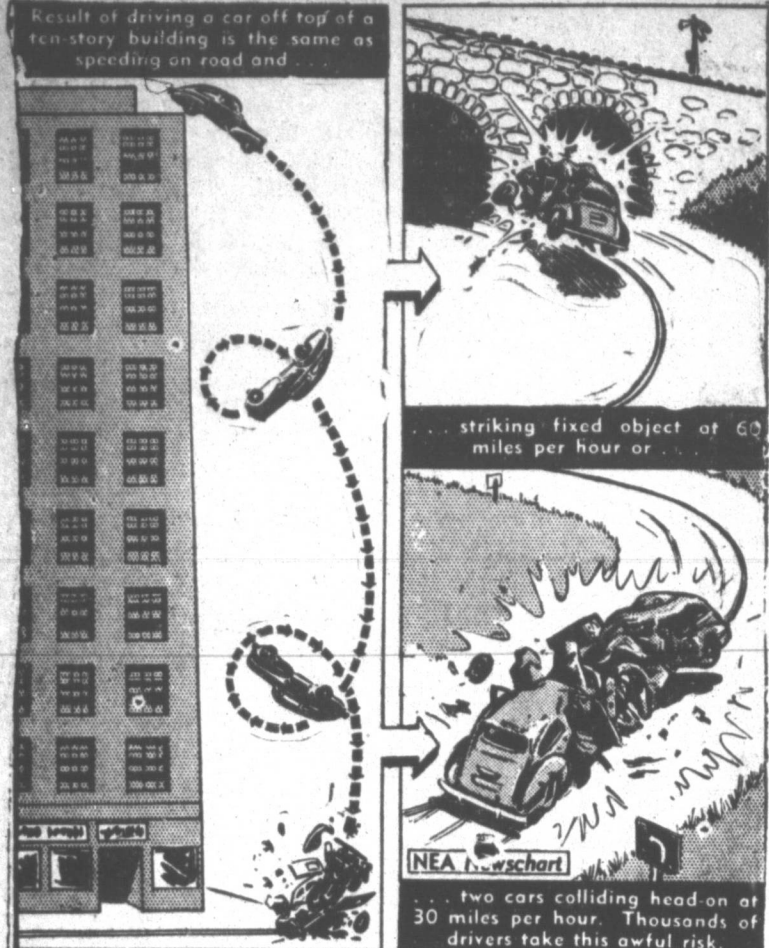


This Is No Worse Than This

14 Pickets Arrested As Plant Reopened

CONNEVILLE, Ind. (AP)—Fourteen pickets were arrested by state police as the Rex Manufacturing company was re-opened today with state guardsmen and state police at the gates.

Other than for shouting by the pickets, which led to their arrest, the scene was quiet as workers streamed through the gates into the two plants, scene of a union jurisdictional fight.

Two hundred state guardsmen arrived early this morning. The state police on duty were increased to 130.

The Rex employee pickets (CIO) were joined by several hundred pickets, also CIO, from the nearby American Central Manufacturing company.

The pickets arrested today brought to 26 the number of pickets arrested since the Rex company was granted a circuit court injunction against interference with office workers entering the plant.

3 Ex-Servicemen Join Staff of Pampa News

Three ex-servicemen have joined the staff of The Pampa Daily News.

James H. Brannan, who came here from the New York Daily News Record, was discharged from the army last February. Prior to his employment with the News Record, he was employed by the International News Service (a wire service) for a number of years. He will serve as reporter with the editorial department.

Charles Richard ("Dick") Stedum, who has been a resident of Pampa since 1939, served 18 months with the navy air force. Prior to his service in the armed forces, he was a member of the Pampa police force. He will work on the staff of the News advertising department.

Herman Gray, a resident of Pampa for five years prior to spending four years in the service of the United States, is completing his training in the mechanical department of the News. He had previously worked for the News for three years and nine months for the Pampa Press.

July Is Big Month For Savings Bonds

WASHINGTON (AP)—Americans bought \$752,985,000 in savings bonds during July, topping all months since January by a wide margin, the treasury reported today.

The figure covers combined sales of the E war bonds, F and G series, which exceeded total cash-ins by \$252,804,000.

REPORTS ON BRITISH SOCIALISM

It has now been nearly a year since the present Labor government took office in Great Britain. Appraisals of its record are beginning to appear in British publications. These hold a special interest for us, as well as for the British. For while Labor's overwhelming victory at the polls last summer probably resulted from many factors, the novel feature of its campaign platform was that which called for the nationalization of certain basic industries. Britain, in short, voted to embark on a fairly large scale experiment with socialism.

May Is Suffering 'General Collapse'

PRESTONBURG, Ky.—(AP)—Rep. Andrew J. May (D-Ky) is confined to his bed by a severe attack of the flu, Dr. John Archer, who said the chairman of the House Military Affairs committee is suffering from a "general collapse" which prevents him from activity for "at least a couple of weeks."

