United States Makes Initial Installment: Tito To Receive \$50,000,000 From U.S., Britain, France

Copper Strike To Continue Says Leader

Denver — (AP) — The nationwide strike of copper workers is going to continue "unless or until" the government presses the industry to accept its proposed wage settlement, a union leader said last night.

Defense officials said the strike was hitting the mobilization drive at its weakest point since copper is the scarcest of the major metals. The strike also affects zinc, lead and silver production.

The U.S. Conciliation service has proposed that the companies raise wages 18 cents an hour and increase pension benefits an additional four and one-half cents to settle the strike.

Maintenance workers at the 50 strikebound plants in 15 states remained on duty in preparation for a quick reopening of operations when the strike ends.

Lake Charles, La. — (AP) — Five newspaper men who crusaded against wide open gambling refused to investigate charges of defaming three admitted gamblers and several public officials.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States, Britain and France have agreed to provide \$50,000,000 in economic aid to Yugoslavia to support Marshal Tito's "contribution to the security of the free world."

The Economic Cooperation administration, in announcing this today, said it already has allocated \$29,800,000 as an initial installment to help the Yugoslavs buy cotton, coke and steel.

Britain shortly will announce, ECA said, its decision to make available \$11,600,000 to help bolster Yugoslavia's economy.

France is also expected to announce its contribution soon. Officials said the initial French installment would be around \$5,000,000 or \$6,000,000.

The new United States allotment, the ECA said, "will help Yugoslavia overcome shortages of raw materials and other supplies vital to her economic strength and the support of her military defense effort."

The new three-power aid program came two days after President Truman's foreign policy advisor, W. Averell Harriman, conferred with Tito in Yugoslavia.

Harriman said he talked over with Tito means of bracing Yugoslavia's strength to help it withstand any possible aggression by Russia or its Balkan satellites.

The ECA said the decision to provide new aid was made in London several months ago after lengthy conferences by American, British and French officials.

The three-nation aid program is designed to support the Yugoslav economy in its contribution to the security of the free world and the meeting and strengthening of the standard of living of the Yugoslav people.

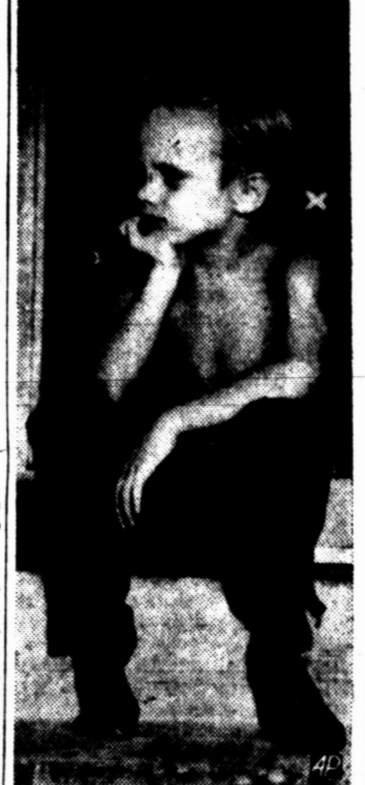
Of the \$150,000,000 previously allotted to Yugoslavia, \$95,000,000 was in outright grants for food and raw materials. The remaining \$55,000,000 came from the government's Export-Import bank.

Search For Kidnapper Intensified

Miami, Fla. — (AP) — The search for the kidnaper of Mrs. Lewana Newman, pretty Miami Beach hotel clerk, was intensified today after her body was found beside a lonely farm road.

She had been shot through the head and thrown into a weed patch, O. D. Henderson, chief sheriff's deputy, called it a "vicious murder" by a robber.

The 28-year-old woman was last seen alive before dawn Wednesday at the desk of the Gould hotel on the ocean front north of Miami Beach.

A search of the sand dunes and back roads by the north Miami police area was climaxed by the finding of her body.

Henderson said the killer placed her head on the roadway, stood over her and fired a bullet through her brain, then dragged her into the underbrush.

Several pistols and revolvers belonging to boy friends of the young woman have been rounded up, Henderson said, and will be checked by ballistics experts.

Mrs. Newman was separated from her second husband, Her six-year-old son, Jimmy, was not told immediately about his mother's death. District lodges of Knights of Pythias "adopted" him last night and voted to make his welfare part of their program.

Henderson called the slaying a "home job" and ordered every available deputy into the hunt for the killer.

Commie Note Could Finish Truce Talks

TOKYO — (AP) — The United Nations command charged today that the Communists sent one of their own planes through the motions of bombing Kaesong last Wednesday and blamed the allies for the attack.

The charge was contained in a bulletin at Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's headquarters. The UN commander studied a Communist note that could shatter hopes of truce in Korea.

"There is as yet no indication as to the nature of the reply General Ridgway will make to the latest Communist letter," an officer said.

