Pampan Sent Back To Penitentiary On Parole Violation

Billie Max Frazier, Pampa, must go back to the state penitentiary for violating his parole, Gov. Allan Shivers decreed Friday in an order sent to The Gray County Sheriff's Department.

Frazier was convicted of theft in Oldham County April 13, 1950 and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Dec. 15, 1950 he was granted a conditional pardon and released to Gray County.

Between that time and July 31 Frazier was free, but a fracas in the Hillson Hotel on the afternoon of that day wound up with his arrest on charges of disturbance of the peace by city police.

Sheriff Rufe Jordan Saturday said he didn't know when Frazier will be taken to the penitentiary. He will either be taken to Plainview or Lubbock if prison's "pick-up wagon" comes through there in a few days, or he will be taken to Huntsville by local officers.

Youth Charged With Forgery

A 14-year-old boy stepped into the Pampa bus station Saturday morning to buy a ticket to Vernon where he intended to visit his father.

While the teenager was waiting for the bus, two Pampa policemen stepped up, arrested him and took him before juvenile Judge Bruce Parker on a warrant charging forgery.

Asst. Chief of Police J. O. Dumas said the youth had written a check on John B. Heesey for \$16.75. The check was signed "J. E. Heesey (by wife)" and passed at Montgomery Ward, but returned to the store by the Citizens Bank on which it was written.

Dumas said the youth told police he wrote the check and passed it about Aug. 7. Judge Parker ordered the youth held in the county jail until he decided on final disposition of the case.

Receive Warrant Charging Burglary For R. G. Carter

Sheriff R. H. Jordan, Friday received a "hold order" with warrant charging burglary on Roland G. Carter, Dumas, now in the county jail on a theft charge.

Carter, who admitted taking a high-powered 22 rifle from Carl Carter, near Laketon (no relation to the jailed man) last week, is being held for Wheeler County authorities where he is charged with taking an automatic shotgun from the home of a Mr. Yearwood, two miles north of Shamrock. The shotgun was identified Tuesday by Deputy Sheriff Lake Black of Wheeler County. Black took the shotgun along back to Wheeler with him.

Carter, an ex-convict, took the gun from the other Carter's truck last week and was picked up in Dumas by the sheriff's department there on information from Jordan. Carter was released by the Moore County officers on his promise to come to Pampa to face questioning.

Air Force Base Says It Is Saving Money For Taxpayers

WICHITA FALLS—(AP)—The word is out to save the taxpayer's money at military installations. Sheppard Air Force Base here says it is making an effort.

About fifty million dollars was spent at the base in the fiscal year ending June 30. That's a lot of money.

But the cost would have been greater were it not for a constant campaign to impress upon every one at the base that the ultimate source of the money is the common purse.

A faucet washer costs only three cents and can be installed in five minutes. But a neglected, leaky faucet must be replaced—and that costs three dollars.

Cement, sand and gravel are purchased in carload lots. Paint is bought in 50-gallon drums. Competitive bidding has resulted in savings, in one instance a dollar a gallon on paint.

The Officer of the Day checks use of electricity. Where unnecessary lights are found, commanding officers are notified.

There are eight four-man teams of carpenter, electrician, plumber and foreman scattered about the base. Their principal aim is preventive maintenance—making the early repairs which save money.

The taxpayer does not pay for the juke box, nor the electricity which make it operate in the various clubs. Installations, improve-ments and utilities costs are assessed against such facilities as the Officers' Club, NCO Club, base exchanges, cafeteria, barber and tailor shops, laundry refreshment stands, etc.

Football Captain Says He Was Forced To Tell Of Cheating

WEST POINT, N. Y.—(AP)—Harold Loehlein, captain-elect of Army's 1951 football team, said he was forced, with the threat of prison, to "squeal" on his teammates in the exam-cribbing scandal at the U. S. military academy.

The Kimball, Minn., youth, one of 90 facing dismissal for violation of the academy's honor code, told his story in the New York Journal-American.

"They kept hammering at me," he related. "Even if I knew my rights, which I now know, I would have told my part in the cheating. But I wouldn't have told about the others. I didn't want to squeal on my teammates."

Loehlein said he was handed a long sheet of paper by the examining colonel and told to check the names of those who cribbed.

"I checked 20 names," he said.

The football captain said he had been ushered into a large, bare conference room where three "grim-looking" lieutenant colonels sat behind a long wooden table.

Five wives of Kiwanians were present for the Ladies Day meeting and were introduced by President Lee Hart.

