



quotations accredited to Jesus or from the Ten Commandments which can be cited and consistently applied as a justification for the initiation of force to sustain tax supported schools?' Mr. Stanley's answer: "It is not

possible to quote scripture specifically giving the right to run a newspaper or advocate anarchy! However, 'Render unto Caesar." You will note that Mr. Stanley did not attempt to quote statements accredited to Jesus that authorize the initiation of force to make anybody do anything. His answer attempts to smear and

imply that those who oppose tax supported schools believe in anarchy. If a man who opposes tax supported schools believes in anarchy, every signer of the Decaration of Independence believed in anarchy, because the Declaration of Independence says: "Governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed' -not from the majority, but from the governed-from the individual, and only the individual can

give his consent.

The quotation "Render unto Caesar . . . " does not say you should be compelled or coerced or forced to support Caesar. People can voluntarily support organizations that promote peace and good will and order as has been done many times—such as voluntary fire departments and hiring watchmen on a voluntary basis. And no one bas ever specifically explained what Jesus meant by Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's" That leaves the impression that Caesar or the government has a moral right to do something that would be immoral for an individual to do. If that is the case, then Jesus

was wrong when He contended that no man can serve two masters. Of the two statements I am sure that no one can serve two masters -- two principles -- and if the two statements contradict each other, the serving two masters statement makes the other null and void. Question 39: "What is the

moral function of the state?" Mr. Stanley's answer: "To insure the greatest justice to the greatest number." Mr. Stanley, or no one else, can

set forth a way of measuring the greatest justice to the greatest number. A thing is either just or is unjust. The purpose of the individual not to sacrifice any individual's natural rights. But of course those people who believe that the majority has & moral right to do anything it wants with the minority have to make some vague general statements that have no real meaning to anyone. Question No. 40: "From where does the state derive its just au-

thority? Mr. Stanley's answer: "From the great majority-not necessarily every individual."

Mr. Stanley implies that the just - that the majority has a right to coerce an individual to buy something that the majority wants him to buy. That is far from the Golden Rule and the steeling and coveting commandments and the Declaration of In-

Children with congenital heart disease must avoid infections and strain. Their activity must almost always be somewhat curbed so that they will not throw too much of a burden on a heart which cannot stand it.

Not one word about "demos nor is any mention made of it in our treaties or official Supreme Court decisions. In due time, however, it is assumed by the heir-archy that a majority will vote nullify) the Constitution, providing for a Catholic majority to establish Roman control of state by law (automatically doing away with the Bill of Rights and protection of minorities). I would remind Catholics who

believe in the Golden Rule, however, that that day may never come and America may, instead, pe a 100 percent Communist nation, if, in the meantime, some rapprochement is not made with non-Catholics against Communism and the heirarchy restrained from making any more enemies than it already has. 





(By The Associated Press) Midwinter respiratory ailments are giving many parts of the nation the sniffles, but health authorities say the symptoms generally do not warrant alarm. Bad colds and influenza forced schools to close in some areas and kept workers away from their jobs. At least one Army post hospital has been jammed by cases of flu, reportedly imported from England. Other communities have

ported increases of grippe, sore throats, pneumonia and other respiratory ailments. However, in most places the officials said the upsurge was seasonally normal. Army doctors at Fort Dix, N. J., where not worried even with 750 soldiers hospitalized with influenza symptoms. They said the situation was not dangerous and was levelling after an incidence

The post flu virus, doctors said, was the same that caused England's epidemic and apparently was carried here by redeployed

troops. In Tallahassee, Fla., colds and a flu epidemic caused an indefinite shutdown of all white schools.

Orange, Texas, a community of 21,000, had its worst influenza outbreak since 1917. The city's two hospitals both had waiting lists, but no deaths were re-Flu plagued Maine, causing the

death of two infants last week. Schools in Niagara County, N. Y., reopened after shutting down for a week with 2,976 of 14,263 pupils home with assorted sniffles and coughs. The Macon, Ga., hospital re-

ported 300 influenza patients overtaxixing facilities, especially with 25 nurses and 22 other hospital employes on the sick list.
