Of the normal 1,500,000 civilian population, only about 200,000 were left in the war-wracked city.

own fields of interest were affected — Brannan in connection with farm prices, Tobin on wages, Sawyer on business earnings, and McCabe on credit financing.
The government's leaders have the responsibility Johnston went on to set an example for the country. The stakes, he said, are great — the success of the entire defense program.
After Johnston's talk, Secretary of Defense Marshall was said to have told the group he agreed fully. Soaring prices are increasing the cost of defense, lowering national morale, and jeopardizing the mobilization, he was quoted as saying.
The session of the board, which was set up to advise Mobilization Director Wilson was given over almost entirely to the stabilization problem, it was learned.
There was no word as to whether there had been discussion of new legislation to be requested of Congress to strengthen the Defense Production Act due to expire June 30. Johnston was scheduled to forward his recommendations in the stabilization field to Wilson today.
The House Banking Committee called a closed session (10:30 a.m. EST) to consider a Senate-approved bill extending federal rent control on more than 2,000,000 homes for 90 days beyond March 31. Unless action is taken, rent ceilings in 1,374 communities will expire at the end of this month. These are cities and towns which have not voted to continue controls until mid-year, when the entire rent law expires.
The administration plans to request new and broader rent control legislation going into effect after June 30, but strong opposition is predicted in Congress.

Shortage Hinted For Dressed Meats

HOUSTON — (P) — A shortage of dressed meats in the Houston area was hinted at because of current high livestock prices.

Charles H. Winreich, Jr., acting district director of the Office of Price Stabilization, indicated this yesterday in a report on a factual survey of the meat situation.

Winreich said that because of no control over livestock, some wholesalers will discontinue selling dressed meats or cuts because the wholesalers price ceilings will not permit them to operate.

Some slaughterers, said the report, said they will discontinue slaughtering calves because of the high price of livestock, and this will result in a shortage of dressed meats in this area.