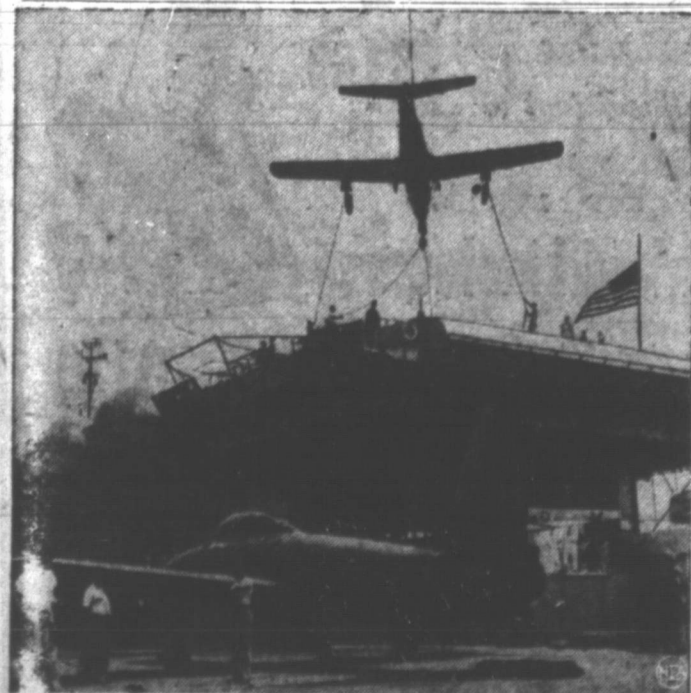

Football Coach Earl H. Blaik, who may lose most of his stellar team as a result of the dismissals, made a similar public plea for the cadets on Thursday.

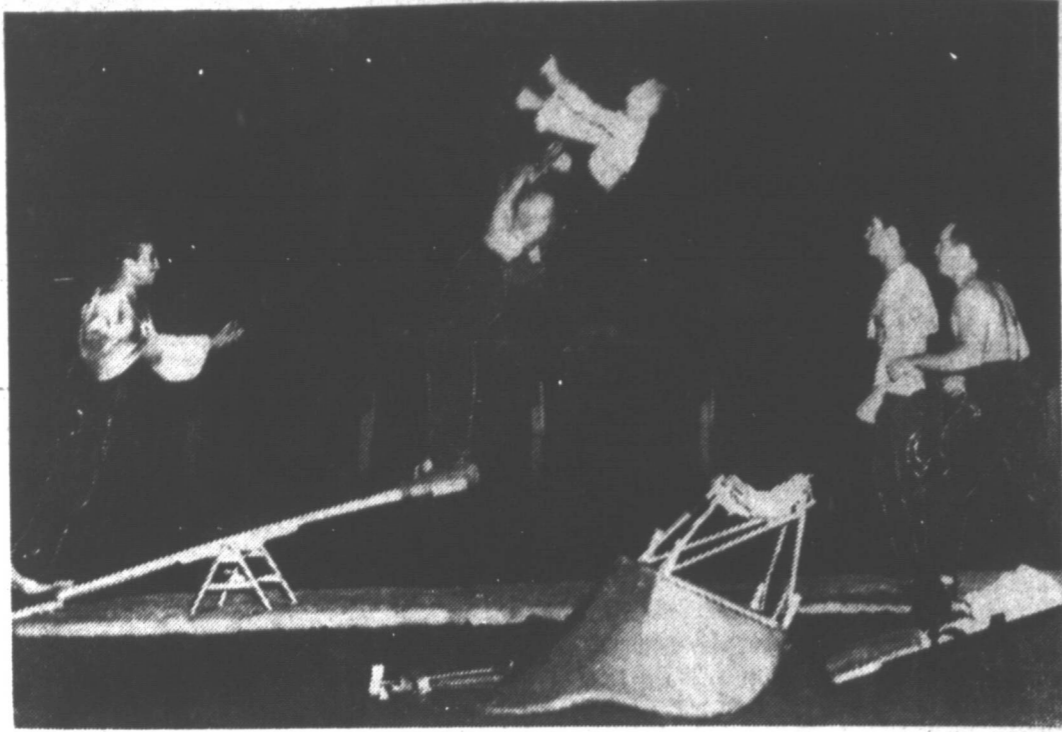

Acrobats Produce Something New In Top O' Texas Rodeo

The Bud Lucas Troupe, teeter-board acrobats from Wichita Falls, are providing something new to rodeo audiences.

