## Snowstorm Plows Into Pampa

### White Christmas Four Days Late In Arriving

Winter got into the spirit of giving and presented Pampa with more than 2½ inches of snow that plowed into the area shortly after 6 p.m. Sunday.  
For those who could stay inside and peer out, it was one of those sculpture snowfalls that left etchings on roof tops, trees and shrubbery.  
For motorists and service stations alike, the early morning was not without its headaches. Some employees were late arriving for work.  
The U.S. Weather Bureau in Amarillo was predicting more snow for this afternoon and tonight with the end in sight during the day Tuesday.  
Travelers' warnings were issued for the Panhandle, where eight to 10 inches of snow was expected to accumulate in blowing drifts.  
The overnight low was expected to be in the mid-teens and the high Tuesday in the mid-20's; winds from the north, 15-20 mph. Pampa had a high temperature Sunday of only 29 degrees. The low dipped to 17 degrees.

Public Works Director R. B. Cooke said the snow caused fewer traffic problems in Pampa than anticipated. City street cleaning crews were on the job removing snow and sanding intersections and hills at 4 o'clock this morning. Drifting in some areas posed difficulties for some motorists. Cooke said two grader-maintainers removed snow to make downtown streets passable and a half dozen or more trucks and pickups were manned to scatter sand on icy spots. "Actually," Cooke said, "it wasn't nearly as bad as we expected."  
Two car accidents were reported to Pampa police department since snow started falling Sunday night. One wreck investigated by Pampa police Sunday night about 8:40 p.m. at Barnes and Brown, no injuries. One wreck investigated by Pampa police about 8:35 a.m. today at Wilks and Brown, no injuries. Very minor damage to all cars concerned. Five cars abandoned between Pampa and Kingsmill, all slipped off road into ditches early this morning. All persons got out safely. All roads in Panhandle area are open. But all are very slick and travel is being discouraged by highway patrol. County and city work crews started sanding shortly before 9 p.m. Sunday and have worked throughout the night and still working today. Pampa has received 2½ to 3 inches of snow with moisture content showing .22 of an inch. From all accounts this is the average snowfall from Dumas, Perryton, Canadian, Berger, Panhandle, Wheeler and all this area. High winds last night (Sunday) did cause snow drifts across the highways but almost all have today at Wilks and Brown, no

### Bottle Misses Agnew

MANILA (UPI) — A four-inch bottle of explosive powder, thrown from a group of anti-American demonstrators, narrowly missed Vice President Spiro T. Agnew's limousine Sunday outside the U.S. Embassy. There were no injuries.  
The incident occurred a few hours after the vice president arrived in Manila, the first stop on his 23-day, 10-nation Asian goodwill trip.  
A police spokesman said the bomb was thrown by one of about 100 Filipino youths who had begun demonstrating outside the building a short time earlier. One suspect was arrested.  
The spokesman said two other bombs were tossed outside the embassy entrance before Agnew's arrival. They caused no damage and no arrests were made.  
Agnew appeared later at the head of a reception line to greet several hundred American and Filipino guests. It was not known if he was aware of the incident.  
Agnew arrived in Manila bearing gifts of pieces of moon rock and space pictures of the Philippines.

### Nixon Faces Big Decision This Week

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon, back at the White House after a weekend visit to snowy Camp David, faces major decisions this week on the tax reform bill and budget matters.  
With a Tuesday departure set for a presidential visit to California, Nixon's decision on the tax bill appeared imminent — perhaps later today. There were no announced White House appointments.  
The bill, which in addition to tax reform and long range tax relief also provides a record 15 per cent increase in Social Security benefits, must be signed by Nixon by New Year's Eve to become law. There appeared to be little doubt that he would sign it.

### Investigation Of My Lai Moves To Site

SIAGON (UPI) — The U.S. Army's investigation into a possible coverup of the alleged My Lai massacre moved to Vietnam Sunday and the general in charge said he wanted a look at the site of the incident.  
Lt. Gen. William R. Peers, a former division and corps commander in Vietnam, told newsmen at the airport he probably would remain in Vietnam 10 days to two weeks. "We've made tremendous progress into the investigation," Peers said. "We've interviewed 39 witnesses, some for two or three hours and some for more than 20 hours."  
Peers' job is to find out whether officers in the American Division attempted to hide the alleged killing of civilians at My Lai from their superiors in the Vietnam chain of command.

