AMERICAN TROOPS MOVING IN TO TRAP BATTERED GERMAN ENEMY

Oil Price Hike Of 25 Cents Would Be Supply Solution

AUSTIN, Nov. 10 (AP)—Increasing the price of crude would promptly uncover enough new flush fields to permit production of 5,000,000 barrels a day over a sustained period. Chairman Ernest O. Thompson, of the Texas Railroad commission, declared today in urging Price Administrator Leon Henderson to supplement depleted petroleum reserves by allowing crude prices to advance to a parity level. "Certainly a commodity as important to the war effort as oil has just as much right to a parity price as any other product," Thompson asserted, explaining: "An increase in the price of oil of 25 cents a barrel in the past has always brought an immediate increase in drilling of wildcat wells and has always in the past brought about the discovery of new pools." The chairman asserted, in an article prepared for publication by the New York Journal of Commerce, that the nation was consuming oil at the rate of 4,000,000 barrels per day, and predicted that within one year the consumption rate would be 5,000,000 barrels per day. "In order to keep our current reserves up to standard," he said, "we must field every week, and this must be done by a 25-cent price increase, not being done for the simple reason that the price does not justify wildcatting." Thompson said that of the 100,304 producing wells in Texas, at least 30,000 are presently being produced at a loss to the operator. Pointing to an actual price of \$1.20 per barrel, the chairman said that "all oil all over the United States of 36 gravity for the past 10 years has averaged \$1.82 per barrel. The parity price of oil on Nov. 1 was \$1.70 a barrel if parity prices had prevailed."

Sumners Urges Nation Resume Basic Virtues

FORT WORTH, Nov. 10 (AP)—Representatives of 810,000 Texas Baptists worked off the preliminaries to their general state convention today, mindful of a stern warning from one of their Congressmen, Rep. Hatton Sumners of Dallas. Sumners' talk before a packed church assemblage last night topped their day. He linked the power of God with the solution of today's world crisis, which he said placed this nation in the position of facing the sternest test any nation has in 1,000 years. His plea was for a return to the virtues of meeting difficulties squarely not letting someone else—Uncle Sam, for instance—do them, of tapping the power of good government that lies solely, he said, in the people themselves. Sumners, craggy-browed chairman of the House Judiciary committee, warned that God does not allow "strength to remain where it is not used." Therefore people use their power to insure good government. They can do that only, he said, by recognizing the laws of deity. "No government," he said, "can operate solely on the theories of men. They just ain't that smart."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—President Roosevelt's omission of Republican legislators from a scheduled White House meeting on manpower problems threw what appeared to be a blanket of frost today on budding Congressional proposals for bipartisan back stage discussions of vital war problems. Republicans and even some Democrats, have suggested a joint committee to consult with the President on the conduct of the war, but if Mr. Roosevelt's attention was attracted he gave no sign of it today in inviting only Democrats to his first meeting with Congressional leaders since the election.

Most Of Pampa To Close Tomorrow; Game Scheduled

Most of Pampa will close shop tomorrow as the city observes the anniversary of the armistice which ended World War I.

Meanwhile thoughts of veterans of that war will be directed toward the winning of World War II as members of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and other citizens assemble at 9 a. m. at the city hall to start an all-day collection of scrap metal.

The work is not limited to members of the two organizations, but open to everyone.

City officers will be closed. Office of the Gray County War Price and Rationing board will remain open in the morning, but will close at noon.

Clifford Braly, acting county judge, in the absence of County Judge Sherman White, who with Mrs. White is out of town on a vacation trip, announced that the precinct, county, and district offices would be closed.

For the first time since he has been in office, Sheriff Cal Rose announced that his office would be closed all day tomorrow. This is the first time in four years the office has been closed all day.

BUY VICTORY BONDS Retail Food Costs Jump 1.6 Per Cent

AUSTIN, Nov. 10 (AP)—Retail cost of food in Texas increased an average of 1.6 per cent in October over September, John Reed, Commissioner of Labor, announced today.

