

INDUSTRY URGED TO 'TRUST OPA'

Pope Declares 'Without God There Cannot Be Real Unity'

Committee To Vote on Vets' Home Program

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—The question of putting \$1,600,000 in federal funds behind President Truman's program for 2,700,000 new houses came up for a vote today in the house banking committee.

HALT QUESTIONING
The committee agreed to interrupt its questioning of Chester Bowles on continuation of price controls and turned its attention to the legislation intended to provide an unprecedented number of new homes for war veterans in the next two years.

It must decide whether to write into the bill a provision for a \$1,000,000,000 increase in the federal housing administration's authorization to insure housing mortgages, and also whether the government should provide \$600,000,000 for subsidy payments to bring out larger production of scarce building materials.

FORD INVITED
Meanwhile, Chairman Spence (D-Ky) telegraphed Henry Ford 2nd, inviting him to appear personally before the committee to give his side of the Ford Motor company's argument for OPA on automobile price ceilings.

Young Ford came dramatically into the price control picture yesterday when Bowles, newly appointed economic stabilizer, told the banking group the Ford Motor Co. had requested a 55 percent increase in the price of Ford automobiles.

'OUTRAGEOUS' REQUEST
This happened last summer, Bowles said, calling the request "outrageous." Instead Ford got a price increase of about six percent over the 1942 figures at the manufacturer's level.

Carrying his fight for price control extension to the nation in a radio address last night, Bowles lashed out at the "few small but powerful pressure groups" which he said are trying to break down the defenses against higher living costs.

Tuberculin Tests Will Be Given in All Local Schools

Testing of school children in a county wide search for tuberculosis germs will start Friday at Woodrow Wilson school, with Mrs. Joe Stephens, R. N., in charge of giving the patch tests.

Students have been issued slips for obtaining their parents permission to be tested. Monday students at the Junior high school will have the opportunity to find out whether they have a positive or negative reaction to the tuberculin test.

Positive tests do not necessarily mean a person has active tuberculosis, although the person should have a chest X-ray immediately to discover the stage and extent of the tuberculosis germs.

Those who have negative reactions to the test should have another test within a year, it is advised by health authorities.

Plans for tuberculin tests for children in Gray county have been in the formative stage for the past weeks, it being difficult to obtain a qualified person, eligible to give the tests.

The program is sponsored by the Gray County Tuberculosis Assn., whose officers are Hueyln Laylock, president; Mrs. H. M. Stokes, vice president; and B. R. Nuckols, treasurer and recording secretary.

Total tax collection in Gray county during January were \$22,950.52, it was reported today from the county tax collection office.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Pope Pius XII told the assembly of cardinals that "it is the church which rises today in this world like a signal because without God there cannot be among men real unity."

The pope's broadcast from Vatican City was recorded in London by the Associated Press.

Speaking in the Vatican's high, frescoed hall of benedictions the pope commented on "this poor world in which hunger is so prevalent."

The address, broadcast in Italian by the Vatican radio, began at 12:23 p. m. Eastern Standard Time, after the pope had placed barettes on the heads of 29 of the 32 new cardinals created at Monday's secret consistory.

Speaking of the position of the Roman Catholic church in the post-war world, the pontiff added:

SOCIAL EQUILIBRIUM
"The church contributes to the equilibrium of the social structure of the world. The church forms and creates man."

Dwelling on one of his favorite themes, the universality of the church, he declared:

"The church is a perfect society which embraces all men. All people and nations are called upon to be with the church."

FAITH IN THE CHURCH
"The church looks after those who have been evacuated from homes or who, because of military service, have stayed away from their homes."

The pontiff pleaded: "Let us have faith in the church. If everything around it crumbles, it remains unshaken."

"The faithful themselves must be the church and therefore they have united themselves into the society of the church."

It is the aim of the supernatural of the church to form this society.

"This is particularly difficult today when men are declared guilty for the sole reason that they belong to a certain community. This is assuming divine powers."

