

New Tests Of A-Bomb At New Sites Hinted By AEC's Dean

WASHINGTON — (AP) — New tests with U. S. atomic weapons for out at sea or dropped from airplanes at places other than the testing sites used up to now may be in prospect.

A broad hint of this comes from the Atomic Energy Commission itself.

This developed out of an AEC news conference at which a reporter asked, in connection with the recent experimental explo-

sions at the Nevada proving ground, whether there will be other tests. To this, Chairman Gordon Dean answered:

"We have some tests coming along later on."

In Nevada?

"There may be some there, maybe in some other places."

Enlightened? The atom in the Marshall Islands where the government has established a proving ground.

"That is a permanent location."

Then Dean added:

"I don't know the places where they might be but we are going to make some more tests."

Would he mention possible other sites?

"You see, there is always the possibility you could take one (atomic weapon) out in the middle of the ocean, or roll one out in a plane," Dean replied. "I don't want to pinpoint it."

In addition to Eniwetok and the range near Las Vegas, Nev., postwar tests of atomic bombs have been made at Bikini Atoll in the Pacific. But Dean's answers seemed to suggest broadly that experiments at quite different places and perhaps under different conditions might be in prospect.

His comments left several avenues open to speculation, including:

Tokyo Bay for maintenance work. On her return to battle she was accompanied by a number of smaller ships, including the destroyer Osbourne.

The long naval bombardment of the east coast port city Wonsan went into its 26th day—possibly a record. The destroyer English, frigates and minesweepers also turned their siege guns on the rubble city.

Air Force planes reported destroying 60 Communist vehicles, two bridges and several railroad cars.

The Eighth Army black out shielded the action of American, Greek, British, Canadian, Australian and South Korean troops fighting on an east-west line from the Han River bridgehead to Hajinbu.

The blackout was imposed to keep the Reds from knowing just where the pursuing UN forces were.

1st Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, Eighth Army commander, was absent from his Korean headquarters. He may have been with front line units.

Ridgway was moving his forces northward by way of a road parallel to the one sprung by the Chinese last November. At that time they wheeled on General MacArthur's "end the war" drive and shoved the allies far south.

Ridgway has said the Chinese still have a tremendous capacity for hitting back.

It does not appear likely that the allies will try to break through the retreating Reds and smash to Parallels 38 anytime soon.

It is more probable that Ridgway's front line forces will push northward slowly to avoid a trap draws allow, but not so fast that the Communists will be able to throw them off balance.

for about one second, with no damage reported immediately. The shock also was recorded by the seismograph at the Feldberg Observatory in the Taunus Mountains near Frankfurt, an envoy there said. He could not say immediately where it was centered.

A short time later the Seismological Institute at Stuttgart said its instruments had recorded a shock with diminishing tremors continuing for about 15 minutes. The center of the explosion, they added, appeared about 200 miles from Stuttgart, but they did not say in what direction.

In the Netherlands the Dutch Meteorological Institute at Den Hilt said a "strong earth tremor was felt in the southern part of the country."

voted acceptance. The agreement was reached after several intensive efforts by Stabilization Director Eric Johnston set off when the ULPC pulled its three men out of the wage board and ordered all its labor representatives out of mobilization posts.

The ULPC, which represents the AFL, CIO and some other labor organizations, acted in protest against a wage board decision stabilizing wages at not more than 10 percent above levels of Jan. 15, 1950.

But agreement of labor only set Johnston coaling under another window — that of business. A labor leader in on the conference with Johnston at which the ULPC came to terms said the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, a nationwide businessmen's association, was in the wage board agreement. There was no such report about the National Association of Manufacturers.

The chamber of commerce issued a statement last night saying it was in complete agreement "on principle" with the manufacturers and added that business representatives were drafting a policy declaration to be handed Johnston today. That did not make it seem business had been won over yet.

Confessed Spy Says Getting Secret Data Easy At Los Alamos

NEW YORK — (AP) — A confessed spy for Russia says it was easy to take American secrets from the Los Alamos, N. M., atomic bomb project during wartime.

This is the opinion of David Greenglass, 29, who as an Army sergeant, was stationed at Los Alamos in 1944.

Greenglass testified yesterday in federal court at the trial of his sister, Mrs. Ethel Rosenberg, 33, her electrical engineer husband, Julius, 33, and radar expert Morton Sobell, 33.

Often smiling, Greenglass told Federal Judge Irving K. Kaufman and a jury that he obtained information at Los Alamos just by wandering around the super-secret project and asking seemingly innocuous questions.

He also said he occasionally eavesdropped on scientists' conversations.

Iodine Leads Battle Against Thyroid Cancer

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Radioactive iodine, "probably more than anything else at this moment," offers hope in combating inoperable cancer of the thyroid gland, says Dr. Earl R. Miller, noted radiologist.

The same isotope, he said, also is effective in the treatment of hyperthyroidism, or goiter, in many cases replacing surgery.

