May Become **Political Point**

WASHINGTON -- (AP) hough the new 22nd Constitutional amendment does not apply o President Truman, it may become a political talking point as the time approaches for choosing standard bearers for 1952.

The question already has been aised by some political observers as to whether Mr. Truman would feel bound by the spirit of the amendment limiting future Presidents to two terms. There are two sides to the

> Here's how the new admendment to the Constitution reads: Section 1. No person shall be elected to the office of President more than twice, and no person who has held the office as President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of President more than once. But this article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this article was pro-posed by Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President or acting as President, during the term within which this ar-

Amendment Places Limit On Presidents

WASHINGTON - (AP) -From now on, no President of the United States - except for Harry Truman may be elected to more than

two terms. Under the 22nd Amendment to the Constitution, which for all practical purposes became law last night, no man or woman may serve more than ten years in the

White House. The amendment, while limiting future Presidents to two elective terms, allows a person who has served two years or less of an unexpired term to be elected twice on his own.

Since he's not on the House agriculture committee, Beckworth airs his views largly in the Congressional Record and in conversations with collegues, As a top-ranking member of another committee — that on commerce he knows it's generally a futile gesture to sponsor an important bill not handled by the commit-

tee on which you serve.
So Beckworth is trying to sell his idea to someone on the committee involved. Therefore, he committee involved. Therefore, he lets members of the agriculture committee and others know of such problems as that cited in a letter he recieved from H. R. Spivey of Bullard, a bout 15 miles south of Tyler.

"I produced one bale of cotton on about four acres in 1950," wrote Spivey, "and had to pay \$51.84 to sell it. Why?"

"Because I didn't have and couldn't get a little white sell-

couldn't get a little white sell-ing card! This was a hard financial blow, a gross injustice at the hands of the production and marketing administration. "I realize that it wasn't the intention of anyone in that department to work hardship of disaster proportions to a farmer anywhere. Still, because of red-tape regulations, I was compelled suffer a serious financial loss. "I operate a small farm on the cash-rent basis, and grew four acres of cotton to help pay the rent. I planted without an allotment because I understood you intended to help us get at least a minimum of five acres anylow. But I exact the higger anyhow. But I guess the bigger growers got the extra allot-ments, because I never could get a permit to plant a single seed. Still, after I learned all this, it was too late, as I had planted

was too late, as I had planted four acres and I let it go on through and make. I didn't think it right at all for any farm regulation to say to a man that he couldn't plant any cotton, and to a neighbor just across the fence to go ahead and plant a sizeable crop."

There are to be no restrictions on the 1981 cotton grow. But 1951 cotton crop. But Beckworth says a farmer is re-luctant to buy new machinery to set up his production unless he has assurance that the next year he will get an adequate allotment if controls are estab-

He wrote the Agriculture Department about the situation and received a reply which contained this paragraph:

"Therefore, if all farmers in a country should double their cotton acreage in 1951 over 1950, the 1952 farm allotments may be changed considerably or none at all or somewhere between deat all or somewhere between particular county vary their cot-ton acreage in proportion to crop-

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

Tiny wnite worms in the lower intestines are usually pinworms or seatworms. These are only one kind of animal can lodge in the bowel, but like general health and are difficult to get rid of. Pinworms are

most common in children, especially among those in large families or in children living in institutions. They are comparatively This is because the worms get

on the bed linen, pajamas and other clothing and are picked up by others who come in contact with such objects. When children live in an institution or dormintory or when several use the same bedroom the spreading of the worms from one person to another is easy.

The eggs from pinworms are usually laid on the skin and mucous membrane near the outlet of the bowel. This causes sever itching. In fact the itching can be so bad that it produces nervousness, sleeplessness, and even convulsions. The exact diagnosis is made by taking swabs from the place where the worms are likely to be and examining the material under the microscope. Although infection with pin-

worms is common, it is frequently confused with other parasites and the diagnosis must be clarified by accurate examination. Once this has been done, proper treatment can be started. Treatment is reasonably satis-

factory but should be given to all infected persons in a family or to all children in a dormitory. About nine out of ten are cured by this means although the treatment may have to be repeated several

PLENTY OF SOAP As soon as an outbreak of in-

fection with pinworms has been discovered, treatment should be prompt and thorough. Children who are exposed as well as those who have the worms must be given information on hygiene measures. Without care, the danger, of reinfection is great. Careful and frequent washing of the hands with soap and water is the most important.

With the improvement in knowledge of hygiene and flow to take care of one's body and better methods of treatme infections have become quent, Once established, hor vorms rarely or never die off

ONE. Be consistent. You can't draw any line without being unfair to someone. It is an all or nothing proposition. I am 100 percent against ANY conscription or any initiation of force by some citizens against other citizens which is what conscription is. As an American I hate the very word "conscript." It was a term applied to slaves who were chained to their oars in the ancient Roman galleys of war, It is exactly opposite the American principle of the independence and liberty of every individual as detailed in our priceless Declaration. No free man has a right to conscript any other free man and whatever it is immoral fo an individual to do it is equally immoral for a gang of individuals (or "government") to do. If it's wrong for me to steal the same principle is true of 175:000.000 folks called "the people" or "gov-ernment." If it is immoral for me to kidnap a man and force him into involuntary servitude, ft is equally wrong for 175,000,000 people to gang up and do it. That's the principle.
