Cattle Raisers Saddle Up For Controls Fight

DALLAS — (AP) — Texas and southwestern cattle raisers saddled up today for a determined fight against any move to put beef on the hoof under federal price controls. Taxes, ticks, the drought, feed costs, and livestock diseases were lobby conversation but the talk always got back to price ceilings. Joe G. Montague, attorney for the Cattle Raisers Association, told directors at a pre-convention meet yesterday that it was "very definite" that top officials in Washington want "ceilings on live animals of all types of livestock."

Committee Driving For Draft Bill Okay

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House Armed Services Committee drove today toward approval of a broad new military manpower bill, with Republicans keeping mum about plans to attach to it the troops-for Europe issue. Rep. Arents of Illinois, an assistant GOP leader and a member of the committee, was waiting with a resolution to bar the commitment of U. S. troops to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's western European defense force unless Congress gives its approval in advance.

Large Group Heads For Amarillo For Regulation 7 Talks

Headed by E. O. Wedgeworth, manager of the Pampa chamber of commerce, a large group of Pampa retail merchants left Amarillo this morning to attend the Panhandle clinic on Regulation 7, the new price ceiling directive. C. J. Thomas, general manager of OPS, Lubbock, will answer questions and explain the price charts under the regulation. Copies of the regulation and copies of the price charts are on hand in the C of C offices for any merchant who wants to obtain one.

Greenglass Admits He Gave Data On A-Bomb, Space Ship

NEW YORK — (AP) — A confessed spy awaiting sentence on charges of passing atomic bomb secrets to the Russians admitted today that he gave the Soviet Union information on the "atom bomb" project from "one of the boys" — not further identified. David Greenglass, 29, a former Army sergeant, testified in federal court yesterday that he gave the description to his brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg. Rosenberg and his wife, Ethel, 33, who is Greenglass' sister, are on trial accused of conspiring to spy for Russia in wartime — an offense for which they could be sentenced to death.

Mayor Huff Takes Second: B. E. Ferrell First On Ballot For City's Mayoralty Race

B. E. Ferrell won first place on the ballot for mayor in the April 3 city election during the drawing for places at 10:15 a. m. Monday in the office of City Secretary Ed Vicars. Ferrell's name was drawn from the hat by A. Neel, candidate for city commissioner from Ward 2. Mayor C. A. Huff, seeking reelection, will have second place on the ballot. City Commissioner W. E. Ballard drew first place in the Ward 3 commissioner race with A. Neel drawing the number two spot. Ballard is seeking reelection. In Ward 4 the official ballot lineup will be E. C. Schaffer, W. D. Varson, and City Commissioner Fred Paronto. Commissioners Crawford Atkinson and Bob Thompson of Wards 1 and 2 respectively, both unopposed for reelection, were not present at the drawing. Fulbright Suggests Group To Probe Moral Standards

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Fulbright (D-Ark) suggested today that a commission of distinguished citizens be set up to investigate "moral standards in government" and look into the conduct of Congress itself. It is too demanding a task, he said, for the Senate banking subcommittee whose efforts have already touched off a federal grand jury investigation aimed at uncovering any law violations in the makings of big government loans. Any action by the grand jury, which convened yesterday, appeared to be weeks away.

West Agreed On Answer To Russian Plans

PARIS — (AP) — Western power delegates were reported to have agreed today to new proposals for the Big Four talks agenda launched yesterday by Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko. Gromyko's "concession" to meet the West "half way" as he put it, reworded one item on his proposed list of topics for a foreign ministers conference from one concerning a peace treaty with Germany. Delegations from the United States, Britain, and France met for several hours late last night and discussed Gromyko's proposal at length. They will give the Russian their answer at today's meeting.

Road Building Plan Is Sent To House

AUSTIN — (AP) — Administration forces won a round last night in their fight to cut \$30,000,000 off their new-tax needs for the next two years. By 14-5 vote, the House State Affairs Committee approved and sent to the House for debate Rep. Callan Graham's compromise bill to finance farms-to-market roads. The vote was a sharp reversal of the 15-3 decision by which the Highways and Roads Committee had disapproved Graham's original proposal.