Morgan is an educator, writer and lecturer. He is a member of the speakers bureau of the Douglas Aircraft company. The subject is a colloquy to the theme of all four lectures sponsored by the Rotary club, i. e., "Steps Toward World Stability."

Tonight's speaker is a graduate of Leland-Stanford and Columbia universities. He was professor of education at Ohio university, was a member of the California legislature from 1934-38, and has been president of the Shoreline Planning commission of California since 1940.

Such lecturers rarely come to Pampa and it is hoped many will take advantage of the opportunity offered tonight. The first lecture of the Rotary series proved not only informative but stimulating to thought on community, national and international bases.

According to DeLea Vicars, president of the Rotary club, this program is being developed by the club to give the people of the community an opportunity to learn from informed speakers about the problems which must be met in planning for a lasting peace now that victory has been won.

The Institute also will be a study course in world affairs for the young people of the community for, in addition to the public forums in the evening, the speakers will address the students of the Senior high school during the day.

President Signs Employment Bill

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—President Truman today signed an employment and production bill which congress passed as a compromise for so-called "full employment" legislation.

Aimed at establishing a government policy of promoting employment, production and purchasing power, the President's original measure was toned down sharply on Capitol Hill.

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Byrnes Says Atomic Bomb Know-How Safe; Capitol Hill Renews Cry 'Guard It Well'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes' assurance that the know-how of atomic production remains an exclusive U. S. secret, brought a renewed Capitol Hill cry today of "guard it well."

STATEMENT IS RELIEF
In the wake of Canadian disclosures of arrests to break up a foreign spy ring, the congressional reaction to Byrnes' statement was a mixture of relief and admonition to make sure it can't happen here.

Typical of that reaction were these comments to a reporter: Chairman May (D-Ky) of the house military committee—"I only hope that he is correct. We should preserve the secrecy of the atom bomb until positively assured of an effective United Nations agreement not to utilize it for war."

LAWMAKERS COMMENT
Chairman Carl Vinson (D-Ga) of the house naval committee—"I am glad we still keep it."
Rep. Mundt (R-SD), member of the house foreign affairs committee—"Mr. Byrnes' assurance are both surprising and gratifying. I think that the atomic bomb secret should be kept until we are assured of proper control."

SHOULD NOT RELAX
Rep. Hebert (D-La), member of the house naval committee—"His (Byrnes) statement is reassuring. Nevertheless we should not relax our effort until assured without doubt that the weapon cannot be turned against us."
In answer to direct questions at his news conference yesterday, the secretary of state declined to say: Whether the spy ring in Canada

Courts Divided on Veteran's Rights To Hold Old Job

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Courts are divided on the extent of a veteran's right to his old job—the so-called "superiority issue"—Maj. Gen. Lewis R. Hersey, selective service chief, reported today.

Two courts have upheld the right of the veteran "to absolute reinstatement and continuance in the job for one year so long as such jobs are available." Hershey said in a prepared statement given out at an American Legion national employment committee conference.

But in two other decisions, Hershey related, "the courts declared that the veterans was not entitled to continue work following reinstatement if his seniority placed him in a position where he ordinarily would have been laid off."

A circuit court of appeals ruling, expected soon, will have great weight "on this much-discussed issue," Hershey said.

Selective service receives thousands of requests for help in getting jobs back but fewer than 300 have gone to the justice department before adjustment, the general related.

Hershey's offician d the justice department construe the selective service law as entitling the veteran to return to his former position even though it means displacing a non-veteran. There are exceptions such as physically handicapped, or the employer going out of business.

10-Day Holiday Ends for Students

Ferry service between Galveston and Bolivar peninsula, which has been suspended for 10 days because of breakdowns in the engine rooms of two ferry boats, has been resumed.

CALL A WALKOUT
The national federation of telephone workers, representing one-quarter million telephone employees, yesterday empowered its executive board to call a walkout whenever it "considers proper."

Joseph A. Beirne, president of the federation, announced: However "we will continue bargaining with the company and all efforts will be made to settle the dispute."