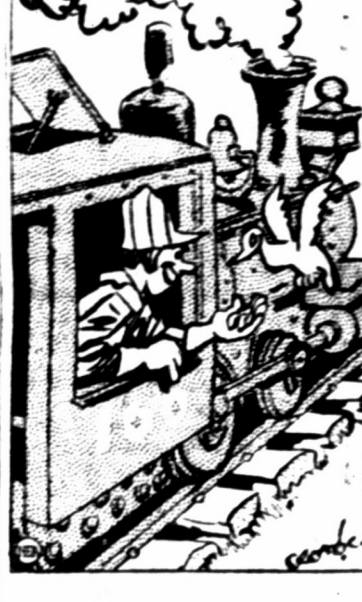

Farm Leader Warns Of Black Markets

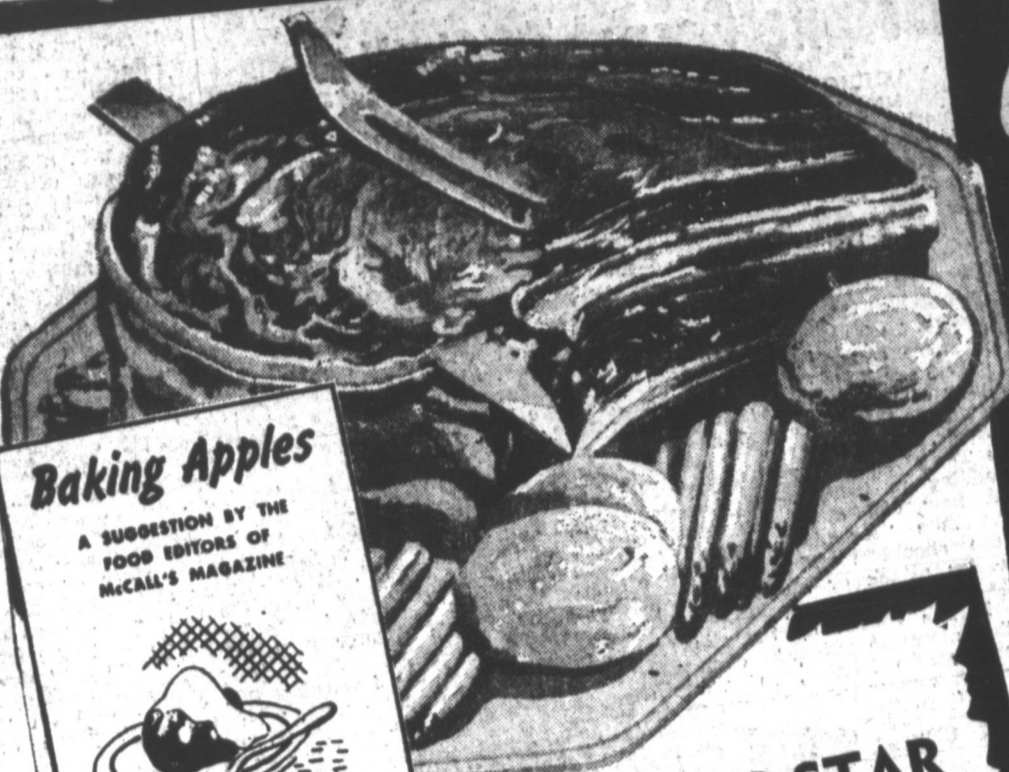

Percent Cited On Tax Check

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The chances are about 1 to 2 that the income tax return you must make as an individual by midnight tonight will be scrutinized to see you paid enough. That is, if you are in the so-called lower brackets. If you are among those fortunate few whose income exceeds \$25,000 annually, the odds are even that federal agents will examine your return. Internal Revenue Bureau policies with respect to checking returns were disclosed to the House Appropriations Committee during hearings on the 1952 treasury appropriation bill. Here's what bureau officials said:

On returns of from \$7,000 to \$10,000, examinations are made of 8:80 percent; from \$10,000 to \$25,000, it's 17.2 percent; from \$25,000 to \$100,000, the percentage is 58.1; on \$10,000 and over, 85.4 percent are examined. Those are figures on checks of 1948 returns. On returns of \$25,000 and over, the examinations have disclosed that 7 out of every 10 have been in error; so, starting this year, every return in the big-bracket group will be audited once every two years. All returns, regardless of size, are "scanned for mathematical errors."

All in all, said G. J. Schoeneman, head of the Internal Revenue Bureau, at least 95 percent of American taxpayers are honest and "will discharge their obligations if they know what they are." He added, "The errors they make are not dishonest errors."

Movieland Animals Had No Tax Worries Despite Salaries

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Been stewing and fretting, figuring and refiguring to compute your income tax. Then it will give you small satisfaction to learn that one group of wage earners — and they're in the upper brackets — didn't give taxes a thought. They are Hollywood's acting animals — and you should have it so soft.

Lassie, for instance, which makes about \$50,000 a year, complacently munched a filet of horse while his master huddled with a tax expert. How much does an individual animal have to pay? That's a toughie. Most trainers have scores of beasts. The biggest outfit, the World Jungle Compound, has more than 200, ranging from elephants to squirrels. Taxes are based on the owner's total income and are not broken down to show each animal's share. Lassie, if he were human, male and single, would pay about \$23,000 on his income. (That's right, Lassie's "he"). Billy Richards, a co-owner of the Jungle Compound, estimates his more famous charges would be in at least the 20 percent bracket. He said his biggest star, a chimpanzee named Tamba which died in a fire last week, was paid \$1,000 a week while working and he got a lesser sum between pictures "just for eating bananas."

Here are some other examples of how highly the movie industry regards its four-footed performers: In the \$600 a week class are Jackie the lion, Dynamite the black panther, Stan the tiger and Sherry the puma. A racing camel gets \$100 a day. Lassie's stand-in, Laddie, draws \$150 a week. A leading man's saddle horse gets up to \$360, a trick horse \$450. Frosty, a trained gull, is paid \$30 a day. These salaries aren't as big as they sound when you consider overhead. Animals eat the year around but work only a few weeks. Expenses for food, quarters, transportation and veterinarians are deductible. Lassie's trainer, Rud Weatherwax, wishes animals could claim exemptions for children. "Lassie has sired about 200 pups," he says. "Think how much that would knock off my tax bill."

Military Concentrating Units Despite Gospel To Civilians

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The military, which preaches the merit of dispersion to private industry, is continuing to concentrate some of its most vital projects in a single, comparatively small area of the country. The state of Maryland and the District of Columbia at its southwestern border, provide a highly profitable target for any enemy bomber or airborne troop attack. There already existed within a complex of military research centers, command headquarters and airfields.