The Reds offered to resume truce talks — which they broke off last Thursday. Primarily, they want to say a UN plane bombed the Kaesong neutral area Wednesday.

He said no UN plane was even in the area. He told the Communists they manufactured the incident.

Less than 24 hours after the Reds rejected the Ridgway's public information office restated the same position in detail.

"It is beyond doubt that this was a Communist aircraft," "All evidence established the clear conclusion that on the night of Aug. 22 the Communists perpetrated a deliberate fraud."

The release said there were no bomb crates, no bomb fragments, "no evidence on the ground of a United Nations command air attack."

"There is every indication," the release said, that Red troops "personnel at Kaesong were accessories to the deliberate fraud. Using their military control of the conference site as a cloak of deceit, Communist personnel perpetrated a sham of unprecedented proportions."

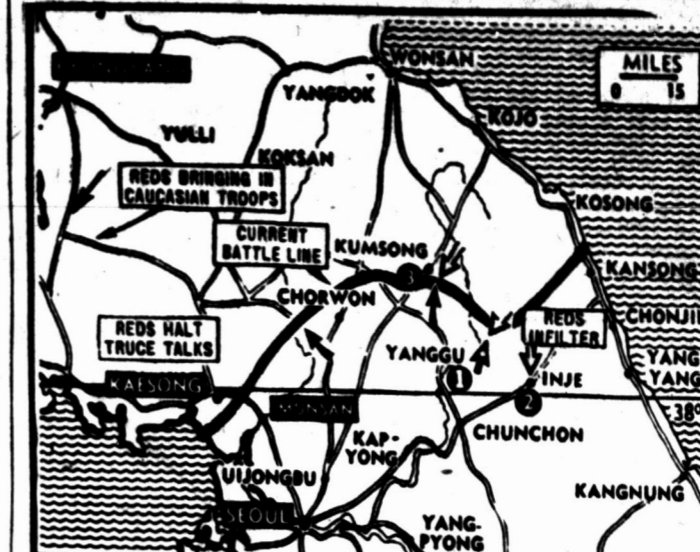
"Creating an elaborately staged and obviously premeditated scene, they sought to fix upon the United Nations command a false charge of air attacks on the conference site."

The Reds asked Ridgway to investigate again their evidence. The original evidence was transparent as to immediately indicate the fraudulent nature of the bombing charge," the release said, "but this defect in the evidence could be cured."

"Should the investigation be reopened, it is probable that much more convincing evidence of a bombing attack would be presented."

Officials said it was virtually unthinkable that Ridgway would retract his charge that the entire Red China's Peiping radio said one of the two American liaison officers who investigated the original evidence "either lied or was incompetent" in reporting there had been no bombing.

Ridgway's headquarters reviewed the whole array of charges of neutrality violations. It said: "From the beginning of the conference (July 10) the Communists repeatedly violated the letter and the spirit of our agreements concerning neutrality of the conference area."

Mrs. Doswell Willed \$100

DALLAS — (AP) — The will of millionaire oil man Thomas W. Doswell, 55, who was shot to death last week as he sat in his parked car, provided \$100 in cash for his widow.

The bulk of the estate went to a brother, Houston J. Doswell of Weatherford, Texas. The will was filed for probate yesterday.

Mrs. Rebecca Doswell, 52, was charged with murder last Wednesday in the fatal shooting of her husband. Doswell died of a bullet wound inflicted as he sat with his wife in their Cadillac sedan, parked in front of a fashionable Dallas residential hotel where they lived.

Mrs. Doswell told officers the gun fired accidentally when she handed it to her husband. Doswell recently started a new rock quarry in the San Juan basin of northwest New Mexico. Indications are that his holdings in that area would earn fabulous sums.

The will left all his "real, personal and mixed property, including cash deposited in banks," to his brother.

Other bequests were \$100 each to two other relatives, Christina Schmuck Doswell and Nellie Granden Doswell.

The Doswells were married about three years ago. Mrs. Doswell was the widow of Parren M. Morgan, also a Dallas oilman, who died in 1941 of cerebral hemorrhage.

How To Win Friends: Truman Tells Czech That Oatls Release Can Smooth Relations

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman told the new Czechoslovak ambassador today the best way to restore cordial relations with the United States would be for his government to free William N. Oatis, Associated Press correspondent jailed there on spy charges.

In a five-minute meeting reporters were told Mr. Truman informed Dr. Vladimir Prochazka that relations between the U.S. and Czechoslovakia had "deteriorated ever since Jan Masaryk was murdered."

This plain talk when the ambassador called to present his credentials was reported afterwards by the President's press secretary, Joseph Short.

Short said the ambassador declared "he hoped to make our relations more cordial."

"The President replied that the best way he could make our relations more cordial was to send our Oatis home," Short related.

