Stockmen Wind Up Judging; Awards Given At Banquets

Tomie M. Potts, Hereford breeder from Memphis, showed the Grand Champion bull at the Top of Texas Hereford Breeders show, Monday afternoon. J. P. Callihan, Conway, exhibited the reserve champion. The cattle were placed for auction by W. R. "Bud" Thurber, manager of the Bridwell Hereford Farm, Windthorst, Tex.

A total of 46 bulls and 11 females were shown Monday afternoon at the livestock judging HBA show. The second half of the event, with Col. Walter Britten on the stand as auctioneer, began at 1:30 p. m. today. Sale of junior livestock began promptly at 9:30 a. m. today.

The grand champion female was exhibited by E. T. Alexander & Son, Canadian. Reserve champion was shown by Callihan, with Jack Hess, McLean, coming in third. Callihan showed the best pair of sale cattle in the show. This latest class was added as a final event of the HBA show and a trophy was presented to Callihan by Frank Carter of the Combs-Worley Ranch.

The entire show, with the exception of the junior fair pig show and the livestock judging contest, was held in the new HBA show barn, just completed last week. The barn, which measures 64 by 96 feet, has ample room inside for a large show ring and for 300 to 400 spectators. HBA cattle were kept inside the building all during the show, while junior cattle were kept in a nearby building. The sales today are being held in the old show ring, just east of the new barn.

In the junior livestock judging contest, Canadian's team won first with a score of 1073. Canyon was second with 1052. Amarillo third, 1022. Pampa fourth and Panhandle fifth. The first place team was awarded a silver trophy through the courtesy of Frank Carter. Second and third place winners were presented banners signifying their place in the contest. The awards were presented by Quentin Williams, superintendent of the contest, at the FFA banquet, held at 8:30 p. m. Monday, in the Palm Room of the city hall. Twenty-nine teams

Rail Strike Settlement Felt Imminent As Tie-Up Eases

Trainmen Return In Many Centers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Humphrey (D-Minn.) said today he had good reason "to be optimistic a settlement of the rail strike may be imminent."

Humphrey said his optimism was based "on information from outside the White House" but he would not elaborate.

Humphrey declined to say who suggested that the White House conference be called off. He told newsmen: "All I can say is that the committee members felt they might be able to contribute something toward ironing out the trouble. Now we find that the situation may be ironing itself out."

Railroad switchmen were returning to work in many important centers, but there was no sign of a general back to work movement.

Because of the delays in rail transportation, the Defense Transportation Administration ordered motor freight carriers to give the defense effort was being handicapped by a "creeping paralysis" of the rail transportation system.

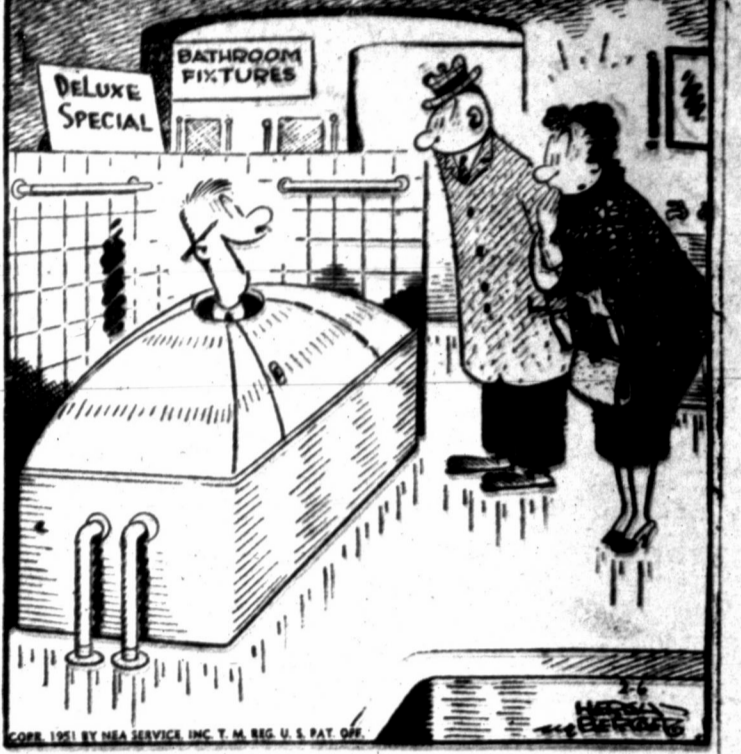

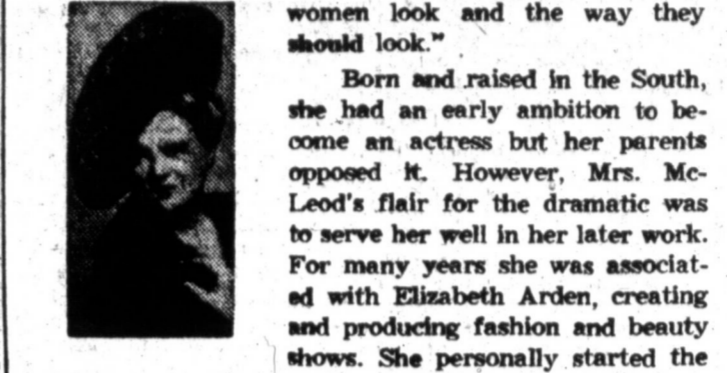

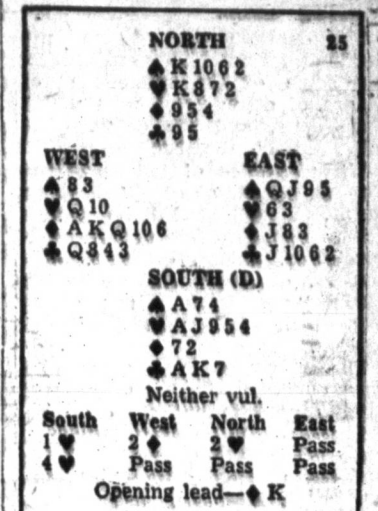

Letters written by me when I was about the age of 22 or 23 clearly show that I had a head for business and would not be bullied in business transactions.

An early love for the theater is revealed in a letter to my oldest brother, written two days after I had been in New York for the first time.
