

Navy Hurls Steel **In Supply Sectors** TOKYO -(AP) - Doughboys spearheading the allies limited offensive were slowed to a crawl by diehard resistance today. An officer said they apparently hit the main enemy force arrayed along the frozen western Korean

On the east coast, UN naval power hurled hot steel and bombs into a North Korean town from carrier-based planes and big guns of warships. Hundreds of enemy supply vehicles were seen in

North Korea moving souhtward toward the western natives advanced by legislators in battle line.

Forward UN units in the western sector advanced laboriously only a few hundred yards on the sixth day of their northward limited offensive.

Potato Scab Treated By Applying Sulphur

DES MOINES — (AP) — Application of sulphur to the soi will prevent potato scab infection, the most serious potato disease in Iowa, according to botanists at Iowa State College. The botanists found in a re

search program that an application of 500 to 1,000 pounds of sulphur per acre proved effective in combatting the disease. The sulphur treatment is usually sufficient for a three - year period, they report.



Livestock and products — Beef cattle, \$23.80 and \$25.40 for 100 pounds (national average for all grades and classes); chickens, 30.2 and 22.3 cents: eggs, 53.3 and 50.6 cents a dozen; hogs. \$19.90 Washers and refrigeration repair wholesale, \$4.58 and \$4.07 for 100 pounds: turkeys, 38.2 and 34.3 cents a pound; veal calves \$28.50 and \$28.90 for 100 pounds.



He explains some of our difficulties in this manner:

"To get political power the prospective leader makes his appeal primarily to the stupidest classes in the country. This is because their stupidity has given them little discrimination and they are therefore most ready to accept a vague plan without considering the effect of the details. Also he appeals to youth, many of the young not yet having developed discriminatory powers, and all being easily beguiled by youth movements, parades and government financed vacations, guest houses, etc. No other large groups of the population are so easily coalesced round vague doctrines, so blind in their partisanship, or so violent or intolerant. Such groups are necessary for a leader, in order to build a majority around them.

"It is difficult to unite large bodies of people for something. It is absurdly easy to unite them against something. There is always a popular 'pet hate' that car be fanned into flame and the great majority united against on the 'they' and 'we' principle. So served the Jews in Germany, the kulaks in Russia, Great majorities could be rolled up against them. It 's also a great advantage later to have created a public whipping boy on whom anything that goes wrong can be blamed."

The politicians in the United States during the 30's set up the banks as the "whipping boy". The bankers were practically helpless because the government had taken over the real control of currency and money and taken it cut of their hands. The modern "whipping boy" is the "profiteer"-the man who is successful in furnishing tools. Tom, Dick and Harry do not see that without tools their wages would be practically nothing. 

Grace Tells Em The Doctor Says

BY EDWIN J JORDAN, MD.

Che of the skin diseases is proriasis, pro-nounced with the "p" silent. It worries people a good deal- and affects the apis relatively harmless as far as life and general health are concerned.

The involved skin is usually bright red, flat, and scaly on the surface. There is a sharp dividing line between the normal skin and

that which is affected. The elbows, knees, lower back and scalp are the places most likely to be attacked. It can cover only a small part of the skin or spread to a large part of the body surface. If the psoriasis starts suddenly there is likely to be severe itching. In the most chronic cases (which are more frequent) there is little or no itching. Those parts of the

skin which have been involved

for a long time generally become

covered with a thick scale. When

the scale is scraped off, tiny bleed. ing spots appear underneath. Unfortunately the cause of psoriasis, like that of so many other diseases of the skin, has not been discovered Several members of the same family are sometimes afflicted, and this may or may

not be a clue. Also psoriasis is frequently associated with certain kinds of arthritis, though just what the connection is when the two conditions occur in the same person is still uncertain. However, this raises the possibility that cortisone or ACTH may be put to use in psoriasis. Time will tell.

Many treatments are being used for psoriasis. Most of them produce good results the first time they are tried. But too often the improvement turns out to be only temporary and when it is repeated the good results that happened the first time fail to materialize.

The remedies most often used by skin specialists for psoriasis include ointments containing coal tar, exposure to ultraviolet rays (psoriasis is usually better in the summer), and X-rays. Almost every year, too, there is a report of some new and "better" treatment, but as yet there is none which has stood up and really does the job for everybody without any failures.

Some day the right treatment will come, but until it does psoriasis will be discouraging to treat. However, much work is being done on it and those who have psoriasis should not despair.
