Explosions Blast Gas Storage Plant

NÉWARK, N. J. —(P)— A rocket - like series of explosions ripped belief her entire family has turnthrough a propane gas storage plant today setting off a general alarm fire which raged out of control for hours.

The 70-root long cylindrical tanks, 10 feet in diameter, were flung hundreds of yards like giant toys by the terrific blasts which rocked true and were told to her just by the Reds and agreed to tenta-At least nine persons were injured in the explosion and fire at the

Fundamentalist In Action

A situation has arisen in Lewis town Pa., that should inspire defenders of the Christian faith and protestants socialism in the church. This is bully. It is exactwhat ailing Protestant groups need. I wish to take this occasion to

congratulate Dr. Harold Snider

and his congregation for the consistent stand they have taken for Christ and country. These Pennsylvania folk built up a fine, outstanding church in their community. They were good members of the Church of the Brethren denomination, sometimes nicknam-ed "Dunkers". Under Snider's pastorate they increased from some 300 members to nearly a thousand They paid their bills and prospered as only a congregation of spiritual ly strong, doctrinally true, loyalprincipled people can prosper with

God's blessing.

And then came the Devil in a very un-Brethren-like manner. A strong protest was lodged when the Church of the Brethren denomina tion joined the ultra-modern, socialist-tinged Federal Council of Church in 1941. Pastor Snider helped lead a revolt both against this falling away and also against some of the practices the heads of his denomination were indulging in. His was a strong voice and in due time the fundamentalist Brethren came to see in him a sterling leader, a separatist of the Martin Luther type, a man determined to give his all, if necessary, to hold on to doc trinal purity as taught by his church, and also to stand firmly against un-Christian associations and fellowship with unbelievers

In due time this led to a tiny minority in his congregation, with the help and conspiracy of denominational heads, trying to get rid of him. When he staunchly answered charges brought against him and put the elders to open shame, they resorted to the "brotherly-love" tactics of unfrocking him, whereupon the big majority of the congregation joined him in disowning tne Brethren ruling clique and de claring their church an independent Bible church. Having manced it built it and supported it, they nat-urally supposed the edifice to be theirs, by the grace of God.
The Brethren heirarchy,

ever, had other ideas, and in spite of the Bible's admonition to Christian brethren, not to go to court against one another, he minority group sued to have the property turned over to them. This minority claimed possession of the church and, after a long-drawn-out court fight, won on a technicality and took over the structure. Pastor Snider and his Protestant friends moved out and began holding services in the Lewiston armory.

The new church had an attend ance the first three Sundays of 450, 540 and 465 respectively while the group in possession of the denominational church had 103; 91 and 87 espectively (only one-third whom were members of the old congregation, the rest having come in from neighboring denominational churches). In short, while the Protestants were increasing regu-larly, even though deprived of the property they had invested their money in, the Federal Councilors and go-alongers had a nice big church-full of empty pews! "Goo moves in mysterious ways His wonders to perform."

Besides that, the minority group (numbering about 4 per cent o Snider's former congregation) have had other troubles. Before they started this rumpus Snider warned them that they would lose money and members. However, they ignored him and claimed they would hold some 75 per cent of the membership as well as the property if the denominational heads stood by them. The denomination did to the extent of giving them legal advice and financing their court proceedings.

How well they held the member ship is demonstrated in the figures given above. And as for the erty, on April 28, 1951, Sheriff's notices were tacked on the church be cause they had defaulted in obligations to the bank and holder of the mechanic's lien. This resulted in the denomination's board loaning them \$20,000 (which loan the denomina tion has protected by putting its own mortgage on the church buildings). But as of this writing they are still reported as owing \$15,000 with a big question of who is going to pay it, and how. Their total obli-

Businessmen **Take Guess** At Future

NEW YORK - (P) - What's ahead for business? A number of businessmen, manufacturers, purchasing agents, and bankers appear willing today to guess how their own firms will fare the rest of the year.

Surveys from several independent sources show that most of them look for their companies to as well or better in the next six months as they did in the last half of 1950 when the Korean war was touching off a boom. They look for momen tum to carry them through as defense orders build up.

Here is a wide sampling of business opinion, taken before a definite offer of truce talks in Korea, but while peace rumors were widely circulating believed - in business circles Business will go wheeling along in high gear the rest of the year, in the opinion of most of the 142 manufacturers around the nation polled by the Nation-Industrial Conference Board Large backlogs of unfilled or-

ders and a growing volume of defense business will do the trick Seven out of ten are operating at or near capacity now, and pine out of ten are working on military orders, although with most the defense work is still a small part of their total vol-

Nine companies out of ten have much higher backlogs of orders now than a year ago. This doesn't hold true for electrical appliances, apparel, chemical, rubber and textile industries. Half of the 142 have larger inventories than last year, but many stress that the stocks are in line with increased volume

of business. Purchasing agents, on the other hand, are taking "a very cautious view" of summer business. the National Assn. of Purchasing

Agents says.
"July and August, heavy industrial vacation months, are expected to be slow," it reports after a survey of its members. A more realistic approach to pricing is developing, caused by the stronger competitive trend of fabricated goods."

But the men who keep the hink they'll be using black ink the rest of the year. The New York State Society

of Certified Public Accountants says 43 percent of its members answering a questionnaire expect business to improve, 40 percent took for little change from present high levels and only 17 percent think it will sluff o'ff. However, a third of them see small business having a harder

Prices will go up a little, say \$8 percent — up a lot, say 17 percent. Only five percent look for price drops, and 20 percent see little change.
