

TRUMAN SAYS: 'Save Public Money'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman today called all federal officials to keep public expenditures "at the lowest possible level."

In a formal statement, Mr. Truman declared that reductions in federal expenditures are imperative in view of the present inflationary situation.

The President's statement was contained in a letter to the heads of all executive departments and agencies, it said.

"We must do everything in our power to reduce inflationary pres-

sure. One of the most effective means of doing this is to reduce federal expenditures."

The President made his statement public at a news conference at which he announced he will hold a news conference on the budget at the White House at 2 p.m. (CST) tomorrow.

The statement emphasized that the nation's present fiscal situation "is a most serious one."

"We are faced with a continued substantial budget deficit in the present year," it continued. "Even those federal expenditures which

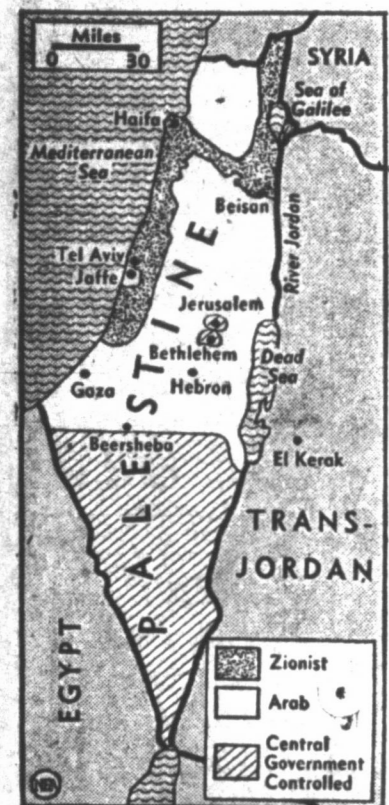

Committee Seeking Bad Shell Sources

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The senate war investigating committee set out today on the back-trail of defective chemical mortar shells which killed American soldiers in the battle of the bulge.

Concluding the first phase of its open hearings on war contracts, the committee announced it will give "high priority" to a separate "major investigation" seeking to fix responsibility for failure of the shells and the resultant casualties.

Road Funds Set At 10 Millions

AUSTIN—(AP)—The state highway commission today appropriated \$10,000,000 for highway maintenance during the fiscal year beginning next Sept. 1.

The figure is an increase of \$1,000,000 over the department's earlier estimate of its regular road maintenance bill for the coming year.

Commission Chairman John S. Redditt said the increase is due in part to the 555 miles of road, mostly in the farm to market category, which has been added to the state system since the last budget was made.

GI Money Bill Waits Signature

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The \$3,000,000,000 GI terminal pay bill headed for President Truman's desk today as house members laid plans to get around its "payment in bonds" provisions early next year.

The measure cleared both chambers of congress yesterday. Acting last, the house contented itself for the present with denouncing the senate-inspired bond-payment plan. Members were afraid to reject it lest the legislation get lost in controversy during the closing days of the session.

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CONGRESS HITS SNAG

Ex-Marine Kills Amarillo Couple, Buries Bodies

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif.—(AP)—Emmett Patterson, 30-year-old ex-marine charged with murder, yesterday told a jury that he had buried the bodies of his brother-in-law, William B. Cole, 47, and sister, Alene, 33, on the desert "because I wanted to get my health back before I told my story."

Testifying in his own defense, Patterson said he killed his brother-in-law after the latter had fatally beaten Patterson's sister.

Price Raises in Flour, Loaf Bread Studied by OPA

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The government is trying to reach a decision today on whether to allow price increases of a penny a loaf on bread and about a cent a pound on flour.

Top OPA and agriculture department officials conferred on this as the new price control board pushed plans to start public hearings by August 12 on this issue.

Mystery Shrouds Circumstance of Woman's Death

CANSET, Mass.—(AP)—A body identified by police as that of pretty Ruth McGurk, 25-year-old Cambridge visitor, was discovered today in a lonely cranberry bog reservoir ten miles from the dance hall from which she vanished Saturday night.

The body was clad in a pink dress, but medical examiner E. Vincent Smith said undergarments were missing. Shoes also were missing and the victim suffered external violence, were stained with a black substance which residents said was foreign to the area.

Justice Jackson To Stay--Truman

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman said today he expects Associate Justice Robert H. Jackson to resume his duties on the supreme court upon his return to the United States.

Jackson, chief U. S. prosecutor at Nuremberg, is due back in Washington tomorrow.