Miller is professor of radiology at the University of California School of Medicine and consultant in radiology for the U.S. Veterans Hospital in San Francisco, the U.S. Public Health Service and the San Francisco Public Health Service.

Miller described this use of radioactive iodine in attacking inoperable cancerous tumors in the thyroid area:

Most of the normal thyroid gland in the neck is removed by surgery. Radioactive iodine is then administered orally. Iodine has an affinity for thyroid tissue and seeks that area. If the tumorous masses pick up the radioiodine, they become normalized — that is, they cease to be malignant. Furthermore, these normalized masses tend to function as a thyroid. If they don't, thyroid extract can be administered by mouth.

The reason most of the normal thyroid gland is removed in the first place, is that, if left in the body, it would take up the radioactive iodine rapidly, since it has an affinity for iodine, and the cancerous tumors would remain virtually unaffected.

Radioactive iodine, Miller said, is easy to take and has a short half-life. This means it loses its radioactivity relatively quickly. Substances with longer radioactive life might injure normal tissue.

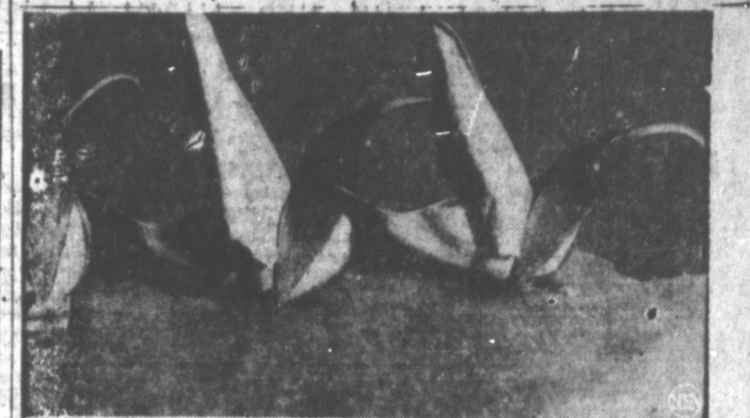
In discussing treatment of hyperthyroidism, Miller said: "It is our feeling that radioiodine is simpler, just as efficacious and, in some cases safer than surgery."

