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

Navy Checks On Reserves Who Travel

NEA Ctaff Correspondent WASHINGTON (NEA) — The Pentagon has recently issued the following regulations, calls to duty and changes in rules which affect, reservists and persons interested in active duty with the

This time most of them come from the Navy. No Naval reservist may leave the country for more than 30 days without getting permission from the, commander of his reserve district or group. When abroad the reservist must report to the nearest naval attache or senior officer in the vicinity. And when he returns he must notify immediately the officer who gave him permission to leave.

This new rule does not apply to airline employes or employes on merchant vessels whose business normally takes them out of the country.

During January, February and March, approximately 7500 en-listed men in the naval reserve will get calls for extended active duty. They will have to report in April, May and June and will be in the category of seamen and seaman apprentices who have served on active duty for at least six months as seamen, hospital men and stewardsmen. ness was it of ours? One thing I can understand. After many years of futility in trying to get rid of us, the commu nists were the only ones who seemed to be able to do the trick, I don't think the average Chinaman is any more of a communist than you or me but I do think he actively or passively sided with the communists because they were his only means of throwing out the "foreign devils." Even if the Chinese communists were bad Chinaman figured that, after all, they, too were Chinese and couldn't be much worse than the westerners and grafting Chiang Kai Shek politicians. The Chinaman simply had nothing to lose one way or the other. He had nothing to lose because the fore eigners had already taken everye thing he had.

You know, that's hard to understand. The best way to compare-hend it in the light of the golden rule is to imagine ourselves here in America as poor as Job's turkey, our land completely in the control of Chinese and Japanese interests with Oriental marines natrolling our cities to prevent us from pulling any "Boxer Rebellions." What with having to throw our girl babies in the rivers to keep down the population, subsisting on a handful of rice a day. hitching ourselves up to buggles to haul wealthy Oriental sightseers and overlords around, and with a president who took his orders from the Asiatic powers, I'm not so sure but what Americans would side with almost anyone who seemed able to get rid of the "foreign devils." would there be to lose?


Or suppose Canada were to be in a civil war and the Chinese and Japanese were to send armies there for "police action" to help one side or the other. I would almost bet that in jig time the United States would send millions of men into Canada to drive the orientals in to the Pacific. That might be called "aggression" on our part but we would call it selfdefense. Perhaps the Chinese, knowing better, from her own experience, than to trust the western powers' alleged intentions Korea, felt the same way about it. After all, we've been pretty selfrighteous. A little honesty here and there shouldn't hust us. It might help up to reconstruct our entire foreign policy on a moral, golden rule hasis, and save an awful lot of precious American lives. And, for that matter, what about Chinese and Japanese and Russian and German and British lives?

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

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
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
