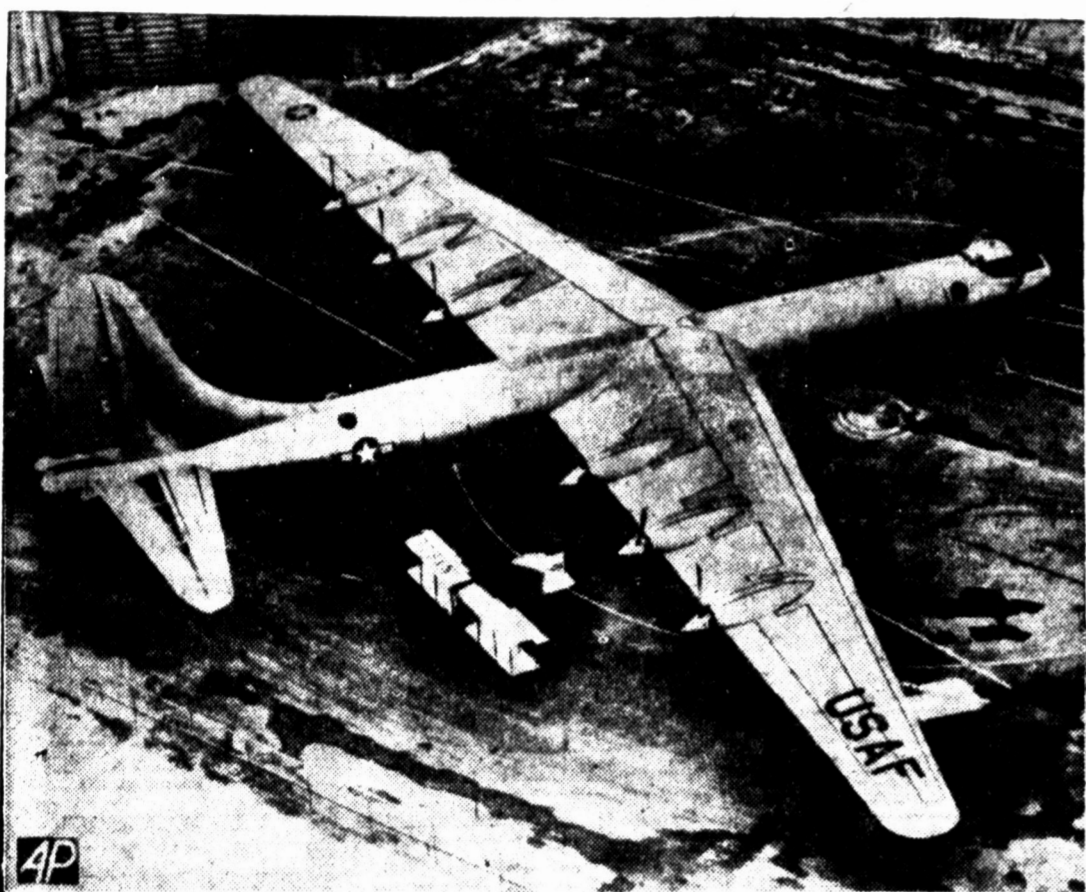

William Cowper suffered all of his 69 years. Due to uncontrollable melancholia, he suffered mentally. He believed that God had doomed him to eternal damnation. This belief drove him to attempt at suicide and he was committed to insane asylums four times. He had studied law but could not plead cases because of stage fright, and his speech was impaired by liping and stammering.
