Critical Tie-Up Death Toll Reaches Of U.S. Trains

Easing Slightly 81 In Rail Disaster

(By The Associated Press) The critical and costly tie-up of the mation's railroad transportation appeared easing today as more striking switchmen joined in the back-to-work movements which started yesterday.

However, there was not a fullscale return across the country marking the end of the "sick call" walkout which started on Jan. 30. Indications were that the crippling week-long stoppage was nearing an end in most parts of the country. Several bright spots appeared on

the troubled rail front following the first major break yesterday when thousands of switchmen returned to work.

Service was normal on major lines in the New York and New England areas. It was near normal many other cities. And many carriers expressed hope for normal service soon as the back-to-work ovement spread from city to city. But there were some dark spots,

oo, in the overall picture. There were a couple of new, alhough small, walkouts. And not many trains were moving in some of the key rail centers - notably Thicago, St. Louis, Cleveland and the twin cities.

The delay in a full return to work delayed the recall of thousands of workers in rail-related industries. More than 250,000 had been idle in the last week because of the rail stoppage.

> WOODBRIDGE, N. J. -(AP) — A crowded commuter train plunged off a newly erected trestle last night, killing 81 persons and injuring about 500. It was the nation's worst train wreck in 32 years.

Throughout the night andfar into today, rescue workers hacked through the twisted mass of wreckage. They said other bodies still may be found in the crumpled coaches and debris.

The 11-car Pennsylvania rail, road train, "The Broker," swerved wildly and jumped the tracks it sped onto the midtown overpass. The cars, jack-knifing crasly, hurtled down a 20-foot em.

bankment. The new, temporary overpast had been put in service only a ew hours before the crash. The dead included bankers, lawyers and businessmen, prominent in their localities and civie life, most of them home-bound from New York City offices.

New Russian Notes | Lion Governor **To Speak Here Reiterate Warning** On German Arming

MOSCOW - (AP) - New Russian notes on a proposed Big Four meeting reiterate that German rearmament is the chief threat to peace, but they leave the door open for talks on other world problems — in the council for foreign ministers as set up by the Potsdam agreement.

(In Washington officials interpreted the call for a "council" meeting as meaning Russia ould exclude discussion of Far Eastern questions unless Communist China was represented, since Potsdam included China on the council for such discussions. (The United States does not ecognize the Red China regime and would not agree to its inclusion in the talks, Washington

sharply I felt the rest of the cars would never make it. "I hit the trestle at about 25 miles per hour and the speed of the train certainly couldn't be blamed for the crash. When I started to sway, I applied the brakes, but it apparently was too late.'

Passengers and at least one railroad detective --- who did not give his name - disagreed with the engineer on the speed of the train. The detective said it was going at top speed when hit the trestle.

The Pennsylvania, in a statement, said a 25 mile-an-hour speed limit was in effect on the new track, opened to traffic less than five hours before "The Broker" cracked up at 5:43 p. m. (EST).

Coach Cliff McNeely cleared the bench, and all of the Harvesters broke into the scoring column






imaginary manpower shortage that exist mostly in the bureaucratic mind. In a recent article, my associate, Dr. Alfred P. Haake, had this

to say: "We actually do have enough workers if all of us do enough work...if everyone of us will do all in our power during regular working hours, and, if need be, work additional hours at regular rates."

Dr. Haake is right; the productivity of the nation's working force can be increased by lengthening the working period. In October 1950, the average work week in manufacturing was 41.4 hours. If this vere extended to equal the World War II peak of 45.2 hours, it would add nearly 10 percent to the man-hours worked, approximately the equivlent of 1.4 million additional



however, grow slowly and may produce a feeling of pressure in the abdomen and general weariness. The most common and troublesome sign is excessive or abnormal bleeding and if the fibroids continue to grow this gets constantly worse.

Specialists in diseases of women have done a lot of work on fibroids and as a result there is not so much suffering from them now as there used to be. Small fibroids which are not producing any symptoms merely have to be watched from time to time since they may grow and cause difficulty, at least up to the time of change of life. Larger ones must be followed

more closely. If they start to grow rapidly or if the symptoms get much worse something may have to be done for them. What produces fibroids is not

exactly known and as yet there is no way to prevent them. On the other hand if the age of the patient, the size of the tumors and the trouble they are causing warrant it there is a cure.

It is surgery. It is not often satisfactory to remove the fibroids and leave the womb in place so that the operation usually involves removing the entire uterus, including the tumors.

The fact that removal of the womb is a serious operation makes the decision difficult. In most cases it can be postponed till after or near the end of the childbearing period though the presence of fibroids itself tends to make conception difficult. All Chinese - owned assets in the United States have been frozen by the Treasury department. They are believed to be worth some \$300 million, but a detailed census on them is not complete. The freeze order was imposed principally to prevent transfer of these assets to other countries, from which the Chinese Communist government might gain control over them. Red China's imports from countried outside the Soviet bloc were valued at \$270 million during the first nine months of 1950. Forty percent, or nearly \$100 million came from the United States. What China got om Russia via the trans-Siberian railroad is unknown.

Chinese imports from the U. consisted mainly of \$66 million worth of raw cotton. \$26 million dyes and chemicals, \$9 nillion metals, machinery and vehicles.



send their sons to fight in China, hunger and suffering she has as we know from the experience in Korea, even if sanctions are voted. Nevertheless, the house says, this outfit should be encouraged to commit the young men of America to an expanded war in Asia.

Common prudence, reinforced by the appalling failure of the theory of collective security in Korea, should have warned against adopting the resolution. If there is one lesson which the Korean experience should have taught congress, it is hereafter to follow our own Constitutional plan and let neither U.N. nor the President usurp the power of congress.

The snap vote in the house shows that one branch of congress is willing to leave the fateful decision of war in China to U.N. In the Senate, a substantial number of the members (we hope not a majority) have shown by their speeches against the Wherry resolution that they are willing to leave the decision of participation

Truman. The arguments for and against war with China can be discussed at another time. The important thing to bear in mind now is that decisions for or against war in China, Europe. or anywhere else, should be made by congress and only by congress. It is sheer folly to leave the determination to U.N. whose members do not intend to engage in the war if they declare it altho some of them may be quite willing, for their own purposes to commit us to it.