Heretofore, bucking broncs, wild bulls and cowboys were the only ones doing acrobatic antics in the arena, but now the Lucas Troupe takes part of the spotlight.

Since their successful performance at the Stanford Cowboy Reunion, they have had calls for more engagements than they can fill. At that rodeo, where the top rodeo people of the country gather, they were well-received and made contacts for future shows.

They perform at benefit baseball games, circuses, and other events, but rodeos rapidly are becoming their primary interest. They do little showing in the winter, but their vigorous training program continues the year round. The troupe has been together two years, and meets four nights a week for a two-hour

practice session. They work seven hours on Sunday.

The act is centered about the clown, Lee Rudley, Sherry Lucas, 11-year-old flyer, and Gary Lucas, 7. At present, Gary is flyer in two tricks, and as he grows older will work into more stunts.

The men in the troupe, Bud Lucas, Rudley Al Pio and Don Gallion, all have other jobs, but the troupe is their main interest and the thing by which they hope to earn a living in the future. Gallion and Rudley are both stationed at Sheppard Field in Wichita Falls, and upon their dis-

charge from the Air Force, the troupe plans to go on the road. At present their engagements are made in limited sections of the state.

They are commuting each day from Pampa to Wichita Falls so that Lucas and Pio can handle their morning jobs, from 4:30 a. m. to 12 noon. Last week they left Wichita Falls about 1 p. m., arrived here at 7:30 p. m., gave their show at 9 p. m., then traveled back to Wichita Falls, arriving there in time to begin the 4:30 a. m. job. Pampa is the farthest show the team has made.

With that close schedule, it's well that the troupe can do the act "in their sleep" — because on a show as far away as Pampa, they do lose a lot of sleep, but it doesn't hurt their performances. On the more distant shows, Rudley and Gallion get short furloughs.

Bud Lucas, owner of the troupe, has had 15 years experience in acrobatics. He has worked with the Gainesville Circus, and once had his own 21-act circus. Rudley, the clown of the group who wears a shabby tuxedo in the show, has been doing acrobatics eight years. He started in high school in Philadelphia. Al Pio started acrobatic training in Oakland, Calif.

Don Gallion is a "natural," who had never had previous experience, but fitted into the act perfectly as a "jumper." Gary and Sherry Lucas fitted into the act naturally. They have always been taught acrobatics, but were worked into the act only last year, and began serious practice.

The colorful sextet in yellow and maroon uniforms present action in color as they flip and whirl through their original teeter-board routines.

Shoes are an important part of the acrobat's dress. The jumper wears thick soles, flyers wear high-top shoes and the catchers wear ballet shoes.

One of the most unusual tricks, which was presented here for the first time in public, begins with the 11-year-old girl standing on the teeter-board, from which she is thrown into the air. She turns a back-flip and lands on the clown's shoulders. He is 18 feet above the ground, standing on a pole balanced by Al Pio.

The remarkable thing about this feat is that the girl is blind-folded. It's a precision trick requiring coordination and timing. She must jump at the exact moment the jumper hits the teeter-board. In this and many stunts, members of the team use "slaps" as signals.

Tricks such as these are practiced many times in safety belts, and the team never takes a trick

out of the belt until it's being completed consistently. Weight is something the troupe worries little about. Rudley, one of the flyers, never has to watch his weight; he's a consistent 145-150 pounder. Pio, who is a catcher, has been pused over Bud Lucas' head weighing as much as

200 pounds. He is down to a trim 180 now.

Age is another factor that might cause some concern to the spectator, but the troupe doesn't worry about getting too old for the acts. Some of the world's most famous acrobats are 80 or more.

The troupe takes two teeter-boards, a chair, perch pole and pedestal on their tours, and that's little equipment for the wide variety of tricks they present. They are believed to be one of the very few comedy teeter-board teams in the country.

Seek Clue Before Melding

By OSWALD JACOBY

In our last article we discussed two of the various ways you might play the very same cards. Today we continue the discussion.

Your side has melded Joker-A-A-A, Joker-K-K-K and Q-Q-Q. You hold K-K, Q 3, 2 (the three being black, of course), and you draw an ace from the stock. What should you do?

The answer may depend on the number of cards in your partner's hand, or on the way the melding has gone. If he has very few cards, you tend to meld out. If he has a large number of cards, you tend to play on. Somewhere between these extremes you ask for permission to meld out.