The Defense Department is adding to those priority targets a new one of equal value, a wartime "second Pentagon" for use should Washington come under attack or immediate danger of attack. It has chosen as the site for this alternate national command post Camp Ritchie, in western Maryland north of Washington.

The camp was used until recently by the Maryland National Guard. The location of that emergency military headquarters, with underground quarters and communication facilities, is within relatively short distance of another potential primary target, Camp Detrick. Situated on the outskirts of Frederick, Md., Camp Detrick is the center of the military's germ warfare laboratory and production effort. Fifteen minutes away from the modern fast bomber is Aberdeen, heart of the Army's ordnance research and development work and its chief proving ground. At Baltimore (where 2nd Army headquarters also is located) is the center for army's counter intelligence corps. Washington and the immediate vicinity would be an enemy bombardier's dream, even if it

Here, over the years, concentrated such top priority targets as the Pentagon (the whole did not have the White House, military high command and all its operating staff in one building); headquarters of the Atomic Energy Commission (a civilian agency with a military mission); the Bureau of Standards which specializes in precision instrument development needed for weapons; a Naval gun factory, and three military air fields, two of them adjoining. Moreover, the Maryland - District of Columbia concentration is close to the Atlantic seaboard. There have been broad hints that intermediate range guided missiles, capable of launching from submarines or surface ships, are located on rivers or bays. Of all natural landmarks, these are the easiest for a radar to locate. The delineation of a bay or river or coastline or a radar scope conforms exactly to the picture presented on a map. No bombardier or pilot can mistake it. When long range, target-seeking guided missiles are ready, this could help them "home in" on the final phase of their flight.

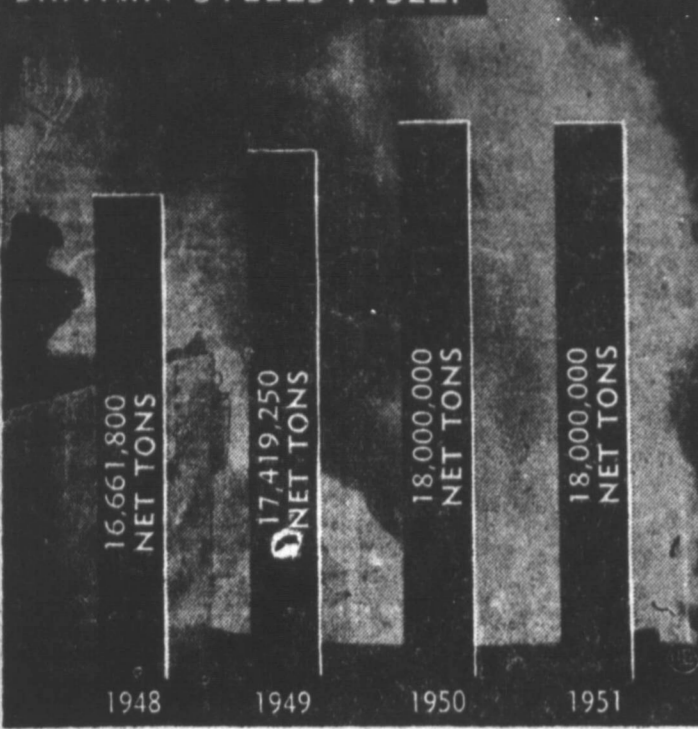
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BRITAIN STEELS ITSELF

Bone Banks Should Be Built Up Says Orthopedic Surgeon

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Bone banks should take their place with blood banks as a national medical facility as rapidly as the public can be convinced they are needed.

Dr. G. Mosser Taylor of Los Angeles expressed this view of orthopedic specialists at a news conference recently.

Such repositories, he said, greatly enhance the availability of bone for surgical grafting and enable medicine to prevent much pain. Yet less than 10 such banks exist in the United States, he estimated.

Taylor is head of the orthopedic department at the School of Medicine, College of Medical Evangelists. He also is director of the short courses at the school's National Medical Convention.

A bone bank is nothing more than a deep freeze chamber. Bone can be kept indefinitely under refrigeration, he asserted, if taken from a living person or stored within six hours after death. Merthiolate, an antiseptic, also can be used as a bone preservative if the solution is changed every two weeks.

In most grafting operations, Taylor said, the bone is taken from another part of the patient's body.

However, the amount of bone a graft patient can spare is limited, and almost invariably the area whence it is taken proves more painful than the injured region where the graft is made, he pointed out.