### Sales Tax Effective Thursday

## Pampans Start Adding Penny To All Purchases

The 3¼ per cent sales tax Pampans have been paying on retail purchases will jump to 4¼ per cent Thursday when the city's one-cent sales tax becomes effective.  
The one penny city levy on all taxable items was approved 1825 to 1264 by Pampa voters in a special election last Sept. 24.  
City officials had appealed to the voters to okay the tax to meet the \$200,000 annual payment as Pampa's share of the Canadian River Dam costs. Under the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority contract Pampa is committed to the payment for the next 49 years.  
City Manager Charles Hill estimated today that the one-cent city sales tax will return approximately \$230,000 to \$250,000 in annual revenue.  
At the time of the election, voters were told that if the sales tax was not approved it would be necessary to increase the city's current 1.72 tax rate to \$2.22 per \$100 property valuation.  
Voters decided they would rather have the sales tax than the increased property tax. The tax rate remains at 1.72. Officials say Pampa will receive an additional \$45,000 a year in revenue from the 50-

### Hope Diminishes For Badger State Survivors

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (UPI) — Hope was almost gone today in the grim search for survivors of the Badger State disaster.  
Twenty-four U.S. seamen were missing in 30-foot seas including four whose bodies were seen but could not be recovered.  
A lone American freighter, the SS Flying Dragon, pushed through towering whitecaps and misty darkness in the search area 1,500 miles northwest of Hawaii.  
Even in daylight visibility at times was only a half-mile because of rain and sea spray.  
The Badger State, abandoned by her crew and wrecked by an explosion Friday, still was adrift with her dangerous cargo of bombs and rockets. A Navy tugboat was en route from Hawaii to try to take her in tow.  
"The odds that any more survivors will be found out there are marginal," a Coast Guard spokesman said Sunday night.  
There were at least 14 survivors of the tragedy. They were rescued by the Greek ship Khian Star a few hours after they abandoned ship. The Khian Star today was en route to Yokohama, Japan.  
The Badger State was en route to Da Nang, South Vietnam, when the cargo started breaking loose in heavy seas and she was abandoned Friday morning. An hour later an explosion ripped a hole aft starboard just above the water line.

## King's Assassin Seeks Freedom

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — James Earl Ray, chained and handcuffed, arrived at federal district court today seeking freedom from maximum security in state prison.  
Nearly 50 law enforcement officers stood guard as the convicted killer of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was placed in a sedan and driven in the rain to federal court.  
He wore sunglasses and a checked sport coat but apparently was without the bulletproof vest he wore in previous appearances. All persons, including newsmen, entering U.S. District Judge William E. Miller's courtroom for Ray's hearing were searched.  
Ray, serving 99 years, said in his motion that his near-solitary confinement "constitutes the sort of cruel and unusual punishment which is prohibited by the Eighth Amendment to the Constitution."  
Ray inferred in his affidavit that Percy Foreman, one of his former attorneys, and the prosecution at Memphis may have made a deal to keep him in maximum security at the state prison.  
"I suggest if state wanted to keep me in maximum security cells as a form of punishment they should of took me before a

### Voyage Of French Ships Create Stir

TRAPANI, Sicily (UPI) — An Italian fishing boat sighted five French-built gunboats headed east toward Israel today despite France's embargo on arms shipments to the Jewish state.  
The boats, built to carry sea-to-sea missiles with 165-pound warheads, were seen passing Gibraltar into the Mediterranean Saturday.  
They would require refueling to make the trip to Israel but there were no reports of any request to dock for fuel.  
The five boats were the last of a consignment of 12 built by a French shipyard for Israel. Seven had been delivered before De Gaulle imposed his embargo on arms to Israel a year ago Sunday.  
France had said it had paid back Israel for the gunboats, thereby freeing it to sell them to another buyer. The Israeli naval crews that helped supervise the construction in Cherbourg nevertheless remained on board.  
"Sunday, the Norwegian representative of the Panama-based Starboat S.A. shipping firm said in Oslo that Starboat was the legal buyer of the gunboats. The representative, Martin Siem, said the transaction was carried out through Oslo because he maintained an office there.  
The owner of the shipyard in Cherbourg, Felix Amiot, said, "All is legal and above board. We have the documents."  
Residents of Cherbourg said the Israeli community of about 400 that sprang up around the shipyard, has dissolved. Israeli officers went around to the sailors' hotels the night of the boats' departures and paid their bills from thick wads of bills.

