Guards Due BUTTONS AN' BEAUX Korea Service

WASHINGTON -- (AP) -- The Army says draftees and volunteers trained with federalized National Guard units are being pulled out of those units to bolster forces in Korea.

No precise figures were given but calculations indicated something over 16,000 men from that source might go to the combat

The men being shifted are not national guardsmen but others who were assigned to the four divisions and two regimental combat teams from the guard which were called into federal service last fall, an Army spokesman said.

Other sources are being tapped, too, for men to go to Korea. The spokesman said artillery, anti-aircraft, signals and other units have been called up-

With the additions, the Army said, units in Korea will reach full strength next month for the first time since hostilities start-