RFC Investigation At End, He Claims

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The subcommittee, of which Fulbright is chairman, has accused an influence ring with exerting pressure on the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC), the multi-billion dollar government lending agency. The subcommittee has said the ring reaches into the White House. Fulbright moved to bring the subcommittee's inquiries to an early end because, he said, it has served its purpose — to investigate the RFC. But he said it has turned up findings which might merit creation of a group somewhat similar to the Hoover Commission, conducted "a general investigation of moral standards in government."

New Formula On Ceiling Due

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The government put finishing touches today on a proposed new formula designed to tie price ceilings more closely to manufacturing cost increases since the Korean war. Thirty-two industrialists from a dozen states will sit down with Price Director Michael V. Disalle tomorrow to discuss terms of the new order which has been in the making for weeks. Even before their arrival there were reports there would be some loud protest from manufacturers against the plan.

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Allies Chase Fleeing Reds As New Defense Line Seen

TOKYO — (AP) — Allied troops today chased mysteriously retreating Communist forces to the old Parallel 38 border separating South and North Korea. Vanguards of three United Nations columns, driving on the Red massing center of Hongchon in Central Korea, were within 25 miles of the old boundary. There was no ready explanation for the sudden Communist withdrawal from the mountain redoubts where they had fought bitterly for every yard of ground. Some front line officers said they were pulling back to make a new stand in prepared defenses in the ridges north of Hongchon. "It was such tough going yesterday and so easy today," a sergeant said. All along the 70-mile front the Reds were pulling up only a show of rear-guard resistance. But allied commanders were wary. They did not label the Red withdrawal a rout. "We've got the enemy reeling back but he still isn't knocked out," said Maj. Gen. Claude B. Ferenbaugh, commanding the battle-hardened U. S. Seventh Division. The outlook is optimistic, but we're keeping our guard up."

Mr. Moore died Monday afternoon at the Highland General Hospital after a long illness. He lived at the Adams Hotel and was employed as a mechanic at Purlsey Motor Co. Mrs. Elaine Johnson of Detroit, Mich. is the sole survivor. Mr. Moore moved to Spearman from East Canton, Ohio, and a year ago, he came to Pampa. Burial will be in the Fairview Cemetery.

Service Set For Father Of Pampan

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Wednesday in Fort Worth for J. F. Luther, 88, father of Mrs. Dick Walker, east of Pampa. The Rev. Robert Boshen, formerly pastor of the Pampa Presbyterian Church, will officiate at the services in the Guardian Funeral Chapel. Mr. Luther died Monday afternoon. Besides Mrs. Walker, Mr. Luther is survived by his wife, one other daughter and three sons; three grandchildren, and one sister. Mr. Walker was born Feb. 14, 1863, in Texas and has lived in Fort Worth for about 70 years.

Stress Retrieves Stolen Mink Coat

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Bentina Hume's mink stinks. "It smells pretty awful, in fact," she said yesterday when police returned it to her, but she was glad to get it back anyway. Miss Hume, wife of Actor Ronald Colman, identified the coat at a preliminary hearing for Harold Goodfellow, 28. He is charged with taking the coat from her NBC studio dressing room Jan. 17. Goodfellow was arrested last month in a Phoenix, Ariz., hotel room. There was no explanation of the coat's odor.

Less Than Half Of Campaign Goal In, Red Cross Reports

Less than half the goal for the American Red Cross has been reached here with a total of a little over \$4000 being reported by workers. Today, the workers are to report to Herman Whately, chairman of the Pampa drive. This may bring the total to half the goal of \$11,393. Plans for the residential drive are being set up with Mrs. W. E. Campbell in charge. This drive will be held Friday night between 8 and 9. It will be conducted very much the same as the March of Dimes drive in January. Members of the Federated Women's Clubs in Pampa will call at homes during the designated hour. Further announcements will be made later as to the final plans of the residential drive, according to Whately. The Lefors workers will conduct a similar campaign on the same night. Larry Fuller is chairman in Lefors.