DALLAS, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Approval of the use of part of a tract south of the veterans hospital at Lisbon, in this area, as a site for temporary homes for families of 516 veterans was announced here by Col. H. Rubin, veterans administration deputy administrator.

Veterans administration approval of the project will permit erection of a village of Quonset Huts, allocated to the navy but not delivered. They will be shipped to Dallas from McAlester, Okla., at government expense and deeded to the city. Each hut will house two families.

DALLAS, Feb. 20.—(AP)—It is my fervent hope that the Red Cross ideal may become a more effective force for good will among nations, good will we desperately need in this new age of physical forces."

This statement keyed a speech, prepared for delivery here at noon today, by Basil O'Connor, national chairman of the American Red Cross.

O'Connor, speaking of the forthcoming campaign for Red Cross funds, praised the work of local chapters, which he said perform most of the organization's tasks.

U. S. Consul Service Back in Indo-China

SAIGON, Indo-China, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Consul Charles Reid arrived here today to give the United States its first diplomatic representation in Indo-China in four years.

Testimony of Fortas Heard In Pauley Case

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Abe Fortas testified today he heard Edwin W. Pauley discuss democratic campaign contributions and the tidewater oil suit with Harold L. Ickes but could not recall whether the two subjects were tied together "on a contingent basis."

NAVAL SUBCOMMITTEE
The former undersecretary of interior offered this testimony to the senate naval committee, studying Pauley's nomination to be undersecretary of navy.

Ickes, former interior department chief, previously had testified that Pauley had told him \$300,000 in democratic campaign contributions could be obtained from oil men if the government would not press its suit to determine ownership of submerged coastal lands.

BUSINESS ACTIVITIES
Prior to Fortas' appearance, Navy Secretary Forrestal had told the committee he believed Pauley, a California oil man, would subordinate his personal interests to those of the navy if he is confirmed.

Forrestal said today that he had told Edwin W. Pauley early in 1945 he would have to give up all business activities if he became associated with the navy.

Forrestal testified at the senate naval committee hearing on Pauley's nomination to be undersecretary of the navy. He said that he told Pauley this after President Roosevelt had suggested the California oil man for a navy post.

He said he preferred H. Struve Hensel for the assistant secretaryship Mr. Roosevelt had in mind at the time, but that he endorsed Pauley when another vacancy occurred on the condition that he "demonstrated the necessary capacity and intelligence."

The committee expected later to hear from Abe Fortas, former lieutenant of Harold L. Ickes.

What Fortas may have to say shaped up as the major question mark in the far-ranging inquiry into Pauley's qualifications to be undersecretary of the navy.

GM-UAW Holding Another Session

DETROIT, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Another regular negotiating session between General Motors and the CIO Auto workers was on schedule again today (1 p.m. CST) despite government officials' pleas that the two sides give more conference time to efforts to settle the 92-day strike.

Special Federal Mediator James F. Dewey, who relayed an appeal from Secretary of Labor Lewis B. Schwellenbach that sessions be carried on "as long as necessary," said both management and labor representatives declined the suggestion.

GM and union officials told him, Dewey declared, that they considered it "more expeditious" to meet in separate groups between conferences.

Schwellenbach, who has kept in close touch with negotiations developments through regular reports from Dewey, expressed belief that longer discussions could effect a settlement of the three months' strike in "a few days."

The union has demanded reinstatement of the old contract as well as a 19 1/2 cent increase (17.5 percent) recommended by a fact-finding board.

Maintenance of membership and policy on promotions and transfers, which, with the wage question, are the largest issues in the dispute, have yet to be settled.

City of Houston Employs on Strike

HOUSTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Members of Houston's city-county union and city employees who are members of the holding engineers union called a strike for 7 a. m. today and acting City Manager J. M. Nagle said "as far as I am concerned these men have resigned and will be replaced as early as possible."