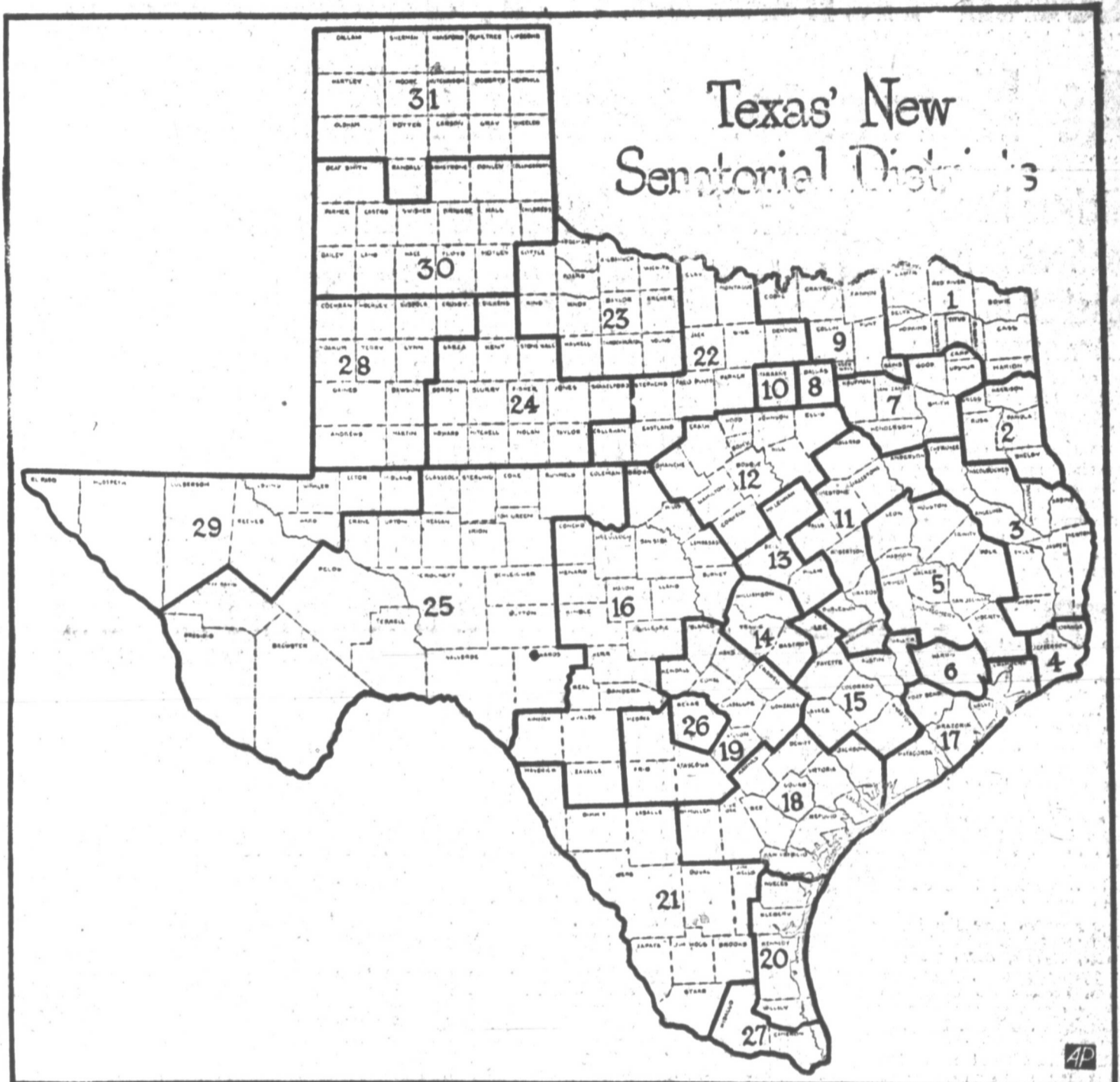

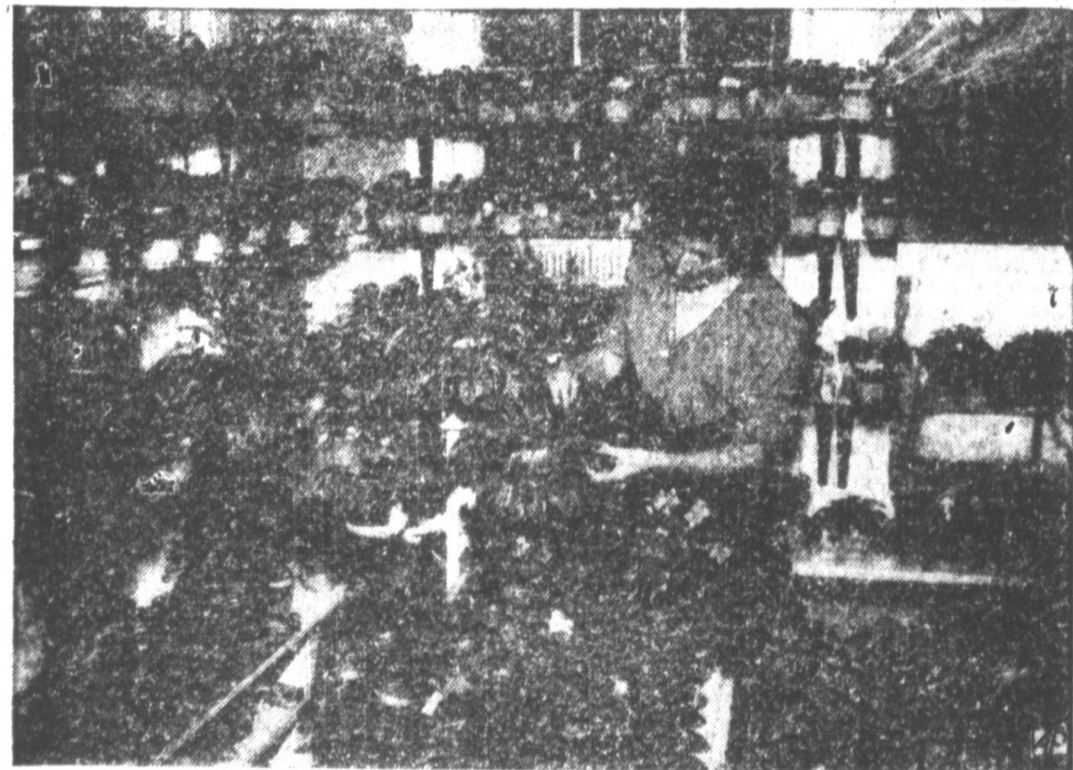

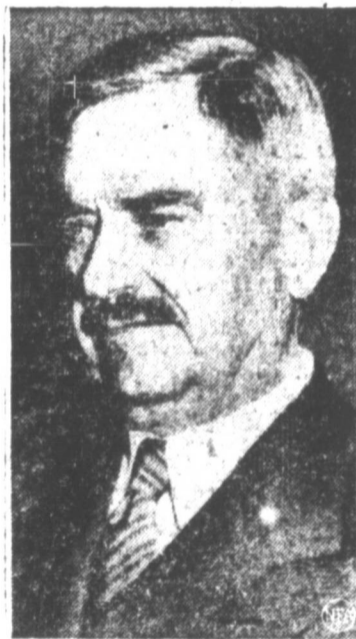

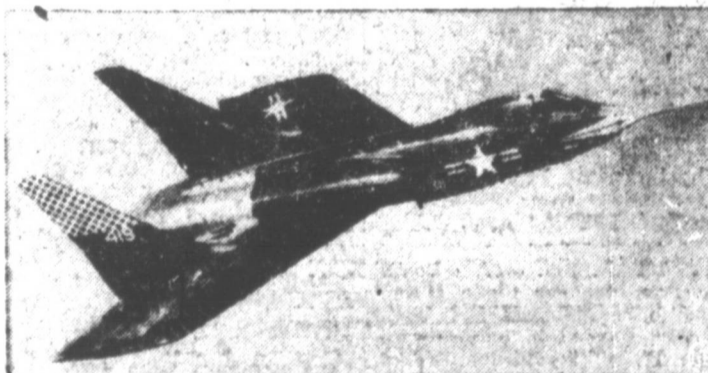

Time Is Near For Payments On Domestics, Farm Workers

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The time is near for payment of the first social security tax on people employed in non-farm homes and on farms.

This tax — covering the quarterly period of January, February, March — should be paid between April 1 and 30 by the housewife or farm owner.

Starting Jan. 1, the new social security law covers domestic workers in non-farm homes and workers on farms — if they fit the rules.

Not all will fit the rules and so are not covered. Since the rules are slightly different for both groups, they'll be handled separately here.

People (domestics) in non-farm homes:

Who are they? a cook, maid, gardener, chauffeur, or even a baby sitter if he or she fits the rules covering domestic workers.

What are the rules? A domestic must have been employed at least 24 days by the same householder in a quarterly period and earned at least \$80 in that quarter.

That's called the 24-80 test. The quarters are: January, February, March; April, May, June; July, August, September; October, November, December.

The tax must be paid in the month following each quarter. The total tax is 3 percent on the first \$3,800 of a worker's pay. The employer pays 1 1/2 percent, the workers 1 1/2 percent.

The employer can pay all of it if she wishes. Otherwise, she deducts the 1 1/2 percent from the employee's pay, and turns the total into the internal revenue collector for her district.

If you employ a domestic worker and are not sure what to do or even that you come under the law, you can do this:

Write to your nearest social security office and ask for a pamphlet, called “Do You Have A Maid?” This gives a lot of information.

If you learn from it that the law covers you, tear off the back which is a postcard and mail it, with your name, to the internal revenue collector for your district. He's the one who collects your income tax.

Then he'll do two things: 1. He'll send you a more detailed pamphlet, called “House-

hold Employer's Social Security Tax Guide.”

2. Before the date for paying your tax — in this case April 1 — he'll send you a Form 942 on which you make your return.

Farm workers:

Farm operators (This means farm owners and tenant farmers) don't come under social security but people who work regularly on farms do. This means a maid or cook in a farm home or a farmhand who works outside.

You come under the law: 1. If you work for the farmer a preliminary three-month period — one full quarter — and then at least 60 days in the following quarter. Your social security credit starts with that second quarter.