The President further said that relations between our two countries had deteriorated ever since Jan Masaryk (former foreign minister of Czechoslovakia) was murdered.

Masaryk, a staunch anti-Communist, fell to his death from a window while he was under a Prague arrest by the Reds in Prague several years ago.

Prior to Masaryk's death, Short quoted the President, "the relations between the United States and the republic of Czechoslovakia had been wonderful."

Short added that the President "mentioned the extreme friendliness of our political relations and also the back and forth trade relations."

But now, the President said, it looked as if our relations would not be what they had been unless Czechoslovakia changed its policies.

Serviceman Due Here From Europe

Staff Sgt. Clifford Howard, grandson of Mrs. Roy Hallman, 507 N. Cuyler, is scheduled to arrive in the United States from England Sept. 10.

Howard, son of Mrs. Faye Howard of Lubbock and brother to Mrs. Harlan Beachamp, 601 E. Browning, has been with the Air Force six years, three years being spent in England. He was stationed about 15 miles from London.

According to a letter he sent Mrs. Hallman, he will be given a 30-day furlough and be stationed at Tampa, Fla., on his return to this country.

Commission Tables Ban On Peddlers

The city commission today tabled the entire peddling ordinance for further consideration.

Three local insurance men objected to the ordinance because it would include local salesmen as well as itinerant merchants.

The local insurance men contend they could be picked up under the same ordinance. City Attorney Bob Gordon said this was possible.

Roughly, the ordinance prohibits a peddler from entering a premise unless he has permission of the householder. It is copied after the Alexandria, La. ordinance.

Muleshoe To Offer Reward For Leads On Blocher Killing

MULESHOE — A reward fund is being made up here for information on the slayers of Joshua Blocher, eccentric founder of the little town of Progress, who was found murdered in a cotton field near here Aug. 15.

The reward fund was started Monday by George Houser, manager of a Progress grain elevator, who donated \$250. Houser, J. M. Forbes, publisher of The Muleshoe Journal, and W. Q. Casey, vice-president of the Muleshoe State Bank, are fund trustees.

Blocher lived in a one-room shack at Progress, six miles from here.

Several suspects have been questioned but were released, according to Sheriff Hugh Freeman, an ex-Texas Ranger who has been working on the case.

Solons Tentatively Knock Down House Increase On Taxes

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate Finance committee tentatively voted to knock out about one-fourth of the corporation tax increase voted by the House.

Most of the excess profits tax boost was eliminated yesterday from the House-passed \$7,200,000,000 tax hike bill.

The senators kept the five percent increase in corporation income taxes but juggled rates to make the hike lighter on small companies with incomes of \$25,000 or less a year.

Even with this softer treatment, the higher corporation levy rates would yield an estimated \$2,200,000,000 a year in additional revenue — \$700,000,000 less than under the House bill.

The Senators now have tentatively approved cuts of about \$1,600,000,000 in the tax increases voted by the House.

Last remaining big section of the bill, as sharply as they have other levies they may well get their version of the tax hike down to about \$5,000,000,000, or only half the amount sought by President Truman.

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — (AP) — Gov. Luis Munoz Marin's Popular party was well ahead today in the election of delegates to a Puerto Rican Constituent assembly.

Instructor Killed In Crash Of Plane On Matador Ranch

DALHART — One man is dead and another in "very grave" condition as a result of a light-plane crash during an instructor's training flight with his young student.

Edwin L. Edler, 29, manager of the Municipal airport, died in the crash and Donald Ray Vincent, 18-year-old student, is in critical condition in Loreto hospital here.

The plane, a dual-control Interstate Cadet, crashed about 5:30 p.m. Monday, 20 miles southeast of Channing on the Matador ranch.

Several cowboys, camped near the ranch's Red Corral, were witnesses to the crash. They said Edler and Vincent had just finished a series of landings and takeoffs and were headed back toward Dalhart when the plane started to bank and fell. There was no fire. Ambulances were dispatched from Dalhart.

Edler was a native of Finley, O. He was an Air Corps pilot during World War II. He is survived by his wife and two children, Michael, 7, and Laura, 5.

Young Vincent is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Vincent, who live north of Channing.

Request Refused To Transfer Prisoner

BOHN, Germany — (AP) — One ally has rejected a German request that Konstantin von Neurath, former Nazi "protector" of Czechoslovakia, be transferred from Spandau prison in West Berlin to a hospital because of ill-health.

**DURING** breakfast on Saturday, Arthur remarked jovially, "You're looking very chipper this morning, Mrs. Webb." Lucilla mentioned hurriedly that this was the Saturday she was taking Hoopy to the Children's Theater to see "Little Red Riding Hood."

"I'll pick her up at 7:30," Lucilla said, and we can get her new shoes and eat uptown," Arthur said it sounded like a big day. "I'll have to stay at the office all afternoon, but I'll try to home by 7."