## Plant Killers Believed Cause Of Birth Defects In Vietnam

Boston (UPI)—Three scientists said Saturday the United States was using two plant killers in Vietnam which are believed a cause of birth defects and they asked the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) to urge the Defense Department to "immediately cease."

Earlier Saturday, a medical professor told a symposium of the AAAS that scientists working on chemical and biological weapons should publicize the results of their research even if it means running afoul of their nation's security laws.

The assertion about the plant killers came at a turbulent meeting of the AAAS's Committee for Council Affairs. It was contained in a resolution introduced by three members of the scientists' committee on chemical and biological warfare.

**Two Herbicides**  
The spokesman for the group, Dr. Arthur Galston, who presented the resolution, identified the two herbicides as 245T and 34D, which he said were used by U.S. military forces to defoliate Vietnamese jungles and crop lands.

Galston said tests conducted by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare showed that about 70 per cent of all offspring born of mothers treated with the herbicide 245 had some type of malformation. Every litter contained some defective animals, he said.

The scientists' resolution said, "there is a possibility that the use of herbicides in Vietnam is causing birth malformations among infants of expectant mothers," and it called on the Pentagon to stop using both 245T and 34D.

**Resolution Hanging**  
There was no indication when the full body of the AAAS would act on the resolution, or whether it would.

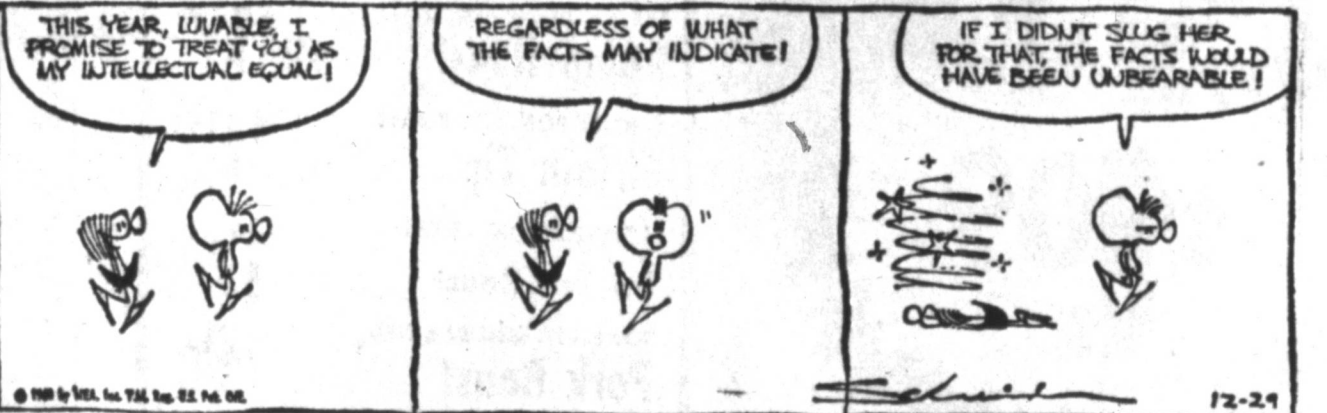
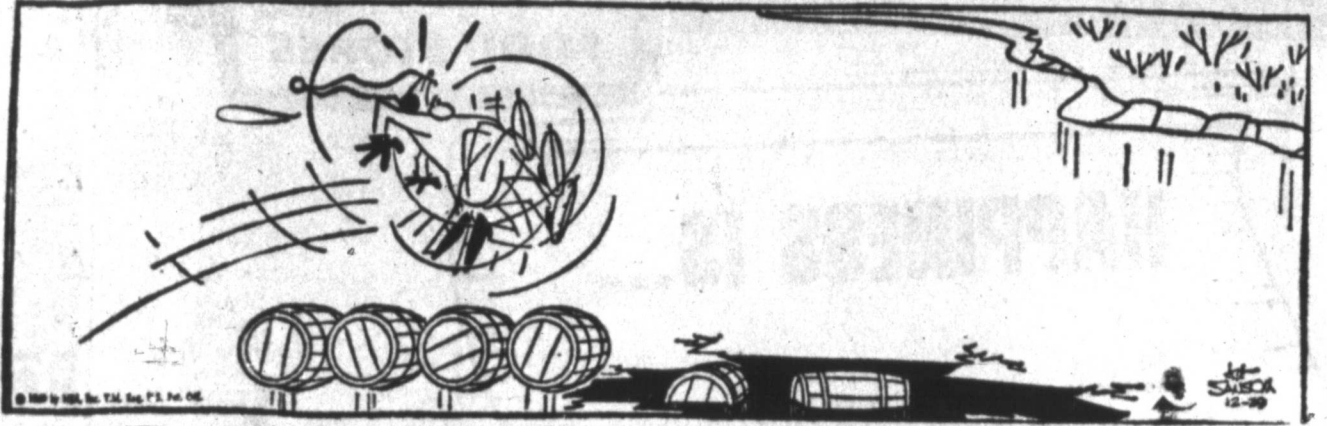