For example, assume that you made the initial meld with Joker-A-A and Joker-K-K. Your partner, at his next turn, added two aces, a king and three queens. He then discarded, and was left with only five cards. This type of meld asks you to meld out as quickly as you can. If your partner were interested in fighting for the pack he would meld nothing. If he were interested in making one canasta but then staying in the game, he would meld the two aces but nothing else. In this situation, therefore, you meld out at once.

To take the other extreme, suppose that you have made the initial meld as in the last case but that your partner then picked up a large discard pile. He proceeded to meld the queens (which gave him the pile) and to add two aces and a king to your melds. He then discards, and is left with more than twenty cards. You don't dream of melding out in this situation.

It can't be denied that you will have some trouble finding safe discards. Your black three is safe for the first play. At your next turn you may have to discard the deuce. Your partner cannot be kept out for very long since he has room in his hand for practically all the pairs in the deck.

The odds are tremendous that he can pick up the pile before

you have to give it away; and there is a chance that you will get the pile yourself sooner or later, in which case you and your partner will have a field day.

It is especially important to play on if the opponents need 120 points and have not yet melded. They are going to have trouble finding an initial meld since they are nearly aceless and jokerless.

Take the same initial meld for your side and suppose that your partner picks up a very small pile. He melds the queens, adds two aces and a king, and then is left with only seven or eight cards. Now you're not sure whether to fight for the pile or meld out as quickly as possible.

TIPRO Lashes Steel Policies

AUSTIN — Petroleum Administration for Defense came in this week for a severe lashing over its handling of steel distribution to the oil industry by the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Assn. The protest over PAD allocation of steel, particularly tubular goods, was registered in a telegram from Executive Vice President E. I. Thompson to Deputy PAD Administrator Bruce K. Brown, with copies to Interior Secretary Oscar Chapman and PAD Production Director Richard G. Lawton.

The PAD allocation formula, Brown was told, "must be revised to provide an equitable distribution of pipe among all operators or the whole program will fall. Protests from our members are pouring into the association headquarters every day in increasing numbers and vehemence. The number of independent operators with critical drilling obligations who received little or no allocations of pipe for the third and/or fourth quarters and are thus being forced to farm out or sell their properties has reached alarming proportions. Many are in open revolt and advocating scrapping the whole PAD program."

"If we are correctly informed," continued Thompson, "there is more gray market pipe available today than before the PAD program was instituted. That alone is conclusive evidence that something is fundamentally and basically wrong with the present program and formula for distribution."

"We believe that the officials of PAD are in the position to recognize the factors contributing to the inequities and ineffectiveness of the existing program and, likewise, to institute immediately such measures and directives as are necessary to correct this very critical situation in which course you can be assured of our wholehearted support."

Under the Defense Production Act, PAD was charged with recommending to the National Production Authority the amount of steel necessary to maintain a necessary program of exploration, development and production. It likewise was to direct allocation of that steel to the industry fairly among its various segments and operators in order to provide the maximum results per unit of steel involved and maintain an active, aggressive program of exploration and development with a minimum dislocation in the over-all operation of the industry.

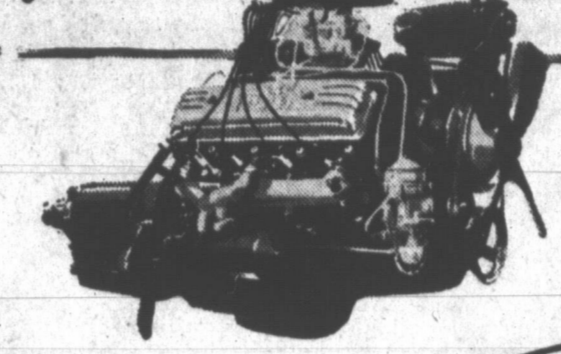
Farmers Leave Eastern Texas

WINNSBORO, Tex. —(AP)— The farmers are moving out of this part of East Texas. O. J. Gipe says the number of active farmers in the Winnsboro area has dropped from 3,800 in 1946 to between 3,100 and 3,200. Gipe is head of the Hopkins-Rains-Wood and Sulphur-Cypress Soil Conservation Districts.

He blames economic pressure and the temptations of the big cities for the exodus.

"The day is gone," Gipe says, "when just anybody can make a living on a farm. Hit and miss farming today won't provide enough to feed and clothe a family, and keep them warm throughout the winter."