Arthur, when he patted her shoulder goodby, said she'd better do some of her exercises before she went out. "Otherwise you'll stiffen up before you go back to the gym class Monday."

She started guiltily. She would have liked to tell him it was about Beautiful-Ten.

When she arrived at the Cantwell's apartment on Washington Square West, Hoopy already had her coat on, and rushed to grab her mother around the waist. "Mommy, we mustn't be late for the matinee." Even though it was said somewhat theatrically, for Linda's benefit, Lucilla was flattered. She felt smugly sorry for poor plump Linda, whose mother evidently didn't plan charming special treats with her child.

Lucilla's theater-loving heart expanded to take in her daughter. "We'll get some candy or an ice-cream cone at intermission," she promised.

As they sat in the auditorium of the Children's Theater, at 2:25, she, thought proudly that Hoopy was almost the only well-behaved

child in the place. There were children racing up and down the aisles, clambering over grown-up laps, ejecting bubble-gum with derisive pops. The air seethed with questions: "When will it start? You said it would start in a few minutes, and it's already been a few minutes." Near Lucilla and Hoopy, a small boy banged his seat up and down with scowling intent, as if he'd been hired specifically to wreck it before curtain-time.

Hoopy eyed him admiringly. The program not only listed characters and scenes, but gave a strong hint of the action: "In this scene, Little Red Riding Hood's grandmother goes out to pick mushrooms, and while she is gone, the Wolf sneaks in and hides in her bed, disguised in her nightcap and shawl, so that . . ."

Hoopy interrupted. "In the book, the grandmother was sick and the wolf ate her up. Why isn't it the same in the play?"

Lucilla explained about dramatic license. Her daughter looked dubious. "I think they ought to do it just like the book." Already she was aligning herself with that sturdy group of theatergoers who resent the meddling of old-fashioned plots because of some such nonsense as modern realism or streamlined action. "Besides," Hoopy continued pensively, "I wanted to see the wolf eat the grandmother right on the stage." Lucilla was chilled at this manifestation of a death wish. She tried to think back over Hoopy's relationship with her grandmothers: they had always seemed amicable to the point of fatuity. "But think how you'd feel if a wolf ate up your Nana Webb or Gamma," she said.

Hoopy pointed out that it wasn't her grandmothers who were in the play. "The wolf would only be eating an actress."

## See End To Mass Jumps

**FORT BRAGG, N. C. — (AP)** — Army and Air Force generals predict mass paratroop jumps by airborne infantry may soon be out-moded by big assault landing aircraft.

They were impressed by the first tests of the C-122 as a fast carrier of heavy equipment in the war games which ended Monday. And they see no reason why the mass jumps and dropping of heavy equipment by parachutes are daring and spectacular — but sometimes they are costly in both men and equipment even under ideal conditions.

Lt. Gen. John Hodge, commander of the maneuvers, told reporters he believes the C-122 assault aircraft has "tremendous possibilities" for transporting both men and equipment into battle. "We should do all we can to develop the assault landing craft," he said.

Air Force Maj. Gen. W. R. Wolfenbarger, deputy maneuvers commander, said the assault craft have "great possibilities in eliminating the mass paratroop jumps."

"And we should work toward this end," he added.

This wouldn't mean the end of the cocky and well-trained paratrooper entirely. For paratroopers still would be needed to chute to the ground behind enemy lines in small numbers to prepare crude landing strips and guide the planes in.

"There will always be some situations where paratroop jumps are needed," Wolfenbarger said, "but developing an assault landing craft would mean we could move the bulk of equipment and men by air."

The big ships were used to land jeeps, howitzers, and other heavy equipment during the drops of 6000 paratroopers and their equipment in the past two days. All the ships landed safely on a makeshift landing strip and the airborne infantrymen quickly got the equipment into action.

In the parachute drop of equipment, some was badly smashed. One paratrooper was killed and 26 others hospitalized with serious injuries during the mass jumps. Hundreds of onlookers watched in horror while 20-year-old PFC. Salvador Camarena plunged 1,200 feet to his death. His parachute failed to open. Cameron struggled to open his emergency chute, but it did not open in time.

## Apologizes To Newspaper

**MOSCOW — (AP)** — A Soviet scientist, recently chided for out-fitting footsore pigs with sandals, allowed yesterday he had indulged in some faulty reasoning.

The scientist, L. K. Greben, incurred the ire of the government newspaper Ivestia, after he tried out some unique theories on an original herd of swine from the Ukrainian plains.

Ivestia accused Greben of pampering ailing piglets with booties, foot baths and penicillin, instead of introducing new blood into the herd.

In a letter to Ivestia yesterday, Greben admitted he had been guilty of a "formalist" approach and had failed to apply the biological theories of the late Ivan Michurin, noted Russian horticulturist, as set forth by T. D. Ly-senko.