The doctor expressed amazement at "the change in his (May's) appearance" since he last saw him about six months ago.

Dr. Archer said he had refused to discuss with May when the congressman might be able to even sit up in a chair.

"He's pretty weak and has to recuperate," Dr. Archer said. "If he should overdo it, it might prolong his illness that much longer."

A physician said he would not estimate the time he long May would have to rest, but that "in a couple of weeks we may be able to tell when he can resume his normal activities."

The republican senatorial nomination is being sought by Thomas Sweeney and Claude R. Hill, a critic of the PAC.

In Arkansas, democrats vote in a runoff primary on five congress seats.

Delaware republicans close the week's political activities with a primary Saturday to select delegates to an August 14 state convention which will pick a senatorial nominee.

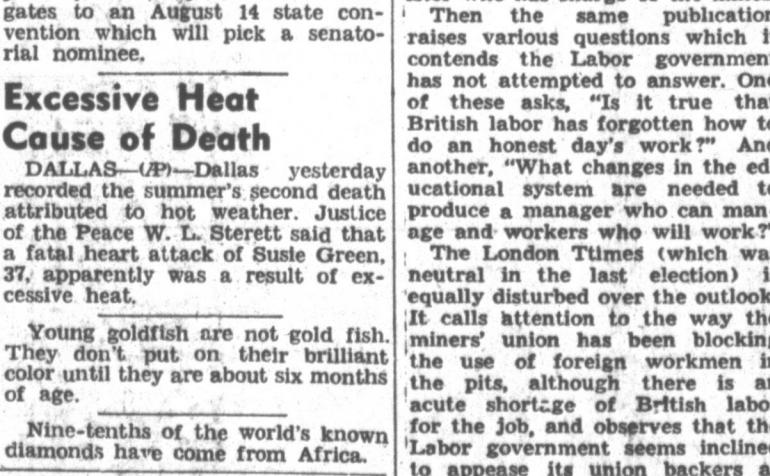
Excusive Heat Cause of Death

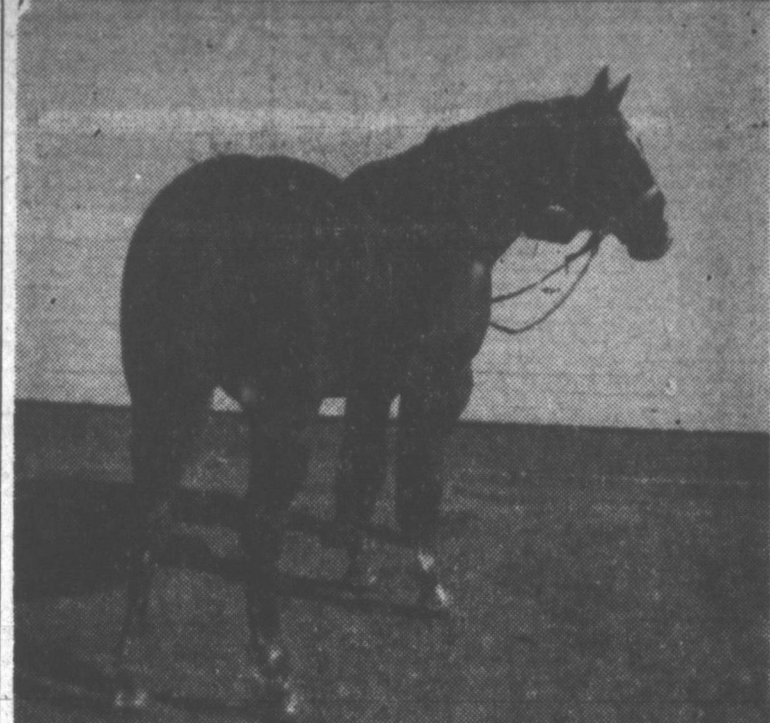

OPA Sees Rise In Cloth Price

WASHINGTON (AP)—Cotton clothing price increases of six to eight per cent and a 17 per cent boost in the cost of household linens are forecast by OPA today as it ordered higher textile ceilings into effect immediately.

The increase for cotton textiles required under the new price control law, averages about 16 per cent, OPA said.

The 17 per cent retail increase expected on household linens also will apply on cotton piece goods.

OPA plans to make higher retail ceilings effective soon.

The price hike at the mill level result principally from requirements that OPA base textile ceilings on:

1. The market price of raw cotton, rather than the parity price.
 2. Prices of 1939-41, rather than those of 1936-39 as heretofore.
- OPA said that in calculating new textile ceilings it used as current cotton costs the average of New York Cotton exchange October futures during the period from June 23 to July 22.

write the treaties" on the questions on which the council is not in agreement.

He thus sought to answer the argument of the smaller powers that as long as the four principal powers vote together there is little or no possibility of obtaining a two-thirds vote in the conference against any decision of the council.

It was understood that the French and British delegations were ready to go along with the United States in pledging support to the conference's two-thirds majority votes in the council.
