvenes today to await a jury verdict.

The jury was given the case last night and retired at 11 p. m.

During the trial, testimony was offered to show that Eddie Barr, the defendant's husband, was intoxicated with Mrs. Woodall, a night club dancer.

Mrs. Barr listened impassively as Prosecutor Jimmie MacNicol described the killing as a hideous crime for which a penalty must be paid.

Defense Attorney Ted Monroe, in his argument, declared the slain woman virtually committed suicide by flaunting her love affair under the defendant wife's nose.

Barr did not appear at the trial.

### Texans At War

**COLLEGE STATION, March 5 (AP)**—Graduates of Texas A. & M.'s War Department Civilian Defense school are ready to train civilians in defense work in their own communities.

The school's first class, composed of 47 students from 14 states were handed their diplomas yesterday after completing 65 hours of work covering theory and actual practice in the field with bombs and war gases.

The next class at A. & M. will begin March 9 and last ten days. Other classes will start on alternate Mondays thereafter.

Wichita Falls and Brownwood were chosen as sub-centers, with T. J. Waggoner of Wichita Falls and E. M. Boone of Brownwood as supervisors.

**AUSTIN, March 5 (AP)**—The city of Austin voted a \$600,000 bond issue to purchase land for a proposed army air base a few miles from here.

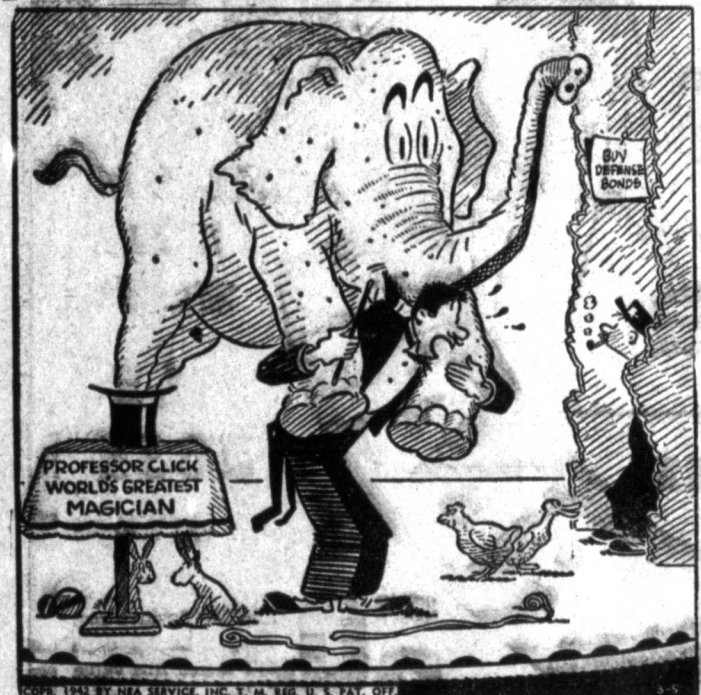

ST. LOUIS, March 5 (AP)—Quiet and reserved, Lieut. Edward H. O'Hare is a new hero America can take to its heart.

The 27-year-old fighter pilot was credited today by the navy with the unparalleled feat of destroying six Japanese bombing planes in one day of action with the United States fleet.

O'Hare was born on Friday the 13th, in March, 1914, but there's been nothing unlucky about it.

Tall, dark and handsome, he still hasn't overcome the personal reticence that made him a bashful boy.

His mother, Mrs. Selma A. O'Hare, was a bit doubtful that he would want any publicity, even as a national hero.

However, outside of a few trips as a passenger, he maintained only a vicarious interest in flying until he was assigned to Pensacola, Fla., for naval aviation training in 1939.

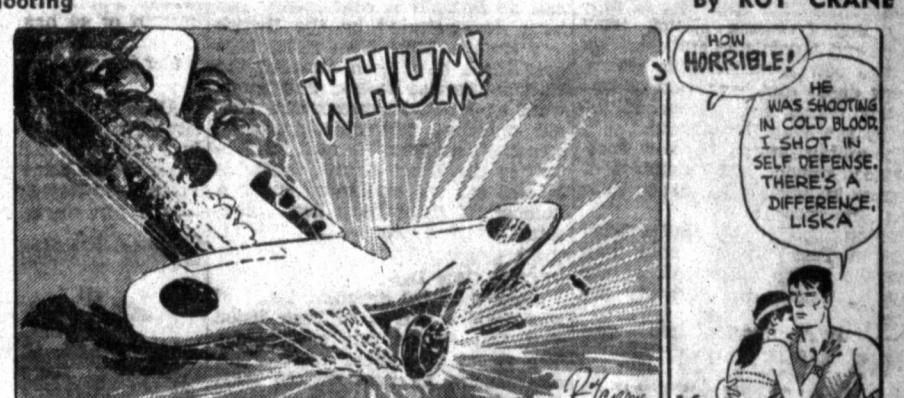
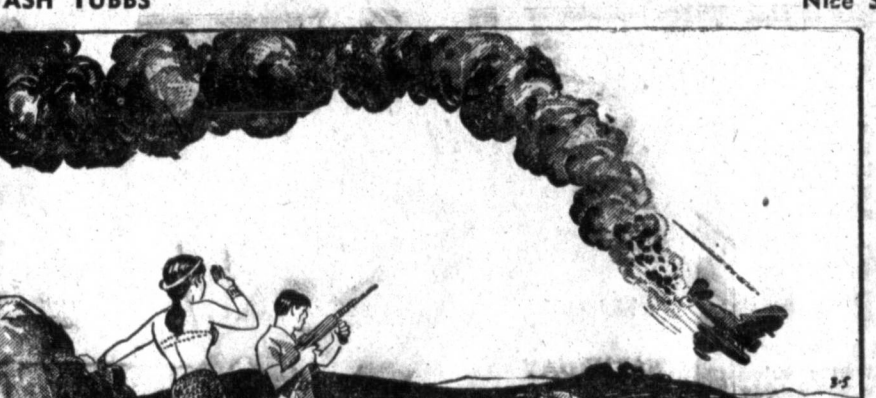