Of the 59 food items under price ceilings, 38 increased in price, 14 decreased and seven remained unchanged for a percentage rise of 0.83 per cent. Of the 26 food items not covered by price ceilings, 19 increased in price, six decreased and one remained unchanged for a percentage increase of 3.07 per cent.

"The overall cost of living in Texas has increased approximately 17 per cent since April, 1941, yet only a small percentage of our working people have been given salary increases to offset the rise in the cost of living," Reed said.

BUY VICTORY BONDS pursuing British vanguards engaged the Axis rearguards yesterday at Sidi Barrani, 184 miles west of the old El Alamein front, and at Salum, 290 miles west of El Alamein.

Dispatches said the frontier area was being cleared of the enemy, and it was apparent that Rommel, in heading flight with approximately 130,000 troops, would make no attempt to defend the strategic Hafaya ("hellfire") pass on the frontier.

Pampa Will Honor Its Soldiers In Program Tomorrow

A tribute to the men who died to keep America free in 1917 and 1918, and a pledge that at the end of World War 2, a new and better world will be built with enduring peace, will be paid in the community-wide Armistice day program to be held at 8 o'clock tomorrow night in the Junior high school auditorium.

Sponsored by the Pampa Rotary club, joined by other civic clubs, and the Pampa Ministerial alliance, the program will include the principal address by Dr. H. Thomason, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church, of Amarillo, speaking on "America—What Lies Ahead?"

Company D, Texas Defense Guard, will attend the meeting as a unit, assembling on the Junior high school campus at 7:45 p. m., 15 minutes in advance of the beginning of the program.

There will be no admission charged. Theme of Dr. Thomason's address will deal with the following: "What are we fighting for? To win the war, yes; and to win the perpetuation of the principles and ideals for which our republic stands. But, after we win this war, we can very well lose the peace that follows. We won the last war and lost the peace that followed. If we are to have a lasting peace it must be on different principles than those of the Versailles treaty."

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 10 (AP)—The long career of Edna May Oliver, the outspoken, crochety but lovable screen character, has ended.

The character actress and comedienne died yesterday on the 59th anniversary of her birth, surrounded by friends and fans in the earth's far corners.

She peacefully fell asleep, said Virginia Hammon, her companion. Miss Oliver knew that death from an intestinal disorder was not far away and asked Miss Hammon to arrange a simple funeral. Private services will be held at Forest Lawn Memorial park, Glendale, Thursday, followed by cremation.

Her death followed by only a few weeks that of her friend, Actress May Robson.

Portraying her stage and screen roles with skill and assurance, as in "Cimarron" which lifted her to stardom, Miss Oliver in private life was almost shy, shunning Hollywood parties and preferring the companionship of old friends, or the pleasures of her garden, playing the piano, singing or reading.

Marines Set New Record Of Combat Duty

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—General Thomas Holcomb, Marine commandant, reported today that "things are shaping up" so that it will be increasingly more difficult for the Japanese to liquid reinforcements on Guadalcanal island in the Solomons.

Holcomb, just returned from a visit to Marine posts in the South Pacific, disclosed that the original Marine divisions which went into the Solomons to begin the first American offensive of the war, still was on front line duty there—three months' period of such duty, which he said, probably set a record for unbroken service under fire for Marine outfits.

The general recalled that when one division was held in the front line in the World War for a period of 40 days it was considered extraordinary, and a tremendous strain on the men.

Are Hitting Foo "The boys on Guadalcanal are tired and there isn't any doubt about it," Holcomb said. He added that some break down and have to be removed.

Carrying the fight to the enemy, American and Allied troops have encircled one Japanese position on New Guinea and apparently are holding the upper hand on Guadalcanal island in the embattled Solomons.

The western jaw of a vise which the Japanese had hoped to squeeze upon Henderson airfield—control spot of the Solomons—has been stationary for two days. This was interpreted as evidence that soldiers and Marines have halted the original Japanese thrust against the airfield.

To the east, American troops are pushing forward to encircle the enemy beachhead at Koli Point, where reinforcements for the original invasion force were landed.