The strike affects approximately 640 city employees, including men in the garbage, water, street maintenance and park department. M. B. Grimes, holding engineer representative said. Also included are city mechanics, janitors, sewer men, zoo and humane department employees.

Religious Sect Duel Results in Death for Two

DURHAM, N. C., Feb. 20.—(AP)—A double slaying etched another chapter today in the colorful history of Shiloh, the hilltop "Temple" here of a religious sect, "The Kingdom, Inc."

Sheriff Louis E. Gendron said a pistol duel between Trenee Laprize, about 30, of Brunswick, and Dr. Charles Reeder, 39-year-old Durham osteopath, ended yesterday with both men dead and Carl Webster, 32, and Mrs. Kneeland Godfrey, 71, slightly wounded.

State Police Sergeant John P. Crosby said the shooting occurred more than two hours after Laprize visited the religious community as a would-be purchaser of the property and then presented the caretaker with a letter demanding "a sum of money."

For two hours after he presented the letter, the investigators related, Laprize held Webster, Mrs. Godfrey and two other sect members at gunpoint in a room of the temple until Dr. Reeder, warned of "trouble" at Shiloh, came to their aid.

Reeder ordered Laprize to get out. Then the men started shooting with automatic pistols, Gendron said. Laprize fell with two slugs in the abdomen; Reeder's heart was pierced.

Two shots gave Webster and Mrs. Godfrey minor leg wounds. Caretaker Philip Holland and Sect Member Bernard Anderson escaped injury.

Holland is a son-in-law of Frank W. Sandford, who built Shiloh—on orders of a "divine voice," he said—on the turn of the century as a communal dwelling for members of his "Holy Ghost and US Society" which later became "The Kingdom, Inc."

At one time nearly 1,000 lived in the huge wooden structure built in the form of a hollow square and surmounted by a once-gilded "prayer tower," and in various outbuildings.

Italian Cabinet Members Are Named

Signing With Unions Termed Initial Step

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—The labor department opened a drive today to "push for settlement" of all current strikes and get the reconversion program back into high gear.

Secretary Schwellenbach told industry generally his advice was to "sign up and trust to OPA."

At the same time a high OPA official promised employers that price increase applications to offset wage boosts under the new stabilization policy "are going to be handled fast."

PROBLEM SUMMARY
The OPA official, who withheld his name, made this summary of the problem ahead:

"There are no two ways about it, we have just got to move speedily." He added that OPA is confident it can stay abreast of any flow of petitions for price relief. If necessary, personnel will be transferred from other OPA departments "to keep the ball rolling."

COST INFORMATION
OPA already has cost information available for a number of industries, the official said, adding that this would lighten the load in the case of many qualified price applications. For example, the agency only recently completed pricing of various consumer products which were off the market during the war. These

Shamrock Schools Adopt New Plan

SHAMROCK, Feb. 20 (Special)—The Shamrock public school system has begun work on a three-year program, Sol Blonstein, president of the school board, announced this week.

The outline of the program was submitted by Supt. Elmer J. Moore at the regular meeting of the board of trustees held on Wednesday night of last week, and the plan was adopted by a unanimous vote.

"The main objective of education is a continuous development of the child physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually so that he will be a happy and useful citizen of a cooperative democratic society," Superintendent Moore stated. This objective may be accomplished by a school continuing to improve in its many phases.

"We must continually evaluate our school and improve it as rapidly as possible," he concluded.

Robert Lee, West Texas Town of 1,000, Scheduled to Have General Moving Day

ROBERT LEE, Tex., Feb. 20—(AP)—Moving day for this West Texas town of 1,000 population may not be far off.

Under plans being formulated the present site will become a lake bed.

This would come about with the building of the proposed Buffalo dam across the Colorado, one of Texas' biggest rivers, backing up water for 50 miles.

Robert Lee, the county seat of Coke county, would be inundated to a depth of about 12 feet, but enough water to irrigate 58,000 acres of fertile but thirsty land would be impounded.