C-C Considers Formation Of Community Chest In Pampa

What might prove to be the initial steps in the organization of a Community Chest or a like organization in Pampa, were taken Monday by the board of directors of the chamber of commerce, at its regular monthly meeting in the basement dining room of the Schneider Hotel. A plan was suggested by Gene Fatheree, chamber president, concerning a meeting to be coordinated by the chamber, of the executive committees of various civic clubs, organizations, and interested groups such as the Boy and Girl Scouts, American Red Cross and American Legion to discuss plans for such a fund-raising group. The present methods of obtaining money for various organizations is for each to have a drive at some time during the year with the major civic clubs furnishing the majority of the workers. Ike Prefers New Place To Politics

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is "willing to spend the rest of my life" in uniting the free world's defenses against possible Communist attack. That statement by the five-star general, made to senators in a closed committee meeting Feb. 1, popped up today to cloud the 1952 presidential picture. The 60-year-old commander of the North Atlantic Defense Forces has been suggested as a possible choice for the presidential nomination of either the Republican or Democratic party next year. He has disclaimed political ambitions in the past, he has now convinced nearly all politicians.

Women Take Over In Village Vote

MENDON, Mich. — (AP) — The women—and should anybody be surprised?—are in control here. The novelty, if any, is that this has to do with politics. In the village election a feminine ticket swept the boards yesterday. It wasn't even close for any office. There will be one lone onetime male officeholder. He is incumbent City Clerk Vern McClish. He wasn't opposed. The women campaigned on a general platform that they could do a better job of running the village government than men.

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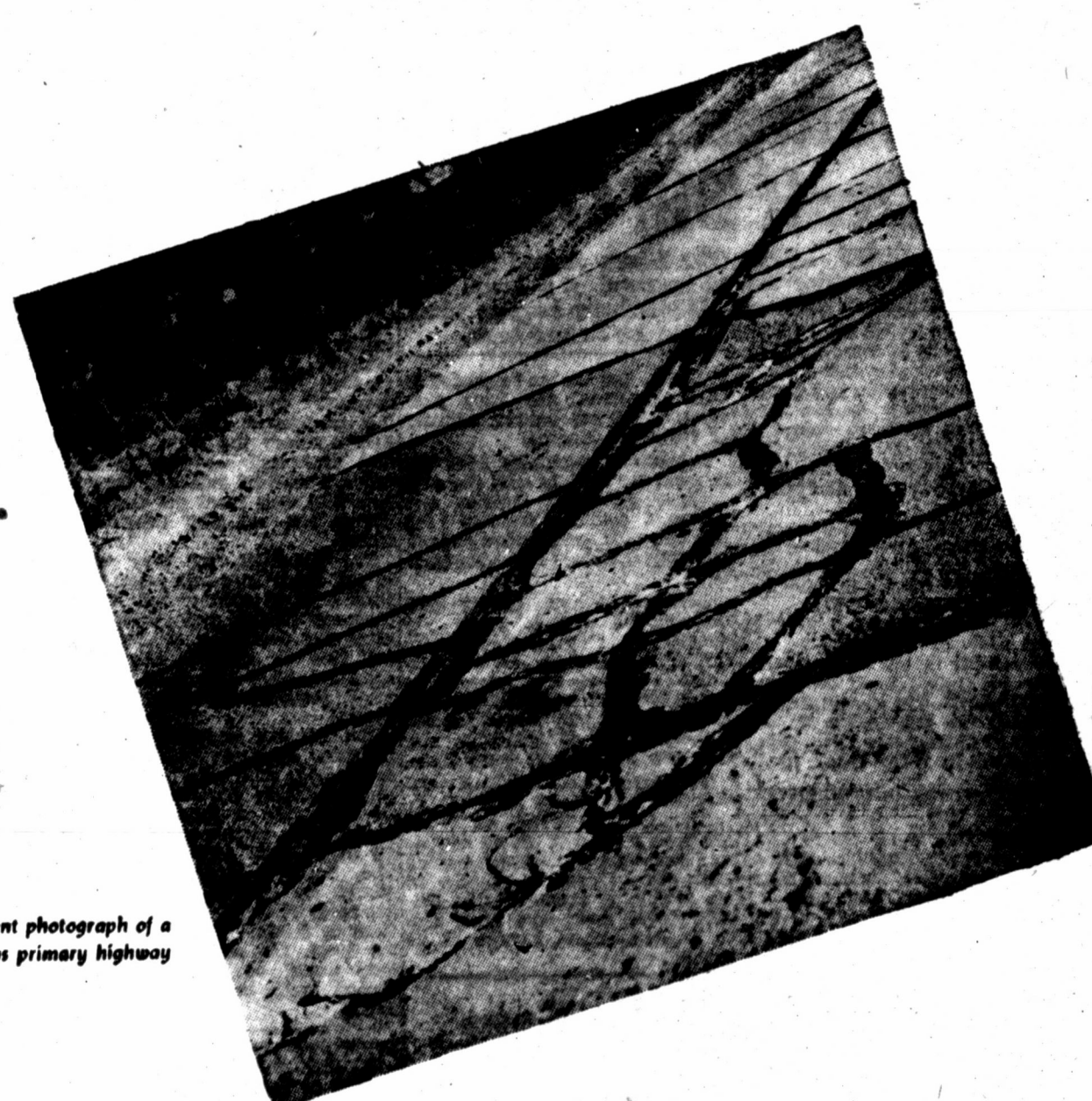

