PRA Alois Texas
\$6,294,440 For '42
 WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP)—Texas was apportioned \$6,294,440 by the public roads administration for federal-aid highway work during the current fiscal year, ending next June 30, according to data submitted to a congressional committee during hearings on the independent offices appropriation bill introduced today in the house.

During the last (1941) fiscal year there was an expenditure of \$5,411,206 of federal funds on highways in Texas. On Nov. 28, 1941, there was a total of 14,742 miles of designated federal-aid highways in the state, by far the greatest of any state. New York was second with 9,903 miles in its federal-aid highway system.

Secondary or feeder roads were allotted \$1,101,527 of the total amount apportioned to Texas in the 1942 (current fiscal year); the apportionment for elimination of grade crossings was \$1,062,857.

U. S. Planes Equal To Most Nations, Says Air Chief
 WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP)—The army confidence in the performance and continuing development of American aircraft was reported to congress today with the message that the nation now is getting both quality and quantity plane production and need not "apologize to anyone in the world."

Combat performances of American built planes pitted against German Messerschmitts and Japanese fighters—in many cases against heavy odds—were cited by Lieut. Gen. H. H. Arnold, deputy chief of staff for air, to back up that statement before the house appropriations committee.

In a transcript of that testimony made public by the committee, Arnold was quoted as saying that in plane research and development work, this country was "equal to most nations and ahead of a lot of them," while Brig. Gen. O. P. Echols, in charge of procurement, added: "I think, from the best information we have, that I can say, certain any hesitation, we are up to the Germans, and I think, in certain respects, we are ahead of them. I think the new pursuit planes are the best airplanes in the world, and I think in our heavy bombers that we are ahead of them."

Farmers Told To Save Baling Wire
 Gray county farmers and ranchmen were told today that they would do well to save baling wire for possible re-use during the 1942 hay baling season.

A recent OPM order assigned baling wire, along with nails and wire rope, a rating that will assure delivery of the same amount of these articles as supplied in the corresponding quarter of 1940.

But, M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer of the Texas A. and M. college extension service, reports that the U. S. department of agriculture estimates 1942 needs for baling wire at around 100,000 tons. This is equivalent in weight to three battleships or 3,000 medium tanks.

Thousands of bales of hay and other forage are now being fed in Texas, Bentley pointed out. The usual practice is to cut the ties, cut farmers will do well to unwrap the wires, straighten them out, and then store them on a flat surface protected from the weather so they can be used again if a shortage develops, he said.

Negro Girls And Boys Will Play

Radio Program Tomorrow Night Dedicated To Paralysis Campaign
 Because President Roosevelt has proclaimed that national health is one of the front lines of defense, the national foundation has speeded up its organization of county chapters throughout the country until there are today 2,081 chapters covering 2,483 counties of the 3,070 which exist in the United States and its possessions.

The Gray county chapter was chartered here last March. Its present chairman is Ray Kuhn, who is also county chairman for the celebration of the President's birthday.

Work of Gray and other county chapters includes providing respirators, orthopedic appliances, and pay for medical treatment for needy victims; arranging transportation and acting as information bureaus in cooperation with county health authorities.

 Rabaul in the last few hours before the Japanese landed there.

In Tokyo, Premier Gen. Hideki Tojo boasted that Japan was assured of further triumphs in "great East Asia," and declared: "I am not afraid of America, although I do not dismiss lightly the huge military expenditure called for in President Roosevelt's message to congress."

Tojo asserted that in manpower "Japan tops the world."

On the Malayan front, the Melbourne radio broadcast a message from Maj.-Gen. Gordon Bennett, Australian commander, frankly conceding that the situation "if anything is more serious than it was a few days ago."

Dispatches from Singapore said grim-fighting British, Australian and Imperial Indian troops who had stemmed Japan's main invasion armies for three days now are throwing their full weight into a terrific counter-offensive, with the battle raging on an 80-mile front across Johore State, less than 70 miles north of Singapore.

This was the picture of the jungle melees as described in front-line dispatches:

Artillery crashing on the Malay east coast . . . forward troops fighting the Japanese in the center—and in western Malaya, Australian and British forces heavily attacking the invaders in close quarter fighting . . . while overhead, Japanese warplanes bombed and machine-gunned the Imperial defense fighters.

British headquarters acknowledged that Japanese pressure was increasing and that the invaders had carried out further infiltrations below the main battle line, in the Batu Pahat sector, 60 miles north of Singapore.

An official Tokyo broadcast declared optimistically that "total collapse" of the British defense system in Johore State was "impending" and asserted that the \$400,000,000 Singapore Island naval base was "doomed."

While the main action blazed around Bukit Payong hill, 69 miles to the north, Singapore counted a three-day toll of 462 killed and 1,084 wounded from Japanese aerial attacks on the island stronghold. Fifty-eight were killed and 178 wounded yesterday.

On the Burma front, north of Malaya, the situation was equally serious.

A withdrawal of outnumbered British troops from mountain areas east of Moulmein, a gulf of Martaban port menaced by a drive of Japanese and Thai troops into Burma, was officially acknowledged in Rangoon. The invaders were reported within 26 miles of Moulmein.

Transport supported by naval vessels and aircraft carriers bore Japanese to New Guinea and the Solomons to widen the scope of landings previously believed executed at New Britain. Those islands lie from 100 to 800 miles above Australia and as far as 4,000 miles east of Singapore.

Singapore dispatches indicated that Imperial lines, although confronted by a flanking attack, held taut through heavy fighting in the lowlands between Batu Pahat, 60 miles northwest of Singapore, and the Muar river.

Australians in the central sector—supplied by plane with food, ammunition and medicines—were reported to have knocked out many invasion tanks. In the absence of this armored equipment, the Japanese were said to be relying now on gun-carriers, field pieces mounted on trucks.

Japanese infiltrations by small landing parties were reported below Endall, 85 miles northeast of Singapore.

Bomb Kills Margaret Despite Ocean Dash
 LONDON, Jan. 23 (AP)—A lifeboat made a 92-mile dash from a lonely Shetland lighthouse last Dec. 2 with 10-year-old Margaret Smith, who was suffering from acute appendicitis.

An operation saved her life. Margaret was killed yesterday by a bomb dropped by a daylight air raider.