L. T. Youngblood, Bronte banker, farmer and president of the sponsoring Upper Colorado river authority, estimated the dam and irrigation system will cost \$20,000,000.

He predicted that the project would bring 10,000 additional people into the four-county area. He pointed out that a large section of West Texas would benefit from increased feed production. This, he said, would be a large factor in the agricultural economy of the district.

Packed up into an area of scenic hills, the lake also would be ideal for a major recreational center, serving thousands of square miles in which surface water of any kind is a rarity.

Robert Lee would move, court-house and all, to an elevation north of the proposed lake, the second wholesale move in the town's 57-year history.

The town's first site was christened Hayrick, after a nearby rounded butte, when a group led by admirers of Gen. Robert E. Lee first settled in 1889.

The next year, in quest of water, settlers moved their community several miles down to the shores of the Colorado, and changed the name to Robert Lee.

NO. 3—WHO CAN USE FORM W-2:

WHAT, WHY AND HOW OF INCOME TAX EXPLAINED

By JAMES MARLOW WASHINGTON, Feb. 20—(AP)—Who can use Form W-2, the withholding receipt, in filing his 1945 income tax return?

If you can't use Form W-2, you can use Form 1040, as a short-form or long-form return, depending upon your individual case.

Form W-2—The receipt given a worker by his boss—shows how much tax regularly was withheld from his wages or salary in 1945. You can use it:

1. If your income was less than \$5,000 and practically all of it was in wages or salary from which the tax regularly was withheld.

2. If—besides your wages or salary—you had income not over \$100 from interest or dividends or other wages not subject to withholding, provided that extra income did not bring the total income to \$5,000.

You can't use Form W-2 for reporting income from rents, professional fees, business, partnerships, estates, trusts, or annuities.

Can husbands and wives make a

combined return on Form W-2? Yes, if that combined income was less than \$5,000 and fits the requirements listed above.

Examples:

1. Your salary was \$3,000. Your wife's salary was \$1,800. Total: \$4,800. Tax regularly was withheld from both salaries. You—or your wife—additionally had \$100 income from interest or dividends.

You could use Form W-2 singly or jointly.

2. Your salary was \$3,000. Your wife did not work but had \$101 income from interest or dividends. You could not make a combined return

on Form W-2 because her income from dividends or interest was more than \$100.

In this case you could use Form W-2. Your wife could use the 1040 short-form. Or the pair of you could make a joint return on the 1040 short-form since your total income was under \$5,000.

Support the combined salaries of yourself and wife—each subject to regular withholding in 1945—was \$5,000 or over but individually less than \$5,000.

You could file separately on Form W-2. Or you could file jointly on the 1040 long form. You could not file jointly on the 1040 short-form which is for total income less than \$5,000.

(In the nine community property states—Arizona, California, Idaho, Louisiana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas and Washington—husbands and wives cannot file separately on Form W-2.)

There's a place on Form W-2 for listing your exemptions but not for listing allowable deductions.

That's because everyone using Form W-2 automatically is given a 10 per cent deduction for such things:

If your deductions are more than 10 per cent don't use Form W-2. Use the 1040 long-form.

There you'll have to itemize your deductions, and figure out your own tax. But you can claim whatever your deductions are.

You can't use the 1040 short-form and claim deductions of more than 10 per cent. People using the 1040 short-form—like the people using Form W-2—get an automatic 10 per cent allowance for deductions.

Hirohito Tells American Newsmen, 'MacArthur Is a Very Great Man'

TOKYO, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Emperor Hirohito told three American newspaper executives in a rare interview this week that the speed of his nation's recovery depends on the cooperation of the United States.

In an atmosphere of unusual informality, the emperor received Robert McLean, president of the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin and of the Associated Press; Norman Chandler, president and publisher of the Los Angeles Times; and Benjamin

McKelway, editor of the Washington Star. Over tea, they discussed a wide range of subjects non-political, with the emperor observing at one point: "MacArthur is a very great man. American troops are conducting themselves 'cooperatively' he said. Japan also 'is very anxious to cooperate,'" said the emperor. He gravely requested his visitors to report fully their impressions of Japan as "a contribution to international understanding."

