commerce calls attention to this information contained in the bulletin: Medical science still does not know the carrying agent of the polio virus, nor has it found an effective serum or vaccine. It is known that 50 per cent of all infantile paralysis victims recover completely, 30 per cent are left with slight disability and only 20 per cent suffer serious crippling or death.

Infantile paralysis is difficult to diagnose. Symptoms present in many minor illnesses—fever, headache, vomiting, nausea—may also be symptoms of infantile paralysis. A physician should be consulted at the slightest suspicion of the disease. Simple precautions recommended for epidemic areas are:

1. Avoid chilling and overting.
  2. Do not swim or bathe in polluted waters.
  3. Avoid tonsil and adenoid operations in children during the paralysis season.
  4. Wash hands before eating.
  5. Protect food from flies.
- Fear and panic are harmful to the efforts of a community or individual in the fight against poliomyelitis. The advice and assistance of expert medical personnel having treatment centers and the best equipment at their disposal, are readily available to combat epidemics and minimize the effects of the disease. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and its chapters are pledged that no victim need lack treatment for lack of funds regardless of age, race, creed, or color.

**C. of C. Says Prepare For Increase of Polio**

"Our community must be prepared again for the late summer and fall increase in the number of infantile paralysis cases," the Pampa chamber of commerce said today. Need for the state and city clean-up campaign is evident. Already three polio cases have been reported this summer in Gray county, two of which were in Pampa.

Medical experts cannot predict where or whom the disease will attack, but they admit epidemics may occur in some localities during the next few months. Helpful information and precautions that may prevent the spread of poliomyelitis, or lessen its severity, have been summarized in a bulletin published recently by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. ### Allowable Oil Production in Texas Reduced

AUSTIN—(AP)—Texas allowable oil production for August is being eased back for the second consecutive month from the state's all-time peak in June.

The railroad commission's August order is calculated to result in production of 2,164,526 barrels of crude daily, a decrease of 98,829 barrels from July's permissive daily flow.

The average daily allowable in August will be 2,308,823 barrels, but estimated underproduction of 1.25 percent is expected to cut actual production to the 2,164,526 figure.

Production of 179,205 barrels daily of natural gasoline and distillates will increase total flow of liquid petroleum to 2,343,731 barrels daily.

Reduction from this month's allowable was applied principally in West Texas, where general producing days were cut to 24 from this month's 27.

The reduction in West Texas was requested at a statewide hearing here yesterday by operators in that district to prevent excessive above ground storage.

The net allowable by districts as of July 15, compared with the August allowable:

### 2 Local Firemen Attending School

Four hundred and thirty-eight firemen and fire marshals from Pampa, Amarillo, Carlsbad, Dalhart and many other Texas cities and towns registered for the 17th annual school for firemen at Texas A. & M. Monday, July 15. Classes began at 8:30 Monday morning and will close with a written examination at 11 a. m. tomorrow.

Attending from Pampa, are Fire Chief Ben White and W. A. Clauch; Canadian, R. L. Durham and Carlsbad; Higgins, Ross Zenor and O. E. Gillespie; Amarillo, Fire Marshal Ed Spann, Firemen Wilson and Stephens and from Dalhart, Chief E. W. McTeens and Fireman Ehrig.

The schedule called for nine classes each morning and nine each afternoon, beginning Monday morning. Each class is held twice a day, once in the morning and once in the afternoon, with the classes being the same every day. The subjects studied by the attending firemen and fire marshals are: forcible entry, which explains the various methods of entering the house without breaking the windows, or wrecking the doors; ladders and knots, the proper ladder-raising procedure to be followed, salvage, or cleaning up after the fire.

One of the most difficult jobs of the firemen is the operation of the pumps. The pump operator must be able to judge the amount of pressure which is coming out of the hose whether he is in view of it or not, and must keep his pumping equipment in perfect condition at all times.

Other courses taken at the school are: fire fighting, practice, hose evolution, pump theory, minor tools and equipment and hose maintenance. Completion of the courses offered, gives a city a 3 per cent reduction in key rate.

(Continued From Page 1) limits of the U. S., he wouldn't be drafted.

Some misunderstanding may have occurred because, while selective service was tightening up to get more men, the army suspended the enlistment of Negroes.

This did not mean that the army was getting so many volunteers that it really wouldn't need any draftees. It meant only this: Any Negro who was enlisting at that time was getting a white man's place in the army.

So many Negroes were enlisting that the proportion of Negroes to white men in the army would be greater than the army wants.

Out of 140,000 Negroes enlisted since last fall, which means: One out of every five recruits has been a Negro. But the proportion

of Negroes to whites in this country is about 1 to 10.

The army wants to keep the proportion of Negroes in the service at 1 to 10. So, except for some Negro specialists, the army has suspended the enlistment of Negroes for a while.