Michurin embraced the claim of inherited acquired characteristics. His chief advocate in Russia today is Ly-senko.

It is standard procedure for a rebuked Russian official to send a public apology to the Soviet newspaper which chided him.

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### Rising Hollywood Starlet Wouldn't Give In To Polio

HOLLYWOOD — (P) — Mari

Blanchard, recently New York's top model of bathing suits and now a promising movie starlet, was walking down a studio street and evoking whistles from admiring males.

"You'd never suspect," remarked a bystander, "that she was once crippled by polio."

Mari, a vivacious, shapely girl who has all the physical assets for Hollywood stardom, told her story as we lunched at the Brown Derby.

"I was nine when polio struck," she related. "I was paralyzed below the hips, in my right arm and the right side of my face. My mother — thank God — was a physical therapist and she had been working for years on the treatment of polio along the same lines as Sister Kenny. She wouldn't let the doctors put me in a cast. Instead, she started me exercising."

"She drew a line along the ceiling of my room and told me to imagine I was a soldier marching along the line. She had me chew three and four packs of gum at a time, to keep the facial muscles working. She bought a small canvas pool, put it in the back yard and gave me massages in it."

"Everything was designed to keep the muscles working. Her theory was that whatever part of the body we do not use will wither and die."

"In a couple of years, I had recovered enough to start learning to walk again. First I had two crutches, then one, then I walked unaided. My mother told me: 'You have two legs, use them!' In three years I was back in school."

Mari, a Long Beach, Calif., girl who moved to Los Angeles, did a great deal of swimming as part of her therapy and the results paid off when she later tried a modeling career. At first she was intent on a career in international law and studied at Santa Barbara State, UCLA and USC. She decided she had to earn a living and got work with an import firm as a clerk. But she was earning more money in part-time modeling work and decided to hit the bigtime — New York.

"I changed my name from Mary to Mari," said the beauty. "Because models are always trying to get some distinctive name. After a while I found there were many models calling themselves Mari and even some actresses in Hollywood."

Soon she was in great demand as a model of swim suits, since her broad shoulders and slim hips set them off to best advantage. Her only difficulty was that most swim suit pictures are taken in the winter time, to be ready for the summer trade.

"They would sweep away the snow so I could pose," she recalled with a shiver. "I had a cold during the entire time I was modeling. But she didn't mind the sniffles at her salary of \$50 an hour, plus free trips to Nassau, Bermuda, etc."

Once she suffered all day through a bubble bath while posing for a photographic ad. The photographer covered her with: "This job will get you a movie offer: The ad will be printed in the Hollywood trade papers."

He was right. She left the sniffles behind to take a Paramount contract. After a year of nothing but taking lessons, she left the studio and is now free-lancing. She has done two films at Columbia, "10 Tall Men" and "The Brigand" and may land a term contract there. Her success is due to her mother's words: "Never give in to pain."

### Newsmen Pleased With Demonstration Of New-Used Paper

**FORT WORTH — (P)** — First press runs of a "new-used newspaper" that might ease the worldwide newsprint shortage were held here in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram press room.

Representatives of 17 newspapers saw the first actual press test of this type "reclaimed" newsprint and indicated they were pleased with the demonstration.

The process, based on flotation activity familiar in reclamation of metals, was developed at the Herty foundation laboratory in Savannah, Ga.

Four rolls of the newsprint were threaded through the press. Two rolls were made from 50 percent magazine stock and a like amount of newspaper stock. The other two rolls were 80 percent magazine stock and 20 percent newspaper stock.

In the reclamation process the used magazine and newspaper stock is processed and "de-inked."

"We plan to proceed immediately with a plant at Tyler which will produce 200 tons of this newsprint a day," John A. Miller of Tyler said.

"I think we have proved to ourselves that we can clean the paper up to a brightness where it is satisfactory for newsprint," he continued.

NEW YORK (NEA) — Most Americans are pretty careful people when it comes to safe-guarding their property. They check their hats when dining, insure their bags when traveling, and burglar-proof their homes against night-time prowlers. But when it comes to their most precious possessions — their children — arrangements are likely to be somewhat hit or miss. Almost any community can cite its own baby-sitter scare story to prove this point.

Extremists, reviewing this sorry situation, are likely to scream "parental negligence," and let it go at that, whereas cynics mutter "these things can't be helped as long as mothers and fathers gallivant around."

MODERN LIVING PRODUCT  
The National Safety Council, however, takes a broader view.

Baby-sitting, they realize, is a product of modern living, since few households today include the elderly aunts or spinster cousins who performed this chore in another era.

Almost any young parents today, if they are to have any freedom of movement at all, must occasionally call in an outsider. Recognizing this necessity, the safety organization has instituted a program for helping parents safe-guard their offspring in their absence. There are numerous things mothers and fathers can do to take their wayward youngsters out of the crossed-finger division.

