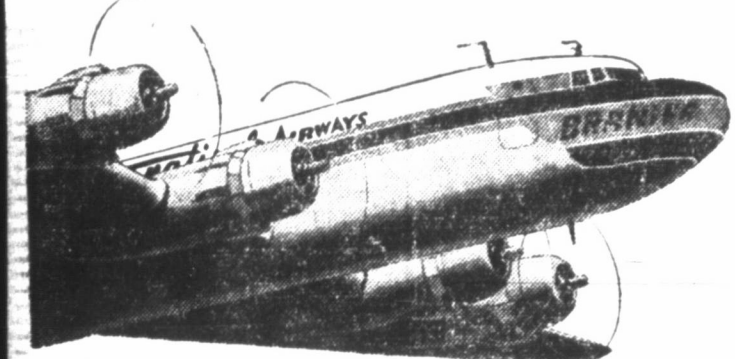

Outlook Given For Building

Building in Pampa for 10 months of the year hit a total valuation of \$2,370,460 after the \$201,540 valuations for October were added to the previous nine months figures.

During October 15 new homes and one new business building were started. During the same period permits for remodeling 19 residential buildings and two businesses were granted. Broken down the month's building picture showed:

Fifteen new homes totaling \$161,550; remodeling 19 homes, \$30,000; four new garages, \$2500; one new business building, \$1800; remodeling two business buildings, \$5000; and moving in three homes, \$700. Two houses also were moved outside the city limits, but no value placed on them.

During October, fees for 199 permits totaling \$328.25 were issued by the engineering department.

Seventy seven dollars was paid for 46 building permits, one hundred and fourteen dollars for 24 plumbing permits and ninety two dollars and twenty five cents for 49 electrical permits.

Thirty nine gas permits totaled \$45. No charge was placed on 22 water and 18 sewer taps.

During the past week 10 building permits were issued. Remodeling took the spotlight with seven permits. Other permits were for foundations and new homes.

Broken down for remodeling the picture showed: L. L. Sone, 926 Christine, \$5000; Horace Blair, 718 Locust, \$900; Hay Barr, 945 S. Nelson, \$1100; F. M. Heaston, 1028 Mary Ellen, \$2000; Tom Bates, 1607 Hamilton, \$5000; Pampa Office supply, 211 N. Cuyler, \$4000; and Ruby Martin, 432 Oklahoma, \$500.

Two permits were granted for homes, each valued at \$10,000. One for Roland Bailey, 1520 Coffee, and the other for Jeff Lard at 1528 Williston. A permit for a foundation at 1319 Francis valued at \$400 was granted Paul Appleton.

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. — (AP)—Carl Loeb, who has made severe attacks on the Hollywood city administration in a mimeographed paper, "The Searchlight," was attacked and brutally beaten by several men in front of his home Wednesday night.

He was taken to a hospital suffering with shock and multiple bruises on his head, face, elbows and knees. Attendants said he may lose the sight of his left eye.

New Disease Strikes UN Force In Korea

TOKYO — (AP)—A mysterious disease, apparently brought to the battle lines by Chinese Communist troops, has infected an undisclosed number of United Nations soldiers in Korea.

Brig. Gen. William E. Shambora, Far East command surgeon, disclosed the presence of the disease here. He said it was new to Western medicine and its exact nature has not been determined.

However, he said, it bore a striking resemblance to a malady called epidemic hemorrhagic fever, which the Japanese discovered in Manchuria in 1939.

It is also known as songso fever and kokka disease.

The number of Allied soldiers infected was not disclosed.

Six weeks ago an anti-Communist North Korean told Allied doctors the disease was present among troops of at least one Chinese Army and had been contracted by some North Korean civilians.

The North Korean said victims first suffered from high fever, headaches, loss of appetite and yellowing of the skin. He said the disease spread rapidly, and often resulted in death within 24 hours.

He said a Communist medical officer referred to "recurring fever."

It is not known how prevalent the disease is in North Korea.

whether the North Korean who reported it saw only a few isolated cases or whether it was general throughout much of Communist held territory.

An Army doctor told the Associated Press the disease was present among Chinese troops north of the battle line before it was found among Allied troops. He said the majority of the cases affecting UN soldiers were reported from the western sector.