William Sedat, Missionary, To Speak At Nazarene Zone Rally Tonight

The Rev. William Sedat, missionary from Guatemala for the Church of the Nazarene, now in the United States for a one-year furlough, will speak at the local Church of the Nazarene, 500 N. West, at 7:30 this evening. Ten Panhandle churches will be represented at a zone rally.

Born in 1909 in the East Prussian town of Nurnishken, young Sedat later immigrated to the United States and settled in the Southwest, where he received his schooling and eventually was graduated from Pasadena College, Pasadena, Calif. He went to Guatemala in the middle thirties as a missionary, where he concentrated his efforts on the work of translation.

He speaks his mother tongue, German; the language of his adoption, English; and the Latin American Spanish. Later he learned the language of the Kekchi Indians of Guatemala among whom he has been working, and has made a study of Greek and Hebrew.

Biscuits Atop Salmon Pie Tops In Favor

Meatless days without regret and here's a delicious solution. Corn meal biscuits, with crisp textured corn flavor get baked on top of a salmon pie. There's grated cheese in the biscuits, too.

SALMON PIE
(6 servings)
Base: Two cups milk, 1-4 cup sifted flour, 2 cups flaked salmon (approximately 1 pound), 2 cups cooked peas, drained, 1-4 cup chopped pimiento, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon salt.
Biscuits: One and one-half cups sifted enriched flour, 1-2 cup enriched corn meal, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 cup shortening, 2-3 cup grated American cheese, 2-3 to 3-4 cup milk.

To make the base, scald 1-2 cups of the milk. Blend the flour with the remaining 1-2 cup milk to form a paste. Add flour paste to scalded milk, stirring until thickened. Add the rest of the ingredients for the base. Place salmon mixture in greased baking dish (2 quart size).

For the biscuits, sift together dry ingredients into medium-sized bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add cheese. Add milk,

mixing lightly only until mixture is dampened.

Turn out on lightly floured board and knead gently a few seconds. Roll out to 1-2 inch thickness; cut with floured biscuit cutter. Place biscuits on salmon mixture. Bake in a hot oven (450 Deg. F.) 12 to 15 minutes.

TUNA BAKE
(6 servings)
Two-thirds cup milk, 1-2 cup quick rolled oats, uncooked, 1 can tuna fish (7 oz.), 1 cup finely chopped celery, 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 beaten egg yolks, 3 stiff-beaten egg whites.

Scald milk. Add rolled oats and cook until thickened, stirring frequently. Drain tuna fish; flake finely. Add tuna fish, celery, pimiento, mayonnaise, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce, salt and egg yolks to cooked oats; mix thoroughly.

Fold stiff-beaten egg whites into tuna fish mixture. Bake in a greased casserole (1 1-2 quart size) in a slow oven (325 Deg. F.) 1 hour or until puffed and brown. Serve immediately. Top each serving with creamed peas if desired.

Mrs. R. E. Engle gave a report on a recent THDA meeting and Mrs. J. S. Fuqua, Mrs. T. D. Anderwald and Mrs. B. M. Vaught were elected THDA delegates for the district meeting.