The first rule, of course, is to choose a sitter in whom the parents have confidence. It's best to employ someone you actually know, or someone recommended by a friend whose judgment you respect. Make sure, too, the sitter is old enough, both in years

**This Salad Has A Soup Base**

Sparkling chilled salad from a can of condensed soup is a trick worth knowing about in torrid weather.

Soups like cream of chicken and cream of celery are rich with flavor and of a good consistency so they are natural in the salad department. Blend each can of soup with one envelope of dissolved unflavored gelatin; then add about one cup of chopped vegetables, meat, or whatever makes a good combination. Pour the salad mixture into molds, chill until firm, and you'll have a nourishing hot weather special.

Tomato soup makes an especially good, perky-flavored gelatin salad. So does consommé, which jells after about 4 hours of chilling. When mixed with other ingredients such as vegetables, the consommé needs added gelatin, just as the other soups do.

Chicken-Pineapple Party Salad (Makes 6 servings)

One 14-ounce can (1 2/3 cups) crushed pineapple, 1 envelope plain gelatin, 1 can (1 1/4 cups) condensed cream of chicken soup,

1-4 cup chopped almonds, 1-4 cup mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon lemon juice. One pound can jellied cranberry sauce, 1 envelope gelatin in pineapple syrup (about 1 1/2 cups). Heat soup over low heat; add gelatin and stir until thoroughly dissolved. Add drained pineapple (about 1 1/3 cups), the chopped almonds, mayonnaise and lemon juice. Rinse six individual or one large mold full with cold water; fill mold half full with this mixture, then chill until firm.

Now crush cranberry layer this way — crush cranberry sauce with a fork. Soften gelatin in water; set in a pan of boiling water and stir until dissolved. Mix gelatin thoroughly with cranberry sauce. Four cranberry mixtures on top of congealed chicken-pineapple layers; chill until firm. Unmold on crisp salad greens.

NOTE: A quick way to fix cranberry sauce for this salad is to chill it in the can while the chicken mixture is chilling. Then slice cranberry sauce into 6 rounds. Unmold each chicken salad onto a cranberry base.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's Republican supporters evidently are content to let his prospective presidential candidacy rock along a while without nudging.

Senator Duff (R-Pa.), regarded as one of the leaders of the Eisenhower boom, has told Senate friends he is content not to beat up the political bushes until after Congress quits, probably in October.

Duff apparently is well pleased with the way things are going in the absence of any definite assurance from Eisenhower that he will be available for the Republican nomination.

It is the Pennsylvania senator's attitude that a groundswell from the ranks is worth several manufactured waves of sentiment. And he apparently thinks the groundswell is on.

Senator Saltonstall (R - Mass) came out for Eisenhower yesterday. Appearing on a television program (NBC), he called the general the best man at the present time.

The return of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey from an inspection trip to the Far East is expected to bring renewed efforts from the Dewey camp in behalf of Eisenhower's potential candidacy.

The New York governor has been invited to the White House, may write some magazine articles and probably has some speeches up his sleeve. It will not be difficult for him to slip in a few words for Eisenhower.

The Dewey campaign is regarded with some suspicion by others in the Eisenhower camp who apparently feel that the New York governor would be willing to bid for a third party presidential nomination if the general makes it plain he isn't available.

Dewey and Duff, for instance, seemed to be dealing somewhat at arm's length in backing Eisenhower. Duff has made it clear he doesn't want the Republicans to wind up with Dewey as their candidate if they don't get Eisenhower.

Similarly, former Senator Harry Darby of Kansas, an unofficial campaign manager for the Eisenhower camp, has said publicly that he would not support Dewey -- as he did twice before -- in a bid for the nomination.

Friends of Senator Taft (R-O), whose race for the nomination is still unofficial, said they are satisfied with the impression he made on a New England tour last week.

Taft would like to break into the eastern seaboard with some convention delegate support to add to the Middle West and Southern strength he is credited with having.

## Less Benevolent U.S. Policy Toward India Seems Certain

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A new and less benevolent American policy toward India appeared certain yesterday to result from Prime Minister Nehru's refusal to sign a United States-backed peace treaty with Japan.

American officials made no secret of their bitter disappointment at India's public denunciation of the proposed treaty draft, coming as it did only nine days before the start of a formal 50-nation peace conference in San Francisco, Sept. 4.

India's arguments for boycotting the signing, officials said, seemed to echo Russia's long-standing objections, and give powerful, timely ammunition to a new Moscow propaganda drive

to wreck the Japanese treaty. In New Delhi, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru told Parliament that India will sign a separate treaty with Japan as soon as Japan has achieved independent status.

A separate pact between the U.S. and Japan is expected to be signed after the main peace treaty is disposed of. That pact would provide a new legal basis for keeping U.S. troops in Japan for its defense.

