Childless Married Men Reclassified

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—Married men without children are

rapidly being reclassified in the light of their civilian occupations, selective service officials reported today, and many are expected to be called soon for military service. With virtually all available single men without dependents already

drafted, the continued deferment of either physically-fit men will be based increasingly, as the army expands towards its 19.3 goal of 7,500,000 men, upon their essential usefulness in civil life. These officials, unwilling to be

3 Killed In Crash Of Army Bomber

The victims were Captain Clarence Bates, Minneapolis, pilot; Robert James Raley, Duluth, Minn., co-pilot, and Robert Delman Bunn, Minneapolis, radio engineer. All were employees of Northwest Airlines and the only persons aboard the big ship. Bates, who ranked as a captain

Improvement Shown By Saturday Market
 NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—The stock market today emerged from its biggest recovery month since July, 1941, with steel, rails and specialties leading an extension of the advance.
 The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 2 of a point at 40, but for the week showed a net decline of 1. For October the composite was up 2.2 points. Transfers totaled 350,210 shares against 290,180 a week ago. The month's volume of 15,932,598 shares was the largest since last December.
 Revision of profits estimates for the principal steel producers revived interest in issues in this group. Rails responded to the best combined net income figures since 1930 for the latest three quarters. Air transports, while not so lively as Friday, added a point more as the outlook for the all-cargo plane program improved.

 which in 1938 supported Governor Herbert H. Lehman in his close but successful race against Dewey. Alliance has the backing of Mayor F. H. La Guardia of New York.
 Mrs. Clare Boothe Luce, playwright and author, has attracted national attention by her campaign for the house in the fourth District of Connecticut. She is opposed by the incumbent, LeRoy D. Downs, democrat, and by Lester Barlow, the explosives inventor who is running as an independent.
 From all sections came reports of listlessness among the voters and an absence of sharp and attention-compelling issues.
 While the republicans are claiming a gain of 35 house seats, that would not give them control of that branch of congress. The present lineup is 257 democrats, 165 republicans, five seats held by members of minor parties and eight vacancies of the vacant seats, seven were filled by democrats and one by a republican at the 1940 election.
 A swing away from the administration has long been regarded as normal in off-year elections. In 1918 it went so far as to give the republicans a majority following a call by Woodrow Wilson for the election of a democratic congress. A repetition of that war-time development is not indicated this year on the basis of the claims made by party leaders.

 Gunboats—One sunk. Unclassified warship—One hit. Transport and supply vessels—three set afire and believed destroyed, one believed sunk, seven hit and damaged, five set afire and ultimate fate unknown, ten believed hit and damaged.
 In addition a launch was sunk. Thirty-five attacks were made on eight Japanese bases and naval concentrations in the Solomons area to support the neighboring command while tireless aerial reconnaissance was carried out within the limits of the Southwest Pacific area and assistance was given ground operations in New Guinea. Several flying fortress crews participated in more than half the attacks.
 Throughout all these heavy blows at the enemy's offensive operations and preparations, the Southwest Pacific command reported only two Allied bombers lost over the Solomons.

 twice attacked by enemy bombers and torpedo planes on October 26th near the Santa Cruz Islands in the South Pacific.
 The first attack, which occurred during the forenoon, caused heavy damage and the carrier was taken in tow in an attempt to salvage her. During the afternoon, a second attack caused further damage below the waterline and she began to list. Reports of the sinking of the carrier and damage to one carrier.
 "2. Reports to date indicate that there were few casualties. The next of kin of those lost will be notified by telegram immediately upon receipt of information.
 "3. This carrier and the U. S. Destroyer Porter were the only U. S. vessels lost in the above engagement."
 The carrier was part of a Pacific fleet task force which exchanged air attacks with a strong enemy force October 26. At that time the Navy reported the sinking of the Porter and damage to one carrier. It said also other American vessels suffered lesser damage while two enemy aircraft carriers were damaged in the engagement.
 The personnel of an aircraft carrier ranges from approximately 1,700 listed for the Ranger to 2,100 officers and men for the Lexington and Saratoga. The carriers have approximately 85 planes each aboard.
 Meantime, Navy spokesmen said, there were no new reports of action in the Solomons where United States soldiers and marines have been defending Henderson airfield on Guadalcanal against Japanese assaults and air and surface craft have been engaging the enemy.

RUSSIANS TAKE OFFENSIVE IN BATTLE OF STALINGRAD
 MOSCOW, Sunday, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Germans made new gains yesterday in their offensive across the Nalchik Plains at the foot of the Caucasus mountains, the Soviet mid-night communique said today, but the Red army seized the initiative inside Stalingrad and won new successes north of the Volga City and on the Black Sea front.
 The fact the Russians had gone over to the offensive in Stalingrad was indicated by a statement in the communique that they had fought "battles to improve their positions" after beating off a number of German attacks.
 (A Moscow broadcast said "the Russians in Stalingrad have gone over to the attack and that they have already dislodged the enemy at one point," the London radio reported in a broadcast heard Saturday night by CBS. Northwest of Stalingrad, the broadcast said, the Russians are "slowly but surely pushing the Germans back." The Rome radio broadcast that the Russians have launched a new mass counter-attack in the West Stalingrad.)
 The mid-night communique said that about a battalion of German infantry had been wiped out in Stalingrad and that ten tanks and five blockhouses had been destroyed. Northwest of Stalingrad the Russians were said to have strengthened their positions and occupied a German blockhouse after killing about two platoons of infantry.