2. And if you have been paid \$50 in that quarter after the preliminary one. The tax on you is the same as in a domestic worker in a non-farm home: 3 percent on the first \$3,800 of your pay.

The farm operator must turn this in every three months, at the end of a quarter, to the internal revenue collector for his district. He puts up 1 1/2 percent, and takes 1 1/2 percent from your pay. He turns the total 3 percent in to the internal revenue collector.

If you switch farmers, your social security coverage stops until you've worked for the new boss a preliminary quarter, plus at least 60 days out of the next quarter.

A farm operator who still doesn't know whether his particular case comes under the law, can do this:

He can get a pamphlet, called “Notice to Farmers with Regular Hired Help” from his nearest social security office or his internal revenue office, or from his county agent, or from the office of the production and Marketing Administration, local production credit association, or National Farm Loan Association.

This notice briefly explains the rules covering farm workers. Attached is a form which the farmer fills out and mails to the internal revenue collector for his district.

The latter will send him a “Circular A,” explaining fully how the law applies to farm workers. And every three months, when the tax is due, the collector will mail him a Form 941 for filing the return and paying the tax.

Metal Users Having Woes

NEW YORK — (AP) — Users of metals have troubles coming at them from all sides. In time, it could put a further crimp in output of a long list of consumer goods.

Foreign smelters are outbidding Americans for world supplies of copper ore and concentrates, and several shortages loom here. Ceiling prices on copper products tie American buyers' hands.

Washington has a deal on the fire with Chile, a top copper producer, but at a fancier price which may send the cost of foreign copper from the present 26 1/2 cents a pound to around 30 cents, including the duty, metal men here say.

Metal scrap shortages are slowing down smelter production in this country and some brass wire mills are running at little more than a third of capacity. They are meeting defense orders but their civilian production quotas are going by the board.

Where the scrap all went is a mystery to many. Almost every metal dealer has his own price ceiling. Big producers who stack to the official prices during December and January are now held by price ceilings to 2 1/2 cents a pound for copper, 17 1/2 cents for zinc and 17 cents for lead.

But users of copper, who can't find what they need from their regular sources, tell of paying as high as 43 cents a pound this week and being told by the dealer: “It's perfectly legal; I got as high as 48 cents during the base period of Dec. 19 to Jan. 25; and that's my ceiling price. I'm shaving it for you.”