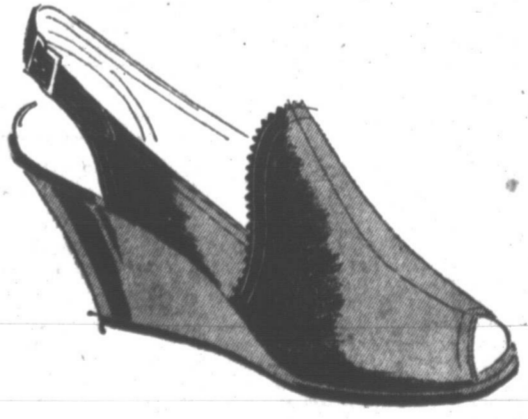

Youths Desert Festival For East Berlin Meals

BERLIN — (AP) — The West Berlin newspaper Telegraf reports that more than 60 young East German communists had been arrested by red police for deserting their World Youth Festival to visit West Berlin. The newspaper added that "several" leading officials of the communist youth movement had been fired and arrested because of a breakdown in supply and organization for the festival, which has massed a half million youngsters into battered East Berlin. West Berlin press reports also claimed that the blue-shirted East German communist youths had engaged in several fights with "people's police" who tried to bar them from visiting West Berlin. But as the festival went into its fifth day many communist youths were still coming over, often employing ruses to elude their police guards or circumvent street barricades and transportation hindrances. From the start of the festival there was evidence the communist bosses were having trouble, not only in keeping their young masses on the reservation but in supplying them. This was, in part, admitted by the communist Berliner Zeitung which said that many of the youths were not getting their promised one daily hot meal because of insufficient personnel in the kitchens.

Tens of thousands of the Iron Curtain youths have been catching warm meals free in West Berlin youth homes on their stolen visits across the sector borders.

Western sources estimated that some 200,000 youngsters already had come visiting. Of these, nearly 200 were reported to have asked about political asylum; but only 38 have been accepted as bona fide refugees. Meanwhile, West Berliners were aroused by a new rash of communist kidnappings and attempted kidnappings at the sector borders. Two West Berlin policemen were reported snatched up by carbine-carrying communist police and hauled away to captivity in the Russian occupation zone. At the downtown Potsdamer Platz reports said a West Berlin civilian was similarly captured for unknown reasons. Another attempt to nab a British sector resident was said to have been thwarted when West Berlin police rushed to his aid.

More Than 625,000 Permits To Be Sold

AUSTIN — (AP) — More than 625,000 hunting and fishing licenses will be sold in Texas the fiscal year beginning Sept. 1, the game and fish commission's chief clerk has predicted. During 1950-51, Texans bought 315,000 individual resident sport fishing licenses and 310,000 hunting licenses. Licenses will be distributed to 1,650 agents by the last of this month. Resident sportsmen will buy for the first time a combined \$2.15 hunting license good for both big and small game, except antelope. The antelope permit is \$5. Anglers will pay \$1.65 for a fresh water fishing license. A hunting permit is required of all persons over 17 when they leave their home county. A fishing license is needed by those over 17 who go beyond their home or adjoining counties.