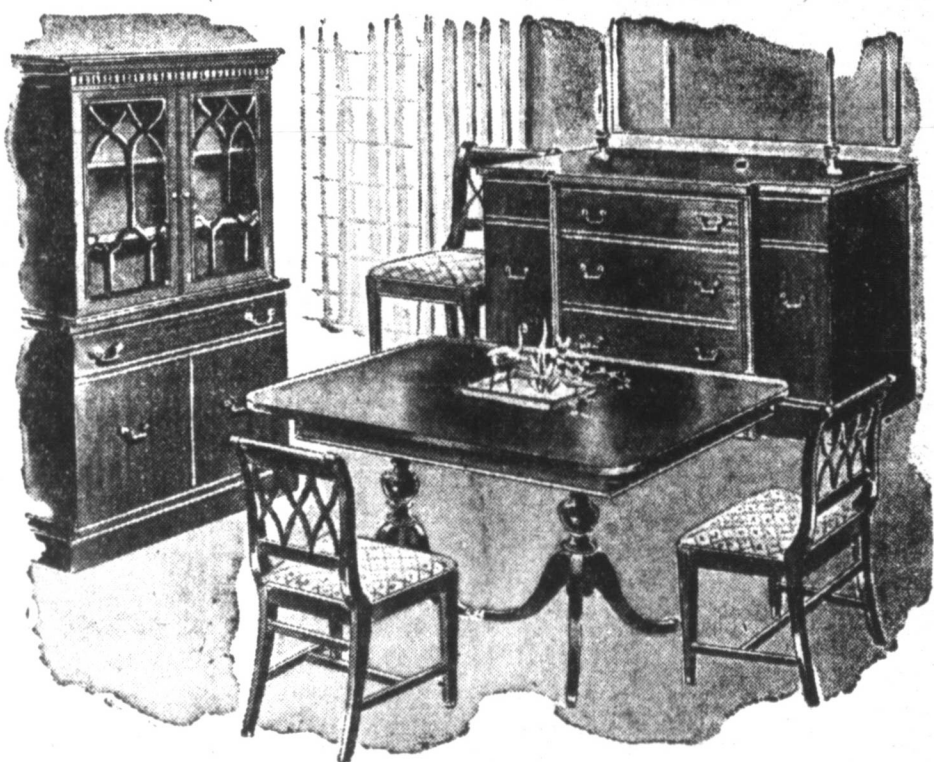

The Russians in the war zones are giving everything they have to winning the war. They need these garments this winter and its up to us to see that they get them.

The production room is in the basement of the post office and the hours are 9 to 11:00 and 2:30 to 4:30. "Services of the American Red Cross to the armed forces are free. No charge may be made at any time for services for which the American

people have given their money to the Red Cross.

Women who crochet are going to start crocheting mittens for men in demolition squads in England. The cotton string and directions for these mittens arrived this week and will be issued from the production room beginning next Thursday. Mrs. Rudolph Taylor is chairman of this project and is now crocheting a sample mitten for you to see.

Services of the American Red Cross to the armed forces are free. They include giving service men information, counsel, assistance in personal problems and caring for the welfare of their families.

Our thanks to Mr. E. M. Holden, superintendent of the Wilcox Oil Co. plant, for having the clothes racks made for us! We are using them in the emergency closet, surgical dressings room, and production room.

Services of the American Red Cross are free. They include aiding United States and Allied prisoners of war in enemy camps.

Mrs. Ray Evans, one of our cutting supervisors, left this week for Providence, Rhode Island, to visit her husband, a warrant officer in the Navy. Mrs. James McCune, who has been working with the production department from the time when we did most of the work in our own homes, is taking Mrs. Evans' place.

uses a wishful communique toward the end of the week.
Some German psychologists have held out for a fine communique on Sunday, but it appears that recently the better thought has been that on Sunday the German has enough other diversions to take care of his morale.

Perhaps the most categorical and complete denial of a wishful German communique yet to be issued was dictated by Lieut. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.
Late in September the Axis spread official reports that "several large ocean-going liners heavily laden with American troops" had been torpedoed. The commander of United States Army forces in Europe waited three weeks and then, in a formal statement, said:
"These claims are completely unfounded, and are merely another example of the untrustworthiness of Axis reports."
"This information has been withheld until every American soldier

who was on the Atlantic at the time of the German announcement was landed safely in the United Kingdom and we could assure ourselves of the complete falsity of the German claims."
But, false or not, the claims probably served a fleeting purpose in bucking up German spirits.
The British admiral was just as categorical yesterday in denying and ridiculing the claim of the Italian submarine Commander Grossi that he had sunk two American battleships.