Scab Bees Hit

PRAGUE — (AP) — Individual beekeepers who do not belong to the Union of Beekeepers will get no special sugar ration for their bees, under ministry of food regulations. Those in the union will get about 13 pounds per hive.

Music Hath Charms Goa Station Finds

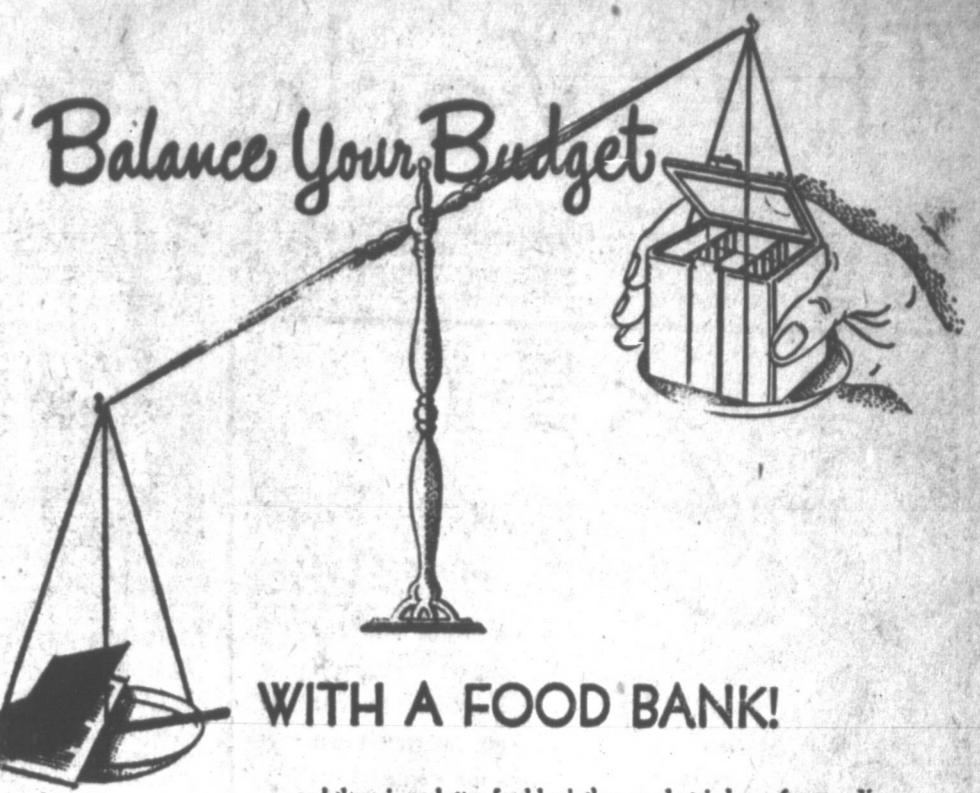
BOMBAY — (AP) — A commercial radio station in the nearby Portuguese colony of Goa is winning listeners from the Indian government radio and making enemies among some Indian politicians.

Listeners in Western India are tuning to Radio Goa because it broadcasts music day and night. They particularly like music from Indian films — something they don't hear very often on state all-India radio.

Indian businessmen are patronizing Radio Goa because it is the only commercial station in the area. Critics, headed by Joachim Alva, member of Parliament from Bombay, have asked advertisers to give up their programs. They have also appealed to newspapers not to publish Radio Goa's program schedules.

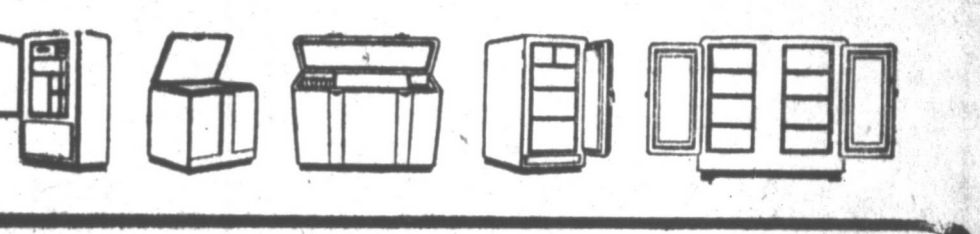

Yugoslavia's Charges Against Russia Important, Not New

Yugoslavia's formal charges the past weekend that Russia is preparing the satellites to overthrow Marshal Tito's government are important — but not new.

The official Yugoslav white paper issued on the subject is a grave document. It's about the most two-faced document leveled at Russia since Tito was read out of the bolshevik fold by the Cominform.

However, it is reviewing and bringing up to date a situation with which we have been conversant for some time.

Yugoslav Foreign Minister Edvard Kardelj as far back as 1949 before the United Nations assembly outlined this explosive situation. That was for the information of the peace organization, and Yugoslavia didn't ask for any action.

the new white paper is largely for the information of the western powers and the United Nations. Possibly the Belgrade government also feels that by thus spotlighting the situation it may slow down the anti-Yugoslav activities of the neighboring Balkan satellites.

