

RFC Investigation At End, He Claims

WASHINGTON -(AP)- Senator Fulbright (D-Ark) suggested today that a commission of distinguished citizens be set up to investigate "moral standards in government" and look into the conduct of Congress itself.

It is too demanding a task, he said, for the Senate banking subcommittee whose efforts have already touched off a federal grand jury investigation aimed at uncovering any law violations in the makings of big government loans. Any action by the grand jury, which convened yesterday, appeared to be weeks away.

The subcommittee, of which Fulbright is chairman, has accused an influence ring with exerting pressure on the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC), the multibillion dollar government lending agency. The subcommittee has said the ring reaches into the White House.



Fulbright moved to bring the subcommittee's inquiries to an early end because, he said, it has served its purpose — to investi-gate the RFC. But he said it has turned up findings which might merit creation of a group mewhat similar to the Hoover Commission to conduct "a gen-eral investigation of moral stand-

When a President remains in office more than ten years, it gives him the power to select Supreme Court judges who follow his ideologies. In other words, the Supreme Court becomes not an impartial organization but an organization, as one wag remarked years ago, that follows the elections rather than the principles on which this government was formed. 
