





Marshall Women **Deserve Cheers**

The stalwart women of Marshall who are determined that the government shall not make tax collectors out of them are making a militant stand for real Americanism and the battle that they are fighting ought to be joined by every person who believes in free-

dom for the individual. The actual amount of money involved in the refusal to collect for the Treasury Department the monev that the Social Security tax law says they must is nothing. But the principle involved is just as important as though there were lieve. thousands of dollars concerned with the law.

Mrs. Vivian Kellems of Connectfcut has now established a pattern for all empolyers to follow, having sucessfully challenged the Treasury Department to force her to become a collection agent for the Department of Internal Revenue and the protest on the part of the women of Marshall should cinch the matter.

An interesting point in the entire "affair Marshall" is one that has often been stressed in this column: that is, behind every law there stands, ultimately, a man with a gun who has the right to shoot the person who sufficiently resists the law.

So it is in the instance of the women of Marshall who have refused to become unpaid tax collectors for the government. If the people involved have put their money into cash where the government can't get at it and still own a home the power of the law will permit the house to be taken from nem in settlement of the bill. If the person objects to having hist home taken from him and defies; the sheriff or United States marshal then he has put himself in the position of being willing to be shot

It might seem to be a silly thing to be shot to death for the sake of the few dollars involved and this is the attitude that the majority would take in supinely Yollowing what "the law" says.

But if the law can, without the consent of the person involved, force him to become an unpaid tax collector the law can force him to become any kind of an unpaid servant of the government. Carried to its extreme, if the existing law is held valid, then any person could be required to perform any kind of government service without pay including being a soldier and getting killed.

We hope that the woman whose bank account was attached for \$2.51 will make the sternist kind of a fight to protect her rights for in so doing she will be protecting the rights of all of us. For if I tell you that this would be a disobedience to a divine command, and therefore that I cannot hold my tongue you will no believe that I am serious; and if I say again that the greatest good o man is daily to converse about wirtue, and all that concerning which you hear me examining myself and others, and that the life which is unexamined is not worth living that you are still less likely to be-

Because the publishers and editors of this paper believe that statement of Socrates to be absolutely true is the reason they discuss and are obliged to take the unpopular side of so many ques-Virtue and understanding need not be afraid to speak out. It is only those people who are think-ing of their own popularity and material well-being who are obliged to hold their tongues on moral questions. Remember Jesus said about the same thing when he said: "Men do not light a candle and put it under a bushel".

So if Socrates was right, the tea chers and superintendents of tax supported schools are disobeying a divine commandment when they refuse to explain how tax supported schools can be in agreement with the moral law of the Commandments, the Golden Rule and the Declaration of Independence. So is every publisher, editor, columnist, preacher, politician, radio announcer, lawyer and business man disobeying a divine commandment when he holds his tongue about courses of action as to whether or not they are just and in agreement with virtue.

Public As Well As Private Socrates also explained that he acted just the same in private as he did in public matters. He ex-plained it in this manner:

"But I have been always the same in all my actions, public as well as private, and never had yielded any base compliance t hose who are standerously termed my disciples or to any other. For the truth is that I have no regular disciples: but if anyone likes to come and hear me while I am pursuing my mission, whether he be young or old, he may freely come. 

tering, what with Reds picketing the place, parading the streets and making an open mockery of the judge right in the courtroom. At one time he was even threatened by hostile defendants and lawyers who advanced to-ward the bench. It's pretty tough to keep a calm, judicial aspect under such circumstances. A judge is likely to become prejudiced against the people he's trying. That's exactly what the Reds hoped Medina would do so that they could later on have his decision reversed.

My own questions on the subject have been largely resolved by a speech the judge gave in New York and a copy of which has come into my hands. Putting it briefly, he believes in God, is a Christian, and depends on a power much greater than mere man's to sustain him. Only once in his entire life, he says, can he remember failing to say his prayers before he goes to bed. That ws when he was 14 years old and was excited over his first night in a boarding school.

"It was not long after I became a judge," he says, "that I began to feel a new sense of responsibility. It was not simply that I wanted to be right and that I took my duties seriously. There came a feeling that everything I did, even the decisions of nice questions of interpretation of mere rules of proceedure, was in some way becoming apart of a huge fabric which, on the whole, was part and parcel of the moral law governing mankind and which must of necessity be of divine origin."

Quoting the 22nd chapter of St Luke (which, he says, "follows im-mediately after those verses which are so important a part of our Communion service") he stresses the need of humility which he discover-

Judge Medina found that law itself-any law-unless based upon fundamental divine moral law, the Commandments and Golden Rule,

would be futile.

The next day he firmly sentenced the defendant to 30 days in jail. He was doing what it was his

duty to do. The judge says he doesn't see why a judge should be ashamed to say that he prays for Divine guidance and for strength to do his duty. In the Red case he was so weary that he declares, "when I finally left the courtroom one day and went to lie down, thinking that perhaps I should never go back aften ten or fifteen minutes I was refreshed and I did go back; and I gained in strength from that mo-

Your side has melded Joker-A-A-A, Joker-K-K-K and Q-Q-Q. You hold K-K, Q 3, 2 (the three being black, of course), and you draw an ace from the stock. What should you do?

It is especially important to play on if the opponents need 120 points and have not yet melded. They are going to have trouble finding an initial meld course), and you draw an ace since they are nearly aceless and jokerless.

Take 'he same initial meld for your side and suppose that your partner's hand, or on the way partner picks up a very small partner's hand, or on the way pile. He melds the queens, adds two aces and a king, and then very few cards, you tend to meld out. If he has a large number of cards, you tend to play on. For example, assume that you made the initial meld with Joker-A-A and Joker-K-K. Your partner, at his next turn, added two aces, a king and three queens. TIPRO Lashes **Steel Policies**

AUSTIN - Petroleum Admir istration for Defense came in this week for a severe lashing this week for a severe lashing over its handling of steel distribution to the oil industry by the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Assn. The protest over PAD allocation of steel, particularly tubular goods, was registered in a telegram from Executive Vice President E. I. Thompson to Deputy PAD Administrator Bruce K. Brown, with copies to Interior Secretary Oscar Chapman and PAD Production Director Richard G. Lawton. The PAD allocation formula, Brown was told, "must be revised to provide an equitable distribution of pipe among all op-erators or the whole program will fall. Protests from our members are pouring into the associa-tion headquarters every day in increasing numbers and vehemence. The number of independent operators with critical drilling obligations who received little or no allocations of pipe for the third and-or fourth quarters and are thus being forced to farm out or sell their properties has reached alarming proportions.

Many are in open revolt and advocating scrapping the whole PAD program.

"If we are correctly informed," continued Thompson, "there is more gray market pipe available today than before the PAD program was instituted. That alone conclusive evidence that some thing is fundamentally and basically wrong with the present pro-gram and formula for distribu-

'We believe that the officials of PAD are in the position to recognize the factors contributing to the inequities and ineffectiveness of the existing program and, likewise, to institute immediately such measures and directives as are necessary to correct this very critical situation in which course you can be assured of our whole-hearted support."

Act, PAD was charged with recommending to the National Production Authority the amount of steel necessary to maintain a necessary program of exploration, development and production, It was to direct allocation of that steel to the industry fairly among its various segments and operators in order to provide the maximum results per unit of steel involved and maintain an active, aggressive program of exploration and development with a minimum dislocation in the over-all operation of the industry.