Mrs. D. A. Rife and Mrs. Vern Savage were chosen first and second alternates. Mrs. O. A. Wagner gave a special committee report on ordering aluminum trays. She reported that 19 trays had been ordered for the club.

Mrs. Engle gave a Council representative report of the February Council Meeting. Mrs. W. W. Estes will serve as chairman for the Worthwhile Club during National Home Demonstration Week, April 29 through May 6.

Mrs. Roy Tinsley, vice president, was in charge of the program when individual and club reports were checked and discussed. A 30-minute demonstration was given by Mrs. Wagner on "Effects of Nutrition and Health."

An exchange of plants, shrubs and seeds served as recreation. Mrs. Mary Anne Duke, county home demonstration agent, presented a demonstration on how to make a herb and asparagus bed. Mrs. Duke said "To plant asparagus you should wait until after the last freeze—around May 1. Keep plants 18 to 20 inches apart and rows should be six to eight inches wide. Plant on a good sandy loam with good drainage and keep well fertilized. Grass and weeds should be kept out of beds. Rust is about the only thing that attacks an asparagus bed."

There are only two varieties of asparagus, Martha Washington and the Mary Washington, with the latter the more popular.

Pampa Ag Teacher Attends Area 11 Sessions In Tulia

Paul Payne, vocational agriculture teacher in Pampa High School, attended a meeting, Saturday, in Tulia, of about 40 agriculture teachers in Area 11, which covers the area north of Plainview. Payne also attended a like meeting in Amarillo, Friday afternoon, at which time Bob Manire, head of the Texas vocational agriculture program, talked to the teachers about their problems. Another speaker was John Boyce, president of the Tri-State Fair Assn., Amarillo, who told of some of the plans for the 1951 show.

At the Tulia meeting, some of the farm topics demonstrated and discussed included the treatment of ruptured hogs; treatment of lumpy jaw in cattle; methods of castrating hogs; treatment of the Newcastle disease in chickens; soil testing, and caponizing chickens with an electric knife.

The lumpy jaw operation was performed by four FFA boys from

Friona on a cow afflicted with the disease, which is caused by a fungus. Other demonstrations were performed by various teachers in Area 11.

A big day for the VA teachers will be April 28, when state FFA contests will be held at Texas Tech. Contests will include livestock judging, grass judging, wool grading, cotton judging and several other categories. About 150 Texas schools will be represented at the show, with from one to nine teams from each school taking part. Payne expects to take at least one team, probably a livestock judging team, to the show.

n't exactly call Mr. Stalin a liar, but did brand his interview as "one more misstatement" which is as close as a diplomat ever comes to that horrid, four-letter word.

In London, the ordinarily meek Attlee threw the complete factual book at Joe, in the form of a long note listing Moscow's entire, smelly, postwar record.

Peace? His Majesty's Government gave that one a most un-majestic snort. How did Russia have the gall to talk about peace when, on the record, she had: backed North Korean and Chinese Red aggression—violated the Yalta agreement by setting up Red stooge states in Eastern Europe—"aided and directed" Greek Communists—vetoed a UN investigation of the 1948 Communist putsch in Czechoslovakia—built up a military force in East Germany, etc., etc.

Also, the British noted acidly, the "most accurate figures available" testified that peace-claiming Russia has 175 active army divisions, 25,000 tanks and 20,000 aircraft. "Premier Stalin may call this demobilization, but the figures speak for themselves."

"There, as we see it, is an opening for Stalin to actually start talking facts, provided he wants to. Joe knows (every U. S. newspaper printed it) that we're contemplating an armed force of 3,500,000 men. Our western allies are being just about as frank and specific.

If Stalin really wants some peace and tranquility—and personally we're not buying that one—it should be easy. Merely let him cease his shrill screams at the neighbors, a tactic which he copied from his friend Hitler anyway. Then he might blossom out with some actual, reassuring facts on Communist disarmament, and allow a few impartial arms experts to make their own count of divisions, planes, etc.

Until that miraculous invitation comes from Moscow, the civilized world would do well to keep the closest possible eye on Soviet actions and believe nary a Red-bird word.