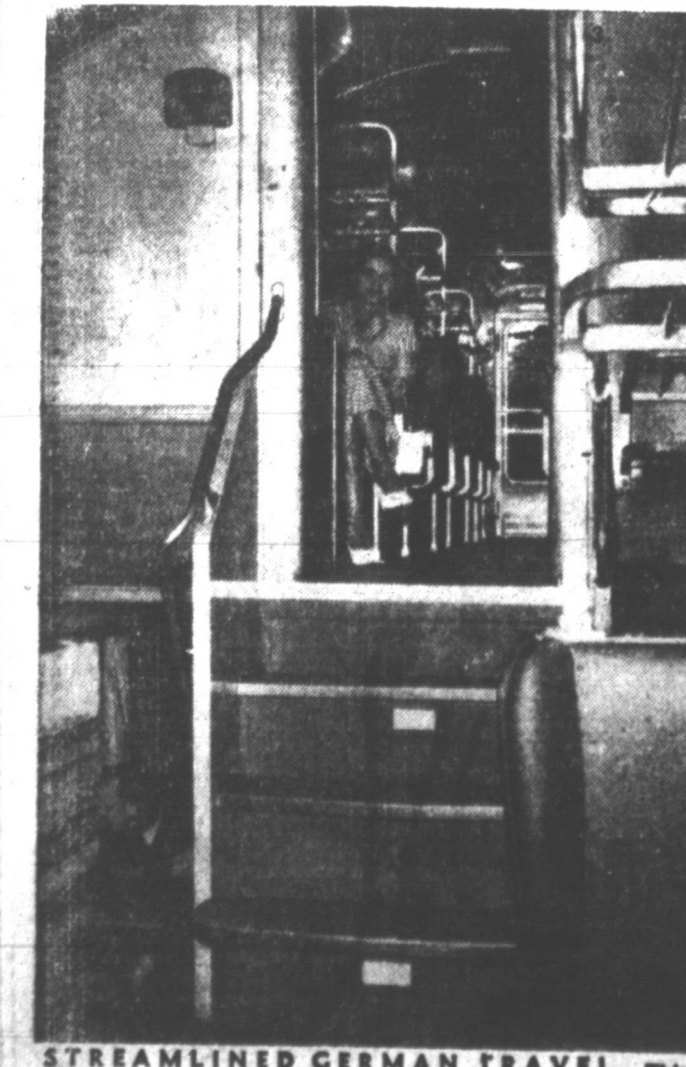

Your Garden:

No Let-Up In War On Jap Beetles

By HENRY FREE

Written for NEA Service Japanese beetles are on the rampage again and wise is the gardener who gets after them before they spoil all the bloom on the roses. Fortunately, these insects prey much stay away from the vegetable garden although they are fond of red raspberries, beans and sweet corn. Although not present in our garden, as yet, all shrubs and flowers will be dusted regularly. Hand picking will be indulged in when but one or two are observed on a plant. The grown Japanese beetle

works in full view from June through August. Its sole object is to devour every green thing above ground, and it has a special fondness for the leaves of the white birch, all types of maples, cherry trees, rose bushes and dahlias. Grass blades do not particularly tempt it.

In July, the female burrows into the soil to lay its eggs. In August, the eggs hatch into the worm stage. Grass roots are the mainstay of the grub diet. Well-fed grubs are content to hibernate from November through March. In April their interest in the roots of your grass returns, and



Learn to recognize this arch-enemy of the gardener. The grubs feed ravenously. In June the adult beetle emerges from the soil. The cycle begins again.

Quizzing The Gardener

Q — Please suggest a robust evergreen vine tolerating partial shade. — S. R.

A — The hardy Evergreen Bittersweet, euonymus fortunei, is a robust vine. Known also as Bigleaf Wintercreeper, this vine will cling to both masonry walls and tree trunks, and is useful as a ground cover or specimen shrub. The thick rounded evergreen leaves are attractive the year round and

Q — How often should the rose garden be cultivated? — M. F.

A — It is best to cultivate the soil during the spring and then add a mulch to keep the soil cool and damp for the remainder of the season. Peatmoss is a popular mulch, although rotted manure or ground corn cobs may be used instead. However, where a mulch is not used, it is wise to cultivate after a rain or after watering so that the ground will not become packed and hard. This should be either shallow scratching or not over two inches deep.

South Dakota Complains U.S. Doesn't Know Its Advantages

SIOUX FALLS, S. D. — (AP) — When a guest departs, he usually drops his host a bread-and-butter note. And on leaving South Dakota, I'd like to write a thank-you note to a state where I've had a world of fun and good food. The main thing South Dakotans complain about is that the rest of America doesn't seem to know what they've got out here in "the land of infinite variety." "Maybe you'd better start off your article by pointing out that South Dakota is one of the 48 states," an editor remarked dryly. "What do they have out here, where the deer and the antelope played and the buffalo roamed? Well you can still find buffalo deer and antelope — and some of the nation's greatest Indian reservations. They've got 10 gallon hats, ear-to-ear grins, and a mile-deep gold mine. They've got endless miles of waving corn and wheat, and rolling oceans of grass studded with fattening herds of cattle, they've got dinosaur tracks in stone. And not far away they've got a big B-36 air base, where modern monsters of the sky rise to guard our northern frontiers. South Dakota is a mixture of the old West and the new West. The tourists love the legends and symbols of the old West, such as the small cemetery above Deadwood, where Wild Bill Hickok and Calamity Jane lie side by side. Or they like to visit the Homestake mine, which has yielded more than \$550,000,000 in gold since 1875. The Indians are still willing to play Indian for the tourists. But for themselves they like to play cowboy. "Most of them prefer to dress like cowboys," said one oldtimer. "And their ambition is to be ranchers." The buffalo are on government preserves now and can thumb their bears at hunters. But sportsmen fly from both coasts here to hunt Chinese pheasants. They are almost as beautiful as birds of paradise. All South Dakotans love their famous Black Hills, a wonderland of fish and game where the Indians believed the great spirit of Manitou dwelt. Once a year they made a pilgrimage into the hills to fashion their arrowheads and tomahawks.
