TOKYO —(AP)— An allied patrol stabbed back into Wonju Saturday a few hours after elements of an enemy regiment recaptured that gateway town of rubble on the central Korean front.

The major menace was southeast of Wonju. Six North Korean divisions at heavy cost in casualties were trying to maneuver for a break out of the Sobaek Mountains to the plains of southeast Korea.

How long the pre-dawn patrol remained in Wonju was not stated. The allies were forced out of the town Saturday for the second time in a week

The patrol found enemy troops working feverishly at Wonju's air strip a half mile southeast of town. They either were trying to mine the field or make it usable.





Spindletop Is Daddy Of All Texas' Booming Oil Towns

When the Lucas gusher was brought in Jan. 10, 1901, it was the world's first big producing oil well. It blew in making an estimated 100,000 barrels of oil a day and this was unprecedented, history-making. It marked the beginning of the modern oil

From a comparatively small city of 9,000, Beaumont's population jumped to 50,000 in a 30-day period. There had been no fever like it since the gold rush of 1849 to California. People came from all over the world. Men slept in the three hotels of the city in six-hour shifts and paid the then high price of \$2 shift. Two dollars was paid for the use of a chair in a lobby. Grocery stores and banks never closed. And with rain and mobs of people, unpaved Pearl Street became a quagmire. It took six horses to pull a carriage.

A young school teacher at the time, J. W. Kinnear, says there was little violence or trouble: People were too busy trying to make a fast dollar," he said. Even small boys made good money. They would stand in line for mail at the postoffice and then sell their spots for as high as \$50. They would then promptly get back in the line again at the rear."