(Continued From Page 1) loan—a \$300,000,000 item — was scheduled to be made available to the American free trade program.

One of the principal factors involved in the loan was that with an ample supply of dollars great Britain would be able to support the American free trade program.

Hence officials here are counting on the trade conference early next year to bring early relaxation and ultimate abolishment of British empire trade preferences. This system

has made it more economical for members of the empire to trade among themselves rather than with outsiders.

The tariff cuts by this and other countries would round out the program.

American trade officials acknowledge, however, that some other practices followed by this government also will have to be revised. They mentioned specifically the rent quota placed on imports of Swiss watches as well as subsidies and artificial price levels established or contemplated for American cotton and wool.

**Texans Warned of Food Experts Study Personal Hygiene By Health Officer**

AUSTIN—In addition to the general instructions for community sanitation which are important in preventing poliomyelitis, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, today issued an argument warning to every individual in Texas to practice strict personal hygiene to protect his own health and that of those about him.

"Of course, cleanliness and personal hygiene are ordinarily taken for granted," Dr. Cox said, "but at this time the incidence of poliomyelitis having reached a total of 292 cases, I would like to re-emphasize some personal sanitary measures which may help in preventing the spread of this crippling and often fatal disease."

The state health officer stressed the importance of scrupulous cleanliness of the person. Frequent bathing and immaculately clean clothing are vitally necessary. Oral hygiene through brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic are recommended. The nasal passages should be kept clean and dental defects corrected immediately.

Sanitation and thorough cleanliness in the home are instinctive with the average housewife, but at this time their importance to health must be re-emphasized. Home sanitation includes those taken-for-granted measures such as washing the dishes in hot, soapy water and rinsing them in hot, clear water; keeping sinks, bathtubs and fixtures scoured and rinsed with a mild antiseptic solution; sunning and airing bed clothes, ridding the home of flies, rats and roaches which, since poliomyelitis is believed to be a fly-borne disease, are suspected as being responsible for transmission.

"If good personal hygiene is combined with good community sanitation and hygiene, it is hard for any disease to get a foothold," Dr. Cox said. "With such a dread disease as poliomyelitis prevalent in the state, no precautions should be overlooked and no bars should be left down for its entrance."

It is estimated that an ordinary elm tree of medium size will give off 15,000 pounds of water on a clear, dry, hot day.

**Vets To Receive Credit Extension**

FORT WORTH—(Special)—Uncle Sam will extend a thirty day credit to Texas veterans who are owners of established businesses and to other businessmen who want to buy surplus property at forthcoming "on site" sales to be held in the Fort Worth region, according to an announcement made today by Hamilton Morton, W.A. regional director. Credit arrangements must be completed before the sales begin and buyers will have to pay cash unless they bring a "letter of credit" issued by the Fort Worth regional office.

Applications for credit may be made now, by formal application either by letter or in person, to B. E. Winder, chief of the war assets administration's regional credit division, T. E. building, Fort Worth. A total of thirty-five million dollars worth of surplus property is expected to be offered at seven "on site" sales in the Fort Worth region during July, August and September.

### Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Notebook

EION, Switzerland—(7)—For the farmers living far up in the isolated valleys of the Valais Canton in Southwestern Switzerland, their annual cow fights are no less thrilling than a heavyweight championship boxing bout to citizens of the U. S.

Toward the end of June herds of the stocky, combative brown and black cattle known here as the "Herence" breed are driven to high pastures just beneath the glaciers and snow covered tops of the Alps to spend the summer.

On the same day approximately 200 cows, chosen from the different stables, are assembled on the grazing ground to determine a queen which will become the acknowledged summer leader of the combined herds.

It is a great honor as well as financially interesting for a farmer to own a queen cow. Rivalries are sharp and often the excitable temper of the Valaisans, noted all over Switzerland, flares in heated argument, sometimes culminating in violent fist encounters and life-long family feuds.

The cow fights start early in the morning. The animals are herded together in as level a field as can be found in this rugged country. Their horns have been blunted and sharp tips removed. The air is filled

ed with lowing and bawling and the thud of hundreds of cow bells.

The clashes are short, but violent. Two cows will maneuver with lowered heads for a good stacking position, then hurl themselves against each other, locking horns and straining with the whole weight of their muscular bodies until one yields to superior strength.

The trial by individual combat continues for about three days after the arrival at pasture, but the fights never wholly cease all summer as some of the cows try again and again to improve their rating. The queen, however, seldom is attacked after the first flurries, her impressive series of early victories giving her such prestige that other cows apparently feel handicapped from the beginning.

For weeks before the drive to pasture special candidates for the title receive special care and are fed the best hay and oats and even bread and white wine to increase their fighting spirit. They also are allowed to produce less milk. That is why, during the war, cow fights officially were forbidden by the government.