Present sources of bone for banks are restricted, but should increase through effective presentation of the problem to the public, Taylor believes. White Memorial Hospital here, maintained by the College of Medical Evangelists, has a bone bank, and most of its supply comes from amputations.

Amputees and others who lose bone through surgery, however, commonly object to having parts of their anatomy incorporated in the bodies of strangers.

"I have been pleasantly surprised, on the other hand, to find that patients needing grafts are perfectly willing to accept bone from other persons — that is, from the bank," he said.

Some bone for the bank here, Taylor said, is supplied by the amputation cases from railroad yard accidents.

Softer, spongy bone, from the sides and back of the hips, and

It included 2,000 rifles, 15 heavy machine guns, 10 light machine guns, 38 Thompson submachine guns, 120 automatic burp guns, 50 automatic rifles, eight cases of mortar shells, four cases of grenades, 20 rockets, 21 mortars, more than 27,000 rounds of small arms ammunition, four American-made 75 mm. recoilless rifles, twelve .37 mm. recoilless rifles, communications equipment and a motion picture projector.

Ike Says U.S. Can Win War

It certainly bolsters confidence to hear from a commander-in-chief who has led his conquering armies across western Europe that America could defeat Russia if war came.

The way General Eisenhower put it to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee during his recent examination was that "our enlightened 150,000,000 people can still whip 190,000,000 backward people" in Russia if war comes.

He also declared that with sufficient air and sea support, 12 American divisions could hold the Ereton Peninsula of southwest France against the Russians.

General Ike apparently bases these estimates not only on western strength but on potential Russian weakness. One of the most impressive parts of his testimony was his prediction that

If there is war the Red satellites will turn against Moscow. He declared that "dissent elements all the way from the Balkans right up to the Baltic will rise."

That is a likelihood which this column has been hammering on for a long time as one of the most important aspects of the continuing crisis. There can be no doubt that the disaffection now apparent among the satellites weighs heavily with Russian plans.

The satellites not only have been Russia's bulwark across eastern and central Europe, but Moscow originally looked to them as sources of supplies and manpower. Those expectations now have gone glimmering. And worse yet, from the Soviet viewpoint, the satellites have become potential active foes of bolshevist rule.

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Production Answer To Inflation Says Texas Bank Official

CHICAGO — (AP) — A banker has told his colleagues that the only certain answer to inflation is adequate production.

Fred F. Florence, president of the Republic National Bank of Dallas, said "direct controls do not eliminate the basic causes of inflation, but tend to suppress them for the time being."

He suggested this program for the nation's bankers:

1. We should insist that all sound measure be directed toward increasing the production of goods as rapidly as possible to meet defense and civilian requirements.

2. We should demand sound anti-inflationary fiscal policies by government at all levels — municipal, county, state and federal.

3. We should insist that the Treasury follow sound anti-inflationary development policies.

4. We should demand that the federal reserve system and the commercial banking system follow an anti-inflationary credit policy consistent with providing the essential credit needed for productive expansion but withholding credit that might have unproductive inflationary consequences.

It is of snow white marble, and was built fifty years ago, but on walking through its gates you would swear it was brand, spanking new, and was awaiting dedication.

Speaking of gods, the Greeks of way back yonder did all right by their gods and goddesses. I never have been the sort of traveler who threw communion fits of rapture at the sight of ruins, but the Acropolis and the Parthenon of Athens are some closer to converting me to a worshiper of ruins than I thought possible.

You don't have to know architecture, which I don't, or art, which I don't, or anything else, to get a tremendous inner infection from the Parthenon of Pericles, which has been standing centuries before Christ, has the grace of a soaring bird, the purity of a laughing child, the magnificence of a storm, and is the one work of art that I have ever seen that I am sure I would never grow tired of.

It is always the same and always different. That may not make sense, but it's true. A cloud shades the sun and the marble takes on a different hue. The moon touches it and the marble changes its dress. Sunrise and sunset give it an ethereal glow, and you feel as if it were not built on the ground, but that it floated in the air between the summit of the Acropolis and the heavens. It is a ruin, but to me it is much lovelier than the Taj Mahal.

That's a bit fancy for me, but that's sort of the way the Parthenon made me feel.

If I can find the time while I am in Greece I am going to make a boat trip to a certain peninsula which, for centuries and centuries, has forbidden the presence of a female. A female of any sort. Not only gals, but all females. It is strictly for men. Roosters are there, but no hens. Dogs, but no bitches. Male canaries, but no girde-wearing canaries.