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Kentuckian Will Get Federal Post

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman announced today he is appointing Keen Johnson, former governor of Kentucky, as undersecretary of labor.

The president also told his news conference he is naming William L. Clayton undersecretary of state in charge of economic affairs under new legislation he is prepared to sign.

AUSTIN—(AP)—The railroad commission today ordered two additional shutdown days for West Texas (commission district 8) oil fields during August, bringing total shutdown there to nine days, instead of seven as previously ordered for the month.

Big Four Agreement Is Road to Success

NEW YORK—(AP)—Secretary-general Trygve Lie said today that the success of the United Nations hinged directly on the big powers seeking agreement among themselves in a spirit of understanding and compromise and that failure would mean "the triumph of destruction."

Declaring that he did not feel that the world agency so far had fulfilled the broad hopes placed in it, Lie said that the power of veto granted to the Big Five "imposed upon them an obligation to seek agreement among themselves."

Trucks Slowed by Big Trash Loads

Although men on the trucks being used in the current clean-up drive may be behind schedule, it is because the amount of trash and garbage being picked up is unusually large, officials of the drive said today.

Bill for Control Of Pollution Shelved

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Legislation to control stream pollution bogged down today in controversy and proponents said it would be shelved.

The controversy centers on a provision giving the federal government broad authority to compel industries and even local governments to cooperate in measures to abate pollution of navigable streams.

Slip Between Shivers, CIO Beginning To Show

AUSTIN—(AP)—A political clash was out in the open today between State Senator Allan Shivers, run-off candidate for lieutenant governor, and the CIO leaders of his Fort Arthur home precinct.

After his name had been struck from the precinct's list of delegates to the Jefferson County Democratic convention, Shivers fapped pointedly: "The noisemakers and radicals are opposing me now because they could not dictate to me during my 12 years in the senate, and they know they will not be able to dictate to me as your lieutenant governor."

Proposal Is Raised By Greeks

PARIS—(AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov agreed today to a Greek proposal to open the peace conference to all "questions pertaining to the draft of peace treaties."

Italo-Yugoslav Line Rejected By Delegation

FARIS—(AP)—The Yugoslav delegation served notice at the peace conference today that it would not accept the compromise solution of Trieste.

The foreign ministers council recently voted to establish Trieste as international territory under United Nations authority. The U. N. has not accepted the responsibility, however.

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PARIS—(AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov agreed today to a Greek proposal to open the peace conference to all "questions pertaining to the draft of peace treaties."

In supporting the Greek motion, Molotov proposed that the rules of procedure of the conference be amended to include the statement that:

"The conference may place on its agenda at the request of any delegation any question pertaining to the draft of peace treaties."

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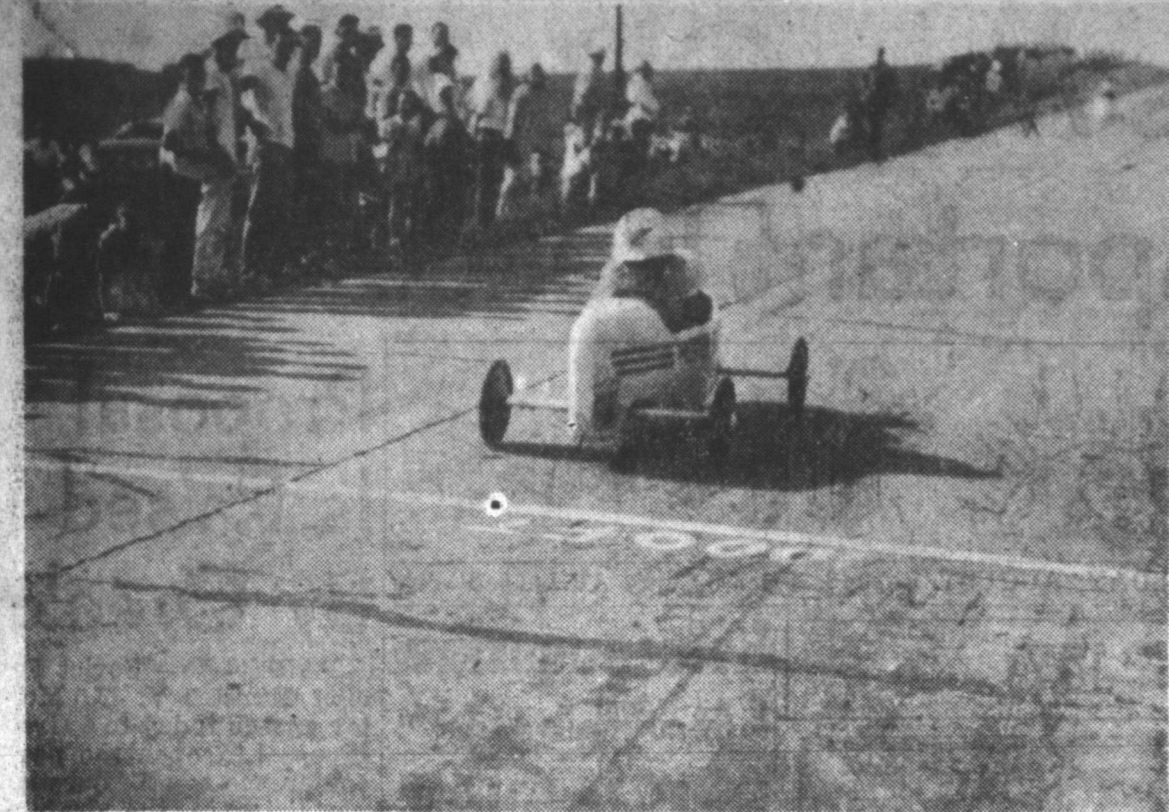