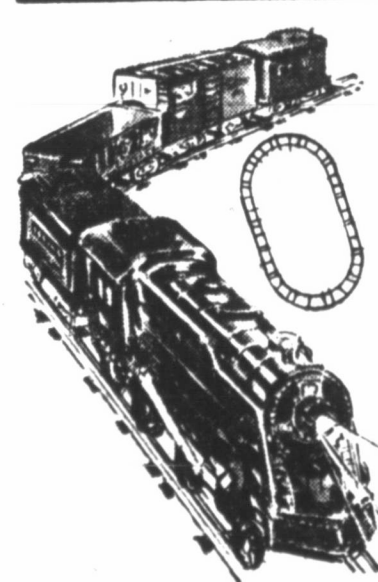

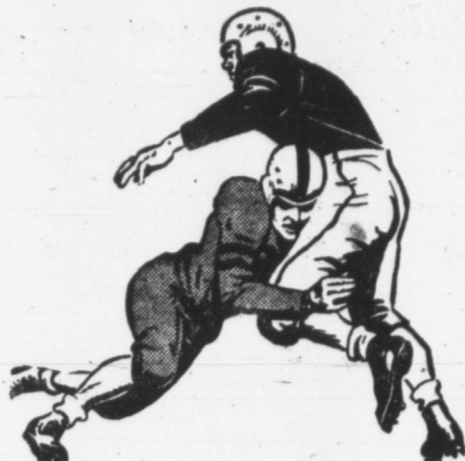

Bodyless Head Stumps Police

NORFOLK, Va. — (AP) — Police redoubled their efforts Monday toward solving one of the strangest cases in their memory—that of the bodyless head and the beaten and strangled widow. Should the head turn out to be — as police believe it will — that of Walter Barr, 34-year-old carpenter missing since Oct. 3, officers are sure they have a double-barreled puzzler on their hands.

The severed head was found Saturday by a small Negro boy in a patch of honeysuckle in adjacent Princess Anne county. An all-day search Sunday failed to turn up any body or parts of a human torso.

It was only about a mile away that fishermen on Oct. 6 discovered the beaten and strangled body of Mrs. Mamie Smithwick, 37-year-old widow of Worley Smithwick, for many years superintendent of a Methodist orphanage in Raleigh, N.C.

When Mrs. Smithwick's body was found floating in a lake, police immediately launched a hunt for Barr, last seen three days earlier. He and the widow were headed for a drive-in movie at the time.

TWO WERE FRIENDS
Police learned Barr and Mrs. Smithwick had lived at the same boarding house here and went to the movies together frequently. They had been planning a trip to a church function Oct. 8 in Washington, N.C., where Barr's wife works in a laundry.

On Oct. 10, police found Barr's car parked in Norfolk. Blood was smeared on both seats, a bullet hole was found in the roof and there were fragments of human teeth on the floor.

But nothing was heard of Barr until the youth made his grisly discovery on Saturday.

Police still are not certain the head is that of Barr. Absence of photographic records prevented positive identification yesterday by a dentist who had filled some teeth for Barr.

The head was on its way to the state chief medical examiner's office in Richmond Monday for further checks while police resumed their search for the missing body.

Labor Doubtful About Ike As Presidential Timber

NEW YORK — (AP) — A labor official has declared he could find nothing to indicate that General Dwight D. Eisenhower would be "an acceptable candidate for President as far as organized labor is concerned."

Edith Mazy, secretary-treasurer of the United Auto workers, drew heavy applause from the CIO national convention when he declared that, speaking for himself, he was opposed to General Eisenhower as President.

"I have carefully examined the record of Gen. Eisenhower and I want to say that I find nothing in his record which would indicate that he is an acceptable candidate for President as far as organized labor is concerned."

"You will recall that some time ago General Eisenhower pooh-poohed the idea of the importance of social security and the necessity of pensions, and he thought we were pampering people by trying to provide for them when they reach the age where they were too old to work and too young to die. That is the only basic social question that the general has ever committed himself on."

Mazy declared that General Eisenhower is a good general but has spent his entire life "in the environment of the caste system and dictatorship of the Army."

Mazy said that such a person does not have the proper basic training to be President of the United States.

The convention took no official recognition of Mazy's criticism of Eisenhower but, when Mazy remarked that Eisenhower was an "unacceptable candidate" for President, the crowd cheered.

