





Now, the prostate gland is a sex gland which lies at the neck or outlet of the bladder. In the later years of life if often grows bigger and thicker. If it enlarges too much, it interferes with the free flow of urine and complete emptying of the bladder. Getting up at night is often one of the first signs of enlargement. Delay or difficulty in beginning

urination is common at first. This tends to increase slowly. The bladder wall gradually thickens and is, therefore, able to hold less urine and thus the desire to urinate comes more and more often, setting up a sort of vicious circle.

The pain, irritation, and local discomfort caused by enlargement of the prostate vary from person to person. The sleep can be disturbed. There is also a possibility of developing kidney trouble because of the back pressure from the urine in the bladder. A man with an enlarged pros-

tate may suddenly find that he is not able to urinate at all. If this happens the bladder must be emptied through a tube, called a catheter, which is passed into the bladder. The symptoms of acute inability to urinate can be relieved in this way but only for a while. SURGERY USED

Any Household Handyman Can Repair Broken Furniture



Many an ailing table, chair or chest of drawers needs only an hour's work to put it in good shape. Purniture reconditioning is easy and requires only the simplest of hand tools.

The commonest of all furniture troubles is sticking of drawers of dressers, tables and other similar articles of furniture. Slight sticking can be cured by rubbing par-affin on the edges. For bad cases, the edge that causes sticking should be shaved down, which can a pocket knife. Then coat the affected areas with shallac.