The State Department Sunday made public India's decision not to sign the U.S.-backed treaty along with an accompanying American rejection of India's arguments.

In Moscow, the Soviet government newspaper attacked the proposed treaty as an American attempt to set Japan against other Asian peoples and make it into an American colony.

At least 46 nations are expected by American diplomats to approve the peace pact despite Russia's threats. Only Burma and Yugoslavia so far have joined India in refusing to sign.

## Industrial Output Hits Low Point In July; Is Recovering

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Federal Reserve board has reported industrial production dropped in July to the lowest point in 10 months and appears to be making only a mild recovery this month.

The board said reduced consumer buying was a big influence in the cut-back in production. With retailers selling fewer goods and inventories piling up, factories reduced production to get in line with the sales slowdown.

July output was recorded on the board's seasonally adjusted index of industrial production at 213 percent of the 1935-39 average.

Comparatively, the June mark was 222 and July, 1950, was 198.

Preliminary indications are that output in August will be above July but still somewhat below the first half (first six months of 1950) level, the board said.

The sales resistance by consumers in July would have caused factory output to fall even more, the board said, except that it was partly offset by continued rapid increase in buying for defense purposes.

There was one sign that a change in the trend might be under way. The board said that "after the early part of July, consumer buying apparently increased more than seasonally."

The board observed: "Prices of raw materials generally changed little after mid-July following substantial declines from earlier levels. Business loans at banks showed some expansion."

## Quadruple Amputee Will Marry Girl He Met By Mail

JOLIET, Ill. — (AP) — Pvt. Hubert Reeves, 19-year-old quadruple amputee of the Korean war, will be married next month to an 18-year-old girl he met through letters she wrote him while he was in a hospital.

The bride-elect is Beverly Jean Hall, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David W. Hall of Wilmington, Ill.

The Halls announced the engagement Sunday and said the couple will be wed Sept. 9 at the First Baptist church in Joliet.

A reception will follow at the Cantigny post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Joliet.

The young infantryman said Miss Hall wrote him while he was being treated at Valley Forge State hospital at Phoenixville, Pa., last March. On returning to his Joliet home, he said, he looked her up and the romance blossomed.

Reeves was in combat for less than a month. His limbs were frozen when he was captured and left for dead during a Chinese Red break-through last winter. He lost parts of all four limbs.

## Measure Would Stop Shipments To Communists

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Sparkman (D-Ala.) asked the Senate yesterday to approve a new measure aimed at drying up the flow of arms, ammunition and atomic and military material to Soviet Russia and her satellites.

"This is a good bipartisan bill, but I guess we face a fight," Sparkman told a reporter in advance of Senate debate on a measure that would cut off all U.S. aid for any nation engaging in embargoed trade with iron curtain countries.

Senators Kem (R-Mo.), Wherry (R-Neb.), Byrd (D-Va.) and Malone (R-Nev.) have amendments that would clamp mandatory restrictions on all such trade and permit no exceptions.

## Even With No Bullets:

## Mock War Serious Say Guardsmen

Warfare, even when words and tactics are used instead of bullets, is serious business according to some 50 Pampa National guardsmen who returned this week from a training camp at Fort Sill, Okla.

The headquarters battery of the 474th Field Artillery Observation Bn. met other batteries from Dumas, Dalhart and Shamrock for two weeks of army training that included everything from mock air raids to observing actual artillery fire from observation points.

Battalion staff officers attending were Capt. William Ragsdale and Warrant Officer William Leonard.

First week of the camp was spent in classrooms where sections of the unit learned individual jobs. The second week, all units were combined to perform under actual combat activity, and a part of the men worked alongside regular Army men on a field problem.

Reports from the men indicate the training was excellent, the food good, and the experience profitable. As one man said, "When you realize the tactics may someday be a means of survival, you can't help but want to learn battalion tactics."

Many of the men in the local group qualified on use of small arms, making 140 out of 200 shots. The Eighth Field Artillery group and XI Corps was in training at Fort Sill with the area men, and an Oklahoma guard unit was also there.

About 200 guardsmen of the tactics presented.

## JACOBY ON BRIDGE

## Bidding Often Gives Key Clue To Cards

Sherlock Holmes once solved a mystery from the fact that a dog failed to bark. Bridge players do this all the time, as today's hand shows.

West led the deuce of spades, dummy put up the ten, and East won with the jack. East continued with the ace of spades and then with the king. South ruffed the third round of spades, drew two rounds of trumps, and finessed the queen of diamonds.

East won with the king of diamonds and got out safely with a low diamond, whereupon South made the rest of the tricks without the slightest trouble. Do you think South should have had trouble with the clubs? That's because you've forgotten about the dog that failed to bark.