The break between Moscow and Marshal Tito came in '48, nearly three years ago. It was caused by his rejection of the bolshevik tenet that Communist nations must surrender their sovereignty to Moscow.

Tito didn't reject communism altogether, however. He built himself a new lam along nationalistic lines. This has become known as Titoism and has spread to the Communist parties of numerous countries, including the satellites.

Moscow has been harassing Yugoslavia through the neighboring satellites. The latest white paper reiterates that Russia

Car Shortage Hurts Florida

MIAMI — (AP) — A shortage of refrigerated railroad cars is forcing Florida farmers to waste hundreds of acres of fresh vegetables.

With an estimated 3,000 freight cars needed right now to ship the millions of dollars worth of vegetables north, many farmers are having to plow under, or watch go to seed, ripened crops.

The estimation was made by Gordon Stedman, secretary-manager of the Growers and Shippers League in Orlando. He described the situation as "the worst in years, and said there are only 893 cars in Florida now and 796 enroute. He warned that between 3,500 and 4,000 cars will be needed this week as more crops ripen.

The Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) said in Tallahassee all its bureaus east of the Mississippi were making "strenuous efforts to get refrigerated railroad cars to Florida.

The Tampa Tribune said hundreds of acres of escarole and lettuce are being plowed under and hundreds of acres of celery are going to seed.

In the Lake Okeechobee area, beans, celery, cabbage, corn, peppers and leaf crops are in danger of spoiling in the fields.

Growers there said they needed 200 cars a day and are getting only 30 or 40.

Pacific Northwest Steps Up Tempo

By VINCENT HORMAN
SEATTLE — (AP)—Atom bomb planes and ships to carry them... aluminum to build the planes.

There you have the spectacular side of rearming in the Pacific Northwest.

The mobilization spotlight centers on the great Hanford plant, where 6,000 construction workmen rush expansion of already huge facilities for making plutonium—heart of the atomic bomb.

It swings to the big Boeing airplane plant, where the Air Force has just ordered a new

heavy bomber into production even before it has been test flown.

It touches seven plants turning out 53 percent of the national aluminum, and a teeming Navy yard busy reconverting carriers so they can handle atom bomb carrying planes.

In the northwest, as elsewhere, the mobilization machine is starting rather smoothly.

The Hanford plant, its secret atomic workshops scattered over an isolated semi-desert site in southeast Washington, is well along with a postwar construction program that will at least double its \$350,000,000 wartime cost.

The Air Force has just ordered Boeing to put into production its new B-52, a fast, heavy bomber of which two experimental planes are being built.

At the big Puget Sound naval shipyard in Bremerton, Wash., famous name ships are being fitted for atomic warfare. One, the carrier Essex, just got through a \$40,000,000 two-year conversion job.

The big Oregon and Washington private shipyards are relatively idle, but Henry J. Kaiser is seeking contracts to permit reactivation of yards at Portland, Ore., and Vancouver, Wash.

The aluminum plants, six in Washington state and one at Troutdale, Ore., are going full speed. Another is being built at Kalispell, Mont. More are planned.

Lobbyist Uses No Pressures

WASHINGTON — (AP)—It isn't a headline-making congressional hearing. No mink coats. No deep freezes. No dancing girls.

But to energetic, 35-year-old Mike Masaka, the hearing on changes in our immigration and naturalization laws is of top-flight importance. He hasn't missed a meeting of the Senate and House judiciary subcommittees, and he doesn't intend to.

I thought you might be interested in Mike because he doesn't fit in the picture that usually is painted of lobbyists. Like many another person working here to influence legislation, Mike has no money to throw around and he doesn't control enough votes to swing a single congressional election.

All Mike has in his own seemingly boundless energy, a cheerful friendliness, and he quickly points out, "a cause that is just." That may be enough.

Mike's cause may be better understood by looking first at Mike.

The Masaka family moved from Fresno to Utah. Mike went to school there, was graduated from the University of Utah. Everything was going along nicely until Dec. 7, 1941. That was a disaster for all of us, but it was a double disaster to Americans who looked like the enemy.

Japanese were put in detention camps. Japanese-Americans, though citizens, were suspected of treachery. Mike was jailed nine times.

He decided the best way Japanese-Americans could prove their loyalty would be to have a fighting force of their own. The 442nd Japanese American Regimental Central Postal Directory was the result.

The first volunteer: Mike Masaka. The second, third, fourth and fifth volunteer: Mike's brothers.

The combat team had a terrific record. "We helped rescue the Texans," he says proudly, "and I am now an honorary citizen of Texas."

The 442nd won medals by the bucket full.

The cost was high. Its casualties ran higher than 300 percent counting replacements.

The Masakas won 20 medals. But one brother was killed, another suffered wounds that left him 100 percent disabled, another was 40 percent disabled.