Reorganization Of Committees Affects Texans

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The new legislative reorganization act will have a far reaching effect on Texas members of congress.

The measure has three important sections: It revamps committees, establishes a pension or annuity retirement program, and increases salaries from \$10,000 to \$12,500 annually, plus a \$2,500 expense account.

Opening the 80th congress next Jan. 3 will almost certainly precipitate some lively, intra-party scraps over membership on committees, primarily in the house because the number is reduced from 44 to 19 standing committees. Whether the democrats win or lose control of that body, Speaker Sam Rayburn of Bonham is expected to have an important say-so in determination of a policy to be followed in selecting membership on committees.

If the republicans should take over the house, Rayburn, as minority party leader, would still wield much influence.

Under the reorganization, some of the oldest and most important committees are merged, the house military and naval committees become the committee on armed services. Seniority has always determined chairmanships, and undoubtedly will continue to be the determining factor. But the question arising out of the organization is the selection of a chairman of a new committee created by a merger, and of determining whether a chairman of a dissolved committee shall assume seniority over a younger congressman, from a service standpoint, who happens to be on a committee absorbing the other group.

Looking into the possible effects of a new setup on the 21 Texas house members one finds this situation:

Reps. Edwing Thomason of El Paso and Paul Kilday of San Antonio rank second and fifth respectively on the military committee, while Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson of Austin ranks third on the naval committee. Each of these groups now has 47 members. The new armed services committee will have only 33 members. Who will be left out in the change? Presumably seniority will be a controlling factor, but under that procedure Texas would have three members. This undoubtedly would meet with vigorous objection from other states. If one of these Texans then had to give up his assignment on that group, would he have to go to the bottom of some other committee?

As for the chairmanship of the armed services committee, seniority probably will dictate the selection of Rep. Carl Vinson of Georgia, the present head of the naval committee. His service here exceeds that of Rep. Andrew Jackson May of Kentucky, now head of the military group. Thomason, who would succeed to chairmanship of the military committee in the event May was not returned, would thus drop down a notch in the scale of the merged group.

While the El Pasoan was thus being shoved further from a chairmanship, the reorganization would at the same time place another Texas head of a newly created and highly important "committee on public works," assuming he is re-elected.

The new committee would be a consolidation of the rivers and harbors, flood control and public buildings and grounds committees. The last named has been headed by retiring Rep. Fritz Lanham of Fort Worth as chairman of the rivers and harbors committee and senior member of the three committees concerned, Rep. J. Mansfield of Columbus likely would become head of the new committee on public works if he is re-elected.

The effect of the reorganization is to make subcommittees more powerful than they have been, so that the position of a member on a major committee which has been left intact becomes more strategic than ever. Thus, assuming he is re-elected, Rep. West on the ways and means committee, Reps. George Mahon of Colorado City and Albert Thomas of Houston on the appropriations committee, Lindley Bechworth of Gilmer on the interstate and foreign commerce committee and W. R. Poage of Waco and Gene Worley of Shamrock on the agriculture committee, will find themselves in more influential spots than ever before.

Alternative Sites For UN Selected

NEW YORK—(AP)—The United Nations Headquarters Commission announced Monday the selection of 15 possible sites for the permanent home of the United Nations in the Westchester-Fairfield area of New York and Connecticut.

