Oklahoma Is **Trial Site for Accused Killer**

William E. Cook, accused kidnaper and suspected slayer of eight persons will be returned to Oklahoma from here to be prosecuted on federal kidnaping charges.

The Department of Justice in Washington announced last night that Cook 23-year-old ex-convict captured in Mexico after a twoweek international manhunt. will be tried on a charge of kidnaping the Carl Mosser fam ily of Atwood, Ill.

The federal charge, known as the Lindbergh Law, carries a possible death penalty. U. S. Attorney Ernest Tolin, at Los Angeles, said he had agreed to the transfer of custoda and was merely awaiting the

Oklahoma. Cook also has been sought by police in Joplin, Mo., where the five bodies of the Mosser family were recovered from a mine shaft. The Mossers: all of whom had been shot, are suspected victims of Cook.

He also has been charged in California with the murder Jan. 6 of Seattle salesman Robert Dewey. A California sheriff's deputy said Cook also had talked slaying two other persons in Oklahoma. The deputy said he had been kidnaped by Cook but

was released unharmed. Cook is in isolation in a lone upper-floor cell at the county jail where he was taken following his deportation from Mexico Monday and his arraigment here on federal charges of kidnaping and flight to avoid prosecution for murder and robbery



Air Force and Navy planes pounded the enemy. B29 Superforts of the Far East Air Forces blasted Kaesong and Chengju Wednesday with 176 tons of explosives. Kaesong, a few miles south of Parallel 38, is a rail and highway junction. Chongju is in northwest Korea on the main Red supply line from Manchuria.

Wave after wave of B-29s hit the rail yards at Kaesong and Chongju in clear weather. Pilots said the raids were successful. East of Seoul toward Ichon and abandoned Wonju on the central Korean front Red Korean and Chinese troops dug in. They were not rushing to attack the new allied positions.







"Consider the possible forms retribution could take. For example, if the thief who was not caught had any measure of intelligence he knew his act was thievery. He was aware he had done wrong and thus, in ways he might not perceive, had contributed to his own destruction. The press carries numerous stories of conscience-stricken theives many years later returning what they stole. It is important to one's upgrading not to be consciencestricken. If, on the other hand, the thief were so ignorant that he did not know his act to be wrong, the retribution conceivably, could take another form of destruction: the absence of development that comes with the habit of getting something for nothing. Ignorance of an evil in no way modifies the evil. It might modify the form of the penalty but it will not erase its severity. During World War II some Chinese coolies jokingly threw themselves out of an airplane. They hit the ground no less hard by reason of their ignorance of the laws of gravitation. The truly practical man is an idealist. He searches for the ideal. As an aid to his search he projects his thinking as far into time as his competence permits, and weighs all of his acts on the scales of future consequence. He attempts to determine what is right in a long-term sense in order that he may be more certain of what is right for the present. He lives his daily life as nearly as he can in accordance with what such find-



New Ideas Run Rampant as Film To Be Shown Radiologists Get Together

NEA Staff Correspondent

CHICAGO -(P)- Dr. Richard Chamberlain of Philadelphia took a long look around the exhibition hall and said: "When you come to one of these meetings, you begin to feel like a one-eyed boy at a threering circus."

That is how a radiologist with 12 years of college and advanced training feels when his colleagues from all over the country gather to describe to each other the latest in their field.

'Any one of the 2100 radiologists assembled at the convention in Chicago would concur with Dr. Chamberlain. Their science, vastly important not only in combatting disease, but also in controlling radiation effects in a potential atom bomb attack, has grown tremendously since the days of Ma-

dame Curie and Konrad Roentgen. And yet, as Dr. Warren Furey, outgoing president of the Radiological Society of North America, puts it: "We're only in the kindergarten stage. We're just on the threshold of a whole new world in medicine.'

According to 36 - year - old Dr. Chamberlain, the convention was like going back to school - "a week - long, concentrated, intense school with dozens of new developments tossed at you.'