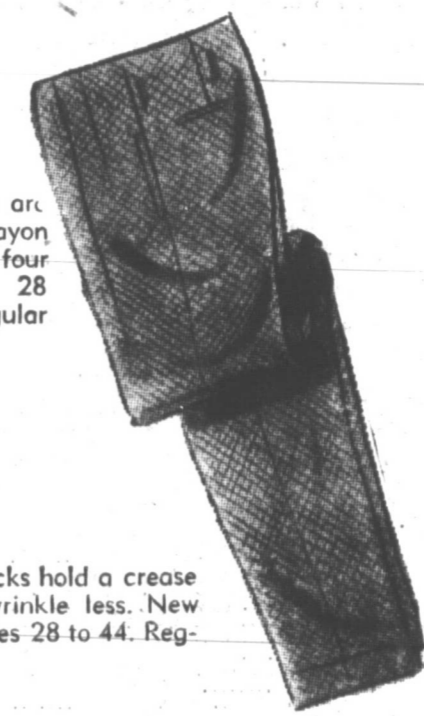

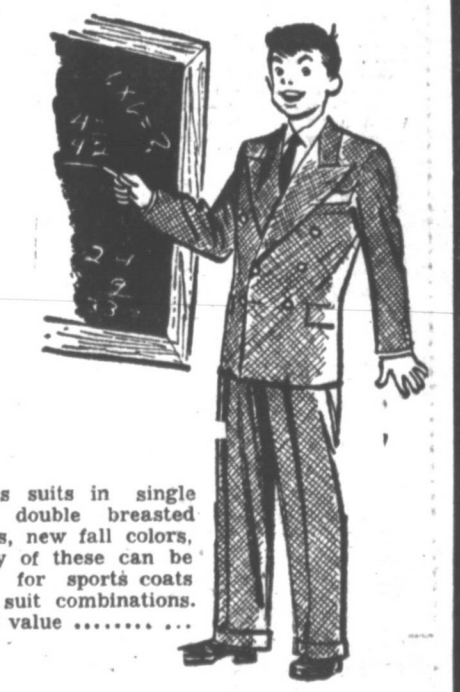

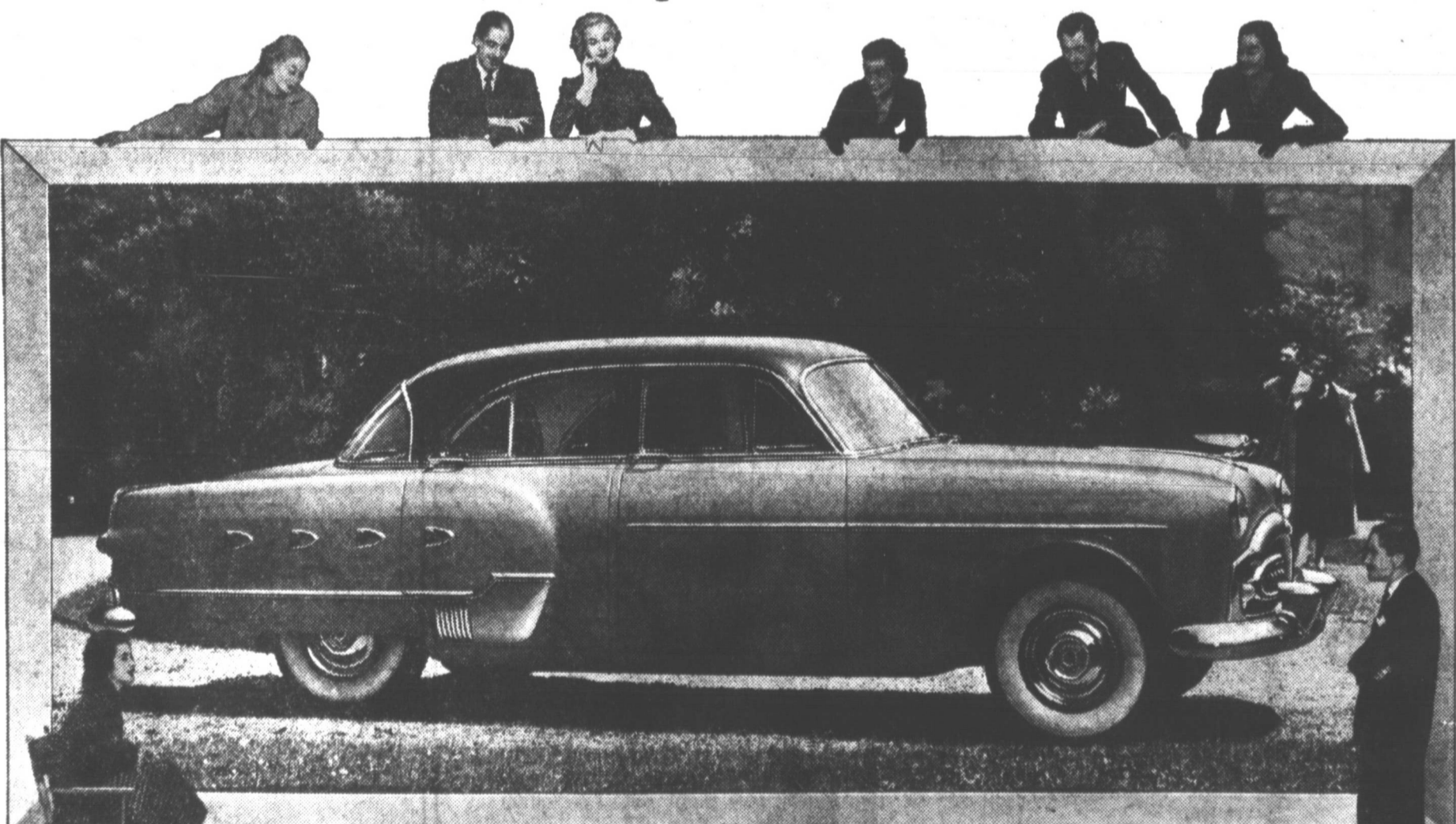

Meat Institute Says Some Meat Prices May Dip

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The American Meat Institute says the price of pork and some cuts of beef may dip soon as the result of increased marketings of hogs and beef cattle.

The institute is a private organization, representing meat interests.

It said in a statement that in Chicago, the wholesale price for pork loins is down 17 percent since mid-summer, skinned hams 16 percent and cured bacon 29 percent. It said a near-record pig crop is expected to come to market and further reduce pork prices.

A seasonal increase in beef marketings, the institute said, is expected to reduce some beef prices. It said lean cuts for braising have already dropped ceiling prices in some cities.

Office of Price Stabilization regulations require dealers to pass along to the consumer price reductions in wholesale pork prices. Beef dealers, however, need not do so, since they operate under dollar-and-cents ceilings.

Meanwhile, OPS officials said beef slaughterers will probably be required to set aside for the armed forces in December, any beef killed above 100 percent of their volume in November, 1950.

