He and his wife Mary John have two children, Kate, a second grader and Will who is in the third grade.







It is good to see Marge Toombs back in circulation again. She spent one week in the hospital in Lamesa and about two weeks at home recuperating from the flu.







Cattle Report Shows Decline

AUSTIN--The number of cattle in Texas feedlots as of March 1 had dropped 3 percent from a year ago, but consumers should still find beef in adequate supply in the coming months, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has said.

"Reduced supplies point to slightly higher prices, because beef prices basically depend on supply and demand," Brown said. "People want to eat more beef, but there will be less of it available. With inflation also taking its bite, prices are bound to increase."

While movement of cattle from pastures to slaughter has been reduced sharply in past months (meaning less hamburger and higher prices), larger supplies of grain-fed cattle have helped make up the difference. However, dwindling cattle herds (in Texas as well as other states) are making feeder calves increasingly scarce, and this will cut output of steaks, roasts and other choice cuts.

Dear Sir:



"If this thing blows it will blow a hole the size of Pennsylvania" - - - The China Last August a Snydrome. "scenario" was written in "Harrisburg", a monthly news magazine. This fictional account pictured an accident in a nuclear plant happening on March 28. Correct date -similar accident. Only twelve days before the 3 Mile Island accident the York Daily Record began publishing a series, "Nuclear Accident: The Devastating Consequences". Only fifteen minutes awayfrom the plant sight, the movie "The China Syndrome" was showing. There are eerie parallels in Jane Fonda's latest propag and a vehicle and the "accident". And then, surely I'm not the only one who has read "Overload" - - the book about public utility companies.

What I'm getting at is this: and I'm almost afraid to put it in print. Do you suppose in your wildest dreams that the accident at 3 Mile Island could have been sabotage? Or have I been reading too much fiction and seeing too many movies? But I'm telling you, the parallels are mighty peculiar. Why, after reading "Overload", if I could figger out a fission from a fussion even I would know how to cause an accident. If I wanted to, that is. And that is my point. The "no - nukes" freaks wouldn't object to there being a relatively "safe" accident

as long as it served their purpose - that of de-industrializing this nation by setting back any progress in the harnessing of energy by years. The Great Leap Backward is what some call the philosophy of these no-nukers and extremist environmentalists.

It is the In thing these days to oppose nuclear power - just as it has been popular to oppose strip mining, offshore drilling, refineries - - anything

that would be a means of getting energy to US. One col-umnist put it this way, "will we reduce our standard of living sharply to avoid imperiling our own lives, and those of our children, born and yet unborn? The 19th century seems to be an exemplary way of life. Now I'm for long petticoats, pantaloons and candle light. I learned to read by a kerosene lamp and to cook on a wood burning stove. When we got electricity, it was fueled by a wind charger. But I wonder if these freaks have not misplaced their priorities. Look at the Great Leap Forward we have made in the 20th century thru the use of energy. Nuclear devices are used to scan for disease - radiation is used to cure disease. It takes more than wind power to operate life support systems. And it takes more than a kerosene lamp to replace

a lens in an eye. No one is arguing that nuclear energy is fails afe. There are very tangible dangers. But there are dangers inherent in any method of conversion of energy to productive use. From the time men discovered fire there have been accidents - there have been well blow-outs gas and chemical plants have blown up-- mines have caved in men have died from flack lung disease--dams have burst, But as a power source, nuclear energy has a high safety record and is one of the cleaner sources of energy. There has never in history been a more thorough scientific approch. made than to the development of this energy source. No one would dare to guarantee to eliminate all danger. But dangers and accidents are involved in all other sources--remember Promethius? He flew too close to the sun and his wings melted off.

What are the propagandists and saboteurs going to do when the lights go out all over the world?



Help children play safely and happily by providing them with safe playground equipment.

Playground equipment related injuries send about 118,000 children to hospital emergency rooms each year, according to U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commissionestimates.

Most injuries occur to children under 10 years old with falls from slides and climbing equipment the most frequent hazards.

Parents can use the following suggestions to help safeguard their children from playground injury: Select equipment wisely and

take care with placement.

To help reduce the severity of injuries from falls, place equipment on a grassy or soft ground sürface--never on hard surfaces such as concrete, blacktop, birck or cinder.

Locate equipment at least six feet from fences, walkways, walls or other play areas. Set equipment legs in concrete below ground level to

prevent a tripping hazard. Place metal sliding boards to prevent burns from sun-

heated sliding surfaces. Construct a landing pit in

front of slides from sand or similar materials. Place ablock under each end

of the seesaw so that children will not catch their feet if the board decends too rapidly.

Make maintenance checks at the beginning of the play season and at least every two weeks during the season.

Tighten any loose nuts, bolts or hooks.

Apply tape over protruding screws or bolts and over sharp or rough edges, especially on swing seats and slide edges. Replace rusted parts, including swing chains.

Replace worn ropes on climbing nets and tire swings or standing swings attached to a tree. Nylon or synthetic rope is usually more durable than rope made of natural fibers.

Oil any moving parts, sand and repaint any rusted metal tubing with unleaded paint, sand any wooden equipment, refill landing pits and cover foundations with several inches of soil.



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

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Rising Farm Income Figures Don't Tell Complete Story

EVEN THOUGH NET FARM INCOME improved substantially last year, Texas still lost over 3,000 farms and ranches, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has noted.

"Current, estimates place 1978 U. S. net farm income about \$8 billion higher than the depressed levels of 1977, and prospects for 1979 are even better," Brown said. "But, obviously, these figures can be misleading.

"Any farm price increases are welcome, and muchdeserved," he said. "But there is another side to the coin."

Brown noted that steadily rising equipment and fuel costs, higher interest rates, farm debt levels, labor problems and price weaknesses in some commodities have taken much of the shine off of the farm picture.

"Because of the cost/price squeeze and other factors, several thousand farms and ranches went out of business in Texas alone last year," he said. "Over three million" farms have been lost nationwide since World War II, and this trend shows few signs of leveling off. There's no question that the continuing decline in family farms -- which most of these are -- is bad for the country. "The trend today is toward fewer, but larger farms," he said. "Let us not forget that the family-owned and operated farm has made the American agriculture industry what it is today. The

family farm, when wellmanaged and adequately financed, has proven to be the most efficient method of producing food and fiber.

"I believe that our farmland and water resources are best taken care of by the people who depend on them for their livelihoods," he remarked.

"It has been said that the best fertilizer one can put on farmland is the footprint of its owner, and I've seen plenty of evidence that this is true."



Be it April in Paris, Paducah, Philadelphia or Phoenix, we welcome it with joy in our hearts. Here's a chance to get the family together for Easter decorating. This year, why not try a popcorn lamb?