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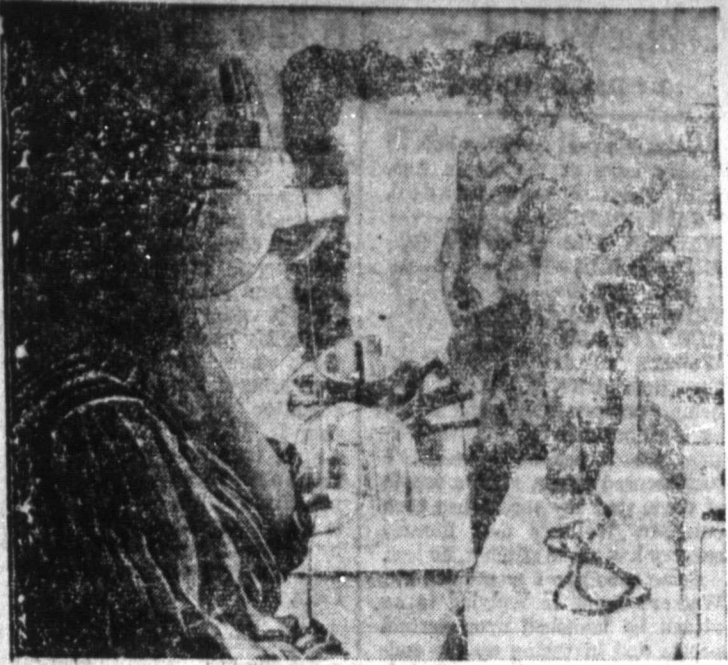

Truman Overruled Labor Department

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Labor leaders are in a running fight with Charles E. Wilson, big boss of the defense program, over several things. One of them is the handling of manpower. There's no shortage of workers for defense plants now but there may be in another nine months when defense production really is rolling. It will mean getting workers for jobs, training them, maybe even shifting them around. If the problem gets serious the government will face this choice: Trying to work it out through the voluntary cooperation of labor and management or slapping on government controls, telling workers and employers what to do. Labor leaders want the voluntary method. In their long fight with Wilson they are looking forward to the long-range problem and the steps which the government may take, or want to take, to fill manpower needs. And the labor leaders want some say-so in what's done. But as time passes this whole squabble tends to get lost in a fog of words. This is a brief attempt to explain what's happened and what the situation is now. On Sept. 9, 1950 President Truman issued a general order to get the defense program going. He assigned various jobs to government officials. One of these was secretary of Labor Tobin. He told Tobin to do what he could to meet manpower needs which would arise, including the making of plans and policies. The word "policies" is important in all this. It really means deciding what shall be done and how.

Tobin's Labor Department has numerous branches or bureaus whose regular job deals with workers anyway, so, by shifting gears a bit and enlarging their work, they could be of help in the defense manpower case. And Tobin appointed Robert C. Goodwin, a labor department official, to run the job of setting up a program that would help get men where they were needed in defense plants and all the millions of details connected with such a job. In addition, Tobin did something else which pleased labor very much. He set up an advisory committee composed of representatives of labor and management. Actually, this would amount to a policy committee. Goodwin, knowing the manpower problems everywhere, would decide what steps he thought should be taken to solve these problems. He'd recommend what he thought should be done to solve these problems. He'd recommend what he thought should be done to the Tobin labor-management committee. It would approve or disapprove and so advise Tobin. Whatever it decided would be pretty much the government policy on manpower since Tobin could be expected to follow the views of his own labor-management committee. But the people in Wilson's office say Tobin could set policy only in so far as the work of his own Labor Department's activities in manpower were concerned, but lacked any authority to determine manpower policies for the whole government and all the country. Income Tax Was Supposed To Bring Bright Day To Nation

By ARTHUR EDSON

WASHINGTON — (AP) — This is the day millions of Americans swear: "Never again." Never again, they say, will they put off making out their income tax returns until the last day. But they — or other putter-offers — will. Every year, the income tax: people say, millions don't get the dismal chore done until the last minute. It would be worse if it weren't for the fact that so many are entitled to tax returns. "I don't know why," said the income tax man coyly, "but people who have money coming to them usually get their returns in early."