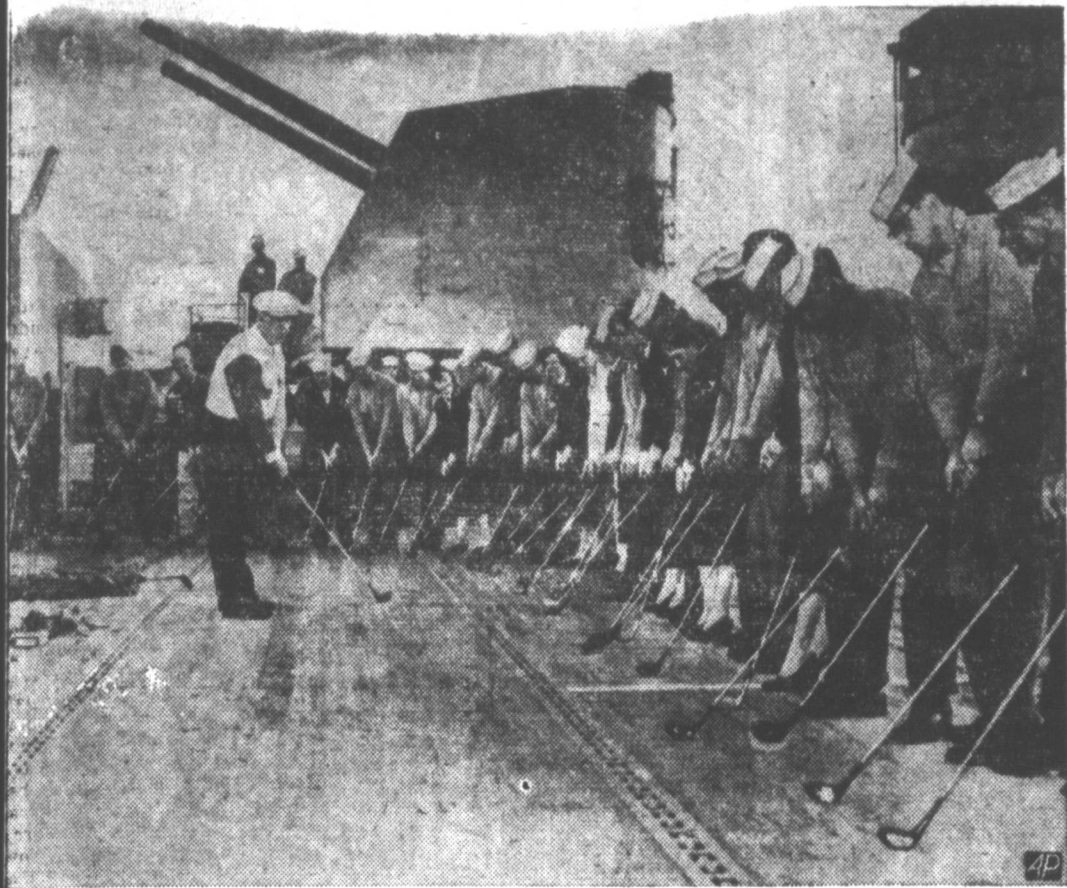

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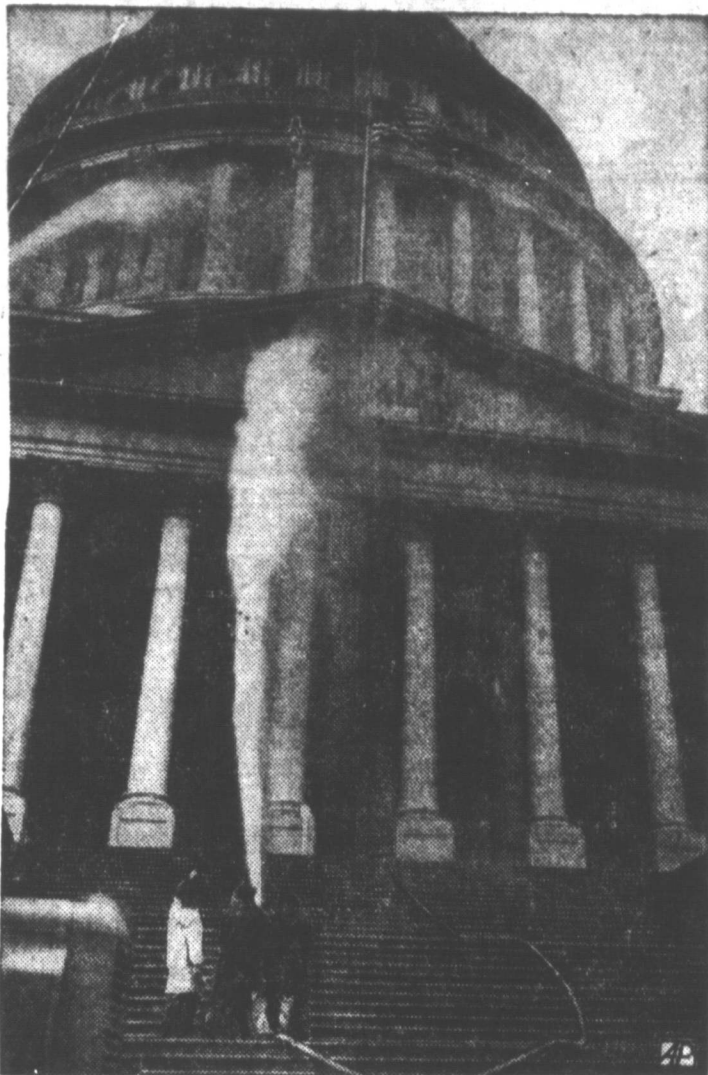
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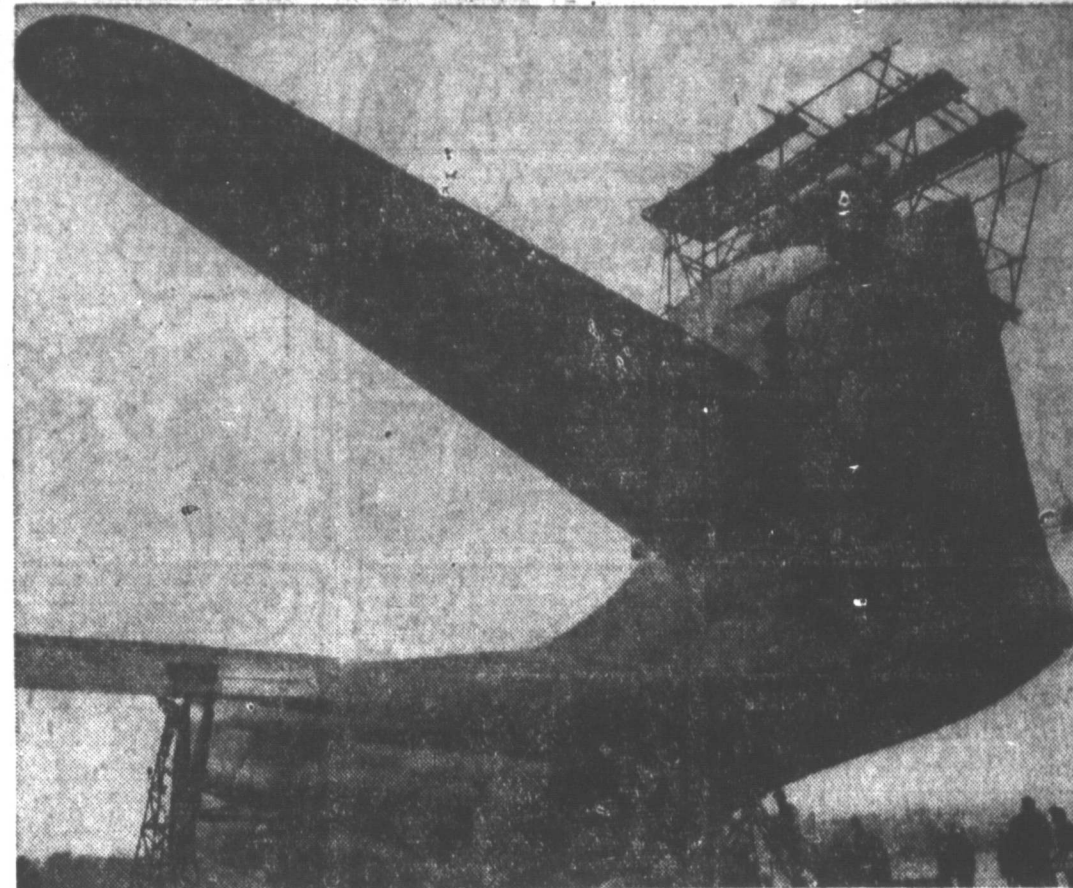

Demos To Use Prosperity Angle

McKINNEY, Tex. — (AP) — The Democratic party will base its campaign on pointing out "the greatest prosperity this nation has ever known." Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn said.

The Bonham congressman, speaking at a flood control celebration, said the people of the nation are more prosperous than ever before.

"They don't want to give up this prosperity," he said, "and I don't believe they are going to give it up. I don't believe there will be a change of administration for a long time."

Rayburn was principal speaker at a meeting of flood control and soil conservation boosters from the Trinity river basin.

They met to inspect the first eight of 107 flood control dams planned on tributaries of the east fork of the Trinity.

U.S. To Work For Lasting Peace — HST

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman says the United States, disappointed in the hope that the first Armistice day would bring lasting peace, is now "determined

to work for it, hard and actively, with all our resources."

"We are engaged in a great national effort to build up enough strength and economic power so we and all the peaceful nations can be secure against the threats of new aggression in the world today," the chief executive said.

He spoke in a broadcast Sunday. It was recorded here before he went to Key West, Fla., for a vacation.

Similar expressions were voiced by other officials in Armistice Day observances throughout the nation and broad Sunday.

But for the United Nations forces fighting in Korea there was no formal observance. "Our policy on the Armistice day is business as usual," said Gen. James A. Van Fleet, eighth Army commander.

The supreme commander in the Far East, Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, broadcast an appeal throughout the United States for blood donations. He said the men fighting in Korea "cannot long pause to note either the day or its significance — they are otherwise occupied."