The opening lead showed that West had four spades. The play

to the first three tricks showed that East had the ace-king-jack of spades. East later showed up with the king of diamonds. Yet East failed to open the bidding. Is it possible that East would have passed if he also held three or four clubs headed by the queen?

The dog would have barked if he had held the queen of clubs. Therefore it was clear that West had the queen of clubs.

South therefore began the clubs by leading the jack through West. If West ducked, South was determined to let the jack ride. If West covered with the queen of clubs, declarer would win with dummy's ace and finesse through East for the ten of clubs.

This "backward finesse" is usually a very poor play. It is usually better to play East for the queen no matter where the ten is than to play West for the queen and East for the ten. But when you know definitely where the queen is, the backward finesse becomes the only hope.

## Use Of Aircraft On Farms Mounting

FORT WORTH — (AP) — Use of aircraft in the nation's agriculture has developed unlimited potentialities since the war, 700 delegates to the meeting of the National Flying Farmers Assn. have been told.

Charles F. Horne, Civil Aeronautics Administrator, said the nation's agriculture stands to make great gains through use of planes.

"Five to six thousand planes of various types are now being used in all sections of rural America to combat insects as well as other uses," he said.

## Russia-Hungary Treaty Reported

LONDON — (AP) — Reports have reached here that Russia and Hungary signed a secret treaty in June permitting the Red army to send new units to Hungary for training in addition to the large occupation forces already there.

Hungary must pay all bills, the reports said.

They came from a refugee recently arrived in Western Europe who had high contacts in the Hungarian Defense Ministry.

The treaty reportedly also calls for Hungary to send complete units to Russia for training, Hungary again paying the bills.

This is causing ill-feeling in the small Danubian country which is already burdened with the high cost of Soviet occupation, according to the reports.

## bloc Against Soviet Is Probable Aim Of Talks

BLEED, Yugoslavia — (AP) — formation of a strong defensive bloc against Russian imperialism in Southeastern Europe is believed here to have been the aim of W. Averell Harriman's week-end visit to Marshal Tito, Harriman, President Truman's top-ranking diplomatic troubleshooter, paused in Yugoslavia Saturday and Sunday en route from Tehran, Iran, to London.

It is an open secret that the U.S., Britain and various other Atlantic Pact countries would like countries in this area — Yugoslavia, Greece, Turkey and perhaps Italy — to draw together in a military alliance.

Collectively they could mount enough strength in fighting men and material to challenge, with American help, Soviet hopes of obtaining a controlling position in the Mediterranean.

Yugoslavia has an army second in size only to Russia on the European continent; the Greek army has been toughened by its experiences in the recently-ended civil war and is equipped by the U.S. The Turks always have proved formidable foes.

The U.S. State Dept. and joint chiefs of staff dreamed of such

an alliance as long ago as 1946. At that time, Tito still was allied with the Kremlin.

Support for the alliance was demonstrated by congressional passage of the Greek-Turkey aid bill which bolstered anti-Russian morale in both countries.

Yugoslavia, while insisting on a neutral position, had to turn to the West for economic aid

and military equipment no longer available from its one-time communist allies.

It is doubtful if Harriman emphasized too strongly the U.S. desire for a Southeast Europe alliance since he is well aware of how suspicious and resentful other countries are of American interference in their affairs. But it is probable that he emphasized to Tito the spigots of American aid — both military and economic — would be opened wider if Yugoslavia will say frankly where it will stand in event of a third world war.

## Texans Said Going Back To The Farm

SAN ANTONIO — (AP) — Texans are going back to the farm in their own front yards, says Don King of Lubbock, president of the Texas Assn. of Nurserymen.

He said they are turning the trick by buying more shrubbery and decorative plants than ever before.

"Where before many of the young people didn't know the difference between a cottonwood and a magnolia, today they are eagerly seeking information on such items as pyracantha and bougainvillea," he declared.

King is presiding at the convention of the association.

He said modern methods had made it possible for the planting season to be extended throughout the year.

"With proper care most shrubs and ornamentals can now be planted the year around," he declared.

December, January and February are still the best tree planting months, he said.

## Chinese Eager For Fight With Reds

SAIGON, French Indochina — (AP) — Interred in French Indochina are 30,000 Chinese who are spilling for a fight with the Chinese Communists.

But they face a dreary, hopeless future.

It appears nothing less than the outbreak of World War III would allow them out of their "prison." Their situation is much similar to that of troops of Chiang Kai-shek on Formosa.

These 30,000 soldiers fled into Indochina in 1949 from the Chinese Reds.

One of their chiefs is 50-year-old Army corps general Hoang Chie, who reportedly was so good he incurred Chiang's jealousy.

Gen. Chie has whipped the 30,000 prisoners into excellent physical condition and reduced their generals from 50 to five, but the troops are without arms and are furious with the French for not letting them fight the Chinese Communists.