Mike came home to work for the Japanese-American Citizens League and its 10,000 members.

The league has two objectives that are under consideration at the present hearing, in the order of their importance, these are:

1. Full naturalization rights for
2. The right to own property.

"Power, natural gas, perhaps an oil pipeline are the keys to future northwest mobilization and development," said one business observer. "We have great potential, but until we get gas and additional power we are in a predicament. And both are a couple of years away."

What about the general attitude toward the military buildup? Opinions varied.

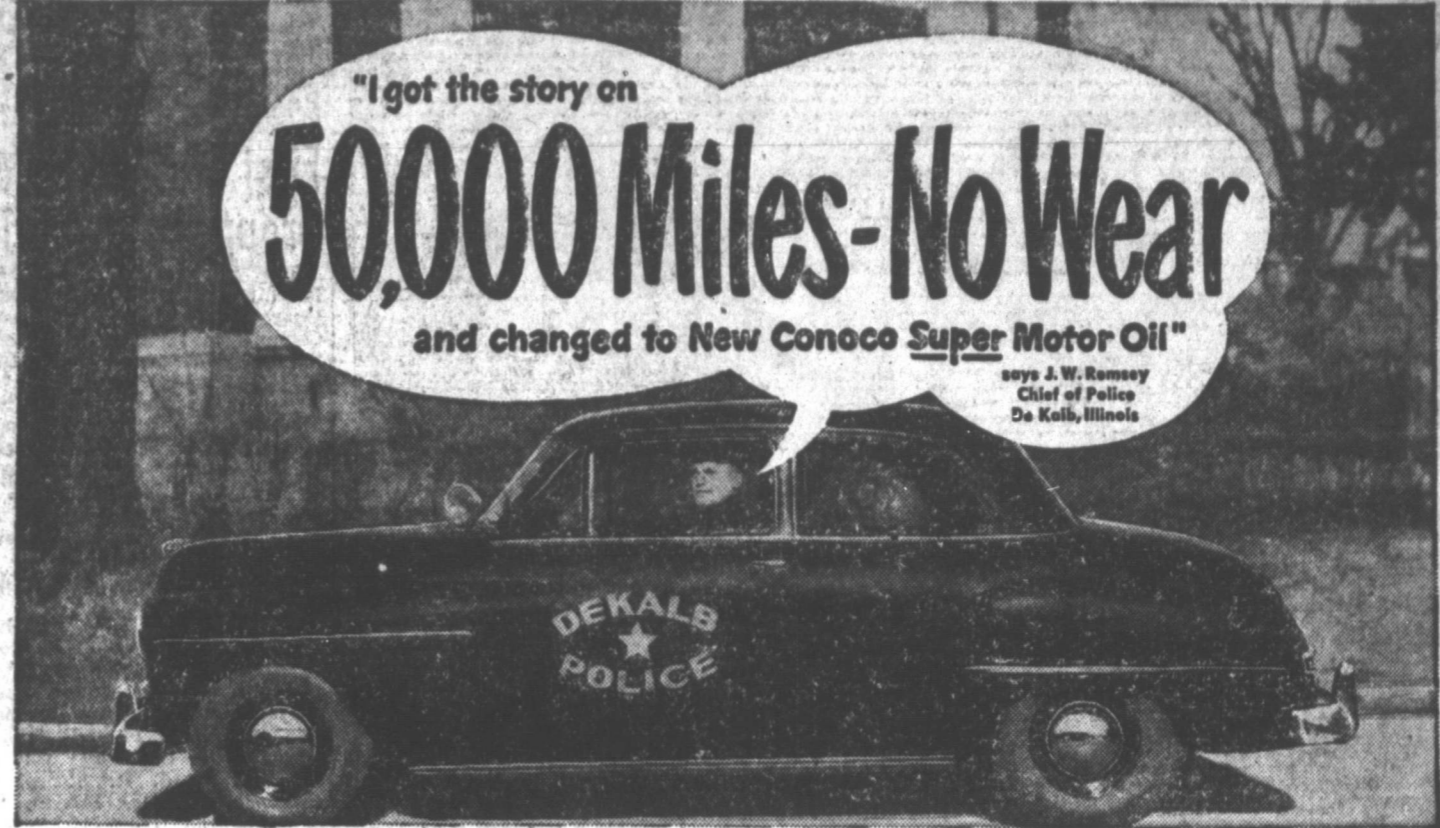
One industry observer with wide connections says:

Give The Children A Thrift Party

 Give the youngsters an ice cream party now and then. It will take their minds off all the war talk. For an easy, inexpensive party serve the children creamy cherry vanilla ice cream with fig cookies. Ice cream, being a dairy food, carries its weight in good nutrition, so let the youngsters have it frequently. Into mold. Cherry Vanilla Crown (Serves 6-8). One package cherry-flavored gelatin, 1 1/2 cups hot water, 1-2 cup canned cherry juice, 1 cup canned drained cherries, 1 quart cherry vanilla ice cream (bulk), fig cookies. Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add fruit juice and pour a thin layer in ring molds and chill until firm. Chill remaining gelatin until slightly thickened, add cherries and pour into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold and fill center with cherry-vanilla ice cream. Garnish with fig cookies around the outer edge of mold. Fig Alaska. One quart cherry-vanilla ice cream (bulk), 1 box fig cookies, 5 egg whites, 10 tablespoons sugar. Place ice cream in freezing compartment until ready to use. Cover small bread board with heavy waxed paper. Arrange fig cookies on board to form base 1/2 inch wider and longer than ice cream block. Beat egg whites stiff; gradually add sugar, beating constantly. Place ice cream on cookie base.

