I wondered about this George Knox Roth and then I happened to think back to 1942 and the investigation of a fact-finding committee of the California State Legislature. In its report published in on "Un-American Activities in California." I found about four pages devoted to the state's investigation of George Knox Roth, who now seems to be aboard the American Friends Service Committee bandwagon.

Sworn testimony by a Japanese florist divulged that "He had become acquainted with Roth while he (Shinoda) was 'temporarily in the produce business' at the 7th St Los Angeles Terminal. Roth came there and he had seen him several times in Litile Tokio." We were at war with Japan, you recall. According to other testimony, Roth offered then Los Angeles city councilman Norris Nelson large insurance contracts from Japanese if Nelson would perform certain services. Nelson was in the insurance busi-

ton Sinclair, Roth later was engaged in the Unemployed Cooperatives. He was an investigator for Clifford Clinton, and for a while was with the state dept, of agriculture. The committee was unable to get a very clear story of his adio "committee" or where he got the money for his broadcasts.
"Transcriptions of his broadcasts ndicated strong pro-Japanese feel-"He denied the allegations of

L. A. city councilman Roy Hamp-ton that he had received money from a Japanese in Simon's Restaurant in downtown Los Angeles on March 11th or 12th of 1942. Under close questioning he finally admitted he had received some money from persons of Japanese descent for his Public Affairs Committee broadcasts....He first con-tended that the F. B. I. would object if he gave the committee the names of the Japanese who had contributed funds to him .... He vas excused while the chairman of the committee telephoned the F. The bureau (FBI) not only denied Roth's statement but sent wo representatives to the Assembly Chambers ... where the hearing was being held. ... He was recalled to the stand and the questions were put in many ways and he still refused to name the Japanese. Charges were preferred against Roth and he was tried and convicted for the violation of Penal Code Section 87..."



By EDWARD P. JORDAN, M. D. I wenty or 25 years ago one disease of the nervous system known as multiple sclerosis was so uncommon as to be considered almost a medical curiosity in the

United States — though not in other places such as England and Germany. It must be said with regret that

this is no longer true, and multiple sclerosis, while not a "comon" disease, is no longer rare. Why this change has occurred is not know; if it were we might have a vital clue to the cause and what to do about it. An accepted identification of the

cause -and method of prevention and treatment-are what is needed. It is known that the disease attacks small and often distant parts of the central nervous system, the spinal cord and brain stem particularly, and that the symptoms depend on what par-ticular area is affected.

This latter point means that the signs of the disease tend to vary from person to person. Indeed when I mentioned some of the more common symptoms on a pre-vious occasion a number of people jumped to the conclusion that that was what was wrong with them. This is a dangerous practice since the diagnosis can only be made by an expert and many peo-ple can have the same symptoms from wholly different causes.