# Cowboys Choke Again, Morton Blames Himself

DALLAS (UPI)—The Dallas Cowboys have still another year to figure out what went wrong. The Cowboys lost 38-14 to the Cleveland Browns Sunday in the NFL Eastern Division championship game—the fourth straight season Dallas has lost either the NFL or division title game.

"I don't think any of us believes in jinxes or anything like that," receiver Lance Rentzel said. "All I can do personally is try to improve myself and look to next year to try to do a better job."

"If I knew all the answers as to why we haven't done what we should have done the last few years, I should be coaching."

Tom Landry does the coaching and he is planning a long hard look at the Cowboys.

"We will have to have a complete re-evaluation," Landry said. "We have to look at

everything. This changes everything. We had the top offense and the third or fourth best defense and it's all gone in one game. You have to start all over again."

By everything, Landry said he meant just that—including the players and coaches and the offensive and defensive plays.

Craig Morton, Dallas' young quarterback finishing his first season as a starter, blamed himself for the loss. He completed eight of 24 passes for 92 yards and had two passes intercepted.

"I have no excuses but I definitely feel responsible," he said. "I apologize for the way I played today."

"I've said it before, we'll just keep fighting until we make it."

Landry did not blame Morton because he said the quarterback did not have enough time to operate effectively. Morton, who has played with a bad

shoulder most of the season, said that was not the cause of his poor showing.

"I'll need an operation after the season but I played that way all year or most of it and that had nothing to do with it (the loss)," he said.

The Cowboys, dejected with their poor performance, praised the Browns.

"We made mistakes—we all make them every game but sometimes they hurt you more than others," said defensive back Mel Renfro. "This time it seemed like every one hurt us a lot."

"Cleveland played a good game," Landry said. "Everything they did worked for them. When that happens you usually win. (Browns quarterback Bill) Nelsen was exceptionally sharp."

"We have a fine team, a very fine team. They overcame a great many things this season to have the record we had and my biggest disappointment is that it has to end this way."

# Offense To Be Thing In Astro-Bluebonnet

HOUSTON (UPI)—The most potent offensive team in Auburn history meets an equally explosive University of Houston team in the 11th annual Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl Game in the Astrodome New Year's Eve.

The game will be played to a standing-room-only crowd of more than 53,000 and will be televised nationally over Sports Network, Inc., starting at 4:45 CST. Auburn is a one-point favorite.

The two teams are similar in many ways. Both had 8-2 records and both were ranked in the nation's top 20, Auburn 15th and Houston 16th.

Both go by the adage that the best defense is a good offense and both rely heavily on sophomore quarterbacks who

won their jobs late in fall practice or after the season opened.