"I hope you will report conditions in Japan as you find them because I believe such a report will contribute to international understanding and to the peace of the world," the emperor said.

Chandler said the reception chamber is a large room on the third floor of the stone residence ministry. It was decorated in imperial maroon and gold. One wall was flanked by a gilded screen. The floor was covered with a thick maroon carpet.

The publishers wore dark business suits, an unusual procedure in a court accustomed to formal diplomatic dress or uniforms.

The newspapermen entered the audience chamber with Itano Goto, chief of the protocol section of the imperial household ministry and who served as interpreter. Hirohito and three major court officials entered from another doorway.

The emperor walked up to his visitors and shook hands with each, saying through the interpreter: "I am so happy to have you here today."

The guests were seated at individual continental small tea tables. Their chairs were upholstered with maroon damask. English tea, with sugar and cream, and cakes were served by formally-dressed attendants.

Hirohito wore rimless spectacles. The newspapermen said he smiled frequently during the conversation, which ranged from hobbies to tragedies of the war.

In response to a question, the emperor said Japan "should become a peaceful and democratic nation."

Hirohito told the executives that he was a subscriber to the army newspaper, Stars and Stripes, but that his "English is not good enough for me to read it."

He said 12-year-old Crown Prince Akihito is studying English. The chubby heir to the throne is in good health, he added.

Hirohito mentioned also that his own principal interest is biology—a hobby for which he maintains a modern laboratory within the palace. He expressed hope that conditions would permit him to return to this summer palace at Hayama, where he could collect seashells in connection with the study.

The emperor and McLean then chatted on the latter's hobby—hunting.

"It was very informal throughout," McLean commented.

The interview lasted for 30 minutes. Court officials observed that audiences usually last only a few minutes. Only rarely are foreigners invited to tea. Informality also is an exception.

Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Notebook

NEW DELHI, Feb. 20.—(AP)—You don't have to seek entertainment in India. It comes to you door.

Particularly is this true in Bombay, where every hotel window opening on the street is a box seat to a series of centuries old Indian vaudeville acts in which the animals usually do all the work and the Fakirs collect all the rupees.

So far nobody has come around who can do the Indian rope trick, and I haven't met anyone out here who has ever seen it performed. It is just a legend—like Santa Claus and Paul Bunyan and the five-cent beer.

One of the dreariest acts consists of a team made up of a small boy who sings "Pistol Packing Mamma" and an old woman who plinks an accompaniment on a battered guitar.

Your sympathy for this couple is tempered by the knowledge that in this country nice old beggar ladies have a habit of renting their friends' children, because people are more inclined to be charitable to youngsters. Beggary is an organized racket here, as it is in China.

Bearded Yogis in turbans roam every street and ambush you on corners to let you know what the stars have in store for you in return for a piece of paper money—say five-annas.

The most common of all Indian streets acts are the "battles" between a snake and a mongoose. The snake has no chance.

The Indian entrepreneur builds up his audience by fishing a large snake out of a basket and hanging it at the end of a gurney sack. The Mongoose only looks bored. He knows he doesn't have to go to work on the big snake unless there is a large crowd around that will throw out several rupees.

The day I watched from my hotel window, the snake charmer turned the snake loose and it writhed sleepily away. The Mongoose was doing too. But his boss gave him a "the show must go on" glance and the Mongoose yawned and with a bored expression, leaped after the snake.

In two leaps he had caught it behind the head, then crunched and killed it. He let it lay and trotted droopily back to his gurney sack.

Bystanders tossed a total of six annas to the pavement—about 12 cents. The snake charmer dropped the dead reptile back into the basket, picked up the coins and strolled off satisfied with his profit.

Western Union Grants Retroactive Pay Raise

DALLAS, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Western Union Telegraph company employees in the southwest will receive \$5,000,000 in retroactive pay, Charles Giltner, general vice president of the telegraph workers labor union (AFL), said.