In his Dec. 16 order, setting up Wilson's job, Mr. Truman told the latter he would control the whole defense effort, including manpower problems. This clearly made Wilson boss over Tobin where manpower is concerned. So Tobin who was made — or seemed to be made — manpower boss by one presidential order on Sept. 9 lost the power to Wilson by another presidential order on Dec. 16. But everything rocked along until Feb. 9 when Wilson forcefully stepped into the picture by setting up, inside his own office, a manpower committee of his own. There were no labor-management people on it. Instead, its membership was strictly limited to representatives of government departments or agencies which have a deep interest in manpower. This committee included: A representative of the Defense Department, of Selective Service, of the Agriculture (farm workers) and the Civil Service Commission (government workers). And Wilson said a representative of Tobin's Labor Department would be on his committee.

This changed the picture around a bit. Under Tobin's arrangement, this is what would happen: Goodwin would make a recommendation to the labor-management committee which in turn would make a policy to Tobin who'd put the policy into effect. But under the Wilson arrangement, the whole picture would be different: The big policy decisions would be made by Wilson's committee which, in the end, would mean Wilson since he'd have final say as top boss. The labor people complained this meant their too remote from a final policy decision. This is why: Goodwin would recommend to them; they'd recommend to Tobin; Tobin would have to content himself with expressing his views to Wilson's committee through his representative on that committee; the Wilson committee could decide on a contrary policy; and Wilson could change that.

At the same time that it pulled out of all the other defense agencies, labor walked out of the labor-management committee, too. This committee has actually met only three times, Wilson's committee not at all. Labor isn't demanding a place on Wilson's committee. But it complained there is not even one representative on Wilson's own personal staff of top labor people. He asked labor to name someone to work with him. Labor hasn't done so yet. And there the whole case stands.

Success Story Revealed Of Tough, Veteran U.S. 25th

WESTERN FRONT, Korea — (AP) — The tough veteran troops of the 25th Infantry Division, who had written so many winning chapters of the American army in Korea, have achieved perhaps their greatest success in the last seven days. How they went about it is a story that can be told now.

When this nippy, sunny day dawned they were firmly established north of the Han River. The hold 80 square miles of rugged real estate taken away from Chinese Communists who vastly outnumbered them a week ago and have almost vanished now.

The politically important city of Seoul lies but a few miles to the west. The dirty waters of the Han are to the south.

"Lightning Division" troops are stretched across a ten-mile front. All over the jagged peaks, troops laboriously climbed, men are burying Chinese bodies.

Here's how the men of the 25th got there: It began in the black and cold early morning hours of last Wednesday. Junior officers and platoon sergeants of the 27th (Wolfhound) Regiment's Third Battalion filed out into the silence from a dimly lighted room where they had been briefed in minute detail — by Lt. Col. Richard W. Keyes of Houston. They carried back to their men Keyes' words — "I want vigorous, aggressive action."

Suddenly it was on longer quiet. With one unbelievable roar, 148 artillery pieces, 100 tanks, hundreds of mortars and machine guns let loose. "Good morning, Mister Chinaman," smiled a staff officer. Burning tracers snarled across the stream from machine guns into the hills across the water and then skidded crazily into the skies as they struck obstacles and targets.

Then the big gun shells began to burst. There were so many dumped so fast into such a small area that the land across the river looked like a blinking movie magnifying. The projections twinkled as they burst.

Twenty minutes of this — the greatest artillery barrage of the Korean war — and then the troops moved slowly down to the river's edge carrying the green assault boats upside down. As they righted the tiny craft and started to climb in, the Reds started answering the barrage. Shells whined overhead almost incessantly with a "whoosh, whoosh, whoosh."

Red Taxpayer Has Big Load

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Laugh at your tax collector: the Russians are a big step ahead of him in grabbing revenue.

The most formidable levy that faces the Russian muzik is a "turn-over tax" on consumer goods that runs as high as 75 percent on wheat and rye and 85 percent on sugar.

Secretary of the Treasury Snyder described the Russian tax system to the House Appropriations Committee by request of Rep. Canfield (R-N.J.). Snyder said the turnover tax, which amounts to a sales tax, furnishes roughly 60 percent of the Soviet government's budget receipts. It is levied almost entirely on consumer goods.

Since the Bolshevik bureaucracy keeps stores as well as collects taxes, this turnover tax is a real burr raiser.

For example, the government buys a quantity of grain for 100 rubles. The selling price is 400 rubles — including a tax of 300 rubles.