The proposed sites for the world capital range from two square miles to 42 square miles. After discussing each site with the people involved, the commission will cut the list down to five sites to be considered by the general assembly at its meeting in New York this fall.

In New York, the towns figuring in the sites are Harrison, Rye, Cortlandt, Yorktown, Bedford, North Castle and New Castle. In Connecticut, the towns concerned are Greenwich, Tamford, Ridgefield and Milford.

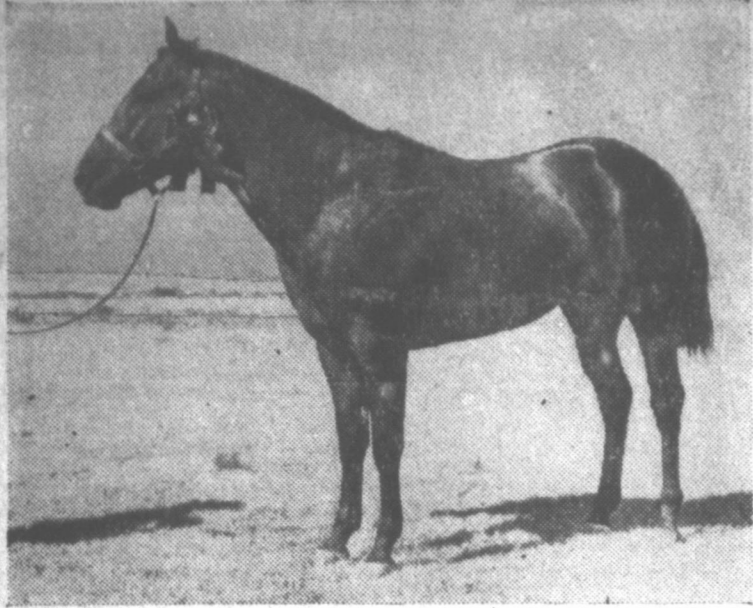

Dan Moody To Take Million-Dollar Law Suit to State Supreme Court

CORPUS CHRISTI—(AP)—The city of Corpus Christi has employed former Gov. Dan Moody at a fee of \$5,000 as special counsel in carrying a million dollar lawsuit to the state supreme court.

The suit had its origin in the dam city water reservoir at Matthis lake in November, 1930, shortly after it went into service.

Plaintiffs in the action were bondholders who provided the money with which lake properties were purchased by the city and the dam structure, elevated tank and other equipment were created.

The bonds had been ruled invalid by a federal court judge because

they had not been authorized by a referendum prior to issuance.

More than two and one-half million dollars had been sought by the plaintiffs in cash settlement of their claim that the dam and lake properties belonged to them since their money was used in creating the water works plant.

A district court judgment of \$1,100,425 against the city was brought in the trial court decision last year. In the tenth court of civil appeals at Waco, three judgments totaling \$2,183,015 had been awarded the bondholders. After the court withdrew the bondholders \$1,700,000, awarded the bondholders \$1,700,000, \$225,566.

That was withdrawn and a third judgment awarded the bondholders \$1,883,556.07.

The appeals court has denied all motions for a rehearing and the city is preparing a request for a writ of error to be filed in supreme court.

Argentina Will Be Asked to Join IEFC

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Argentina will be requested soon to decide whether to join the international emergency food council. Dr. Dennis A. Fitzgerald, secretary-general, said Wednesday.

He told reporters that if Argentina decides not to join, she will lose her provisional membership on the council's nine-nation central committee and be replaced at the September meeting of the 19 member nations.

If Argentina joins the council, she will then be obligated to turn over her surplus wheat to the world pool. Argentina is one of the "big four" wheat producing countries. The others are the United States, Canada and Australia.

Chicago Professor Will Speak to TTA

AUSTIN—(AP)—Dr. Russell H. Morgan, assistant professor of roentgenology at the University of Chicago, has been invited to speak at the Texas Tuberculosis association meeting Sept. 16-17 at Houston.

He will be in charge of a two-hour conference on X-ray reported Pansy Nichols, executive secretary of the association, who also announced that nineteen Texas physicians will be on the medical section program.

SECTION II. All motor vehicles used by said grantee for the transportation of passengers under this franchise, shall be modern type passenger-carrying motor vehicles of not less than twenty (20) seated passenger capacity, and shall at all times be kept and maintained in good repair, suitable for the transportation of passengers, and shall be first approved by the City Commission before being placed in service, and shall be subject to inspection by said City Commission, or by any duly authorized inspector, agent or employee of the City of Pampa.