The payments are to be paid under a ruling of the national war labor board providing for a retroactive increase of 10 cents an hour for each hour worked between Nov. 10, 1943, and Dec. 29, 1945, date of the ruling.

Racial Disturbances Reported in Texas

AUSTIN, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Nearly 1,000 racial disturbances in Texas "every one loaded with dynamite and bearing the potentialities of a major riot" have been reported by Homer Garrison, director of the state department of public safety.

In a tabulation yesterday, Garrison said 46 police departments, representing 1,873,000 inhabitants, reported 147 racial disturbances in 1944. By 1945 this had jumped to 924, an increase of 500 per cent.

"It is only because of quick, decisive and impartial action by local officers that gang fights and minor riots have not developed into something much worse," said Garrison.

He characterized as "a significant and dangerous trend" the fact that those cities reporting an increase in arrests also reported an increase in the carrying of concealed weapons.

Return of 4 Lettermen Brightens Texas Aggie Baseball Prospects

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Return of four lettermen from last Aggie teams, among them are three pitchers—Henry Lindsey, Johnny Shufford and Hub Moon—have brightened prospects in baseball at Texas A. and M.

The Aggies, who won only one game last season, will have nine lettermen of the 1945 squad to go with Lindsey, Shufford, Moon and W. B. Bradley, a third baseman here but first-baseman while in the service. Moon also is a first baseman.

Catching prospects include: R. E. Prince, letterman center fielder last year; Ed Arnold, Burley Hartley and Bob Tullis, who did some squad duty in 1941 and 1942. Bradley is booked for first base with Moon on hand if needed. At second Dimmitt probably will make his selection from among Tex Thornton, Maurice Van Winkle and Albert Rettig, who had some squad experience.

Shortstop candidates include: Cliff Lindoff and Ray Newsum, a squadman. Rettig also can play this position. Both Rettig and Newsum went to the service before the season had advanced far enough for them to be lettermen but both undoubtedly would have lettered.

Third base candidates include Julian Prasley and Burton French, freshmen. Prasley has played with the El Toro Marines the past three seasons. Both Floyd DeLafoose and Mason Matthews, lettermen who played third last year, have been moved to the outfield in Dimmitt's plans.

Martin Has Seat Picked for 1948 Olympic Games

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—(AP)—We have our seat selected for the 1948 Olympic games in London are held at the White City stadium.

It is called White City, possibly because it is neither white nor a city. It is a vast, greyish layout in the outskirts of London which is quite popular with dog racing addicts and would be even more popular if they let their fans place a small bet on the rabbit.

It is adaptable to almost any sports activity, however, and we saw a track and field meet there that was run off with the precision of our better American meets.

The seat we have chosen is in the glassed-in section high up in the main grandstand. Here you can sit in plush comfort, partaking of food and liquids served to lined tables by tuxelod waiters and gaze with unobscured tolerance at the people below.

As we recall there were some 70,000 spectators at the track meet last summer, the lure being chiefly the presence of Gunder Haegg and Arne Anderson, the Swedish stars who look enough alike to be kintfolk, and run the same way. We do not know the exact capacity of the stadium, but it is our impression there was enough wasted space to provide for many thousands more spectators with a little revamping. Stadium revamping, that is.

One thing the visiting athletes at London will find to their pleasure will be probably the most courteous, sportsmanlike and orderly crowds in the world, a crowd which recognizes the good, clean effort without regard to race or creed.

To us, the crowd attending the track meet presented a most amazing picture, compared with our pushing, jostling, often discourteous American crowds. Maybe it was the result of a patient developed through the lean and harried war years, but whatever the cause the Britons showed a lamlike docility.

Hours before the meet was scheduled to start the lines at the ticket windows started forming. Soon they were stretching more than half a mile, six and eight deep. The fans came from all walks of life, as the cobbler or iron puddler is as likely to be a track fan as the graduate of Eton or Oxford.