The Americans advanced four miles east of the beachhead Saturday, Guadalcanal time, the navy said, apparently isolating the eastern jaw of the vise.

Meanwhile in New Guinea Allied forces inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy in a movement which enveloped a Japanese position behind Ovi, on the northeast coast of the island 55 miles south of Buna, Nipponese supply base.

Raking the enemy front lines with machine gun fire and dumping loads of bombs on communications lines, Allied fighting planes worked closely with ground troops in the action, General Douglas MacArthur reported.

ABILENE, Kas., Nov. 10 (AP)—I hope Dwight will be a good boy and come home soon."

That's the 82-year-old mother of Lieut.-Gen. Dwight David Eisenhower speaking, as she peers from behind the newspaper carrying the latest account of her famous son's North African exploits.

She lives with a woman companion in a modest cottage, studying newspaper and magazine stories of her boy.

## An Armistice Day Message from the Soldiers of Former Wars to the 134,000,000 Men, Women and Children Who Are America's Soldiers in the Total War of Today

**I**N A DOZEN spots throughout the world, American soldiers find themselves today behind the barbed wire of prison camps. This has happened because the first months of America's participation in the war have witnessed the usual defeats of a nation suddenly and treacherously attacked.

*Those imprisoned boys look to us to set them free and to avenge the defeats.*

But they are not the only prisoners. The once independent nations of Europe and Asia, now under the heel of the Nazi and Jap tyrants, were also treacherously attacked.

In those nations, not soldiers alone but whole populations are now subjected to the cruelties of monsters without likeness in all history.

*These millions, too, look to us of the United Nations for liberation.*

This is no war for the mere defense of boundaries, or for colonies, or for trade. Difficult as it may be for us to understand, the very continuance of civilized living is at stake.

This struggle is world-wide because no single nation, not even the strongest, can any longer defend itself against gangster dictators with airplanes, submarines, and the resources of whole continents at their disposal.

*Freedom, decency and justice are possible for none, save in a world where they are secure for all.*

This is a lesson we have learned from Manchuria, Ethiopia, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland and the other nations over-run.

"Too bad, but it's none of our business," peace-loving men said each time. And each time that "peacefulness" (or callous indifference) of ours only made the aggressors more confident that no united front of their intended victims would ever challenge their march to conquest.

The idea of the Brotherhood of Man is no longer only an ideal. At long last it has become a law of nature, as rigorous as the law of gravity itself, which men violate at their peril.

Even to be selfish, men must have at least this much wisdom. Else this war, *when* won, cannot be made to *stay won*; and every generation will have to pay in blood for its own stupidity.

### WE MUST HIGHLY RESOLVE

never again to think of ourselves as isolated from the nations of the world or from the conscience of mankind. Even during this war itself, *we must not allow our unity to be destroyed by enemy propaganda devised to get us fighting among ourselves*, suspecting our allies, our government officials, our neighbors—worker against employer, negro against white, Christian against Jew, Protestant against Catholic, native-born against foreign-born.

For if the United Nations *remain* united, *and if their unity is carried into the peace*, the prospects are for a new world beyond the dreams of prophets.

Human progress is not always slow. There are times when changes, long brewing as ideals in the minds of a few, are realized with electrifying suddenness.

Such a time, at this very instant, may be nearer than we think.

Let us then keep our ideals clearly before us, that we may come through with both *victory and a world for which the cost of victory will be justified.*

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 10- Figures released by the war department recently show that a total of 2,250 soldiers, sailors and marines have received decorations for their services in the current war.
A check-up with the headquarters of the Association of Former Students of Texas A. & M. showed that they have records of 27 men who have won awards and one man, Major Hervey H. Whitfield, of Dallas, has been decorated twice. He won a Distinguished Flying Cross and then an Oak Leaf Cluster, signifying a second medal, for this action in the Australian theatre of war.
Highest medal won by any Texas Aggie was the Distinguished Service Cross awarded to Major General George F. Moore, commander of the 1st Cavalry, who received the medal before the fortress surrendered. Only 24 such medals and two Oak Leaf Clusters have been awarded so far the reports show.