Greeks Still Talking About Jailing Of Dashing Palikari

 ATHENS—Much of the talk over the coffee cups of the outdoor cafes here still centers about Costas Kephalyoyannis.
 As the readers of front pages everywhere know, Costas is the dashing, moustachioed Cretan who abducted the love of his life, Tasoula Petracoorgis, and thereby came close to bringing civil war to the island of Crete.
 Costas is in jail now, starting a two-year sentence, and almost everyone agrees that he was a romantic streak in him must be as wide as the yellow streak isn't.
 In Crete, Costas is known as palikari No. 1. He comes from Annoghia, at the foot of Mt. Ida (legendary home of Zeus), the toughest town in Crete, which means just about the toughest town in the world.
 People who live along the rocky road that leads to Annoghia say they're glad that town is at the very end of the road, otherwise they wouldn't be able to pass up and down the road without paying tribute to the hardbitten Annoghians.
 Annoghia was the center of resistance in Crete in World War II and the Germans, after finding that a whole regiment couldn't keep the handful of palikaris under control, finally shelled it to the ground.
 General Kreige, Nazi commander of Crete, who was kidnapped by the British (see the book "Bill Mait by Moonlight") was first hidden in a cave near Costas' hometown. Costas was a member of the kidnaping party, and it was to one of the caves where the general had been secreted that Costas later hid with his beloved Tasoula.
 The Greeks will give you any number of reasons to prove that Costas was 'railroaded,' the first being that he was originally charged with abducting the woman he loved.
 "Ninety percent of the married women on Crete were abducted by their husbands, and the other ten percent say 'they were.' Athenians will tell you.
 "No Cretan woman wants to admit that her husband 'was a n' enough of a palikari to take her off by force."
 But what makes the Athenians laugh is the charge that Costas finally went to jail on, namely, carrying weapons and leading an armed band.
 "I'd bet you," an Athenian told me, "that you'd be hard put to find any male in Crete more than 12 years of age who doesn't have, doesn't carry, and doesn't know how to use a firearm of some sort. Most of them start packing pistols around nine or ten, which they consider a good age to start beginning to be a palikari."
 Another phase of Costas' trial which Athenians say made it tough on the fellow is that Tasoula's father (who hates the Kephalyoyannis clan worse than a poison) is an influential liberal, and the liberals are in power,

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Home sweet home for a nine-day-old Arabian colt is the back shop of a downtown photo engraving plant.
 Shopowner Jim Barnard brought the colt, Skippy, into town in the back seat of his car a few days ago. He called in a carpenter to build a corral in the shop and customers sent him a bottle

warmer and a dozen bottles with nipples.
 Barnard spends each night on an army cot alongside Skippy's corral. Each of his 37 employees take turns looking after the colt's needs. Barnard's bookkeeper, Mrs. Merry Norman, prepares Skippy's formula — milk, lime water, and syrup.
 Skippy, who stands five hands high and weighs 75 pounds, is excluded daily by volunteers who lead him carefully through traffic.
 Barnard said Skippy was born on a ranch in suburban Puente. Skippy's mother refused to nurse him and the ranch owners de-

cided he must be destroyed. Barnard learned the sad story when he drove out to select a saddle horse recently for his ranch in nearby Sherman Oaks.
 "I forgot the saddle horse and bought Skippy," said Barnard. "The little guy kind of gets you."
 Barnard says he plans to take the colt out to his ranch in about two weeks. "Meanwhile he stays right here where he'll be safe."

NEW YORK — (AP) — Food price ceilings are due this week. The rollback that housewives have been praying for seems most unlikely.

Egyptian Farmers Still Have Locust

CAIRO — (AP) — The Egyptian farmer has joined battle once again with one of his ancient foes — the plant-eating locust.

Since Biblical times this insect has been one of the most serious agricultural pests plaguing the middle east.

Peasants who filled the rich Nile Delta soil under the pharaohs suffered from locust invasions which destroyed all vegetation in their path.

This summer, large swarms of them crossed the Red Sea and invaded Ethiopia, French Somaliland, Africa, Somaliland and the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan adjoining Egypt.

Now the scourge has penetrated along the Nile into Egypt. It could be dangerous if uncontrolled because Egypt is an agriculture economy. Egypt produces much of the world's long-staple cotton.