It would take two or three regiments of cops to handle such a gathering in this country, yet we did not see more than a half dozen bobbies along that long line of patient Brits. A courteous "lively now" or a crisp "one side please," and the crowd obeyed without question. It was a remarkable demonstration of crowd control.

We have the idea White City or the Wembley stadium or some other plant now in operation will be the scene of the games, as it will take the Britons a long time to rebuild their bomb-torn city, and all construction for several years probably will be confined to necessary building.

We do not know whether or not it has been repaired by now, but last summer the famed center court at Wimbledon was not available for use because a wayward German bomb had crashed through the roof of the stands. Everything considered, it was a remarkable demonstration of material was needed to rebuild devastated homes.

And we think we have it tough.




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

Hitler Personally Viewed Invasions

NUERNBERG, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler drove to Prague by fast automobile on the first day of the invasion of Czechoslovakia, personally stole a half-dozen fine tapestries and left with them in his possession at daybreak the following morning, Soviet Prosecutor L. R. Sheynin told the international military tribunal today.

German troops were barely across the border before convoys of looted equipment were on the way back to the reich, he said, adding that new street cars and trams were lifted bodily off their tracks or taken from the factories and sent into Germany. River vessels, he said, were seized and divided equally between the Germans and the Hungarians.

Within hours after the arrival of Nazi troops more than \$25,000,000 in gold was confiscated, Sheynin told the court. Sheynin also asserted that German nationals were settled on the farms of Czechs or Jews who had fled before the invading armies and that all cattle and farm equipment were confiscated from Czech estates.

been leading the fight against confirmation of the former democratic national committee treasurer, said the one-time undersecretary of the interior would be called to the stand during the day.

This seemed to indicate that Pauley's opponents thought the witness would substantiate the testimony of his former boss. Ickes said that Pauley approached him in 1944 with the suggestion that \$300,000 in democratic campaign funds could be raised from oil men if the government would not press its claim to ownership of tidelands oil areas.

Some Pauley backers, however, said they had heard that Fortas might not agree with the Ickes version. Fortas himself has kept his own counsel. Despite a variety of testimony about the activities of Pauley and other California oil men, several senators said the nomination is likely to stand or fall on Ickes' charges and others of similar nature that may be made.

Work on Sewer Line Under Way

A shipment of 18-inch vitrified tile sewer pipe has been received here and actual work on the construction of a new sewer line will begin in a few days, City Engineer George Thompson said today.

The Alfred-Erik construction company, Houston, which holds the contract for the construction of the main outfall line, has moved most of its equipment here and workmen are unloading the shipment of pipe.

The main outfall line will start at the disposal plant near the city dump grounds, and proceed westward to a manhole near the swimming pool.

A junction on the 18-inch line will be made northwest of the pool. This line, to be of 12-inch pipe, will be laid in a general southeast direction to a point near the packing plant and will continue south-west to a corner of the Wilcox addition.

The line will continue up Malone street. The old line which is being replaced, lies in the alley near Malone street but the new main could not be laid there because of the danger of cave-ins.

Thompson estimated the total length of the main outfall line at approximately six miles. It will take a slightly more than three months to complete the work, he said. More shipments of the tile pipe are expected soon.

is directed by the Russian government. Whether any scientific secrets leading up to the development of the atomic bomb had leaked out of this country.

Commenting on a statement by Chester Bowles, economic stabilizer, that Ford had sought a 55 percent increase in the price of Ford automobiles, young Ford said:

"In making public our estimate last summer that motor cars would cost 55 percent more to make during the first postwar year than they cost in 1941, the price of Ford automobiles failed to make clear that these estimates were submitted to OPA before OPA had announced any price regulations on new cars—more than a month before OPA had given us the basis on which price ceilings were to be calculated."

"What Mr. Bowles had to say on this point and the manner in which he chose to say it left the impression that we had secretly applied for a 55 percent increase in existing price ceilings. Actually, we have applied for no price relief on any of our cars since OPA ceilings were established."