At traditional ceremonies at the tomb of the unknown soldier in Arlington National cemetery, Secretary of Defense Lovett said "once more we renew our vows to our heroic dead never to give up in the struggle in which they gave their lives."

Divorce Final For Bergman's Husband

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — D. Peter Lindstrom's divorce from his screen actress wife, Ingrid Bergman, became final Thursday.

Dr. Lindstrom won his interlocutory decree Nov. 1, 1950. Miss Bergman had married Italian director Roberto Rossellini and given birth to Roberto Jr. in February, 1950.

The actress had already obtained a mail order Mexican divorce from Dr. Lindstrom, but the Beverly Hills brain surgeon refused to recognize it.

Dr. Lindstrom won custody of their daughter, Jenny Ann (formerly Pia), 13.

NPA Denies Construction Applications

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The National Production authority reported Friday that it had denied 63 percent of the construction applications for this quarter and may be still tougher in the first quarter of next year.

Price control chiefs were revamping regulations affecting 100,000 manufacturers, and said generally higher price ceilings may be expected on many consumer goods as a result.

And a halt was ordered in the government stockpiling of tin so that all available supplies can go to industry to speed defense production.

The NPA report on building permits was based on applications representing more than \$1,000,000,000 worth of commercial and other construction, most of which must be deferred until materials are available.

The agency said it was unable to permit the start of any project not connected with defense directly or indirectly, except a small number of hardship cases in which buildings had been destroyed by fire, flood or other disaster.

The construction controls division now is handling applications for the January - through-March quarter. For that period, the report said, "it is unlikely that approval will be given to any project not at least 20 percent completed."

As in the present quarter, approval will be given only to projects of a military or defense-supporting nature.

In making allotments of steel, copper and aluminum for the office buildings, banks, stores, churches, service stations and other structures approved, NPA said it provided only 15 percent of the steel requested, 3.8 percent of the copper, and none of the aluminum.

A total of 3,834 applications was filed. Of these, 2,419 were denied. Another 897 proved to be exempt from control because the amount of materials needed did not exceed the limits fixed by NPA building regulations.

Of the altered price regulations for manufacturers, price director Michael V. Disalle said yesterday the changes were necessitated by the Capehart

Red China Extortion Racket Is Rumored

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) says he has asked the State Dept. to investigate reports of a Red China extortion racket rumored to have extorted millions of dollars from Chinese-Americans.

Knowland said he would seek to have cases brought before the United Nations as a "monstrous international morality and human rights."

Lee Dai-Ming, editor of the (San Francisco) Daily Chinese World, said many Chinese-Americans had sent sums ranging from \$250 to as high as \$100,000 pay "taxes, fines and rent" levied on relatives in Red China.

"No direct demand for blood money is made," Lee said, "but word is sent out through relatives or intermediaries, usually in the British colony of Hong Kong. Then the Communists wait for the money to come in."

"When it comes they ask for more. If it doesn't come, they apply torture and, eventually, death."

He did not identify any of the reported victims. He said they preferred anonymity for the safety of relatives in China.

Lee asked Chinese receiving such requests to register. Sen. Knowland said when the case was documented he would ask for UN action.

Electronic Brain Can Play Chess

HAWTHORNE, Calif. — (AP) — An electronic brain that can even play chess has been placed within the reach of anyone — anyone with \$80,000.

Computer Research Corp. unveiled its CRC-102 general purpose computer which it has just finished for the U.S. Air Force.

It took a year to make, but the firm said it will be able to produce them commercially in six to eight months.

The brain — a maze of wires and vacuum tubes — is portable. It comes mounted on casters in a 500-pound package. It looks like a cross between a stove and a pinball machine and is about the size of an office desk.

Its price and size make it unique from such predecessors as those now at Harvard, MIT, UCLA, and other research centers. Those brains usually are large enough to fill one room and some cost into the millions.

Yet CRC claims the same capabilities for its baby-sized brain. Engineer Richard Sprague, one of the designers, says it can even think enough to play chess. He said it would chart and make all possible plays three moves ahead. But it would be a monotonous opponent.

He added, however, that the 102 will still make its computations per second. It gains some speed in the long run by feeding into an electrical typewriter, thus delivering the answers neatly and automatically typed.