After that going-over, the Russian taxpayer can scarcely mind an income tax which runs as high as 45 percent on farmers, or a government bond sale program which Snyder said brought

PARIS — (NEA) — Like any good hostess, Paris is getting out her best gowns for the parties she'll be giving this summer for her 2000th birthday.

There's just one big hitch: nobody's sure how many tourists, guests Paris will have at the celebration.

"It's anybody's guess," says Harry Hill, American Express manager. "Right now future reservations in the U. S. are away down. They may jump way up after Easter, but nobody knows." He thinks many families are waiting to see how the draft affects them before they make any plans for a European vacation.

The Commissariat au Tourisme—official tourist bureau—is confused, too, since reports from its agents in the U. S. and in other countries which keep France's tourist trade going are contradictory.

Nevertheless, they are hopeful. "If the international situation remains unchanged," says one official, "it is probably the 1951 season will be just as good as 1950."

This in itself is not much to brag for a 2000-year-old lady's birthday cake, but Paris hotel owners are looking forward to some extra tidbits apart from the regular tourist season. They figure that the Festival of Briton will draw a large number of Americans who will eventually cross the Channel for a few days in Paris. 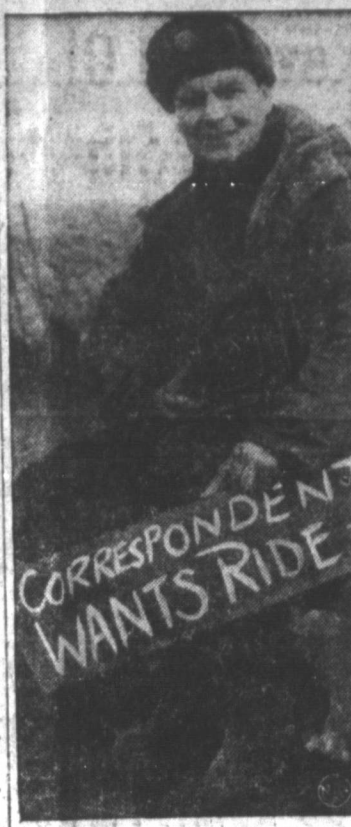

Doctor Raps Fad On Diets

By BOB THOMAS
HOLLYWOOD — (AP)—A prominent Hollywood physician has rapped fad diets which he said are endangering the lives of movie stars and the public at large. The man making this statement is Dr. Max Rubinstein, author of a textbook on endocrinology and a current book for popular consumption, "The Gland and Sex Dilemma." Many prominent Hollywood names are among his patients and he has had a chance to observe the effects of diets.

"Hollywood people are overly diet-conscious," he observed. "And because they are so well publicized, they have affected the eating habits of the rest of the nation. The result is, as the surgeon general of the United States has said, we have more poorly nourished people here in this land of plenty than in impoverished countries."

"Hollywood has gone overboard for nine-day diets, seven-day diets, banana diets and now yogurt diets. People don't realize that a diet should be like a prescription. It should be made up to fit the individual and

should be used under a doctor's supervision.

"These highly-publicized diets do not attack the basic problem in cases of overweight. The weight is regained soon afterward."

"Many of the stars who diet suffer from secondary anemia. This can result in serious ailments and can shorten their lives. It can also cause glandular imbalance and disorders in sex life — not abnormal disorders, but deficiencies which can make it difficult to have children."

Dr. Rubinstein remarked that even the stars who do not diet are often poorly nourished.

"They live on a diet of fat, rich food," he said. "Why, you can eat in these fancy Hollywood restaurants for a year and not consume enough good food to last you a week."

The physician observed that movie stars and Hollywood people in general suffer from nervous tension.

They are constantly worrying about the future and how the public will take them next year," he said. "Their sympathetic nervous systems are overstimulated and this affects their glandular balance. This results in one or two reactions. They either drive themselves too hard or they take the attitude that they don't care and look for escapes."

Returning to diets, Dr. Rubinstein admitted that they are nec-

essary. "The biggest killers are overweight and worry," he said.

"But most of the popular diets are hokum. A diet has to be balanced; you cannot do without starches, fats and carbohydrates. You've got to eat bread, because starches are necessary to burn fat. And you cannot substitute vitamins for food. Vitamins are not valuable if the glands are not functioning because of malnutrition."

I asked how a person should reduce. His reply: "See your doctor and let him give you a balanced diet."