Pat Sullivan, a 6-foot, 190-pounder, took over at Auburn the week of the season's opener when junior quarterback Tommy Traynor was injured. Sullivan proceeded to break every passing record in the school's 78-year history.

He completed 123 of 257 passes for 1,696 yards and 16 touchdowns and accounted for 1,991 yards total offense, all school records. He paced the team to these offensive records:

—Most net yards 4,390; most points 383; most first touchdowns 49; most first downs 211; most touchdown passes 18; most passes attempted 311; most completed 146 and most yards gained passing 1,992.

Sullivan's abilities were more varied than just passing. He

also ran 56 times for 205 yards and seven touchdowns and he's a smart signal caller.

"Sullivan beat us badly with his play calling," said coach Paul "Bear" Bryant of Alabama after his Crimson Tide was demolished by Auburn in the final game of the season.

Gary Mullins, a gummy 5-10, 185-pounder, took over the quarterback duties at Houston after the Cougars had lost their first two games. He guided them to eight victories by completing 83 of 166 passes for 1,433 yards and 13 touchdowns and running for 308 yards and eight touchdowns.

Although Auburn set nine school records offensively, the Tigers' statistics do not match those of Houston. The Cougars rolled up 5,138 yards, scored 386 points, scored 54 touchdowns, had 247 first downs and passed for 21 touchdowns.

# Knicks Head Home After Road Trip

Willis Reed was the New York Knicks' strongman Sunday night as the Eastern Division leader finished their 7,000-mile, three-game road trip with a convincing victory over the Phoenix Suns.

Reed, a 6-10 center, hit eight straight field goals in the Knicks' 45-point third period and wound up with 32 points as New York demolished Phoenix, 135-116, for their second consecutive victory. The Knicks, after flying out to the West Coast from New York on Thursday, lost to the Los Angeles Lakers before beating the Seattle SuperSonics in Vancouver, Can.

The Suns held a 57-52 lead at intermission but Reed paced the Knicks to a 72 per cent shooting spree with 20 points in the third period and New York coasted to their 32nd victory in 39 games.

The Milwaukee Bucks, paced by Lew Alcindor's 35 points, moved to within a half-game of Baltimore in the East as they defeated the Bullets, 133-124.

Flynn Robinson added 30 points for the Bucks while Jon McGlocklin chipped in with 25. Kevin Loughery had 27 for Baltimore.

# Kentucky, UCLA Out To Keep Ratings

Kentucky, its No. 1 national ranking tested by Notre Dame Saturday, seeks to notch its eighth victory in as many starts tonight, in a home game against Miami of Ohio.

UCLA, the No. 2 team which has been putting the scoreboard clicking lately in its bid to claim the top spot it held for so long in the Lew Alcindor era, also is in action. The Bruins beat Georgia Tech, 121-90, Saturday night to advance against Princeton in the finals of the Bruin Classic at Los Angeles.

UCLA is unbeaten this year in six games.

Kentucky got a career high of 42 points from Mike Pratt Saturday but barely edged Notre Dame, 102-100. The Irish trailed virtually all the way but, on the 43 points of Austin Carr, made a frantic attempt to go ahead near the end.

Notre Dame plays next in the Sugar Bowl Classic at New Orleans, one of 10 basketball tournaments that begin tonight.

Other tournaments starting today are the Carolina Classic,

the Charlotte Invitational, the Gator Bowl, the Gold Coast Classic, the Hurricane Classic, the Kodak Classic, the Las Vegas Classic, the Poinsettia Classic and the Senior Bowl.

The Holiday Festival tournament resumes in New York today, with Purdue slated to meet Pennsylvania and St. Bonaventure set to meet St. Joseph's of Philadelphia in the semifinals.

In the semifinals of the Far East Classic at Portland, Ore., Washington State, Oregon, Washington and Oregon State will play. In Oklahoma City, at the All-College Tournament, sixth-ranked Tennessee and Niagara have moved into the semifinals, along with Oklahoma City and Memphis State.

The Quaker City Tournament at Philadelphia also moves into its semifinal round. Still remaining are 15th-ranked Villanova, unbeaten Columbia, LaSalle and Coraol.
