

Add soup to cheese mixture, slowly, stirring constantly Cool; when mixture begins to thicken, fold in mayonnaise or salad to individual molds that have first been rinsed in cold water. Chill. DEFINING CIVILIZATION

I have been reading a very interesting book by Ellsworth Huntington, Research Associate in geography in Yale University. The name of the book is "The Character of Races". The author attempts to show the relationship between climate and environment as to the character of races. In order to measure the different degrees of civilization, he defines civilization.

The real definition of civilization is something that we need better to understand when we hear so much about progress and regression and a changing world. I quote from Dr. Huntington's

"The European ideal of civilization may be, stated somewhat as follows: Civilization is the stage of development which results when men display to the highest degree the power of initiative, the ability to dominate nature, the capacity for formulating new ideas and for carrying them into effect, the power of self-control, high standards of honesty and morality, the power to lead and to control other races, the capacity for disseminating ideas, the ability to express themselves in high types of art and literature, and other similar qualities. These qualities find expression in high ideals, respect for law, inventiveness, ability to develop philosophical systems, great works of art and literature, stability and honesty of government, a highly developed system were to lose, the nations to whom we would have of education, the capacity to dominate the less carry out far-reaching enterprises covering long periods of time and great areas of the earth's surface."

The various subadministrators of WPA are directed to find those qualified for immediate placement in war industries or agriculture. Also to be searched out are those suitable for training in war industries and another class is to consist of those qualified for other private or public employment.

In the two agencies the Government has and is paying some thousands of people, who with exception of a few wholly incapacitated could find jobs in private business and in some cases jobs in the war industries or in agriculture where the need is very great. It is spending large sums of money in these activities when it is imposing back-breaking taxes. 

An Armistice Day Message from the Soldiers of Former Wars to the 134,000,000 Men, Women and Children Who Are America's Soldiers in the Total V. ar of Today

IN A DOZEN spots throughout the world, American soldiers find themselves today behind the barbed wire of prison camps. This has happened because the first months of America's participation in the war have witnessed the usual defeats of a nation suddenly and treacherously attacked.

Those imprisoned boys look to us to set them free and to avenge the defeats.

But they are not the only prisoners. The once independent nations of Europe and Asia, now under the heel of the Nazi and Jap tyrants, were also treacherously attacked.

In those nations, not soldiers alone but whole populations are now subjected to the cruelties of monsters without likeness in all history

These millions, too, look to us of the United Nations for liberation.

This is no war for the mere defense of boundaries, or for colonies, or for trade. Difficult as it may be for us to understand, the very continuance of civilized living is at stake.

This struggle is world-wide because no single nation, not even the strongest, can any longer defend itself against gangeter dictators with airplanes, submarines, and the resources of whole continents at their disposal.

Freedom, decency and justice are possible for none, save in a world where they are secure for all.

This is a lesson we have learned from Manchuria, Ethiopia, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland and the other nations over-run.

"Too bad, but it's none of our business," peace-loving men said each time. And each time that "peacefulness" (or callous indifference) of ours only made the aggressors more confident that no united front of their intended victims would ever challenge their march to conquest.

The idea of the Brotherhood of Man is no longer only an ideal. At long last it has become a law of nature, as rigorous as the law of gravity itself, which men violate at their peril.

Even to be selfish, men must have at least this much wisdom. Else this war, when won, cannot be made to stay won; and every generation will have to pay in blood for its own stupidity.

WE MUST HIGHLY RESOLVE

never again to think of ourselves as isolated from the nations of the world or from the conscience of mankind. Even during this war itself, we must not allow our unity to be destroyed by enemy propaganda devised to get us fighting among ourselves, suspecting our allies, our government officials, our neighbors—worker against employer, negro against white, Christian against Jew, Protestant against Catholic, native-born against foreign-born.

For if the United Nations <u>remain</u> united, <u>and</u> if <u>their unity is carried into the peace</u>, the prospects are for a new world beyond the dreams of prophets.

Human progress is not always slow. There are times when changes, long brewing as ideals in the minds of a few, are realized with electrifying suddenness.

Such a time, at this very instant, may be nearer than we think.

Let us then keep our ideals clearly before us, that we may come through with both victory and a world for which the cost of victory will be justified.

### Wages "Freeze" Order Meaning Dawning On Myriad Workers; Will Be Stringent

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (A)-Relization that an "early freeze" had stunted growth of their pay envelopes last Sept. 15, dawned on the nation's workers today as they were confronted with the strict terms of

a new wage-salary stabilization order issued by the war labor board.

Empowered by President Roosevelt's Oct. 3, economic stabilization order, the WLB virtually froze most wages and salaries under \$5,000-a year at the Mid-September levels, and Chairman William H. Davis served notice it would be "pretty damn tough" to break the ice.

Adopted unanimously by the pub-lic, labor and industry members of the board, the order affected non-agricultural wages and salaries under \$5,000, except salaries paid supervisory or professional employes Farm wages come under the agriculture department's jurisdiction and the treasury controls other

"Only in exceptional cases" increases to be granted over the listed levels, the order stated, adding that no raises whatsoever are to be approved unless "necessary to correct mal-adjustments or inequalities, to eliminate sub-standards of living, to correct cross inequalities or to aid in the effective prosecution of the war.'

#### BUY VICTORY STAMPS-Oil Allowables In State Show Loss

AUSTIN, Nov. 10 (A)-The average daily allowable for Texas oil wells in the week ended Nov. 7 was 1,434,798 barrels, a decrease of 11,361, railroad commission engineers reported today.

The number of wells decreased by 179 to 100,146.
